Hamlin Pied Pipers Down Tribe, 26-14

Injuries contributed greatly to the Haskell Indians second loss of the 1980 season last Friday when the Tribe fell 26-14 to Hamlin.

With an open date this Friday, Tribe coaches are hopeful that team members will have a chance to heal the bruised and pulled muscles before the next game.

The Tribe offensive unit showed considerable improvement last Friday. The offense lost the ball once on a fumble and completed three of eight passes without an interception.

In the season opener, the Tribe lost the ball four times on fumbles and threw one interception.

The offensive unit moved the ball a total of 225 yards against Hamlin as compared to 164 the week before.

The Tribe scored first against Hamlin with 2:36 left in the first

quarter on a four yard run by Joe Benavides. The PAT failed.

Three plays later Hamlin scored and the PAT gave the Pied Pipers a 7-6 lead.

Near the end of the first half, Hamlin scored again to make the halftime score 13-6.

The entire first half was a defensive battle with the two teams punting a total of nine times.

Early in the third quarter Benavides connected with Monte Moeller for 18 yards and a touchdown. The pass for two was good and the Tribe led 14-13.

Late in the third period, the Tribe

marched 94 yards 10 plays to the six inch line before giving the ball up on downs.

Hamlin scored twice in the final period. The first TD came with 3:21 left and gave the Pied Pipers a 19-14 lead.

The final score came with 1:06 left and gave Hamlin a 26-14 win.

Although the varsity football team has an open date this week, the freshmen team will meet Seymour here at 7 p.m. Thursday.

Last Thursday the eighth grade Warrior football team downed Hamlin 22-6. The seventh grade team lost to Hamlin 14-0.

A team composed of the junior varsity and freshmen teams was defeated 6-0.

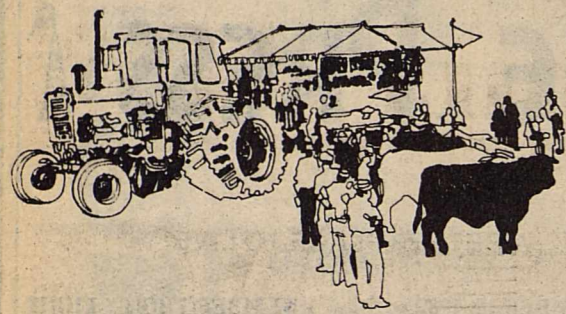

The Music Box, a new business in Haskell, is now open at 103 1/2 N. Ave. D.

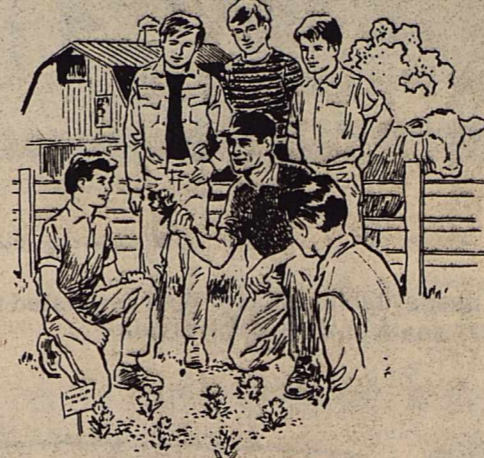

Make Lunches Nutritional

For many, September means leaving vacation behind and starting a regular school or work routine again. But that doesn't mean lunch-time has to be routine. Take a new look at brown-bagging it. You'll not only save money, you'll have more control over the nutritional content of your family's midday meals.

School lunches subsidized by the U.S. Department of Agriculture are inexpensive and nutritious, emphasizing reduced amounts of sugar, fat, and salt.

Brown bag lunches can also meet these criteria, and spark an iffy appetite. Try these tips:

Breads--Enriched, fortified, and especially whole-grain breads are the ticket. Compared to white breads, whole grain breads naturally provide more of some essential nutrients and fiber. For sandwiches, try: pita, raisen, cracked-wheat, whole-wheat, pumpernickel, rye, or black bread; English muffins or bagels. A no-Sandwich Lunch can still include bread products such as muffins, homemade quick breads, bread sticks or whole grain or enriched crackers.

