Completion Scheduled For 1983 On New City Park Project

Work on a \$111,090.00 City Park improvement program has been started in Haskell according to the City Park Commissioner Franciene

The program, scheduled to be completed by August 1983, will include: lighting the softball field; building a concession stand; two lighted tennis courts; rip-rap of creek waterway; channelization of creek; landscaping; low water crossing; signs; parking and restroom renovation.

The project will be funded with a \$55,045.00 grant from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and a matching amount from the City of

Much of the Cities funds will be provided in the form of labor and materials. These funds can also be

supplemented by donations of

labor, materials and funds by

interested citizens or organizations.

The Softball Association has agreed to reimburse the City for funds used on the field.

The original grant was approved in the fall of 1980 but has been changed several times. Each portion of the project must be approved by engineers and the Parks and Wildlife Department which has slowed the construction portion of the project.

According to Mrs. Johnson, the park has undergone extensive work since the 1978 flood.

Original flood repairs completed

in February 1979 included the purchase of two small carosels, two large carosels, one barrel, 12 new tables, a new fence, two barbeque pits, creek cleanup, reseeding grass and repaving.

In addition to the new equipment,

other equipment and facilities were repaired and repainted.

"The original grant application also included a new foot bridge which was later dropped because of costs. The old bridge was destroyed by vandals until it could no longer be repaired," said Mrs. Johnson.

"Any group or club that would like to consider providing funds for a new bridge may contact me or Desmond Dulaney for more information," stated Mrs. Johnson. Mrs. Johnson also said, "We hope when this project is completed it will be a source of pride for the community. Everyone using the park is requested to call our

attention to any repairs which need to be made as soon as possible so that we can keep the park safe and

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





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The Consumer Alert

by Mark White Attorney General

AUSTIN-In February, 1980, Attorney General Mark White sponsored a statewide conference which brought parents, teachers, school administrators, lawyers, enforcement personnel and students together to discuss the problem of discipline in the schools. Among other things, participants agreed that a written code of student conduct which defines student rights and responsibilities in clear and concise language and sets forth the legal limitations within which school officials may exercise their disciplinary authority would help solve the problem. Not only would such a code indicate to students what their rights and duties are, it would also make clear to teachers and administrators that, in fact, they possess sufficient authority to deal with the problem of violence and disruption in the schools.

The code is completed and is now being distributed to school campuses and other interested groups throughout Texas. While the code is voluntary, meaning that it is up to each school district to decide whether to adopt all, part, or none of the code, it should be noted that the State Board of Education has recommended its adoption. School districts which lack clear and comprehensive codes of student conduct should find the Attorney General's code especially useful. Districts which already have a code of conduct in place can use the Attorney General's code to update or strengthen their code. The code of student conduct

is divided into two main sections."Student Rights and Responsibilities" and "Student Discipline." It is further divided into subsections which address specific aspects of both main topics, such as damage to school property, possession of weapons, possession and use of alcohol and drugs, and general disruption. various disciplinary options such as suspension and corporal punishment are also in-

A large part of the code is based upon legal sources such as statutes, constitutions, and case law; these references are clearly noted. The remainder of the code was developed with the aid of input obtained from questionnaires sent to parents, teachers, students, and administrators throughout

the state and from communications with interested parties. Throughout the last year, meetings involving representatives of these groups were held to discuss and critique preliminary drafts of the code.

The underlying premise of the code is that a workable balance must be achieved between the rights and responsibilities of students, with adequate emphasis placed upon each. Although the courts have held that students are entitled to certain protections and they possess various rights, school officials have a duty to ensure that the exercise of those rights does not infringe the rights of others or create an environment in which learning is difficult, if not unsafe. The Attorney General believes that if students are aware of both their rights and their duties, and teachers and school administrators know that they can, and must, take necessary action to handle disciplinary problems when they arise, most problems can be avoided. Your school district has, or

will soon have, a copy of the Attorney General's code of student conduct. You are encouraged to contact school officials for information concerning the code, and to meet with your school administrators during the coming months to consider adopting it in your



Hints For Fireplace Cleaning

FROM LOU GILLY **County Extension Agent** A fireplace-cleaning "blueprint" isn't really necessary for the job, but this one might

FIRST STEPS

First, spread a plastic dropcloth or newspapers around the hearth to prevent damage to floor or carpeting.

Remove chunks of logs and ashes that have accomulated. Use a wide spatula or scraper to dislodge sooty deposits from the fireplace walls.

CHECK CHIMNEY And while you're down on your hands and knees, it's a good time to take flashlight in hand and check out the condition of the chimney itself. Heavy accumulations of soot and creosote in the flue can cause smoking by restricting the upward movement of gases-and it can result in

Make it a practice to clean

the chimney regularly-once a year if the fireplace gets frequent use. Clean it twice a year if you build a fire every

COMMERCIAL PRODUCTS For cleaning brick and masonry fireplaces there are commercial cleaning products designed to do these jobs. They are made to safely remove grime, grease, smoke, soot and discoloration.

