The Drug Awareness Program will be conducted August 19 and the following night will be the self defense class. The public is invited.

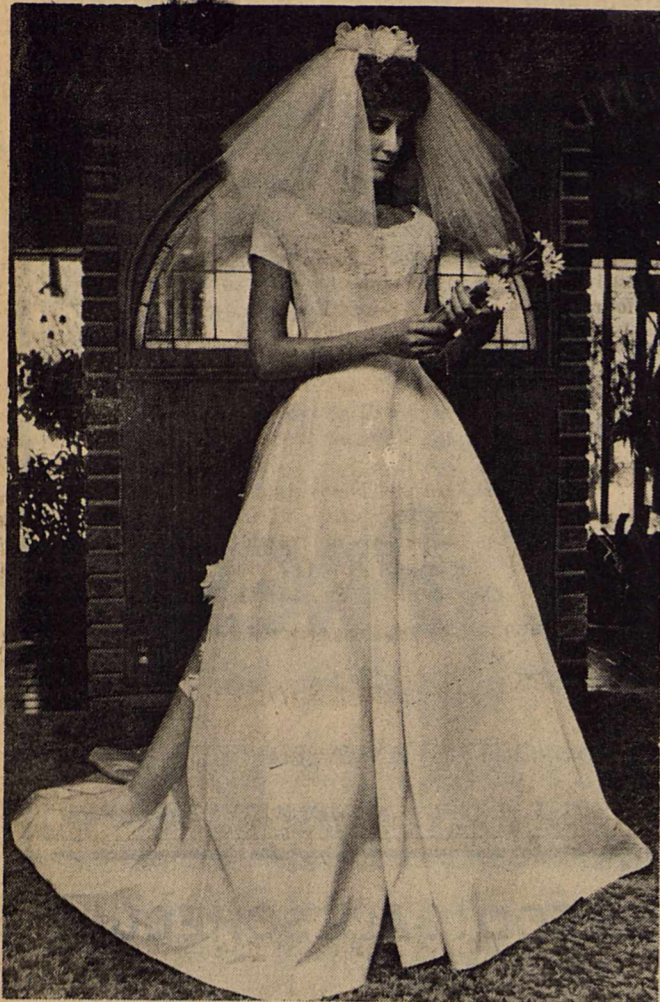

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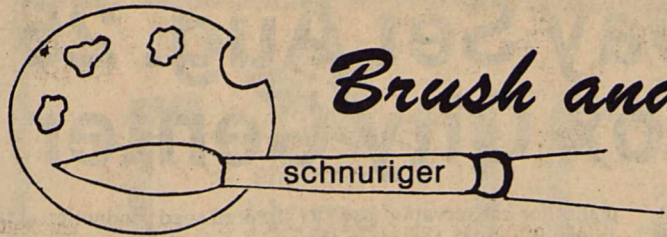
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## Brush and Palette

Have you ever made a mark on a blackboard and then tried to make another one level with or perpendicular to it? Now, test the results with a plumb line and a level. Surprising, isn't it? Is your horizontal and vertical vision normal? Can you tell when a line is perfectly upright and when one is exactly level? The relative positions of everything in a picture depends on the direction of each line in it. The artist must compare the different parts of his subject with one another and determine their relationship by means of imaginary horizontal or vertical lines. One point is exactly over or under another, or a little to one side or another point is on a level with something else - and on and on. Practice putting two or three spots in a horizontal or vertical line - do they slope or are they straight? The great Leonardo da Vinci himself, in one of his notebooks suggests that artists might well indulge in some such "profitable recreations and diversions for the purpose of training the eye to acquire accuracy of judgement, which is the primary essential of painting." Another exercise using lines (heavy lines) is create the following:

1. High; 2. Low; 3. Light; 4. Heavy; 5. Fluid; 6. Solid; 7. Bent; 8. Straight; 9. Taut; 10. Loose; 11. Love; 12. Hate.

Q. Is a fairly thick undercoating of special quick-drying titanium white safe to use if permanency is desired?

A. Traditional oil painters have always been taught that average or thin coats of paint stand a better chance of survival than heavy ones and that extremely heavy paint has a doubtful future. The cracking of thick layers of paint is less severe on rigid panels than on canvas.