Sandwich fillings--Break away from the bologna routine! Luncheon meats are fine sometime, but to keep fat and salt intake on the downside, try these sometimes:

Low-fat cottage cheese is a healthful and versatile filling. Season it with herbs: mix it with chopped, fresh vegetables or fresh, canned, or dried fruits. You can even use it to supplement other fillings like grated cheese, chopped egg, canned tuna, or leftover chicken.

Crunchy fresh vegetables add vitamins, fiber, and flavor to the plainest sandwich. Push beyond lettuce and tomato by layer slices of cucumber, peppers, zucchini, mushrooms, carrots, or radishes on your sandwich. Also try green onion stalks, spinach, sprouts, and chopped cauliflower or broccoli. Avoid wilted vegetable and soggy bread by wrapping vegetables separately and adding to sandwiches just before eating.

Go-withs--Expensive, salty, greasy snack foods appeal because of their crunch and spice. Many more nutritious snacks can taste as good: vegetable chunks--plain, sprinkled with herbs, spread with peanut butter or cheese, dunked in yogurt dip; homemade plain popcorn; unsalted pretzels; unsweetened cereal; bread sticks; whole-grain or

enriched crackers.

Desserts--Fresh fruits contain sugar, but it's not as concentrated as the sugars found in most prepared desserts. Try an apple, a juicy orange, or homemade fruit salad. Remember, fruit is cheaper bought in bulk at the supermarket than at the office cafeteria.

If an occasional sweet is too tempting, you can control the quality and the amount of sugar if you make your own. Fruited muffins, pumpkin or other quick breads, oatmeal cookies, and graham crackers can satisfy the craving and provide some essential nutrients as well. Try plain yogurt-spiced and fruited at home. Or get creative with cereal by adding dried chopped nuts, seeds, or dried fruits.

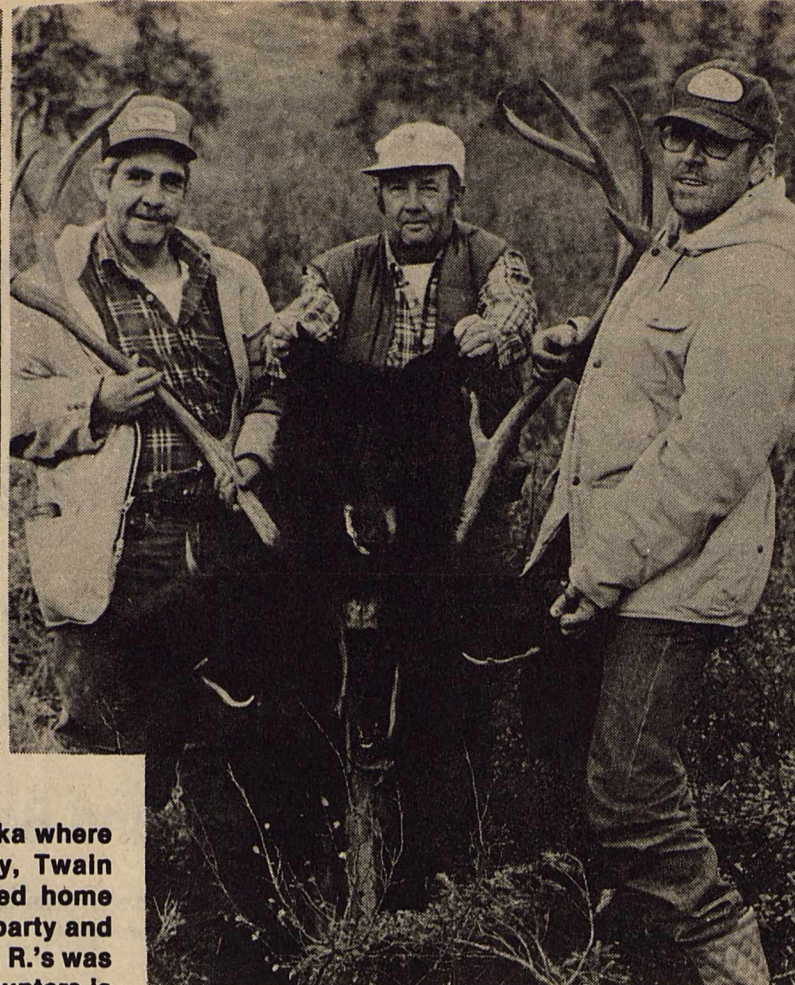

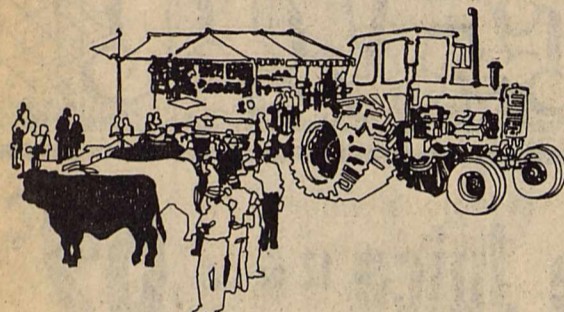

Livestock pens are available at both Abilene and San Angelo where the animals will be fed and watered.

