## HIGH WATER

Rainfall of up to five inches northwest of Haskell resulted in flood conditions in Haskell Sunday evening. Within two hours of the rain, Spring Branch Creek had swollen to flood stage and several local residents were in the process of moving household items. By 10 p.m. Sunday, flood waters had started to recede.



Again the weather is in the news, and again, the story is about the same...

Rainfall of two to five inches in Haskell and Northwest of Haskell during a short time Sunday afternoon resulted in flooding conditions along Spring Branch Creek Sunday evening.

For the second time this year, local residents watched with a feeling of utter helplessness as rising waters crept closer and closer to their homes and businesses.

While the threat of flooding along the creek has always been present, the recurrence of the event has been much more prevalent since the flood of August 4, 1978.

Different individuals give a variety of explanations as to why the flooding is more frequent. Maybe we should be asking not why, but what? What can be done to prevent future flooding?

A unique problem exists with the creek in Haskell. The problem being that almost all of the creek bottom itself belongs to a multitude of private individuals. This private ownership creates several legal problems for the City or County to do extensive work on the creek.

Yet, during the past four years at

least two attempts have been made by the City of Haskell and Haskell County to alleviate the problem. The flooding still continues.

At least two engineers and several other qualified individuals have reported that the problem will continue until major changes are made in the City Streets crossing the creek.

During this time, several floods have required extensive repair and restoration to the Haskell City Park and have caused repeated damage to several City streets, not to mention the flooding of several homes for the fourth time.

The problem remains the same, no attempt has been made to prevent the street crossings from blocking the flow of water and the flooding continues.

At the same time, the City received a Federal Grant to pave Avenue A to prevent flooding in the Northeast part of town and the project was started immediately. Yet without Federal funds, no effort has been made to prevent flooding along the creek or flooding just South of North 16th Street.

Perhaps the time has come to address the problem instead of repeatedly repairing the damage.

# Even Smiles Communicate

For 16 year old Caroline Goumilloux, of Cahors, France, there is a world of difference between the textbook English of French schools and the native tongue of Haskell, Texas.

Caroline is in Haskell for a month long visit in the home of Duward and Gwen Campbell and both she and Gwen joke about constant use of dictionaries during the first few days.

She arrived in Haskell July 13 and will begin the return trip home, this Saturday.

Caroline says that Duward is her

favorite American, but admits they still have some trouble communicating. When talking to each other, Gwen is often called upon to assist in translating English to French schools and the native tongue of Haskell, Texas.

Caroline is part of about 500 French students visiting in Texas, Florida, Louisiana, and Arkansas as part of the North Atlantic Cultural Exchange League.

She is a second year high school student and says that her favorite part of the visit so far is the friendly people.

During her stay, she has attended her first rodeo and first baseball game. She attended a rodeo in Snyder and also saw the Texas Rangers defeat Milwaukee. She also enjoyed a tour of South Fork (location of the TV show "Dallas"). She told of a French newspaper article which stated that more French visitors to the U.S. tour South Fork than the White House.

An accomplished horseback rider, Caroline rides jumping horses and also teaches riding and jumping. Another new experience came when she assisted Nancy Morales for several days and rode a western saddle for the first time.

Several items of food have been new experiences for Caroline. First time tastes during this visit include: peanut butter, tacos, blackeyed peas, okra, squash and corn on the cob, all of which she says she enjoys. On the list which didn't fare so well on her taste buds are: black jelly beans, cinnamon red hots and Dr. Pepper.

During the visit, the Campbell family has taken Caroline to

Oklahoma City to the Cowboy Hall of Fame; an Oklahoma Indian Reservation; Possum Kingdom Lake; Alpine and Dallas-Fort Worth. She was also a guest at several Haskell Civic Clubs and was honored with a western party.

According to Gwen, who is an old hand at exchange programs having hosted 4-H members from across the U.S., Caroline is more willing to try new things, but all young people are basically the same.

The success of the program is evident when plans are discussed for the Campbells to visit France and Caroline talks of coming back to Texas.

