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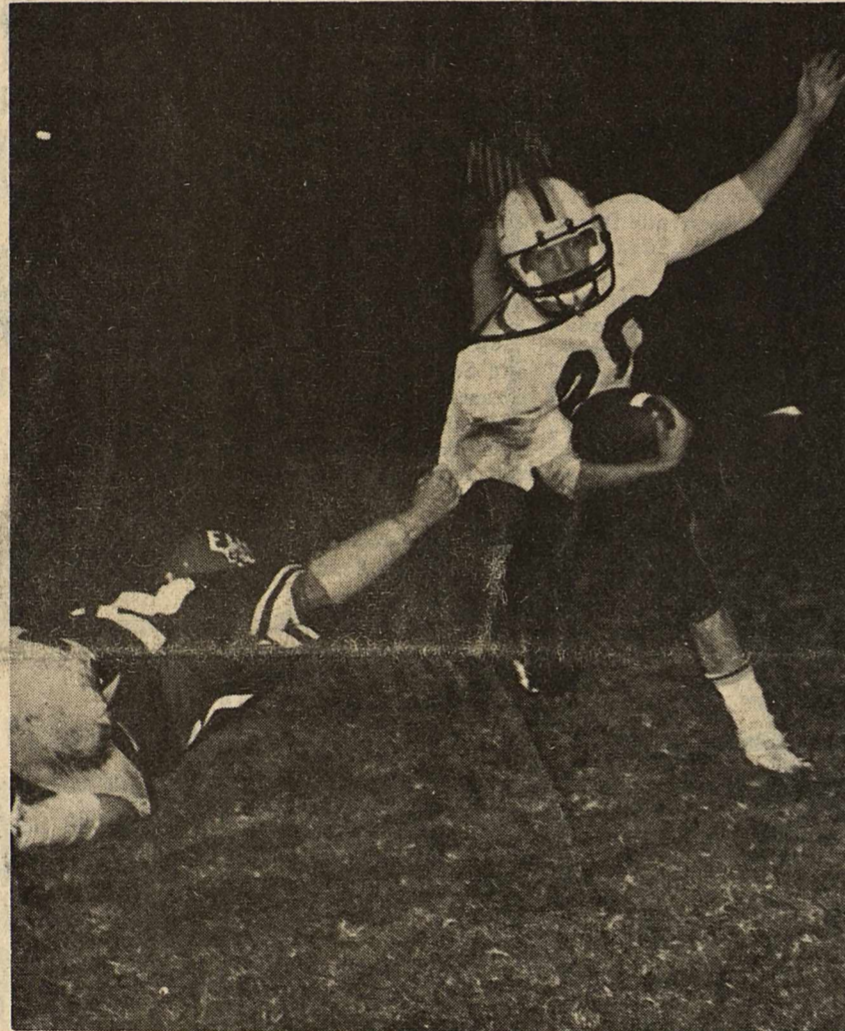

Tribe Downs Electra, 8-7

For the second time this season the Haskell Indians have won a Friday night clash 8-7 in the final minutes of the game.

The Tribe defeated Electra last Friday night in the final non-district game of the season and two weeks before had defeated Stamford by the same score.

The Electra victory came with 2:05 left in the game when Curtis Forehand scampered around right end from the thirteen yard line. Forehand also carried for the two point conversion making the final score 8-7.

Final stages of the game were almost identical to the Stamford game which the Tribe won with 1:52 left in the game.

Forehand led the Tribe rushing attack with 86 yards on 15 carries for an average of 5.7 yards per carry.

Electra scored with 1:17 left in the first half and the PAT gave them a 7-0 lead until the closing minutes.

Most of the first half saw both teams having trouble moving the ball. A tough Tribe defense held Electra to only five yards rushing during the first quarter.

The Tribe defense totally dominated the final period, allowing Electra only eight offensive plays.

Electra moved the ball to within seven yards of a score late in the third quarter but an attempted field goal was blocked by Indian Barry Tidrow.

The Tribe ended up on top of the statistics also, leading 12-7 in first downs and 185-115 in yards rushing.

The Tribe will host the Seymour Panthers this Friday night. The game will mark the first district game of the season and will also be Homecoming in Haskell. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

Mrs. Lawrence Purcell, of Abilene, accompanied and introduced Mrs. Parks, which made us aware of Mrs. Parks being a very busy person in her community as well as in her church and Garden Club.