Among the outstanding pledges that have been received are: a registered

Hereford Heifer from Weldon Davis Ranches, Coleman; a registered Angus Heifer from Bailey Ranches, Merkel; a registered Santa Gertrudis Bull from the world famous Nine-Bar Ranch of Hempstead; a registered Santa Gertrudis Heifer from Turkey Creek Ranch in Uvalde; a registered Brahma Bull from Hudgins Ranch of Hungerford; a registered Brangus Heifer from Mesquite Tree Brangus of Tye, plus others to be announced later.

The first sale will be Sept. 29 at Abilene Livestock Auction. Other sales include a horse sale, Oct. 4, Abilene Livestock Auction; sheep and goat sale, Oct. 6, Junction; special auction, Oct. 8, Coleman; farm equipment sale, Nov. 8, Clyde; and special auction, Nov. 12, Brownwood.

"In order to have sales, we must have livestock," said WTRC executive director Shelley V. Smith. "The more we have to offer the buyers, the higher the bidding should go, bringing dollars for the handicapped."

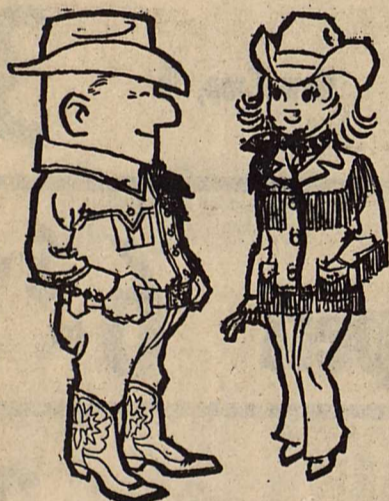



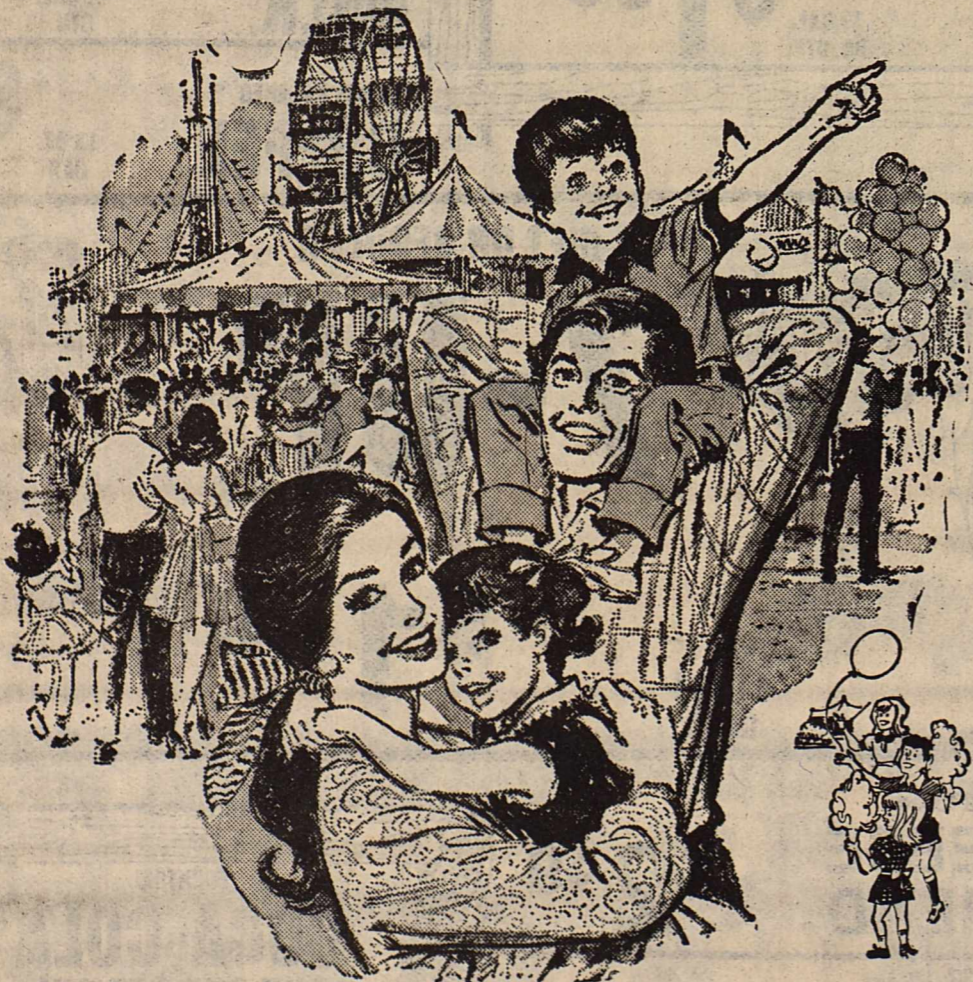

C/F Breath Of Life Campaign Set Sept. 21-27 In Haskell

There are 121 Cystic Fibrosis Centers in the U.S., specializing in the diagnosis and treatment of CF.

In Texas, CF clinics are located in San Antonio, Dallas, Houston, Austin and Lubbock.

The Foundation also conducts nationwide professional and education programs de-

signed to foster early diagnosis and treatment which extends and improves the lives of all lung-damaged children.

The Lone Star Chapter is one of over 100 CF Chapters in the United States conducting fund appeals to support the CF Foundation's programs of research, care and education.

"We are asking residents of

Haskell to give as generously as they can when a Breath of Life Campaign volunteer calls on them," says Sue Miller. "Through contributions to this Campaign we will see a day in which Cystic Fibrosis no longer takes a life every eight hours."

