

# Mikeanna Wilcox Has San Antonio Champion

Almost eight years of feeding steers under the supervision of County Extension Agent Max Stapleton, paid off for Mikeanna

Wilcox when her jet-black simmental was named the Grand Champion Steer of the 32nd Annual Stock Show and Rodeo in San Antonio.

The 1210 pound simmental named 'Tar Baby' was bred and raised on the ranch of W. R. Hager Jr. of Weinert.

Dr. Calvin Drake of Kansas State University was judge for the junior steer show.

To make it to Grand Champion competition 'Tar Baby' was first chosen the Grand Champion Simmental. Then 13 youngsters with expectant looks on their faces stood holding their breed champions in the show ring waiting for the judges decision.

When one bystander told Mikeanna he'd won a bet because 'Tar Baby' was chosen the winner, she laughed. "I'm glad you had that much faith that we'd win. I wasn't all that sure."

On Friday, a crowd of about 700 filled the main floor of the Coliseum Arena. With flags flying and the

band playing, San Antonio Schlitz Beer Distributor, Jim Williams paid a record \$28,000 for 'Tar Baby'.

Williams said he plans to donate the steer to an educational scholarship fund.

The autopsy also showed that the man had been dead for four to six weeks.

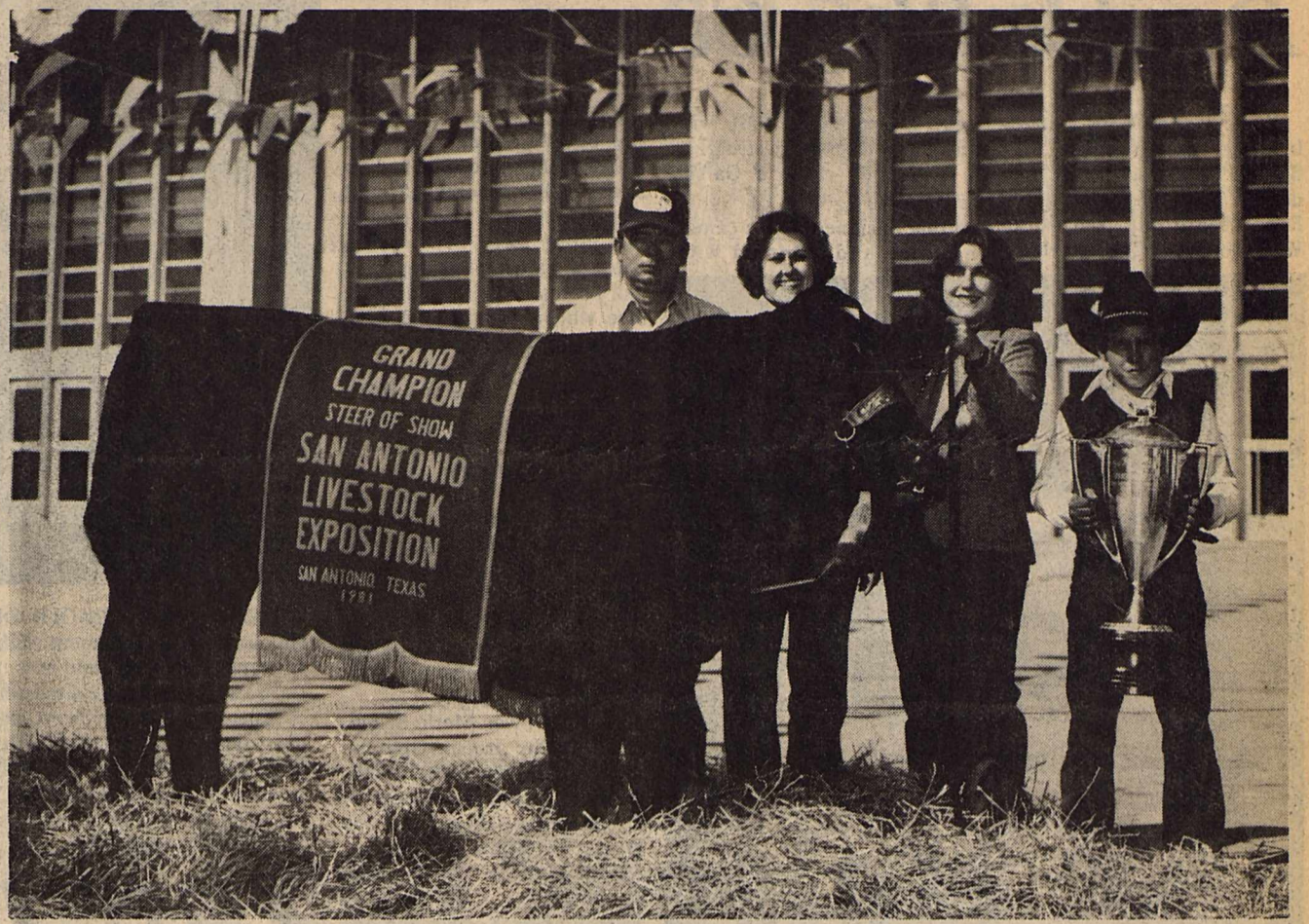
At the November meeting the Haskell chapter voted to meet six times a year, with the first meeting on 1981 to be held on March 2.