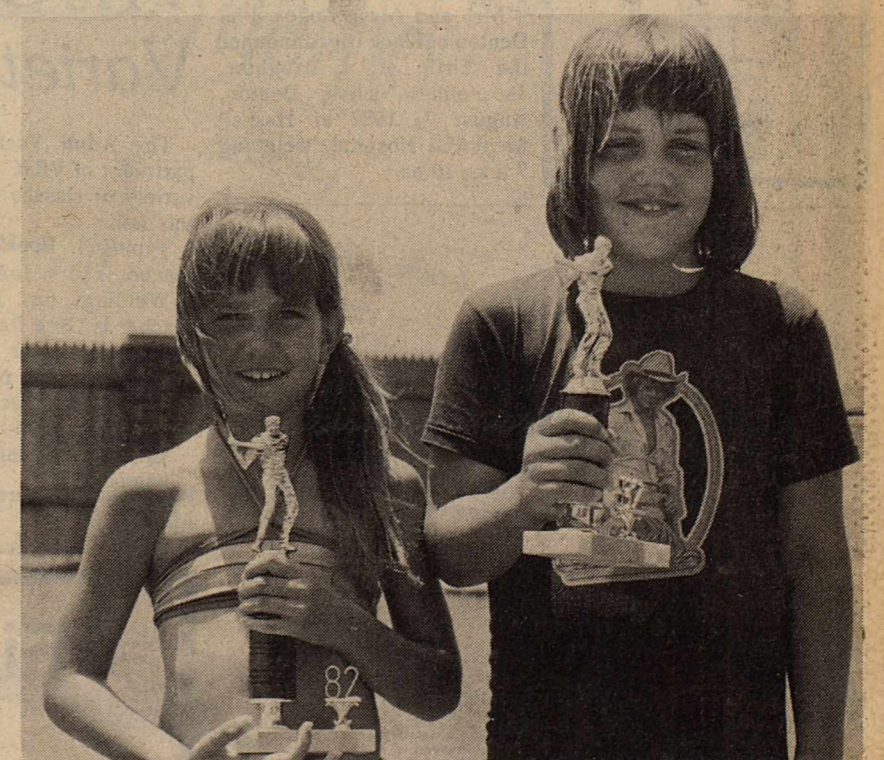

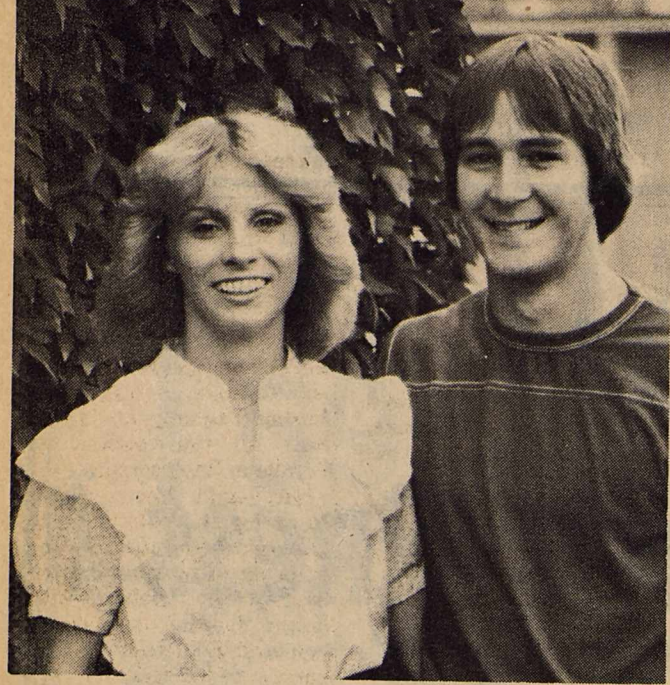

## Water Is Essential To Good Health

Water is the quiet and unappreciated nutrient -- and it's calorie-free and cheap.

People take water for granted, yet it is vital for life.

We tend to be more concerned about calories, protein, fat and vitamins and minerals in our diets, but without water, life would not exist.

Of course, most people know that, but it's important to remind ourselves that knowing is one thing, acting on the knowledge is another.

Many people do not drink enough water. Adults and children require six to eight cups (eight ounces each) of water each day.