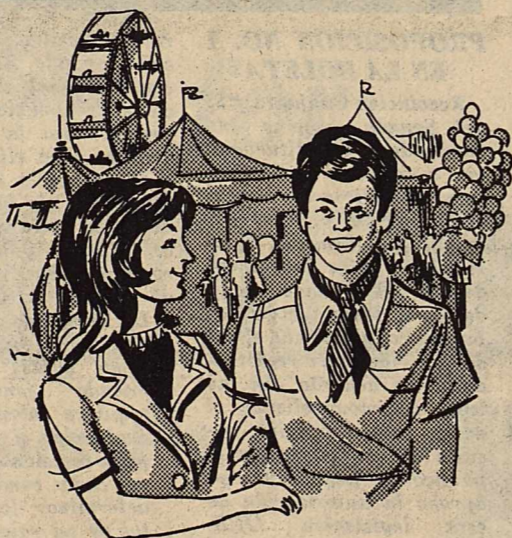

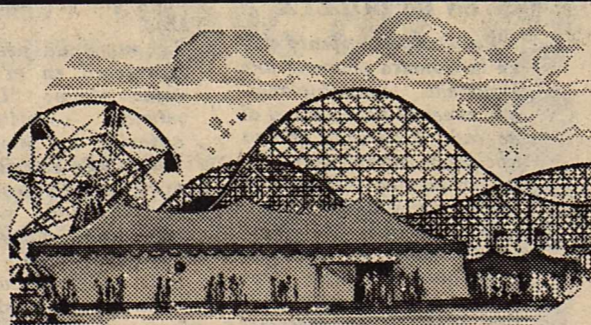

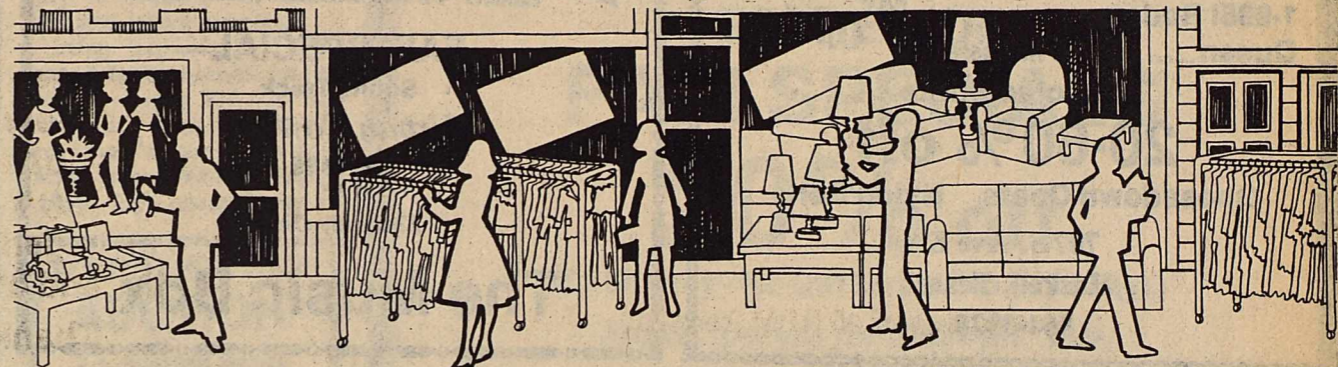

Haskell To Receive \$4,756.60 In Sales Tax Rebate

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said that Texas cities levying the optional one-percent city sales tax would receive \$25.5 million in rebates for September.

Bullock said this month's city sales tax allocation pushes the 1980 payments to more than \$418.5 million, compared to \$364.5 million paid to cities through October of last year.

Haskell will receive \$4,756.60 which will bring the 1980 total to \$91,170.77, an increase of 15% over 1979.

Dallas will receive \$2.9 million this month, bringing

1980's payments to date 14 percent more than 1979. Houston's check will be \$5.1 million, boosting 1980 payments to date to more than \$87.4 million.

San Antonio will receive \$1.4 million bringing that city's tax rebates this year to \$23.2 million.

Fort Worth's check this month totals \$891,097. The city sales tax is collected by merchants and businesses along with the state sales tax and is rebated each month by the Comptroller to the cities where it is collected.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1980

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pre-trial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the Governor to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the approval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitution-

PROPOSICION NO. 1 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta #97 de la Cámara propone una enmienda constitucional que conceda al Estado y al acusado el derecho de una apelación interlocutoria en los siguientes fallos de la corte en causas criminales: los fallos antes del juicio sobre la constitucionalidad de una ley; sobre la petición para anular, destituir, o desear una acusación; y sobre una petición para suprimir la evidencia.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional autoriza la apelación de ciertos fallos antes del juicio de una corte en una causa criminal por el Estado o por el acusado."