Mrs. Park said Texas has more species of birds than any other state in the world. She said five hundred species of birds could save four hundred million dollars a year by eating harmful insects. She insisted everyone that could, should put up a Purple Martin house for one Purple Martin could eat up to two thousand mosquitoes a day. As one

writer said, if birds did not help us, the human race would not last nine years. Did you know, the Robins life is 12 years old, the Hawk is 30 to 40 years, the wild goose 80 years and the whooping crane and eagles are becoming extinct. There are three reasons why birds sing, not to make us happy but to declare their territory by surveying so much space, the mating call and tell when there is danger. Remember, birds are your friends and mine, except maybe the Starlings, Sparrows and Pigeons, which are not protected by law like all the other birds.

Edgar Ellett married Fanny Owens and the Ellett family moved to the San Antonio area in 1935.

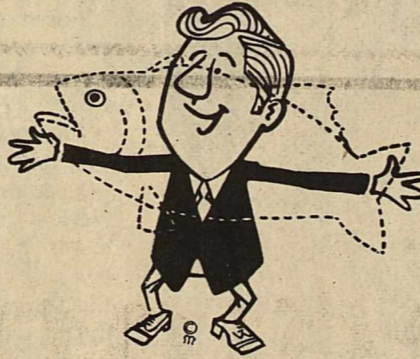
Third generation descendants of Mae Greer, a few fourth generation descendants and one fifth generation descendant also attended the reunion.

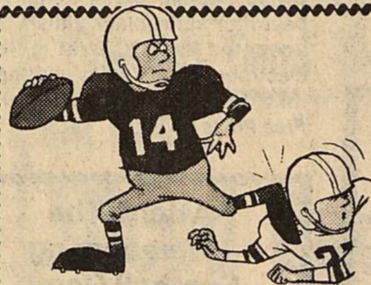

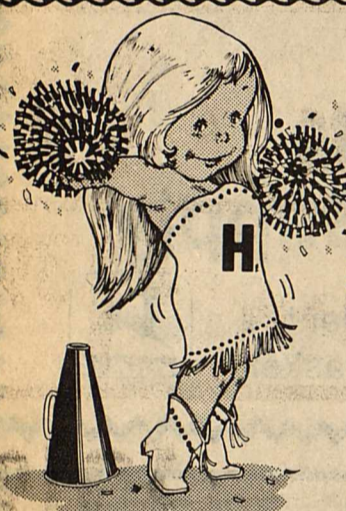

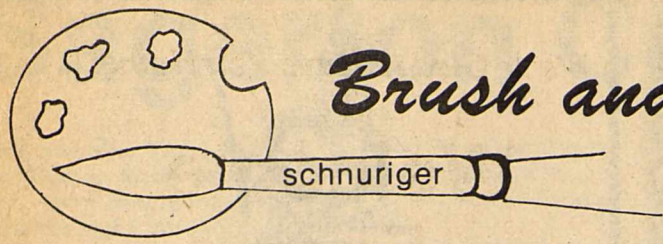

Brush and Palette

Since there are as many approaches to art as there are artists, the teaching of art becomes a very personal pleasure. Class room teaching is much easier than commuting a passage by this column as the person-to-person relationship is difficult to achieve in print. The age old questions come to me as to the materials used by the old masters. As previously mentioned in one column, there is absolutely no certainty but chemists have analysed many paintings and been kind enough to disclose their findings. Really, who cares as long as the antiquity remains for us to enjoy. Today with modern chemistry and methods of the developing new materials and techniques, perhaps our paintings will last as long or longer than those

we cherish in museums.
Q. How do you make the egg mixture used in tempera painting?

A. 1. Crack the egg and while the yolk is still in the halfshell drain off the white. 2. Place the yolk, still in its sac, on a paper towel and gently roll it around. The gobs of egg white will stick to the towel. 3. If the yolk sac breaks, no harm is done. If not, puncture the sac with a pointed knife and let the contents drain into a small glass. Try to eliminate as much of the yolk sac as possible. 4. Then add enough water so that, when stirred, the yolk-water emulsion is about the consistency of medium cream. 5. Next, place a piece of cheesecloth over the mouth of another small glass and strain the yellow liquid

into it. You now have the egg tempera medium. Powdered pigments are used with the egg tempera medium for painting, which is much like regular oil painting. Ralph Mayer's "The Artist's Handbook" has an excellent chapter on "Painting with Egg Yolk", if you care to pursue it further.

Q. For what is fig-tree sap used?

A. The fig-tree sap is either added directly to the whole egg to be used in egg tempera painting or by beating the egg with cuttings of the young shoots to produce the medium for secco painting, which is done on dry plaster. Remember, many of the ancient paintings were on the walls of buildings and this was supposedly used. Cennini refers more than once to the use of fig-tree sap. It is said to be a preservative and to add toughness and flexibility (the juice is similar to latex, the milky sap from the rubber tree) and to make the paint more brushable. There is no record of its use in modern paintings.