Water is needed by each cell in the body. It transports nutrients to the cells and waste products from them. It lubricates the joints, and during perspiration, water cools the body.

Drinking water isn't the only way to meet water needs -- many foods provide much of the water needed each day. Soups, stews, fruit juices,

milk, coffee and watermelon supply much of the daily water requirement.

Remember, too, that more water than usual is needed during heavy perspiration in a hot, dry climate and during illness that includes fever or diarrhea.

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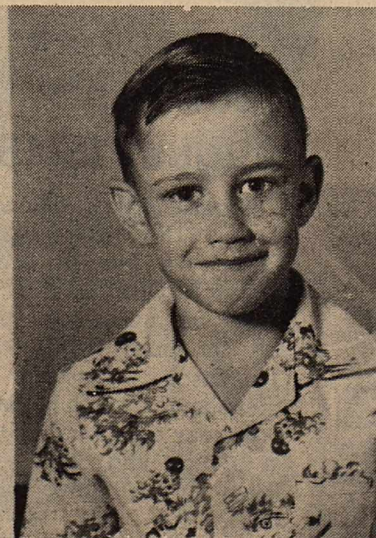

Assisting in serving fresh fruit and egg omelet were cousins Mrs. Tommy Watson of Paige, Renae & Holly McBroom.

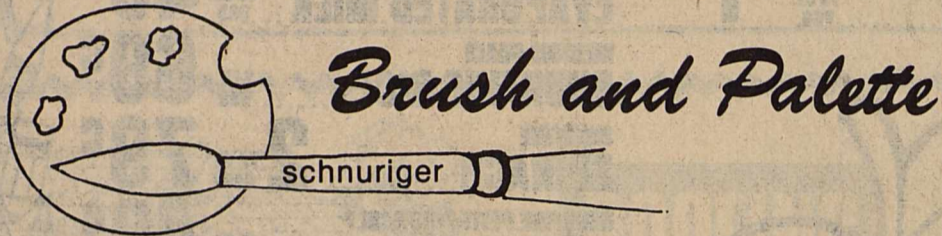

I experienced great difficulty when I was asked to give a concrete definition of the art of the painter, what the painter really is and what he tries to do. My first impulse was to say that a painter was a creature who tried to communicate his ideas to others by means of pictures and that it may be said of him - and often is - that he told you a story in a visible form. This statement could lead to all sorts of misunderstandings. It could have been interpreted as encouragement of the kind of paintings, which all true artists disapprove of - the magazine cover kind of picture that tells a sweet and futile

story. Therefore, I avoided that expression for fear of being misinterpreted. Yet, that is exactly what the painter, sculptor, composer and novelist does. Each tried to convey an impression of something he has seen or experienced. Painters look at landscapes, which strikes him by the harmonious simplicity or by its rugged disorganization. Whether beautiful or ugly, it is a quality which appeals to the painter's emotions and makes him reach for a pencil or a brush. The rest is no concern of his. He can leave that to the critics, for his job is done the

moment his picture is finished. Had he been a poet, he would have endeavored to do so by means of words; a composer would try to tell his experience by means of sound. Being a painter, he is obliged to use the medium of color and line. And that is really all there is to the problem of "Why do people paint pictures?" They do so because they must. And all art that is not the result of such a divine MUST is bad art. If you can grasp this simple fact and never lose sight of it, you will find that it is an unfailing key to practically every mystery connected with the pictorial arts. Just ask yourself, "What did this painter want to tell me?"

Q. Is there a non-poisonous permanent green that will replace Emerald Green?

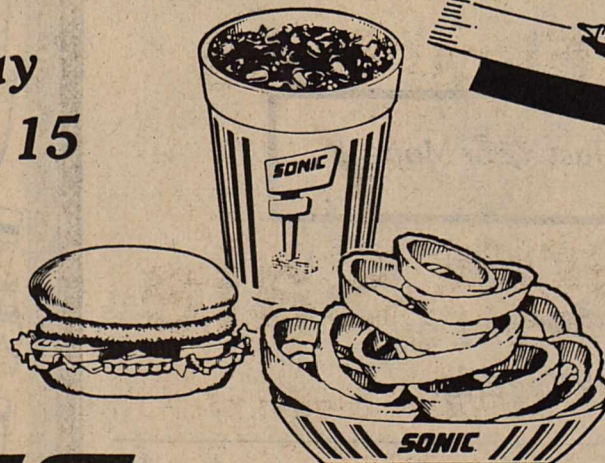

## Take Precautions To Protect Skin From Sun

Our skin takes a beating. We scrape it, scratch it, cut it and bruise it accidentally but regularly. Worse yet, some of us even try to bake it.