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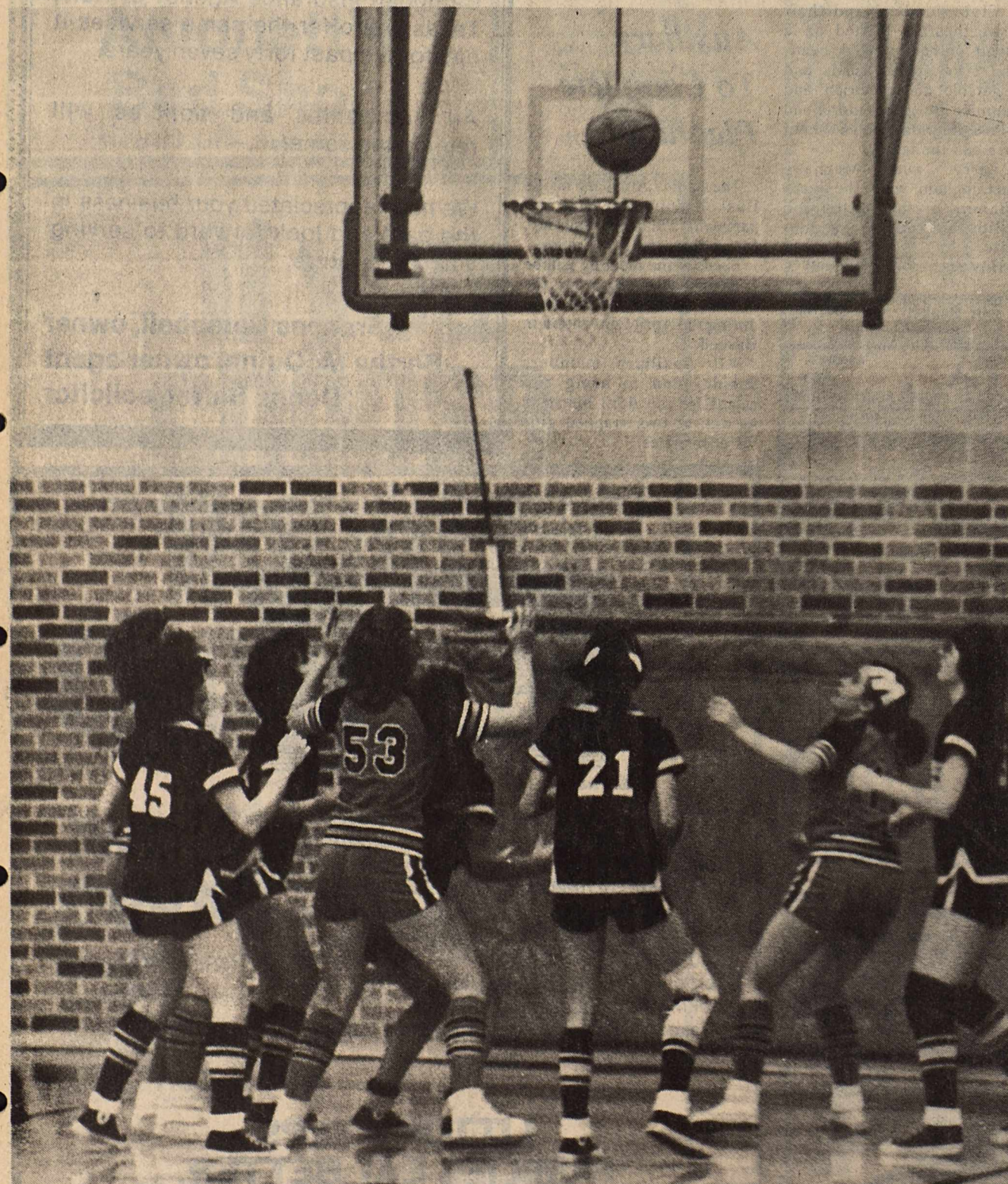

## Stop Food Waste To Save Money

Are we wasting food?