PROPOSICION NO. 3 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta #98 de la Cámara propone una enmienda constitucional que requiera una evaluación de todos los bienes sujetos a los impuestos de ad valorem y proveerá únicamente una junta para

limitaciones proveídas por la ley y sujeto a la aprobación de un comité ejecutivo del presupuesto que constará del Gobernador, Gobernador Teniente, Presidente de la Cámara de Representantes, Presidente y Vice-presidente del Comité de Finanzas del Senado, y Presidente y Vice-presidente del Comité de Asignaciones Fiscales de la Cámara de Representantes.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional concede al Gobernador el poder para ejercer control fiscal de los gastos de los fondos asignados según la ley."

PROPOSICION NO. 6 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta #8 del Senado propone una enmienda constitucional que permita al Gobernador remover a un oficial de su cargo aunque este haya sido previamente nombrado por el Gobernador y confirmado por el Senado. El remover al oficial será únicamente bajo el consentimiento del Senado, y si la Legislatura no está en sesión, se convocará una sesión extraordinaria del Senado, la cual no durará más de dos días, para considerar la eliminación del oficial en caso.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional autoriza que el Gobernador remueva a los oficiales nombrados bajo consejo y consentimiento del Senado."

PROPOSICION NO. 7 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta #121 de la Cámara propone una enmienda constitucional que autorice a los condados con una población de 5000 o menos, que construyan y mantengan caminos privados cobrando razonablemente por el trabajo. Por ley, la Legislatura puede limitar esta autoridad. Los ingresos recibidos por trabajo en caminos privados se pueden usar solamente para construcción, para adquisición de derecho de paso, o para el mantenimiento de caminos públicos.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional autoriza que los condados con una población de 5000 o menos trabajen en caminos privados."