Q. Do you like acrylics better than oils or watercolors?

A. They are all good and fulfill different uses. No medium, whatever it is, is

better than another. Each should be understood and mastered. To continue with the same old medium, whatever it is, without trying a new pigment is rather like a bird trying to fly with only one wing. One will continue to travel around in circles without knowing what lies ahead. A journey into a new territory presents many surprises - some might be sad while others can be very exciting.

Four Haskell County residents were among 156 recent graduates of Texas State Technical Institute in Sweetwater, who received diplomas in commencement exercises, Aug. 6.

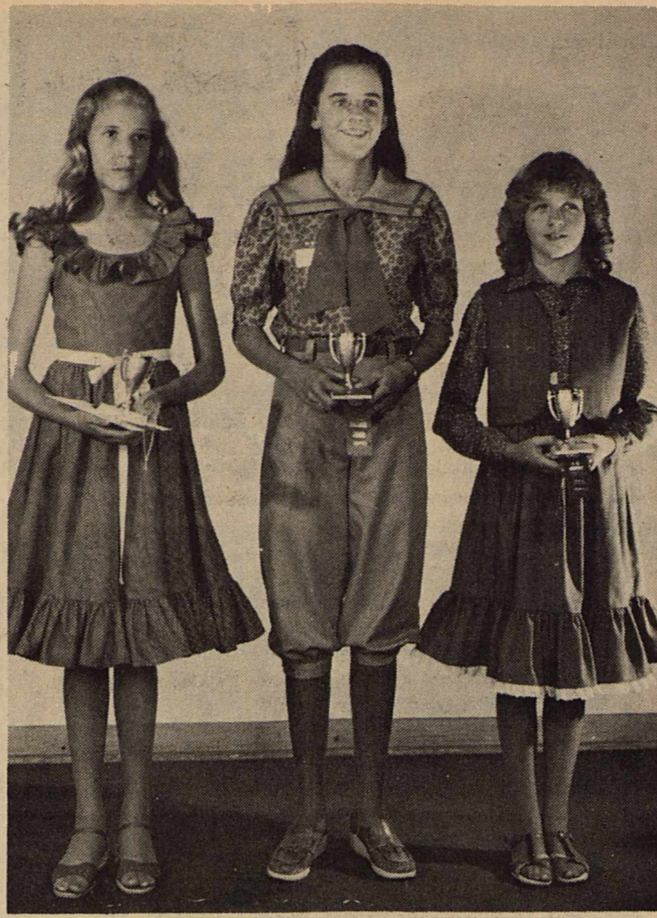
Dennis Stegemoeller, of Rochester, received a certificate of completion in the Air Conditioning / Refrigeration department.

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## Arbor Day Foundation Giving Free Trees

The National Arbor Day Foundation is giving three free American Redbud trees to all new Foundation members joining during August, 1982.

The free Redbud trees are part of the Foundation's effort to promote fall tree planting.

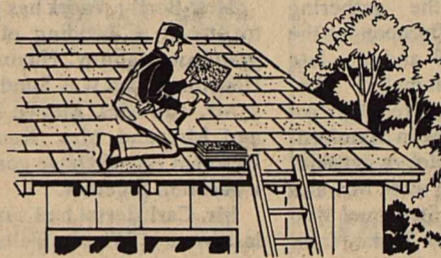
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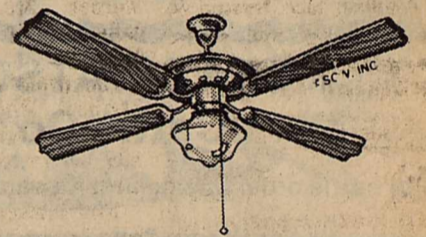