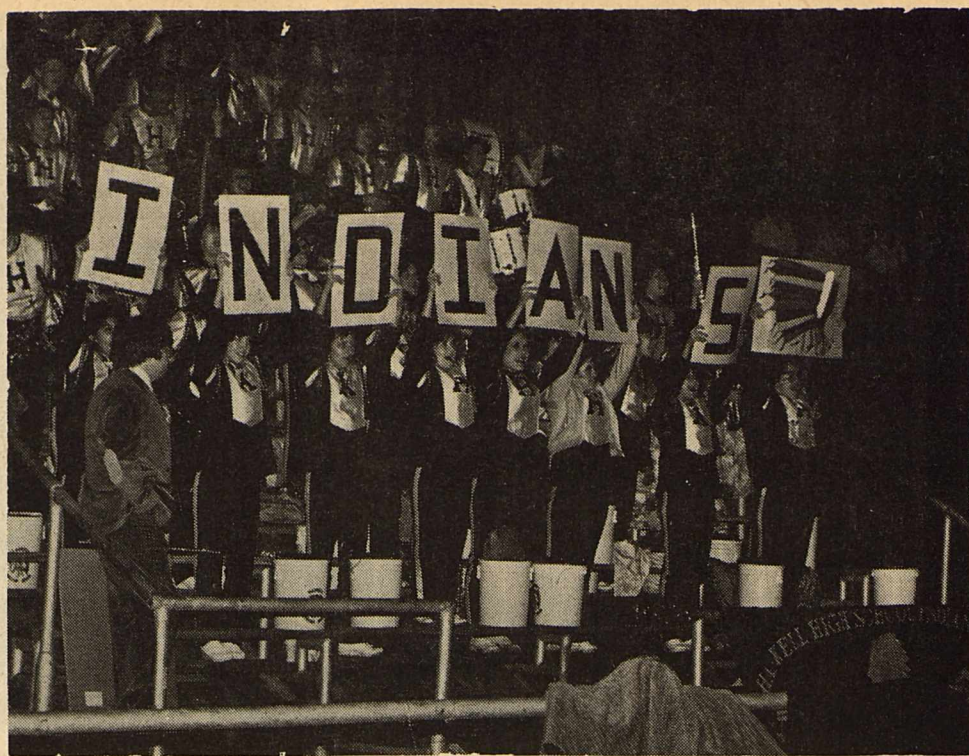

Researcher studies folk medicine cures

Old Indian cures used along the South Texas border are often European in origin rather than native, says a Texas A&M University researcher specializing in culture mixing.

Dr. Clarissa Kimber said many folk medicines used among South Texas Mexican-Americans are often referred to as Indian in nature—having been handed down from generation to generation—but usually can be traced back to Spanish or Portuguese explorers and settlers.

With the built-in acoustical insulation of a fiber glass duct system, air moves quietly without the booming or popping noises associated with metal systems.

Save On Installation

Lightweight fiber glass duct systems are also less expensive to install. Flexible ducts, serving as connectors between main

lines in the system, snake around corners and reduce installation time.

If you already have a metal

duct system, tape the joints and wrap the entire duct system with two inch thick fiber glass insulation.

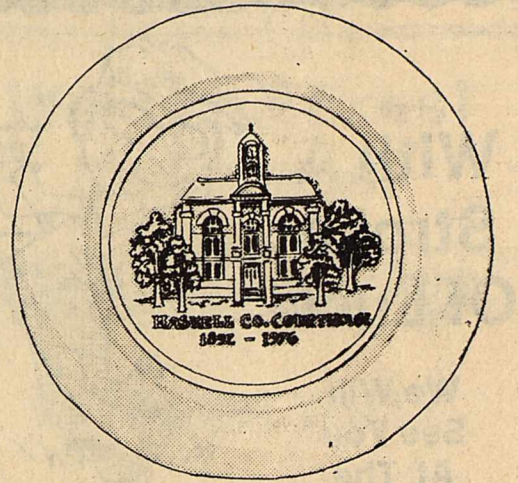

Former Rule Resident Now Chess Champion

Fourteen years ago, a fellow worker taught him how to play chess.

Now John White, 43, is one of the better players in Farmington.

A dispatcher for El Paso Natural Gas, White rates as the king of the Four Corners Chess Club after winning the club tournament last spring. At 7 p.m. Tuesday white and about 15 other chess enthusiasts will converge upon the coffee room at City Hall to kick off the club's fall campaign.

