

The City of Haskell has filed applications for Federal assistance regularly for the past five years and received nothing each time.

Normally I subscribe to the theory that we can solve our problems much better without the aid of Uncle Sam, but this isn't a normal problem.

Both City and County officials generally agree that we would have probably been better off if we had refused federal funds following the 1978 flood. The money certainly helped, but the rules, regulations and paperwork required sometimes hampered to the point of having a negative effect.

Federal assistance to prevent future flooding in Haskell is required for at least two reasons. First, the project simply costs more than the City could ever hope to afford. Secondly, work on Rice Springs Creek would have to be done above and below the city and the city would have authority only to do work within the city limits.

The same type problem exists at Lake Stamford and for the second time in two years most of the homes and cabins have been flooded.

It seems ironic that if the first application to complete flood prevention work on Rice Springs Creek had been funded in 1976 when it was submitted, it would have probably cost less than the disaster payments of 1978 and at the same time both floods would have been prevented.

Work at Lake Stamford which would enable excess water to flow from the lake seems like a simple solution.

Residents and property owners around the lake are meeting with the Stamford City Council next Monday afternoon at 1:30 to discuss

such a project. At the same time most are writing letters to Congressman Charles Stenholm who has expressed his eagerness to assist but stated that he needed letters to document his case.

Indians Fall To Stamford Bulldogs

WTU Request Increase

West Texas Utilities Company has filed application for a general rate increase, Sue Pate, local manager announced.

The official filing was made Tuesday, September 30, with incorporated towns for retail customers within their jurisdiction and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for an increase to customers outside incorporated towns.

The proposed rates would produce an increase in total revenue of \$12,729,619. This amounts to 8.27 per cent based on revenues of \$153,914,156 for the test period ending this past June 30.

The company requested that the new rates become effective November 4.

One of the basic reasons for the increase was cited as inflation.

"The cost of providing electric service continues to increase more rapidly than revenue," the manager

This rate adjustment would be only the second general retail rate increase in the company's entire history, which goes back more than 50 years. The other increase was in 1973 and amounted to about six per cent across the board.

"We've managed to make that six per cent go a long way," the WTU manager said, noting that every other utility company in the state, and probably in the nation, has had at least one increase since then and most of them have had several.

Several reasons were given as to how WTU has been able to manage without a rate increase during the past several years of double-digit inflation. Chief among these was the timing of WTU's power plant construction. Its newest and largest station was completed in the mid-1970s and provided generation reserves sufficient not only to last for several years but to allow profitable energy sales to other companies.

The Company also cited its reputation as a conservative company with firm control of its expenditures.

The Company's rate structure, which now has over 125 rates for many types and classes, would be reduced to less than 30 rates. The effect of the increase on the different customer classes would vary according to present relative rates of return from each class.


For example, the typical residential electric bill would increase by about 10 per cent.

Although customer bills have risen substantially in the past few years, the increases have been the result of more usage and higher fuel costs. The average residential customer's electric usage in the WTU system increased from 6,363 kilowatt-hours in 1972 to 8,270 kilowatt-hours this past year.

The cost of fuel has risen from 23 cents per million BTU in 1972 to \$1.96 this past summer. Generally, this fuel cost is the only increased expense that has been shared by the customer under WTU's recent rate schedule.

The city has several options in responding to WTU's rate request. It may approve the increase, deny the increase, or suspend the rates for a certain period of time. The city also has the option of denying the request and ceding future jurisdiction to the Public Utility Commission.







TEST FIRST

Before shampooing, though, check to see if the rug fades. Simply "test" a spot using the shampoo. Use clear water to rinse the suds by rubbing the spot with a clean damp sponge.

Be sure the test spot is a place usually not seen--such as a spot under a piece of furniture or in a closet.

Rinse the sponge and rub the patch again. Do this several times to make sure all dirt and detergent are out--but don't use too much water.

Let the spot dry. If the color looks the same, but cleaner, after it's dry, go ahead and

shampoo the rest of the rug. Any fiber with fast color should withstand shampooing.

Some twists and weaves are more difficult to shampoo since rubbing and agitation of the pile may affect appearance, and again, that's the reason for testing a spot: to answer all of those kinds of questions

ITEMS YOU'LL NEED For the job you'll need the vacuum cleaner, a special rug shampoo or a light-duty synthetic detergent and a mixing bowl.

For the mechanical method, you'll need a shampoo applicator or an electric polisher-

scrubber with a rug-cleaning

For the hand method, you'll need a soft brush, spatuala, sponges and cloths.

HOW TO DO THE JOB Thoroughly vacuum the

Either use the special rug shampoo or whip one-fourth cup light-duty detergent with one pint warm water until foam is formed.

Apply the foam with the shampoo applicator or the polisher scrubber.

Be sure to follow the manufacturer's directions for use of equipment.

If you don't have devices, apply the foam with a brush to a small area at a time. Remove soiled lather with a spatula and rinse with a clean wet

Repeat this using overlapping circles.

Use an electric fan or reverse warm air blast from the vacuum cleaner to speed the drying. If the carpet is loose laid, drying time can be lessened by directing the air underneath the carpet.

When the rug is thoroughly dry, vacuum to remove any residue and suspended soil.

Put brown paper down if you must walk on the rug