The main problem with trying to get the perfect tan is that the sun damages the skin, according to the Texas Medical Association.

Some damage may be immediate—burning, blistering, skin rashes or eruptions, & eye injury. Later damage can include skin that sags & wrinkles prematurely. Finally, excessive exposure to the sun increases a person's chances of developing skin cancer.

The sun affects each person's skin differently. The main factor is the amount of melanin—a naturally occurring skin pigment—that the individual's system produces. Darker skin indicates larger amounts of melanin. These people tan quicker and easier than those with fair skin.

Most dermatologists believe the risk of developing skin

cancer from ultraviolet radiation—from the sun, sunlamps or tanning salons—exists whether one is sunburned or suntanned. But people who freckle or sunburn easily are particularly susceptible.

Still, not more than 2 percent of all types of skin cancer are fatal. Although skin cancer seldom develops in people under 20, its incidence increases gradually with age and peaks at about 75.

Simple precautions will limit the sun's potentially

harmful effects:

--Avoid sunbathing around noon. The sun is strongest and most harmful from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

--Use a sunscreen regularly. Some of the most effective ones contain para-aminobenzoic acid (PABA). Other effective sunscreen ingredients include titanium dioxide and benzophenone.

Re-apply the lotion every two hours or after swimming or perspiring heavily.

### The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—My Consumer Protection Division attorneys tell me that recently there has been an increase in inquiries about offers of "free gifts". These offers are usually related to the sale of some sort of resort facility but may involve other items.

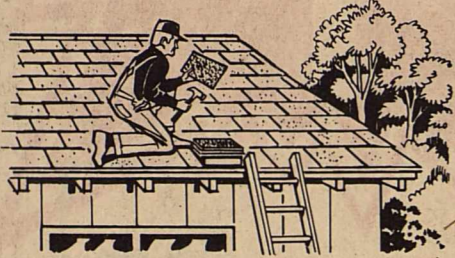
Generally, the promotional material will explain that there are three or more categories and the "lucky" recipient has won a prize listed in one or more of the categories. Most of the gifts often include cars, television sets, microwave ovens, and trips. Some, like steak knives or pen and pencil sets, may be less attractive. The consumer is informed in which category they won a prize. With the promise of a desirable "free gift" many people make appointments to pick up the gift and listen to a sales presentation.

This is where complaints to our office have arisen. In some cases the sales presentation includes threats that a special deal will not be offered at any other time. Some people have been pressured into buying something that they

did not want or could not afford merely because of the urgency of the presentation.

Whether the consumer has purchased the property or item or not the next possible disappointment is when it comes time to get the "free gift". The disappointment comes when it is announced that a trip is the "free gift," and does not include travel to and from a departure point thousands of miles from the consumer's home. This renders the trip useless to most people. In fact some of the prizes that sounded less inviting originally are realistically more valuable. My attorneys tell me of a recent promotion in which 99.85% of the gifts were either a trip without transportation to or from the far off departure point or an item valued at less than ten dollars.

Next time you receive in the mail an offer for a "free gift" remember that there may be strings attached and the gift may not be as attractive as it sounds. If you feel there are misrepresentations in a sales presentation contact the Consumer Protection Division Office nearest you.



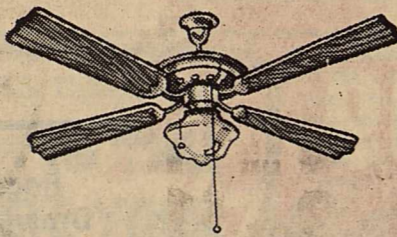

## Knock-Out Pesticide Being Misrepresented By Salesmen

Farmers being solicited by telephone to buy Knock-Out pesticide are warned to be aware that the product may be grossly misrepresented, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said today.