Persons interested in playing chess on Tuesdays with the club, which for the last 13 years has been sponsored by the Farmington Parks and Recreation Department, will have to join the United States Chess Federation. Dues in the USCF are \$8 for players under 19 and \$20 for adults.

"It's a challenge," said White of playing chess. "It makes you concentrate and think. Each game is different. They're an infinite number of moves, so no two games are

alike."

White, who sports a 1,810 rating, won the city tournament which started in January and ended in May by drawing with his three strongest opponents and beating the rest of the men. Actually, he tied with Ken Frank for the title with 7.5 points but had beaten Frank during the tournament.

While American chess players rate on the average at 1,400 points, eight of the 10 men who competed in the city

tourney rate above that. Tops is Raymond Prosser at 1,813 while lawyer George Harrison is at 1,808.

None of the local players approach grand master Bobby Fisher, who held a 2,800 rating in his prime. But then, as White pointed out, after a player surpasses 2,400 the minimum rating for a grand master, points are hard to come by.

What would it take to increase White's rating? "I'd have to play more than we do and have to have stronger competition," he said, "and we'd have to take it a little bit more seriously than we do."

White used to attend chess tournaments in Albuquerque, Santa Fe and Las Cruces but

apparently the novelty wore off. Also, he is the director of the local girls' softball leagues, which take much of his chess time in the summer.

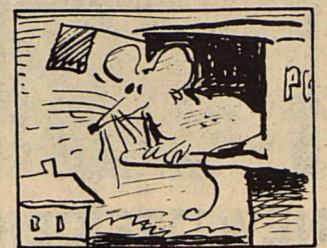
White even was instrumental in getting chess tournaments, one a year, here three or four years ago. He said he'd like to start the tourney craze here next September.

"We had some people come from Albuquerque and Santa Fe," he said, remembering past tourneys. "We had some really strong players."

White's 6-foot-4 frame reveals a bit of his past. He played high school basketball in his native Texas.

White attended Rule and Old Glory schools and is the son of Sally White of Big

Springs, formerly of Haskell. While the chess club gathers every Tuesday for games, it did not always meet here. Two Kirtland teachers formed the group 14 years ago and held game sessions in Kirtland for a year before Pete Welch, then director of the Parks and Recreation Department, adopted it as a Farmington program.

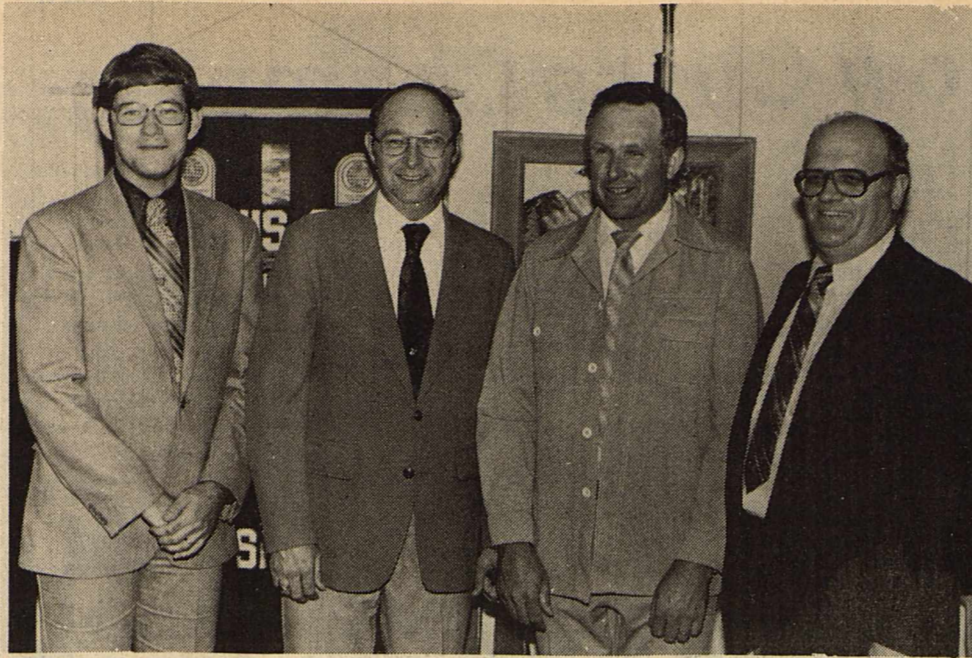

Haskell County To Receive Additional Funds

State Treasurer Warren G. Harding announced today that early next week \$25,770,675.15 will be distributed to the 254 Texas counties. These funds are the Lateral Road Fund administered by the State Treasurer's office as allocated by the sixty-seventh legislature.

