# Appraisal Board Values To Be Effective January 1, 1982

Representatives of twelve of the fourteen taxing entities in Haskell County were on hand Tuesday night to discuss and act on the postponement of implementation of the Haskell County Tax Appraisal District. Sufficient votes were not cast to postpone implementation.

Implementation was originally scheduled for January 1, 1982, but legislation was approved this summer during the special session of the Texas Legislature which allows postponement until January 1, 1983.

Kyle Wilfong, Chief Appraiser of

the Haskell County Tax Appraisal District, explained that the original intent of the law was to allow districts extra time if they could not complete implementation by this January.

Wilfong added that the Haskell District could easily implement the program by this January and that to postpone it could possibly invite legal problems due to dramatic increases in mineral values in certain parts of the County.

R. C. Couch, Jr. was elected moderator of the discussion. He explained that only eleven of the

fourteen taxing entities were allowed to vote. Representatives of the Hospital Board, North Central Texas Water Authority, and Weinert Water Authority were required to pay toward the budget of the appraisal district but were not allowed to vote because of the legislation which created the districts.

Couch explained that eight of the eleven voting entities (two-thirds) would be required to submit resolutions requesting postponement or implementation would automatically be effective

January 1, 1981.

Following a recess to allow members of each entity to meet and discuss the issue, a roll call vote was taken. Voting to implement in 1983 were: Rochester ISD, Weinert ISD, Rochester City, Weinert City, Rule City, and O'Brien City. Voting to implement in 1982 were: Haskell ISD, Haskell County, Haskell City and Rule ISD. Paint Creek ISD was undecided.

With the possibility of only seven entities voting to postpone, (less than the required two-thirds) implementation will automatically be effective January 1, 1981.

In other discussion Wilfong explained that the Board of the Appraisal District would be reorganized in November and asked present board members, Pat Hale, Billy Middlebrook, Delbert LeFevre, Donald Griffis and Manford Reid, if they would consider staying on the board if asked to do so.

Hale and Reid both stated that they would not serve another term and other board members stated that they were undecided.

The tool is used to gain access to

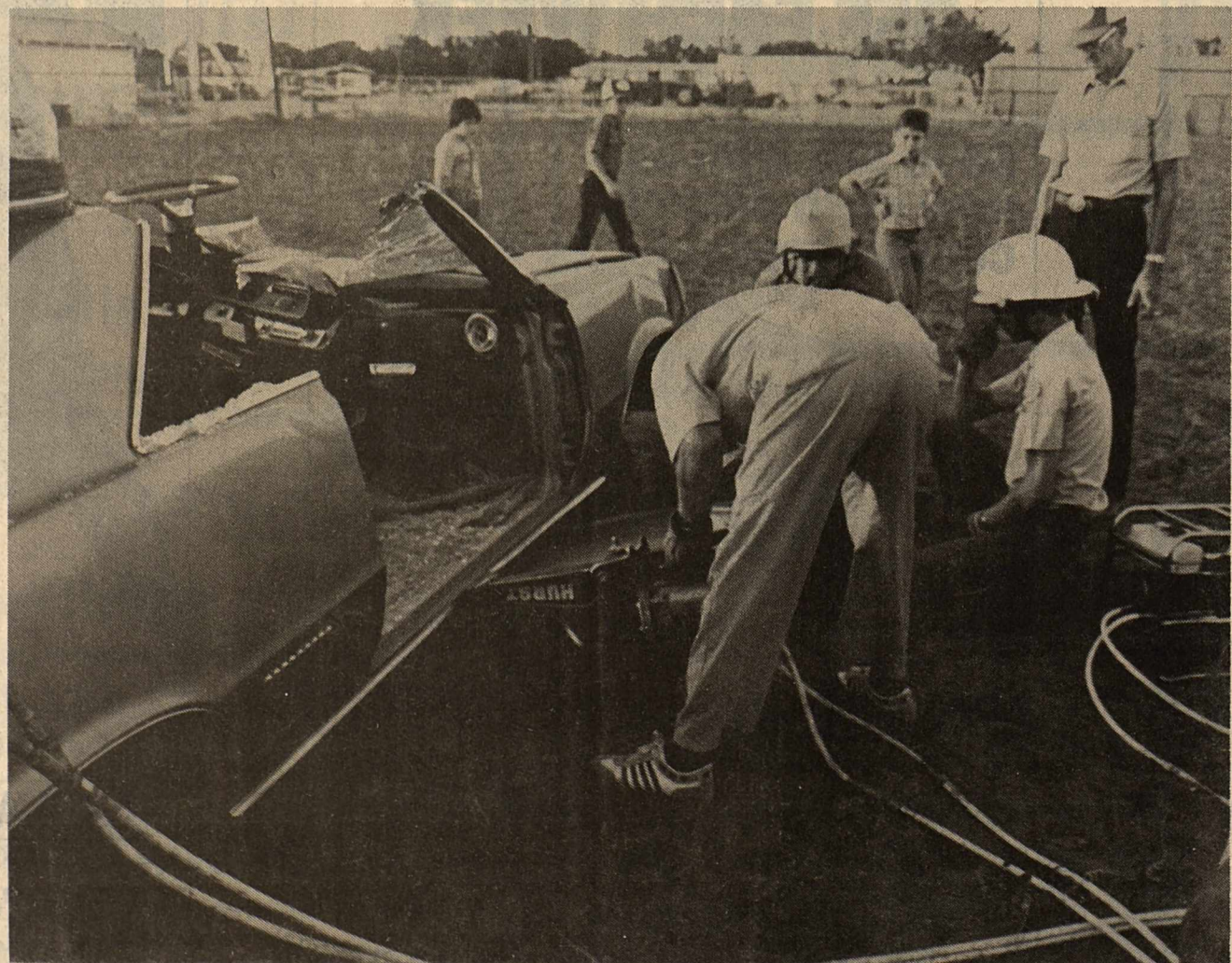
accident victims in wrecked vehicles by lifting, prying, pulling or cutting and can also be used to gain access to buildings.