PROPOSICION NO. 8 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta #36 del Senado propone una enmienda constitucional que cambie la jurisdicción y autoridad de las cortes de apelación del Estado. La enmienda cambiará el nombre de Cortes de Apelaciones Civiles a, Cortes de Apelación, dando a estas cortes jurisdicción de apelación sobre casos criminales y civiles. La enmienda cambiará el título de los Jueces Asociados de la Corte Suprema a, Jueces, y requerirá que los miembros de la Corte Suprema sean abogados con licencia del estado de Texas mientras permanezcan en el puesto.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional que cambia el nombre de Cortes de Apelaciones Civiles y el nombre, y requisito de los Jueces de la Corte Suprema y dicta la jurisdicción y autoridad de las cortes de apelación."

PROPOSICION NO. 9 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta #54 de la Cámara propone una enmienda constitucional que define la propiedad que posee cualquiera de los cónyuges como separada, incluyendo las dos clases—de bienes raíces y los bienes inmuebles—los tales fueron propiedad de alguno de los cónyuges antes del matrimonio o fueron adquiridos después como un regalo, ya sea un legado de bienes raíces, o de descendencia. Las partes que están por casarse o los que ya están casados, y sin la intención de defraudar a sus acreedores preexistentes, pueden repartirse de vez en cuando, entre sí y por escrito, toda o parte de su propiedad. Pueden también intercambiar un interés común en bienes poseídos o que van a poseer por un interés común en la comunidad de bienes. La enmienda permitirá a los cónyuges contribuir por escrito que los ingresos o bienes derivados de cualquier propiedad particular seguirá siendo propiedad particular en lugar de ser comunidad de bienes como sería si no existiera este convenio por escrito. La enmienda propone que el regalo de un cónyuge a otro se supone que incluye todos los ingresos y bienes derivados de tal regalo.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional permite a los cónyuges el consentir que los ingresos o los bienes que se derivan de los bienes particulares permanecerán como bienes particulares."

Controlling Damage Caused By Pecan Tree Aphids

The yellow pecan aphid which feeds on the foliage of pecan trees excretes a sticky substance called "honeydew." When aphids build up in large numbers the honeydew will fall as a mist and cover everything beneath the pecan tree. This sticky material is often first noticed on the car windshield after the car has been parked beneath a pecan tree.

Heavy yellow aphid infestations are now present on pecan trees in Haskell County. Heaviest infestations of these aphids most often occur in late summer.

The flow of honeydew can be eliminated by controlling the yellow aphids. Rain will wash the honeydew from plants and other objects on which it has settled. Heavy rain and wind will also reduce yellow aphid populations and can reduce populations to the point that chemical control measures will no longer be needed.

Another aphid, the black

pecan aphid, causes bright yellow angular blotches on the foliage and heavy infestations by this aphid can result in premature defoliation.

The black pecan aphid does not produce honeydew. Defoliation in late summer can result in a reduced nut crop in the current and succeeding year.

The level of damage that can be caused by the yellow pecan aphid is much less than that of the black pecan aphid. Heavy yellow aphid infestation can result in reduced nut quality and a reduced crop the following year but control measures are most often required to eliminate the honeydew which can be a big nuisance.

Cygon, DeFend, malathion or Zolone are insecticides that might be used to control either the black or yellow pecan aphids. When using the insecticide be sure to read and follow closely the information given on the label.

Superintendent's Views

The School budget is usually an item of vital concern to many citizens. Therefore, we will endeavor to explain the budgeting process with a series of columns.

By far, the greatest expenditure in a school budget is in salaries. The largest portion of this is in classroom teachers' salaries. Haskell ISD has 45 classroom teachers. This total does not include the Title I teachers (4) or the Plan A teachers (4). The estimated cost for salaries of teachers is \$642,070. The figure is broken down in relation to the various campuses. The Elementary classroom teachers salaries are estimated \$250,060, the Junior High salaries are estimated at \$152,400 and the High School salaries at \$239,610.

The State pays the majority of these salaries through the foundation program. However, the foundation program will support only a minimum program based almost strictly on average daily attendance. No school in Texas including Haskell can operate on a minimum foundation program. Therefore, we have the need for local taxes.

In the projecting of the budget for 1980-81 year, we estimated that the foundation program would participate in 35 teacher salaries. The local district will pay the salaries of 10 teachers. We feel these teachers are absolutely necessary in order to have an adequate school program.