Instructions may differ with each manufacturer, so follow directions carefully if you choose one of the commercial

'FROM BOTTOM TO TOP' In cleaning any vertical (up-and-down direction) surface, clean from the bottom upward to prevent streaking. Clean large areas by working with a small secton at a time. Do not let cleaning solutions remain on tile, chrome, copper or brass surfaces, since discoloration may occur.

HOMEMADE PRODUCTS Another method of cleaning the fireplace attacks the problem "from scratch" and does a nice job with

Here's how it works: Start by scrubbing the surfaces of brick or stone fireplaces with thick suds of detergent and water applied with a stiff bristle (non-metal) brush.

homemade products.

After rinsing and drying, check for remaining traces of the stain.

In additional cleaning is required, wash the surface with a solution of one gallon of warm water containing one cup of trisodium phosphate and 1/4 cup wash detergent. Trisodium phosphate is available from paint and hardware stores and do-ityourself outlets.

Work the sudsy solution into the brick, stone and masonry surfaces with a stiff bristle brush for five to 10

Wear rubber gloves and

protective clothing, since the trisodium phosphate can cause skin irritation. FIREPLACE ACCESSORIES

Take fireplace tools and screens outside and sweep or vacuum them before washing with detergent and water.

Avoid using abrasives such as powder or steel wool on brass, copper or chrome pieces-and don't use other types of cleaners or polishes on these items, either. Any of those products can damage the clear, protective coating they may have to prevent tarnishing. Simply wash them with the detergent-water mix to keep the protective finish intact.

To clean heat-resistant glass doors on some fireplaces, do the job only when they're cool to the touch. Wash them with diluted commercial window cleaner as

We are moving forward full speed with a plan to relieve the problem of over-crowding in the Texas prison

Through a new conditional parole program utilizing existing halfway houses and a temporary tent encampment within the perimeter of prison security areas, we will be able to get 3,000 inmates who now sleep on Department of Corrections floors into more-comfortable facilities by July 1.

Our plan is responsive to the order of Federal District Judge William Wayne Justice to eliminate triplecelling of inmates by August.

Attorney General Mark White is seeking a stay of Judge Justice's far-reaching decision with regard to the Texas prison system, many aspects of which we strongly disagree with. We do agree, however, that over-crowding must be eliminated promptly.

Hopefully, 750 inmates will be paroled to halfway houses by June 1 and another 750 before July 1. Meanwhile, I have recommended \$16 million be appropriated for intensively-supervised halfway houses during the next biennium.

Board of Pardons and Paroles contracts with halfway houses and individual parolee contracts will be drawn tightly to insure protection of law-abiding citizens, restitution to victims of crimes and minimum cost to tax-

A supplemental grant of \$1.25 million from the Governor's Office of General Counsel and Criminal Justice to the Board of Pardons and Paroles permits immediate placement of conditional parolees in halfway houses. Inmates will receive the highest degree of supervision to assure protection of the public. Initial conditional parolees have been identified and are being processed to halfway houses with advice of local judges, prosecutors and sheriffs.

Meanwhile, we are obtaining military tents from the Texas National Guard to house another 1500 low risk inmates temporarily within prison unit security areas. July 1 is our goal for this relocation. The tents, which have been used by our loyal servicemen in the field, will certainly be a preferred alternative to triple-celling of inmates during a brief, five-months period.

The Legislature already has approved my emergency request for a \$35 million appropriation to construct additional permanent housing for inmates. When this construction is completed November 1, inmates who have spent the summer and early fall in the tent encampments will be transferred to the new quarters.

Texas Department of Corrections is studying possible purchase of the Harris County Rehabilitation Center or building new facilities on state land to expand work furlough programs under my \$18 million appropriations request. We have also increased funding for adult probation programs.

The TDC construction program for the 1982-83 biennium will provide 10,800 additional permanent bed spaces by August 31, 1983.

I am encouraged, based on my meeting with U.S. Attorney General William French Smith, that the Reagan Administration is re-examining its position in the lawsuit involving the Texas prison system. I am increasingly hopeful of a stay on appeal of the Ruiz v. Estelle suit.

We are, indeed, in a crisis situation, however-one which could cost the state billions of dollars.

I am confident the programs I have set out will eliminate the problem of inmates sleeping on floors by July 1, without need for wholesale release to homes via an inadequately-supervised work furlough arrangement.

All of this has been undertaken in good faith and with integrity to alleviate the situation in our prisons. I believe that Judge Justice will be pleased with our

Pesticide Selection **Important**

Before deciding on what insecticide to use for controlling pests in your vegetable garden, you must first identify the pest.