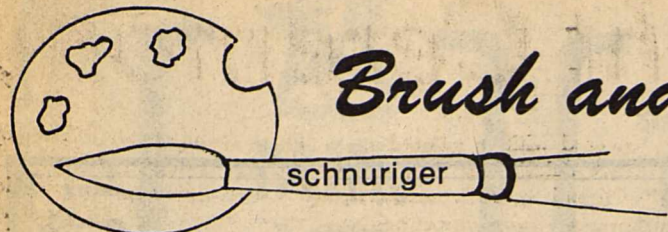

## Brush and Palette

It is never too late to be a painter. There are many classes that offer instructions to groups of senior citizens, those just wanting a hobby and classes for children. It is the desire to so many, both men and women, to create. The manipulation of paints on a canvas is very creative so why don't you pursue your desires and take lessons? You can purchase a limited amount of paints, whether it is oil, watercolor or acrylic and set out on your own. Each brush stroke teaches you something! There are many books available in the library for beginners and by using a step-by-step method, you can get in some valuable practice. At least the first thing you need to learn is the name of colors. Remember, oils dry slowly, acrylics dry fast, watercolors are done on paper, pastels are done on paper and blended, etc. Decide which medium you would like to study then find a good book or teacher—or both—and you are on your way.

Q. What is significance of bonding colors in acrylic paintings?

A. The ability of one layer, or many layers, of color to literally fuse with another layer that has dried is one of the prime qualities of acrylic.

The application of successive layers of color becomes a single flexible and elastic mass (film). It will expand or contract as a 'unit of film' rather than a series of singular applications, as in oil. In oil painting we always live with

the fat vs. thin syndrome. This does not exist in acrylic painting. An acrylic painting, after being worked and re-worked, becomes a singular mass of wholly compatible flexible plastic color. Smooth, rough, impasto or thinned to watercolor consistency do not effect this acrylic characteristic.