"We have received several calls from scattered locations

in the state from farmers who have purchased the pesticide after telephone solicitations and have found that it does not live up to the sales pitch," Brown said.

The telephone salesmen have stated that it is good as or superior to another well-known, commonly used herbicide (Roundup). The most recent telephone solicitation have been from Alpine Farm Products in Long Island, New York.

Knock-Out is registered for sale with the Texas Department of Agriculture with a label specifying a 1.8% active ingredient. "There is nothing illegal about selling this product, but its performance is being misrepresented. The pesticide being compared contains 41% active ingredient."

Brown urged farmers before ordering such pesticides from out-of-state firms to compare the active ingredient percentage on products formulated for the same purpose. "There is still no assurance that the contents meet label specifications on purchases resulting from such telephone solicitations."

They should also check the

local prices. "The cost of the product is often the same or more than they would pay locally."

Pesticides sold by such out-of-state dealers could lack the proper precautions for use on the label. There is no assurance that the pesticides are not contaminated or that they have not been diluted.

Brown advised farmers to buy from dealers they know, "ones that they can complain to if the product does not work

as it should."

If farmers have purchased pesticides from this company and still have the containers, they are requested to notify the Texas Department of Agriculture.

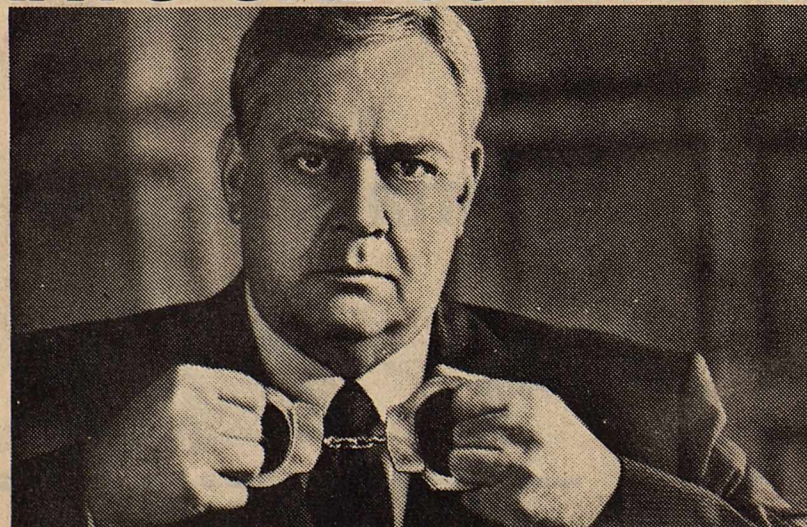

## Chamber Honors Early Religious Leaders

Perhaps no single group of people have had as much influence on the lives of the people in Haskell as its RELIGIOUS LEADERS through the years.

The first religious service was held in September 1884 when a Methodist minister Rev. J.B. Woods visited Haskell and preached at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Tucker.

Shortly afterward a Baptist minister, Brother R.A. Sublett came from Anson and preached in George Kiestler's home.

In November, a Methodist minister, Reverend J.H. Wiseman began the first regular preaching in Haskell. The history by the late R.E. Sherrill shows that all members were enrolled on the records of the church in Anson to which the Haskell church was attached. Their own

congregation was formally organized in 1885.

As the town continued to grow, other denominations naturally wanted their own organizations.

The Presbyterians, with eight members, made a partial organization July 30, 1886. After two years it ceased to operate but was reorganized in 1890. On Sept. 8, 1888, the Baptists organized with nineteen members and began services which they have kept up ever since.

Numerous ministers have graced the pulpit of the First Methodist Church since its beginning by Rev. J.H. Wiseman. Now known as the First United Methodist Church, the present minister is Michael Struve, with 380 members.