If so, we're wasting our own money, too, while some of the nation's families don't have enough food, says Mary K. Sweeten, a food and nutrition specialist.

National statistics say many of the nation's families are wasting food—almost half of all the food we buy, the specialist reports.

Mrs. Sweeten is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Results of a 1977-78 national survey show that about 2,900 kilocalories enter a household every day, but only 1,800-1,900 kilocalories actually are consumed.

**Families Without Enough**  
In spite of efforts to assure America's families enough food, some are still without, Mrs. Sweeten notes.

Progress has been made over past years to give people

on limited incomes a better chance at partaking of the nation's abundant food supply—through government-assisted programs, such as the Food-Stamp Program, the program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) and the School Breakfast and Lunch programs, the specialist says.

However, the national survey still shows three percent of all households without enough food—and nine percent of all low-income families without enough food, she adds.

**How to Stop Waste**  
Families can stop food waste with several steps aimed at preventing food from going to the trash:

1) check plate waste to determine how much the family is wasting,

2) make food-shopping plans—but first consider family preferences and inventory the foods on hand including those from the family garden,

3) use leftovers by making "planned overs," such as stews, soups, homemade frozen TV dinners, and

4) make a family project of not wasting food.

Avoiding food waste is something the nation's families can take action on and see almost instant results, Mrs. Sweeten reminds.

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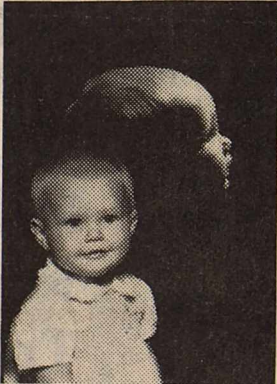
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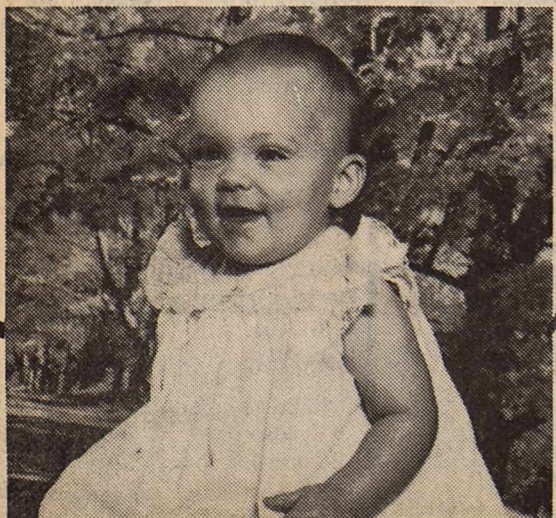

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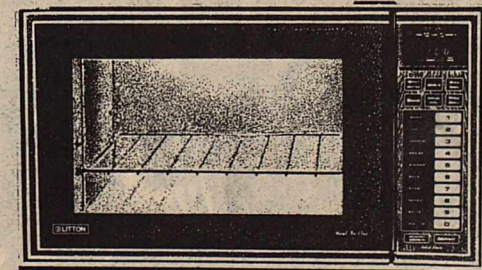
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# Texans To Attend NFU Convention Weinert Baptists Set Revival

Mike Moeller, President of the TFU, said the national convention takes on added importance this year to the country's family farmers and ranchers as the 1981 Farm Bill will soon be pending before Congress. "The convention will provide an excellent opportunity for Secretary of Agriculture Block to outline the administration's plans on the farm bill and for the next four years. Farmers and ranchers are anxious to learn what the Reagan Administration plans for the many programs which affect them," Moeller stated. The TFU President will also attend the national convention.

The theme of the 1981 NFU Convention is "Justice for Agriculture." George Stone, President of the NFU, said the theme was selected "because

justice is exactly what the debate over the farm bill will be about. There will be powerful interests working hard against the family farm concept." Stone added "it will take every Farmers Union member in this country to begin to tip the scale of justice out of the hands of the few and back into the hands of the families in agriculture."

In addition to Agriculture Secretary Block other speakers at the NFU convention will be U.S. Senator Max Baucus (Montana), Congressman Kika de la Garza (Texas), Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, and Congressman Tom Daschle (South Dakota), a member of the House Agriculture Committee.