The Haskell County allocation is \$86,044.69, and the funds will be used for the construction and improvement of county roads. The lateral road fund is comprised of monies derived from gasoline taxes

collected at the pump. The county allocations are based on the county square mile area, the rural population, and the county lateral road mileage. Expenditures of the funds are reported by the counties to the State Treasurer.

Treasurer Harding stated that the distribution includes money appropriated for fiscal years 1980, 1981, and 1982, as well as interest earned on these funds. The 1982 funds are being distributed now rather than at the completion of the fiscal year.

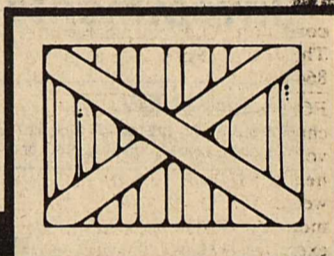

Accounting prof develops formula for retirement plans

COLLEGE STATION — With the changes in the income tax laws, a Texas A&M University accounting professor suggests it is time for Americans to consider taking advantage of deferred tax retirement investments.
"It's important that people invest their money for retirement during inflationary times," says Dr. Karl Putnam. "Assuming a 7 percent inflation rate, a dollar 30 years from now will only buy what about 13 cents does today."

Putnam has developed a formula that will help Americans determine how much money they will need upon retirement to live as they do today. He pointed out that saving \$100 each month at a monthly-compounded interest rate of 12 percent would net \$349,496.42 after 30 years.
That \$349,000-plus would be worth only \$45.012 by today's standards, however, assuming 7 percent annual inflation. Last year the inflation rate averaged 13 percent. This year it has been about 7 percent, he explained.



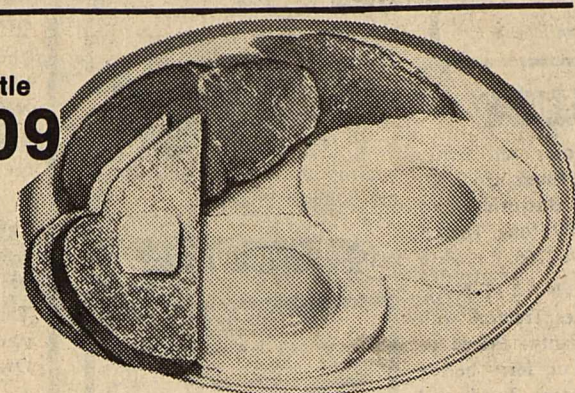

Fire Prevention Week & Why

Maybe you've heard about the "Great Chicago Fire," and how Mrs. O'Leary's cow was supposed to have started it by kicking over a lantern in the barn. But did you know that there was another fire—many times worse—on that same historic date?

Most Americans probably remember becoming aware of National Fire Prevention Week for the first time when they were allowed to create fire safety posters during their early grade school years.

Do you know why Fire Prevention Week is held every

year in early October? Or why this anniversary date was chosen? And how long we have been observing this special week?

The story of Mrs. O'Leary's cow may be more folklore than fact, but what is historically important is that on that date—whatever the cause—a fire raged through Chicago, destroying 2,100 acres of that city at a cost of more than 200 lives and direct property damage in excess of \$168 million.

Perhaps because this fire happened in one of America's major cities, media attention at the time was focused there and largely ignored an even bigger fire on the same day.

It was not very far away from Chicago on that same day 110 years ago, that the worst forest fire in U. S. history also broke out in Peshtigo, Wisconsin. It burned 1.28 million acres and claimed the lives of 1,152 people!

As a grim reminder, Fire Prevention Week is observed annually on the anniversary week of the Chicago and Peshtigo tragedies on October 9, 1871.

In 1922, it became a national observance by presidential proclamation. And the proclamation included the succinct message: "...fires are not deplorable accidents, but the consequences of neglect and carelessness."

Texans have a big stake in the observance of Fire Prevention Week. Last year, volunteer fire departments throughout the state reported to the Texas Forest Service that 5,

273 fires occurred outside Texas Forest Service that 5,273 fires occurred outside excess of 332,265 acres. The majority of these rural fires were natural cover or non-structural fires, with debris burning accounting for 56 percent of the fires. More than 30 percent of all improved structural fires were rural residences.

In forested areas of East Texas, the Texas Forest Service was called on to control more than 3,200 fires that burned 26,963 acres, for an average size of 8.2 acres per fire. 1980 was not a record year, but was a higher fire occurrence year than normal.

Through the first seven months of 1981, forest wildfires are running ahead of last year, partly due to an abnormally dry early spring. Already this year Texas Forest Service personnel have fought 1,617 fires which burned 17,851 acres or an average of 11 acres per fire.