Pesticides are often limited in insect control because they may control one group of insects extremely well while being totally ineffective in controlling others, says Max Stapleton, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Three pesticides currently are used widely by gardeners--carbaryl (Sevin), diazinon and malathion. Although they are effective against a wide range of chewing and sucking insects, each has limitations, Stapleton notes. For instance, Sevin does not control spider mites and malathion is not recommended for soil insect control.

Gardeners should exercise caution when using broadspectrum insecticides because these chemicals can adversely affect non-target, beneficial insects such as honeybees, lady bird beetles and praying mantis, Stapleton explains. When beneficial insects are destroyed, the possibility of increased pesticide use is greatly enhanced.

A pesticide with a narrow host range should be used when possible, says Stapleton. An example of such a type of pesticide is the microbial insecticide, Bacillus thuringiensis, more commonly called B.T. It is designed to control cabbage loopers, armyworms, hornworms and several other larvae. B.T., sold under such names as Dipel, Thuricide and Biotrol, is effective, safe to use, does not harm beneficial insects, and does not require a waiting period before vegetables can

Another specific pesticide in garden use is Kelthane. It's excellent for controlling spider mites and does not harm beneficial insects.

Stapleton notes that the best bet for the gardener in doubt about pest control is to read the product label, for it provides information about the pesticide and the insects it

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A Weed-Free Garden Saves Time And Labor

Weeds can be just as big a problem to the spare-time home gardener in Texas as they are to commercial producers of vegetables, according to Dr. Sam Cotner, State Horticulturist with the Texas table crops. Agricultural Extension Service.

'Weeds, whether growing in a commercial field or in a backyard garden, not only compete with the desirable plants for water, fertility, sunlight, and air," Cotner says, "but can also harbor many different types of insects, as well as numerous plant diseases.'

Experimental gardeners are aware of the time-tested and proven methods of weed control, which include hoeing and mulching.

For many gardeners, hand hoeing is still the best answer to controlling troublesome and pesky weeds. It is inexpensive, obviously selective, very accurate, effective, and for some, even enjoyable.

It is obvious that exercise is also involved, which is one of the added rewards of growing vegetables at home. However, many gardeners simply don't have time to spend hoeing weeds in their vegetable gar-

Mulching around existing garden vegetables helps control weeds and grasses by keeping light away from the seedlings and providing a mechanical barrier to their emergence. Weeds that do come through the mulch can easily be spotted and removed

Mulches that can be utilized by gardeners include compost, straw, leaves, hay, sawdust, wood shavings, bark, newspaper, and plastic sheeting. Mulches applied during mid-summer or early fall have a tendency to cool the soil which is an added advantage.

Herbicides are another weed-control alternative of growing popularity. Although most present herbicides have limited use in vegetable home gardens, research now underway by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station is expected to result in new advances at the recommended rate, waand wider use of herbicides in ter the garden surface enough the home garden, as well as by the commercial producer.

While herbicides work well in single crop situations and are widely used in commercial agriculture it is difficult to use of vegetables occupy a rather limited space, such as in a

Most herbicides are selective which means that they will work well for weed control in some crops but may damage more sensitive vege-

There is also the problem of applying small amounts of the chemical evenly to a garden surface. Misapplication or mis-calibration of equipment can cause overtreatment, with resultant problems of chemical residue.

Dacthal, a herbicide currently available under various trade names, can give satisfactory garden-weed control, if used as directed.

Dacthal is generally applied, Cotner says, to the surface of well-tilled garden soil, after planting or transplanting. It is effective in preventing germination and emergence of a large number of weeds and

If used according to directions. Dacthal will effectively control a number of weed and grass species, for up to 2 or 3 months. But Cotner cautions that if Dacthal is to be used for weed control in gardens, make sure that the label states that it can be used around the vegetables you intend to plant in the

One plan that he says works well on larger gardens, is the grouping in one area of the garden of vegetables which have a tolerance to Dacthal so the herbicide can be used to control weeds in that area. But be prepared to use a longhandled hoe in untreated areas of the garden.

Perhaps the best chemical weed control now available to the home garden is a pre-plant treatment with Vapam. Vapam can be used in home gardens to rid them of weeds as well as nematodes and several types of fungi.

Since it is a soil sterilant, it must be applied to a totally bare garden soil. Vapam can be easily applied to "wellworked-up" garden soil, using a commonly available, hose-on-type sprayer.

After applying the chemical

be made more effective if the garden is covered with plastic sheeting, immediately after applying the chemical.

Vapam works extremely well but has the disadvantage that it must be applied several weeks prior to planting, to allow the chemical to completely dissipate in the soil.

It also does best if applied when soil temperatures are above 55°F. Consequently, best results are obtained when Vapam is applied during late summer or early fall, in anticipation of a relatively weedand-disease-free fall garden.