Q. How do I use acrylic like watercolors?

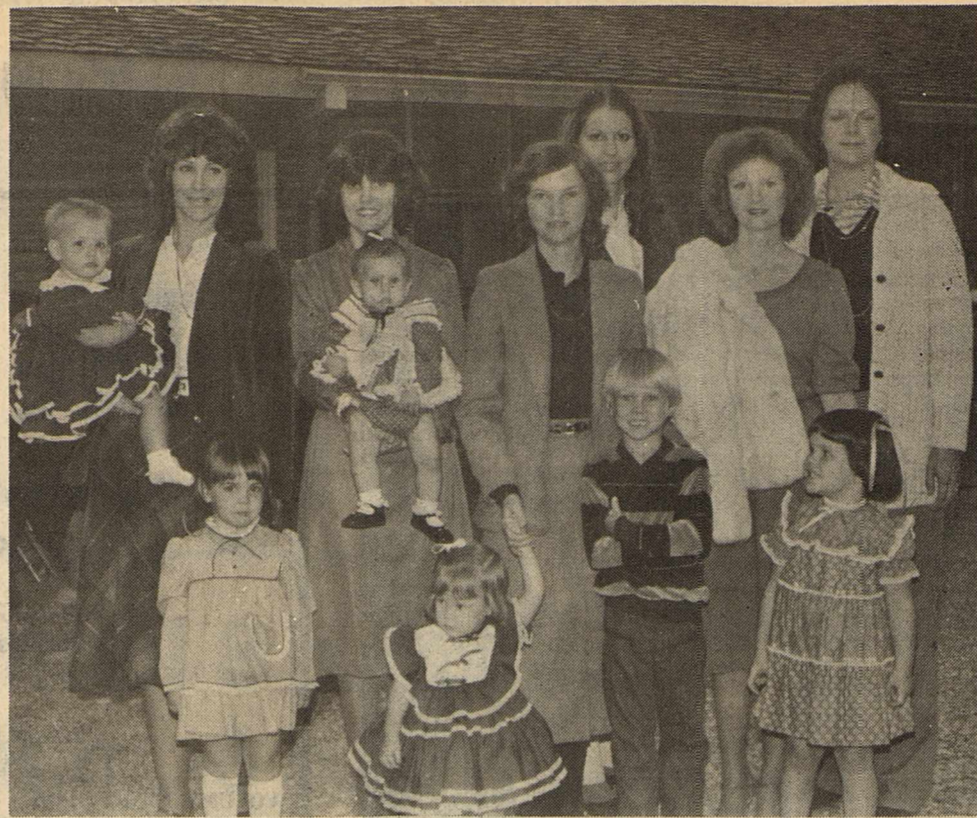
A. Water is the only thinner you use. The more water used, the thinner the paint. We have some excellent watercolor teachers using acrylics, one of which is Al Brouillette. He stresses the use of opaque acrylic watercolor methods. Various types of papers are used as well as heavier papers that are used for transparent watercolors. Experiment with various papers, using thin paint, thicker paint and see which you like best. Remember, in acrylic you can paint over and over an area several times, waiting for it to dry, of course. Acrylic paintings are also done on masonite panels and stretched canvas having been treated with Gesso first.

Q. How is acrylic gloss medium used?

A. This is the final varnish used on a masonite panel or stretched canvas. It can also be mixed with the acrylic paints as you paint. There is a Matte Medium used for less gloss. The Acrylic Mediums are also used to produce brilliant luminous glazes. The medium has strong adhesive properties and is suitable for collage.

HINT: Use only designated brushes for acrylics. Brushes used for oil painting cannot be cleaned to get the oil residue from them.

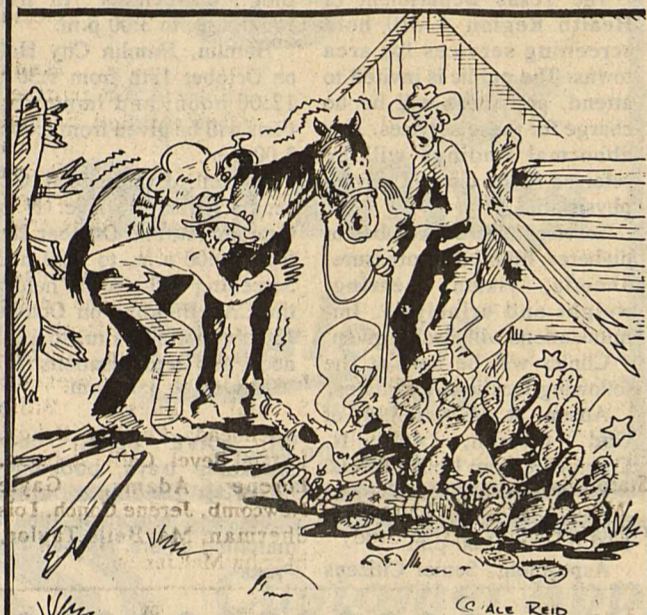

The board of directors

coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns.