October and November are normally dangerous forest fires months in Texas. If rainfall is below normal, the situation will be critical this year, says Pat Ebarb, head of the Service's Fire Control Department, headquartered in Lufkin.

"Even after a rain, forest fires can start easily. The fuel on forest floors dries much faster than most people realize, especially on windy days.

"Most fires can start within a day—and in some cases, within a few hours—after a moderate rain," Ebarb warned.

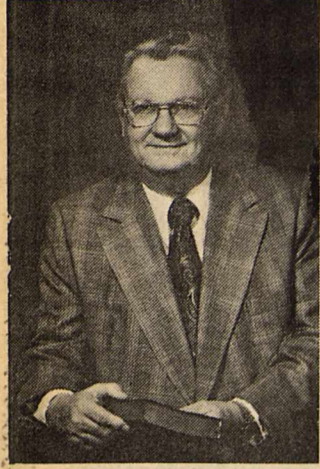

General Telephone To Change Service Rates

General Telephone Company of the Southwest will begin charging new rates for installing, changing or adding telephones Oct. 12. The change is the result of a mandated Federal Communications Commission accounting change for all telephone companies, and has been approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

The FCC order requires costs incurred for installing or changing telephone service to be collected from customers receiving the service as the services are rendered. In addition to the changes in

rates, residential customers now have the option of providing their own house wiring (wiring from the protector or fuse box on the house to the telephones) and save the associated fees charged by the telephone company. In addition, a \$5 wiring maintenance charge will be assessed whenever the company sends service personnel to do repair work on the wiring.

Previously, costs for installing, changing, adding telephones or to do wiring work were partially paid by all customers, not just the cus-

tomers receiving the service," said Oscar C. Gomez, rates and tariffs manager for General Telephone in San Angelo. This charge is the first of four annual steps which will result in full revenue recovery from the customers receiving the service.

The new fees are structured similar to previous charges with some existing charges increasing and others decreasing. Charges will vary from customer to customer, depending upon the functions required to make the installation, change or addition to service.

Free Guide Available To Slash Income Taxes

Though the average taxpayer has put the Internal Revenue Service out of his mind for this year, he would be wrong to think the IRS has forgotten about him. Taxes are a year-round business, not only for the IRS, but also for the wise taxpayer—and what he does (or does not do) now will be reflected in next April's tax return.

On this subject, Tax Information Center, an Ohio firm specializing in year-round tax planning, has just published "99 Legal Ways To Slash Your Income Taxes." This guide, which is available without charge from Tax Information Center in New Concord, Ohio, is an effort to help American taxpayers realize they can reduce their tax burden month by month throughout the year.

According to the guide, the Internal Revenue Code allows many tax-saving techniques that most taxpayers aren't aware of. For instance, a trust created for one's children can significantly reduce the family income tax bite because the parents can loan (for 10 years and one day) some of their income-producing assets to a low-cost trust for the children's benefit. Income generated within the trust stays within the family, but is taxed at the children's and the trusts relatively lower rates. This also allows the trust creator to take advantage of unused

exemptions belonging to the trust and the children.

Another point from "99 Legal Ways To Slash Your Income Taxes" is if the taxpayer mentioned above owns income-producing rental property, he can sell the land to the trust. The trust can then charge him ground rent for the land under the building. That ground rent will be tax-deductible to him and taxable to the children's trust at a lower rate.

For many business or professional people, the establishment of a corporation can open up a floodgate of deductions. For instance, annual company contributions to an IRS-approved corporate pension plan or profit-sharing plan are fully tax deductible (employees' voluntary contributions out of their own pay are not deductible to either the corporation or the employees, but grow tax-free.) The company and employee contributions grow completely free of current income taxes on interest income, dividends,

capital gains, etc., while assets are growing during the pre-retirement period.

Taxes and romance don't usually mix, but those planning to wed at year's end might be wise to consider the tax consequences. In many cases, a married working couple will pay more in taxes than the combined total tax liability of two single individuals. By postponing marriage vows from December until January, the couple will circumvent the "marriage tax" for at least one year.

These, and 96 other tax-saving hints, are contained in the tax guide "99 Legal Ways To Slash Your Income Taxes," published by Tax Information Center.

Roughneck school offered by TEEX

ABILENE — Groundbreaking was held recently for a one-of-a-kind "roughneck school" to teach workers in the booming oil business basic procedures and safety.

Facilities and equipment valued at nearly \$2 million, including a complete 115-foot drilling rig, should be in place on 63 acres southeast of Abilene when classes begin later this year.

In addition to the drilling crew course staff, the site will also house future programs in electric power utilities and public works conducted by the Texas Engineering Extension Service (TEEX), part of the Texas A&M University System, which will operate the school in cooperative effort with area industry.