> Weeds are one of the biggest obstacles to home gardeners in Texas who want a productive and economical garden. But by judiciously using a mix of a long-handled hoe, a good mulching program, and approved and recommended chemicals, gardeners in Texas can make home gardening both enjoyable and profitable.

Texas Troubled By Fleas

Fleas seem to be making it big in Texas. Over the last five to seven years, fleas seem to have become more and more of a problem, particularly in urban and suburban areas.

Cat fleas which infest dogs or cats and readily attack humans are the most common. says an urban entomoligist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Flea bites are extremely annoying and generally become increasingly sore and irritated over a period of a week or more, explains Dr. John M. Owens. Fleas most often bite people about the legs and ankles.

A small red spot with light colored center appears where the mouthparts of the adult fleas enters the skin. Applying cooling preparations such as carbolated vaseline, menthol, camphor, calamine lotion or ice will help relieve itching. Severe allergic reactions or infections should be treated promptly by a physician.

Rub the dust into the animal's fur by hand. Be especially thorough around ears, between legs and around the tail. Try to avoid getting dust in the eyes, mouth and nostrils. Flea collars which contain propoxur appear to be superior to those which only contain dichlorvos. Be sure to read the label before using any of these products and consult a veterinarian if questions arise.

Spray all infested outdoor areas such as the yard, porches, garages and outbuildings with chlorpyrifos or cabaryl. Be sure to treat spray dry before pets or children are allowed to use treated areas, says Owens. Repeat the spray at two-week intervals until fleas are controlled.



FRAUD FEVER. Fraud against the U.S. government has reached epidemic proportions, and no easy solution is in sight. A recent General Accounting Office (GAO) report found that more than 35,000 people defraud the government each year, costing hundreds of millions of dollars.

Thirty percent of the cases investigated by the GAO involved government workers, and 18 percent were recipients of federal aid. One official said that 30 percent were cases "where we just can't tell who did it."

Out of the more than 12,000 cases reported to federal prosecutors, only 4,300 went to court. The results of the report will be analyzed by officials who hope to reduce the incidence of crime against the goverment.

The results of such studies can be discouraging, however, as the Department of Energy (DOE) found recently. The DOE is suffering from thousands of dollars in losses from stolen typewriters, despite a security system which costs nearly \$1 million annually.



VA Benefits To Increase In June Many veterans and their dependent children see their

Those entitled to the increases in benefits are the persons who previously elected to change from one of the older VA pension laws to the new pension law which came into effect January 1, 1979, or who have become entitled to benefits since that date. Persons who continue to receive benefits under one of the older pension laws will not be eligible for any increase in

their payments. Under the new pension law, veterans and others who are on the VA rolls June 1, 1981, will be entitled to an increase 11.2%, the same percentage of increase that will be applied to Social Security benefit payments. 

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On June 15, 1961, I took the oath of office for the

United States Senate for the first time. It was truly an awesome moment for a 35-year-old political science professor from Wichita Falls. It also was a dream come true, because I had had a lifelong interest in politics and public service. Then, as now, I could think of no greater privilege than representing the citizens of the

greatest state in the nation in the Senate. This twentieth anniversary of that occasion is a time to reflect on these exciting years, and to thank you for allowing me to serve you.

These years have been momentous ones for our country. We have achieved many things, and suffered from many problems. We put a man on the moon, but allowed our national defense posture to deteriorate. We made great strides in bringing equal opportunity for all Americans closer to reality, but allowed government to intrude unnecessarily in the lives of individuals and

We have endured war, assasinations, riots and natural

disasters. Yet as I look at our nation today, I see the American spirit as undaunted as ever. Patriotism has surged in the past year, even as pressures on freedom in the world have increased. In the face of the problems facing our economy, I sense a determination to pull together to endure shortterm sacrifice while working for real longterm solutions;

which will leave us in better shape than ever. Looking at the Senate as a body, I also sense a new mood there among my colleagues. Senators seem less sure now than they did 15 years ago that government intervention is the way to solve problems. In this Congress, there is more emphasis on the essential responsibilities of government -- defense among the foremost -- and less on

finding new things with which to concern itself. In fact, there is a growing realization that government has gone too far in injecting itself in the lives of its people. And there is a real possibility of giving back some of the

control that has been assumed in recent years. Over the past 20 years, my own responsibilities have grown, particularly during this Congress as I have taken on the chairmanship of the Senate Armed Services Committee. The responsibility which goes with that job is one I take seriously, for I truly believe the future of our way of life depends on maintaining a strong U.S. defense capability. But my primary purpose for being in Washington is still

to represent you, the citizens of Texas. The past 20 years have been exciting and challenging. But never have I felt greater opportunity, greater respon-

sibility or greater optimism than at his juncture of history. Together -- we who serve you and you who keep us in touch with your needs -- can seize the moment and go

beyond our current problems to a better future.