Any owner of agricultural land within Zone 3, who lives in Haskell County, is eligible to vote in the District Directors election. The term of office is five years and is a position which is vitally important in soil and water conservation activities. Zone 3, of the Haskell SWCD is the south east quarter of the county. All lands south of Highway 380 and east of Highway 277.

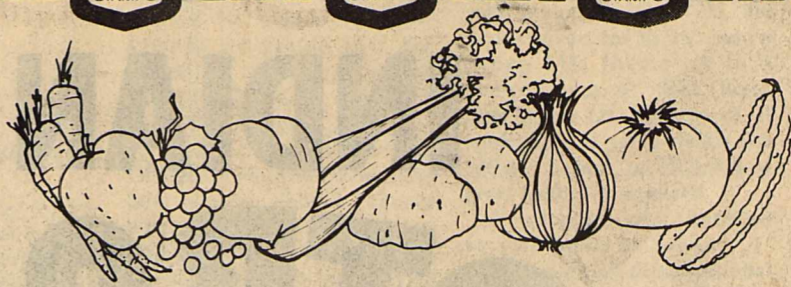



**Superintendent's Views**

The library is a vital part of any excellent institution of learning. We have made some changes in our library to improve our program. First, we combined our junior high and high school libraries and hired one full time librarian. By doing this, it allowed us facilities to use the library strictly as a library. It also gave us over 7000 volumes for our students. This move combined our research materials and periodicals which simply makes more materials available to all students. In addition, this combination made the program more cost efficient as we do not have any duplication of purchases on books or research materials.

Also, because the library is not used for holding regular classes, it is available for teachers to bring their entire class for research or selection of books. The trend in education today is to encourage writing. Therefore we are structuring our program in this direction—especially the language arts. You must have materials available if you make such progress in this area.

Our Library is set up on the Dewey Decimal System with complete card files and coding. Hopefully when a student graduates from Haskell High School, they can go to any college or public library and find information or materials. The teachers are utilizing this change to a great degree. We are averaging at least one class a day doing research or searching for information or special reading materials. Approximately 50 volumes are checked out by the individual students each day. The library is open for individual student use from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. inclusive of the noon hour. This time schedule allows the student to browse for individual reading materials.

We are now striving to

move forward with our library program in several areas. One area is current periodicals in special fields. We are also trying to increase our reference books in various fields including current events for the students. We feel it is important for students to study what is happening in the world. We realize the majority get a capsule view from television and newspapers, but we feel they need to go into greater depth to study cause and effects of events happening today. We are also trying to build a usable reference library for our teachers to keep up with current trends in education. An adequate professional library can help teachers to keep in their profession. We are also using the library as a central place for our audio-visual materials.

Our secondary librarian is Cathy Jones. Mrs. Jones is a graduate of Southwestern State at Weatherford, Oklahoma where she received both the B.A. and M.A. degrees with Summa Cum Laude honors. She also attended North Texas State. Her staff involves all high school students who are particularly interested in library work. These very dedicated young people along with Mrs. Jones are putting in many extra hours to make our library a success. The student assistants are Mike Iley, Patsy Butler, Julie John Wallace, and Anthony Garland for this fall.

**Veterans Administration News**

New veterans making the transition back to civilian life should be aware of some benefit programs that are available to them, and the delimiting dates that are involved in some. According to C.H. Herren, Service Officer for Haskell County, the new veteran should register with the local employment office if he is seeking a job. If he is returning to pre-service employment, he must apply for reemployment within 90 days following release from service. Under Federal laws, he is entitled to certain reemployment rights as a veteran.

Within 120 days (up to one year if totally disabled), he must convert his Servicemen's Group Life Insurance to a five-year plan of VGLI (Veterans Group Life Insurance). If application is made within the 120 day period, no evidence of good health is required.

A veteran who entered service prior to January 1, 1977, is entitled to educational assistance under the GI Bill. He has a ten-year period following release from service to use his benefit, but not later than December 31, 1989. If service began on or after January 1, 1977, and contri-

butions from military pay were made to the program, he is entitled to educational assistance under the Vietnam Era Educational Assistance Program, known as VEAP. He has ten years following release to use this benefit.

Some benefits have no deadline date, and remain good indefinitely, such as: (1) GI home loan guaranty; (2) file claim for service incurred disabilities; (3) apply for admission to a VA hospital; (4) seek help from State employment offices in finding work or entering Department of Labor job-training programs.