The school will include a \$107,000 classroom and office building with 4,000 square feet, plus the oil rig dedicated solely for hands-on training, said TEEX director James R. Bradley.

Proper Care Of Pecan Trees Aids In Production Of Nuts

There are three moths that can cause foliage loss in pecan trees. Populations of fall webworms, walnut caterpillars, and walnut sphinx can cause severe foliage loss, causing pecans to be poorly filled.

Fall webworms are covered with long white and black hairs and are 1 inch in length when full grown. Their webs are most evident in late summer or fall. The larvae feed within the web on the upper and lower leaf surfaces.

The web is enlarged taking in more foliage as the larvae develop. After feeding from 4 to 6 weeks the larvae crawl down the tree to pupate. They overwinter in the pupal stage in cocoons on the ground underneath bark, debris or loose soil.

Walnut caterpillars often develop in pecan trees in Haskell County in September and October. The adults deposit their eggs in masses of 200 to 300 on the underside of pecan leaflets. There are as

many as three generations each year but the last generation is generally the only one that commonly occurs in the northern Rolling Plains.

The immature walnut caterpillar larvae are reddish brown with narrow, yellowish lines that extend the length of the body. The fully grown larvae are about 2 inches in length, are black with two grayish lines on the back and two on the side. Both immature and full grown larvae have many long soft gray hairs distributed over the body.

The walnut caterpillars do not construct webs but live in colonies. Because the infestation is concentrated often on an individual branch, detection is difficult until much of the foliage on the branch has been destroyed. Control measures are suggested when walnut caterpillars are defoliating portions of the tree.

Pecan sphinx larvae do not feed in colonies and do not construct webs. These larvae when full grown are about 2½ inches in length and are green with yellow markings on the abdominal segments. They have pointed heads and an anal horn. Because of their coloring walnut sphinx larvae are difficult to detect until the foliage has been stripped from several leaves.

When approached, the walnut sphinx larvae often makes a squeaking sound. This is a protective mechanism.

The level of damage caused

by these larvae is related to the amount of foliage lost. These larvae although most often found in September and October can also be found during the spring and summer months. There are two or three generations each year.

Control of these three foliage feeders can be obtained by using Sevin in the commercial or home orchards. Fall webworms and walnut caterpillars can be eliminated where infestations are light by pruning infested branches from the trees and destroying them. Where only a few walnut sphinx are found on smaller trees the larvae can be picked from the tree and destroyed.

Crop Insurance Aids In Loan Applications

Agricultural lenders in wheat-producing areas are taking a closer look at loan applications and particularly at the borrower's repayment ability, according to Ben A. Jordan, Jr., Regional Director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. He notes that wheat growers who carry insurance at least equal to their debt obligations are in the strongest position to obtain the credit they need.

"There are a number of reasons why applications for loans are receiving closer scrutiny this year," Jordan

says. "One of these is the generally tight credit situation. Another is the combination of increased production costs and high interest rates. The more a farmer must borrow and the higher the interest rate he must pay, the higher the yield he must have in order to be able to repay his loans."

Still another reason is the scheduled expiration of the ASCS disaster payments program which some farmers who had crop losses last year used to repay their current loans. The widespread 1980 drought

has also made it more difficult for many farmers to borrow money, particularly those who experienced losses and still have outstanding loans from a year ago or who had to refinance land or equipment. In either case, the result is a strain on loan repayment ability, says Jordan.

"Under the all-risk insurance now being offered for 1982-crop wheat, a farmer can choose insurance coverage that's roughly equal to the amount of money he will need to borrow. Or he can carry insurance that, in most cases, will cover his total investment in the crop."

"One of the attractions of the FCIC insurance program, which is now available in all counties, is that the government pays up to 30 percent of the premium cost. The net cost is further reduced by claiming the balance of the premium as a farm business tax deduction. In addition, policyholders who have a record of few or small insured losses qualify for discounts," Jordan points out.

Having an insurance policy can make a big difference when it comes time to borrow money, according to the FCIC Regional Director. He notes that most lenders today carefully analyze prospective borrowers' cash flow projections and insurance can eliminate up to three-fourths of the income uncertainty associated with such projections. In fact, if he wishes to do so, a farmer can actually assign his insurance indemnities to the lender as loan collateral.