The NFU is composed of over a quarter million family farmers and ranchers from 22 states. The organization will be drafting their annual policy for the membership during the

national convention.

The NFU addresses the concerns of all major farm commodities and is the major proponent of a fair government support program combined with supply management practices such as allotments and set-asides. The organization also supports international commodity agreements and has historically stood for 100 percent of parity farm prices.

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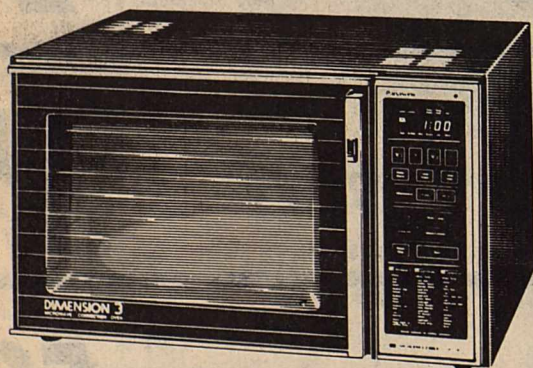
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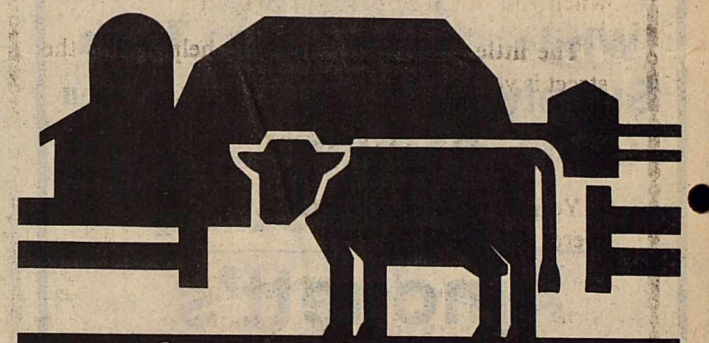