Brother S.H. Blair was the first of a series of regular pastors for the Baptists. In Haskell today the pastor of the 879-member First Baptist

Church (reorganized in 1888) is Brother Mike McKinney. Brother Darrell Feemster is pastor of the 405-member East Side Baptist Church, organized in 1923; Brother Ernest Flanders leads the 50-member Independent Baptist Church; pastor for the 25-member Hopewell Missionary Baptist Church, organized in 1920, is Brother Leester Williams; the Calvary Baptist Church with pastor Santiago Garcia was organized in 1951 and has 200 members on its roll; Brother Kenneth R. Blair is pastor for the Trinity Baptist Church.

The Reverend Martin Jacobsen is pastor of the 100-member First Presbyterian Church, which was organized originally in July 1886 by the Reverend W.M. Dickey, evangelist from the Dallas Presbytery.

The Christian Church was organized by a Christian minister named J.B. Boen.

Shortly after the first church was built, a difference arose among its members concerning instrumental music. An organ placed in the building resulted in a division when those opposing withdrew and organized what has been since as the Church of Christ. Dusty Garison has served the past two years as pastor of the First Christian Church. Some 300 people are listed among those who worship today at the Church of Christ, where Mike Strawn is minister.

The Trinity Lutheran Church was organized in 1917 in Irby and moved to Haskell in 1950. Presently there are 154 members and the minister is Harvey Faltisek.

Since 1922 the First Assembly of God Church has held services in Haskell. With a current membership of 100 people, their minister is J.C. Amburn.

Father Tom Jordan is the priest for the double parishes

of the St. George Catholic Church in Haskell and St. Ann's Catholic Church in Stamford.

Too often we take our religious leaders for granted. We care about them; we appreciate them, but we sometimes fail to tell them. Let's all make it a point this next week to express gratitude to our ministers, keeping in mind that they are also human beings who have the need for acceptance, just as we do. Take your minister to coffee, take him to lunch, take him to a ballgame. Just don't take him for granted.

# Dog Bites Plague Letter Carriers

Riddle: What are the two biggest myths associated with mail service?

Answer: "The check is in the mail" and "Go ahead and pet him; he doesn't bite."

Haskell Postmaster Joe Alves says of the classic battle between the letter carrier and the family dog. "There's irony here," Alves says. "Many people find humor in this confrontation, but there is more human tragedy in dog bite cases than you might imagine."

To illustrate the point, the Postmaster points to a new employee poster. It bears the warning that dog bites can be fatal. Its background is a reproduction of a California newspaper's story.

The lead reads: "A postman died at Kaiser Foundation Hospital Monday morning, four days after he was bitten on the arm by a pit bulldog while delivering mail on a Colton route."

Alves says the California carrier died from blood poisoning after being bitten by the dog. "A death may be rare," he adds, "but the bites are not. The 'Dog Days of Summer' takes on very serious meaning for Postal Service letter carriers."

Alves says 5,700 letter carriers across the nation were bitten by dogs last year, including 2 here in Haskell.

Alves says the Postal Service has the right to protect its carriers from injury by withholding mail delivery to any resident who keeps an unrestrained dog on a property. "In fact, a dog allowed to roam loose can result in interruption of service to a whole block or neighborhood," he adds.

The Postal Service also provides counseling to bitten carriers wishing to file lawsuits against the dog owners. It will also pursue settlement with the third party to recover losses incurred by the Service. "Things don't have to go

that far," Alves says. "All we ask is that the dog owner take a few common-sense steps to protect both their pet and their letter carrier. If the dog is kept outdoors, we ask that it be secured away from the mailbox and the areas where the mail carrier enters or leaves the property."

Alves asks local homeowners to be aware of how serious dog bites can be. "We constantly alert our carriers to the problem, but we need the public's help to stop all dog bites."

"The best protection our carriers can receive is a little thoughtful action on the part of the dog owner. It's the old story of an ounce of prevention being worth a pound of cure."

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials have announced that hunting and fishing regulations leaflets and 1982-83 hunting and fishing licenses will be available Aug. 16.

The materials can be obtained at department offices and many retail outlets such as fishing tackle shops, sporting goods and discount

stores. The hunting and fishing guides are free. Resident hunting licenses are priced at \$5.25, resident fishing \$5.00, and resident combination hunting and fishing licenses are \$8.75.

The 1982-83 licenses become effective Sept. 1, and expire Aug. 31, 1983.