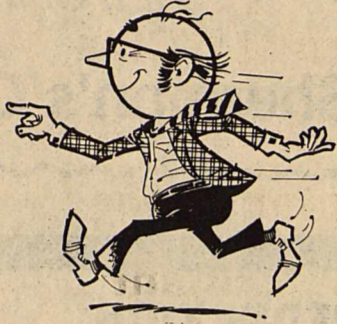

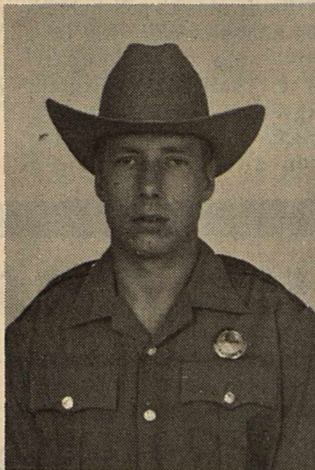

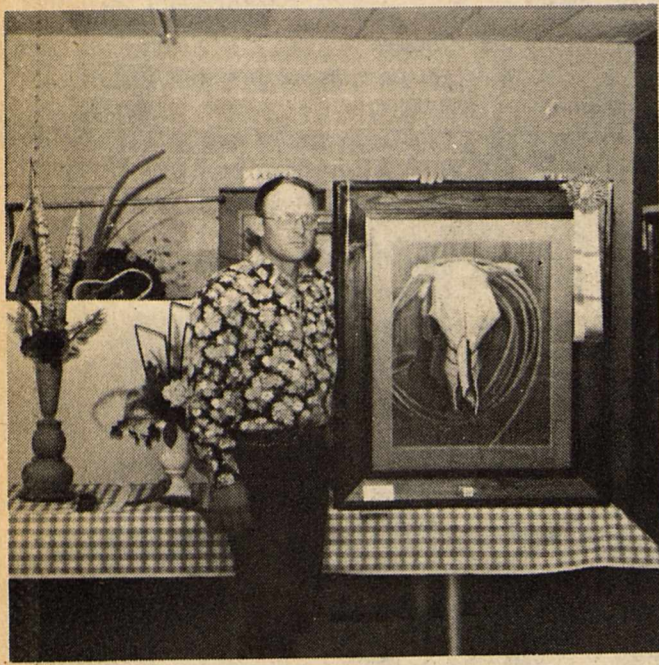

New Waterfowl Stamp Required In Texas

The new \$5 stamp required for Texas duck and goose hunters during the 1981-82 hunting seasons will be a

valuable management tool for the state's waterfowl biologists. Revenues from sales of the

stamp are to be spent on waterfowl research, management and habitat acquisition, leasing and development. Additionally, the names, addresses and telephone numbers of stamp purchasers will provide a base for harvest surveys in the future.

The Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission has adopted regulations for the taking of fur-bearing animals during the 1981-82 seasons.

The seasons are basically the same as in the past, but the resident trapper's license will cost \$10.75 this year instead of \$5, as a result of a bill passed by the Texas Legislature in its recent session.

Dan Boone, the Parks and Wildlife Department's furbearer program leader, said fur prices fell significantly during the latter part of last year's trapping season. "I expect prices to be on the low side early in this year's season, although pelts of some

long-haired furbearers such as raccoons and foxes may bring pretty good prices," Boone said.

Boone indicated that a good trapping season is likely since there appear to be good populations of furbearers over most of the state.

The open seasons are: muskrat, Nov. 15, 1981, through Mar. 15, 1982; nutria, no closed season; beaver, otter, mink, ring-tailed cat, badger, skunk, fox, weasel, opossum, raccoon and civet cat, Dec. 1, 1981, through Jan. 31, 1982.

The commission also set the times after the trapping season during which the pelts of furbearers may be possessed by licensed trappers; until Feb. 20 of each year by licensed retail fur buyers and fur-bearing animal propagators. For muskrat pelts, the dates are March 20 of each year by licensed trappers and March 30 of each year by licensed retail fur buyers and

fur-bearing animal propagators. There are no restrictions on possession of nutria pelts.

Taxidermists also are allowed to possess furbearers or their pelts lawfully taken during the open season provided the animal or pelt is labeled with the name and address of the owner.

Furbearers may be taken during the open season by the following means and methods: firearms, steel leg hold traps and conibear traps, falconry, box traps, dogs, snares, long bow and arrow, and with hand-held or electronic cells. Exceptions are: river otters may not be taken with firearms; furbearers may not be taken from a boat on public waters.

"Being able to poll hunters who hunt waterfowl will be a great help to the department," said Bill Brownlee, migratory bird program director. "In the past it has been difficult to obtain a

sampling of waterfowl hunters from information provided by hunting licenses."

The stamps are available at department offices and at hunting license outlets across the state. Federal law also requires waterfowl hunters to purchase a federal migratory waterfowl stamp, available at most post offices.