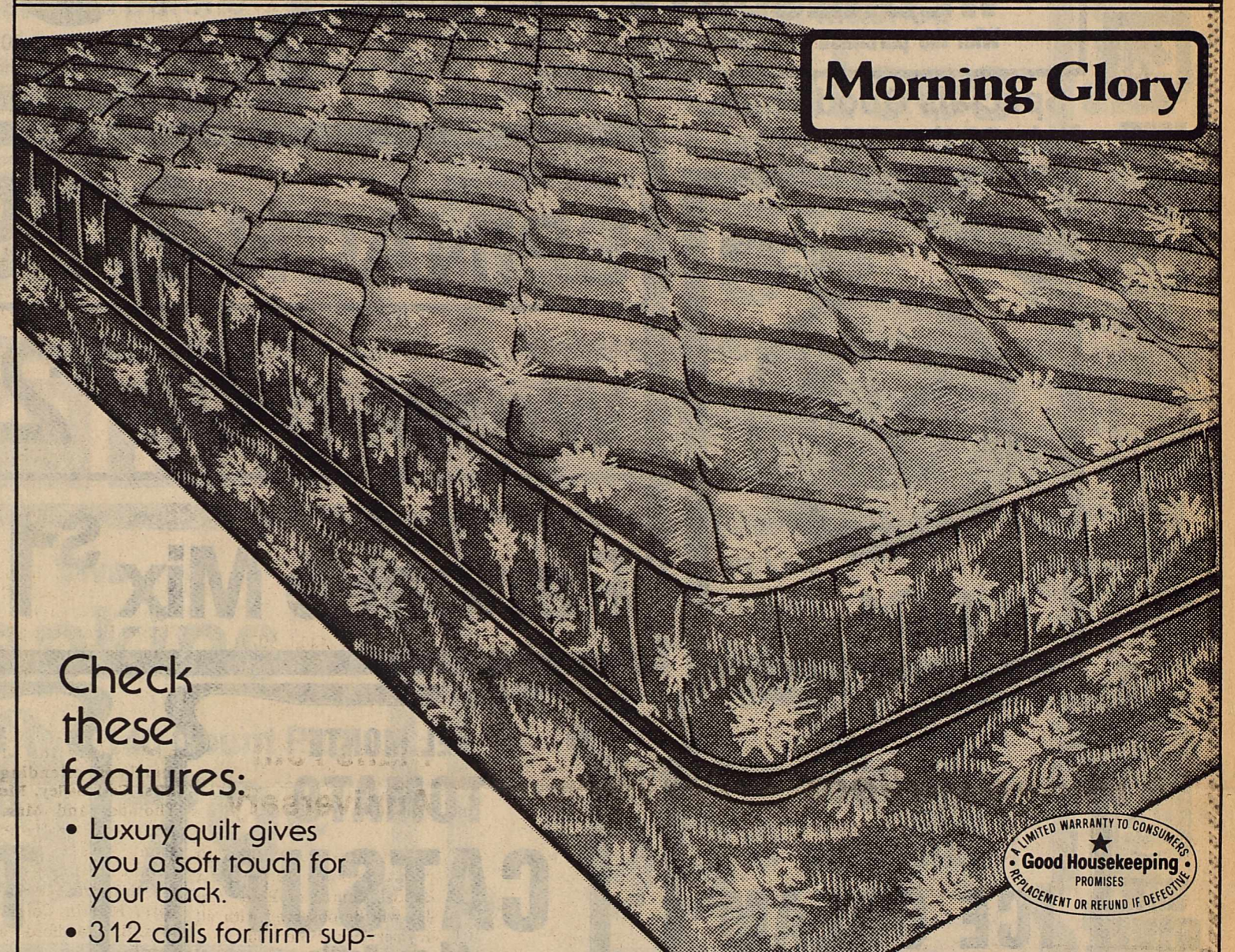

## Stenholm Discusses 1981 Farm Bill

Farmers and Ranchers from throughout the 17th Congressional District met in the first of a series of Town Hall Meetings Saturday, February 21, in Cisco. The meeting, sponsored by Texas Farmers Union, was attended by some 150 people, who are vitally interested in the writing of the 1981 Farm Bill, scheduled to begin on March 2 in Washington.

Congressman Charles Stenholm of Stamford was the keynote speaker for the meeting. He made several comments relative to the President's budgetary cuts mentioned last Wednesday, and their possible effect on agribusiness. Mentioning the conservative trend in Congress, he said that any program for agriculture that required more money was very unlikely to pass, but that higher prices for farm commodities, and the curbing of runaway inflation was the

most likely road to returning of American farmers and ranchers to fiscal soundness.

Stenholm discussed low farm profitability at length, saying "Anyone who deals with agriculture knows what the problem is—it's called cash flow, not having enough money at the end of the year to pay off your debts and be able to look ahead to the next year and putting in your crop." Stating that farm income is down 40 percent from 1973 levels, while the nation's personal income has been rising, he added, "We are somehow going to recognize that agriculture cannot exist indefinitely with declining net income, because when I say it's down 40 percent, that's in today's dollars, and that does not pay \$1.15 diesel; that does not pay the cost of all the inputs that go into agriculture."

A lengthy question and answer session followed

Stenholm's address, with farmers and ranchers providing input to the Congressman about the writing of the farm bill, which Stenholm said should be written by those familiar and involved in agriculture, who know how to write them.

Texas Farmers Union President Mike Moeller and Bob Mullins, TFU staff lobbyist in Washington also lead discussions of issues pertinent to the

1981 Farm Bill, as they will in many Congressional districts throughout Texas in the coming weeks.

## GED Test Set February 28

The General Educational Development Test will be given in the official testing center, the Haskell Junior High School Library, on Saturday, Feb. 28, 1981, beginning at 9:00 a.m. The fee for the battery of five tests is \$20.00. An applicant is advised to bring his Social Security Number and driver's license for proper identification.

The multiple choice test battery has 5 parts: Writing Skills, Social Studies, Science, Reading Skills, and Mathematics. Three of the tests have an hour's time limit, while two (Social Studies and Science) have a limitation of one and one half hours. Therefore, most examinees take six hours to complete the test battery.

Persons eligible for testing must:

- be a resident of Texas or a member of the Armed Forces stationed in Texas;
- be at least 17 years of age and officially withdrawn from school for one calendar year.

Applicants who have attained

their 17th birthday and will enter the Armed Forces may test immediately after withdrawing from school.

To receive a certificate of high school equivalency, the examinee must:

- complete the examination with a minimum standard score of 40 on each of the five test OR an average standard score of 45 on all five tests.

- have attained at least their 17th birthday prior to date of testing and be out of school for one calendar year.

The GED Program provides a means for determining the educational level of adults who have not completed a formal high school education. A certificate of high school equivalency will be issued to adults who successfully complete the GED examination. This verifies that the holder has demonstrated a level of competence on the examination which is equivalent to that of a high school senior.