Other items in the estimated instructional salary costs includes \$10,000 for substitute costs, \$1650 for workman's compensation (which is required by law) and \$1050 for unemployment

(which is also required by law.) We also have two aides paid for out of compensatory state funds. The total estimate payroll costs for instruction comes to \$666,930 of which the state pays the greater majority.

Conservation Viewpoints

The Rolling Plains Brush Control and Range Improvement Field Day will be held at the W.T. Waggoner Ranch, 13 miles south of Vernon on Highway 183/283, at the Zacawista Headquarters. The date is Friday, September 26, 1980.

Ranch tours will be conducted beginning at 8:00 a.m. and lasting through 11:30 a.m. Air conditioned buses will carry visitors on the tours. To be observed are research work being done. Discussions of the advances in chemical and mechanical control of mesquite, lotebush, and cedar, and range seedings.

The latest results of new experimental herbicides for mesquite control will be shown. Comparisons of commercial and experimental herbicides will show differences in control and treatment longevity. Studies on factors influencing herbicide effectiveness will be discussed along with findings from studies on annual broomweed and lotebush.

Latest results in low-cost techniques by rootplowing, disc-chaining, smooth chaining and aerial seeding or ground seeding with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station experimental seeder plus numerous kleingrass plantings will be viewed and discussed. Promising new grasses will be given attention.

Research and commercial equipment will be on display. A special showing of the "Waggoner Horses," and discussions of advances in breeding and feeding programs will be available at ranch headquarters.

A catered meal (Dutch Treat) will be served between

12:30 p.m. and 1:30 p.m., with entertainment.

From 1:30 p.m. to 3:00 p.m., a very interesting program is planned dealing with (1) the role of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Extension Service and Range Science Department in range improvement research, (2) accomplishments in brush control and range seeding research, and (3) development of a practical brush control and range seeding program on ranches.

Co-sponsoring the field day with TAES and Extension Service, will be the Soil Conservation Service, Texas Section Society of Range Management, the Wilbarger Soil and Water Conservation District and others.

Pre-registration is requested. Details can be secured from your County Agent Max Stapleton or your local Soil Conservation Service Office.

Two air facilities are available, (1) Airstrip on ranch headquarters-3,000 feet of dirt strip, (2) Wilbarger County Airport-5,100 feet paved and lighted strip. Transportation to ranch headquarters will be available.

Rail Act Promises To Increase Competition

BY CONGRESSMAN CHARLES STENHOLM
WASHINGTON, D.C. — With the recent passage of the Rail Act of 1980, Congress has

now taken significant steps toward deregulation of our three primary transportation industries: air, trucking and rail.

Two years after the deregulation of the nation's airlines, we are all aware of the many changes in that industry, particularly the increased competition by which small commuter airlines are serving the public well with increased service at competitive costs. Now, only four months after passage of the trucking deregulation bill, we are beginning to hear of initial effects of competition on that industry. Members of the trucking industry have reopened contract negotiations with the Teamster Union this week, a move thought by many to have been brought about by the increased competition by non-union

firms after deregulation. In both cases, I applaud that increased competition, feeling that it supports my strong belief in the Free Enterprise System, even though there may be economic dislocation of major importance in the short-run. In the case of rail deregulation, however, it is the lack of competition in many areas that may lead to trouble. Many areas and industries of our state are served by only one railroad and must depend solely on that transportation for the movement of such bulk commodities as grain, steel, coal, auto parts and chemicals.

The Rail Act of 1980 may have failed to provide a balance in railroad ratemaking with respect to those captive shippers. I supported a provision, the Eckhardt Amendment, which would have given the Interstate Commerce Commission greater flexibility for review of rates where railroads enjoy monopoly power and can extract exorbitant rates from these captive shippers. The City of San Antonio presents a representative case of the problems caused for captive shippers: After being locked into plans to convert the city-owned electric utility from oil and gas to coal, the city has seen a 260 percent increase from the transportation rate initially proposed in 1973. That amendment did fail (296-83) and I subsequently supported the compromise legislation because it was the best we were going to be able to pass.

viable means of transportation and turn to even more expensive transport for bulk commodities; or continue to pour federal money (to the tune of some \$11 billion during the past five years alone) into inefficient government-managed rail lines. CONRAIL and AMTRAK were enough for me to make my decision to support rail deregulation. With any deregulation, we are surely headed down the right track.

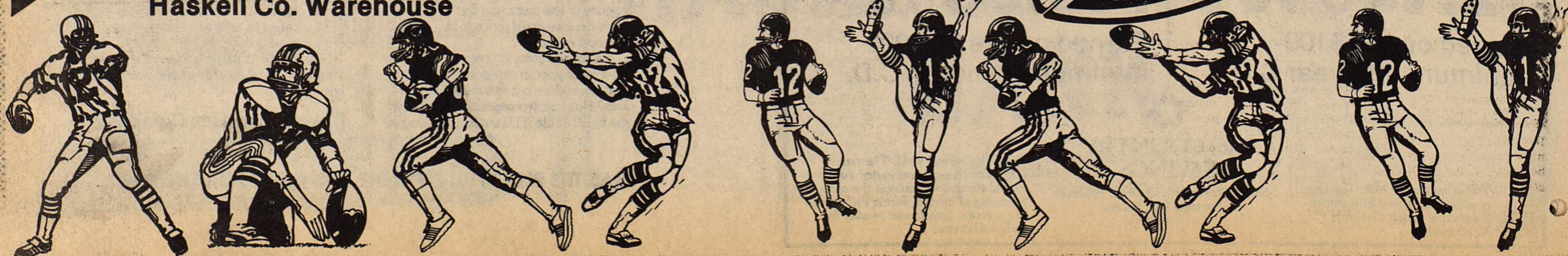
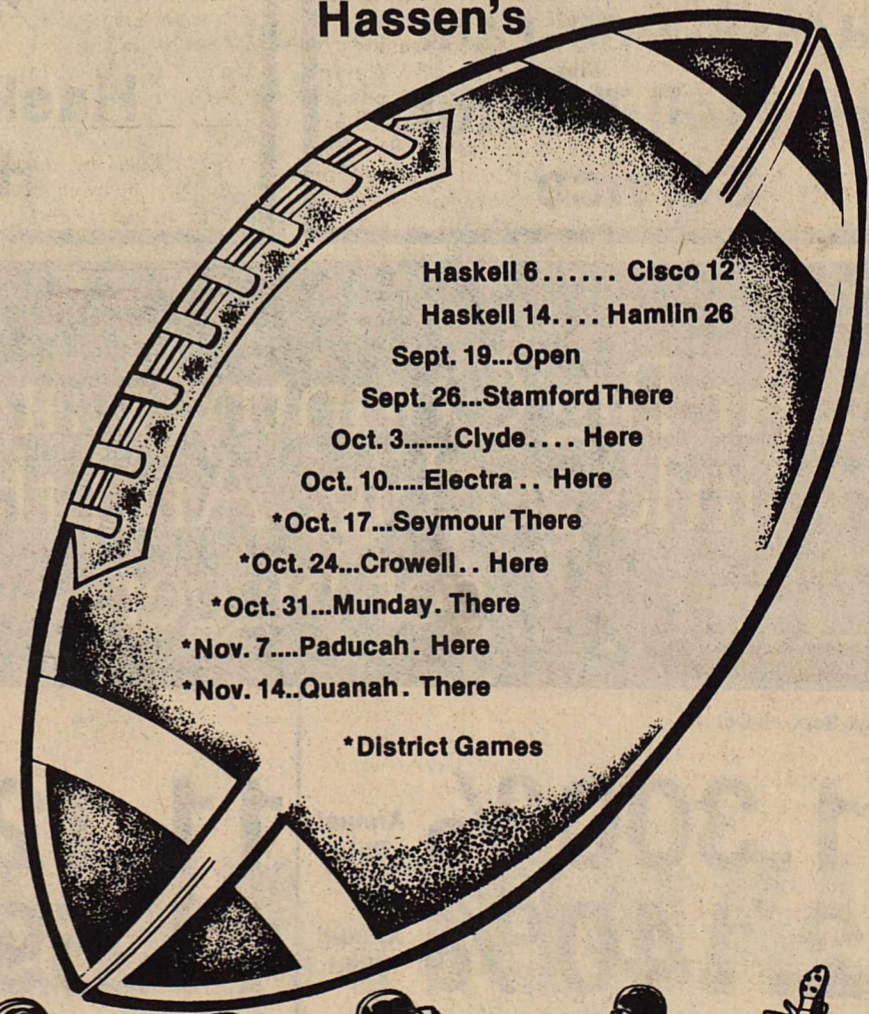