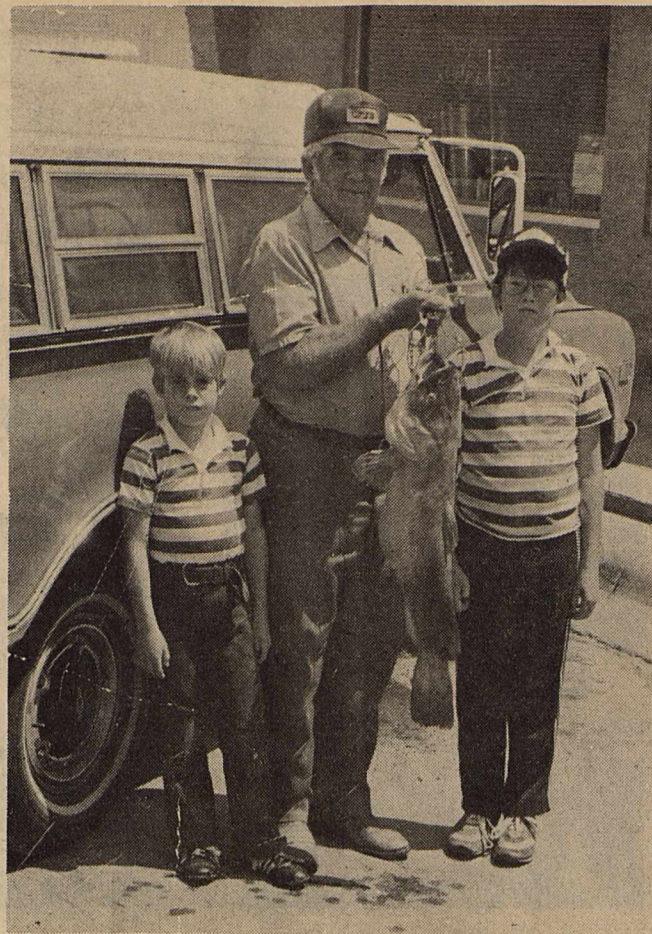

## Superintendent's Views

One of the areas that we have changed in order to have a more economical operation is student transportation. We have dropped one route and now will operate with two routes. One route will operate east of Hwy. 277 and the other route will operate west of the highway. This change will allow us to save one driver's salary plus the cost of operation of one bus. The east route will be 37.7 miles in length while the west route will be 44.2 miles long. We will transport approximately 45 legal students on these routes.

This change will cause an inconvenience for those town students who have been accustomed to riding the bus. We will have to limit the in town stops. In the mornings one bus (east bus) will stop first at Elementary and then proceed to the Secondary School. The west bus will stop at the Secondary School first and proceed to Elementary School. Students who need to cross town will be loaded at these stops in the mornings. For the afternoon run, both buses load at Elementary School first and proceed on H Avenue until 9th Street where they will stop and unload. They will then proceed to Secondary School where they will load. Both buses will proceed south. One bus will stop at the American Legion Hall to unload any students who live in that area who care to ride. The east bus will then make a rural loop to the Paint Creek highway and will stop at the Lutheran Church for youngsters who care to ride that far and live in that area. The west bus will continue south and then return to town at the red light on the square and turn west on the Rule Highway stopping in the vicinity of the clinic for students living in that area who care to ride. The bus will then make a rural loop stopping in the vicinity of the Catholic Church if anyone cares to ride that distance.

We certainly realize this is a major change over the past, but we feel it is an absolutely necessary move for the economical operation of our student transportation program. We hope each of you can accept this minor inconvenience to insure the efficiency of our school system.

The Honorable Jack Hightower, U.S. Congressman for the 13th Congressional District, will be the featured program speaker. Hightower will speak at 12:30 p.m. Other participants on the program include George C. Marks, SCS State Conservationist, Temple, and Roland R. Willis, SCS State Conservationist, Stillwater, Ok. Invocation will be given by Reverend Douglas Stenberg, Pastor First United Methodist Church, Knox City.

Registration for Field Day will begin at 8:30 a.m. Guided tours of the Center will start at 9:00 a.m. and continue throughout the day. SCS personnel will be stationed at various locations, including the initial evaluation areas and the woody plant blocks. They will point out the different types of plants being evaluated and answer questions concerning the origin of these plants and their intended conservation use.

A catered barbecue meal will be served at noon. Tickets will be available on a prepaid basis at \$4.50 per plate. Payment should be made to Doris Crownover at the Knox City Chamber of Commerce office on or before Aug. 20th.

Registration will be handled by the Knox City Chamber of Commerce and the Knox City FFA Chapter. The Knox CITY FFA Chapter will sell refreshments and snacks throughout the day.

The Plant Materials Center was established in 1965 to serve the states of Texas and Oklahoma in developing

plants for conservation use. It is one of only 23 centers in the nation.

The major objective of the Center is to assemble and evaluate plants having potential value for use in critical and special areas such as mine spoil revegetation, range and pasture improvement, wind-break and shelterbelt development, shoreline stabilization, and for recreational plantings. Over 1200 different plants are in the initial stage of evaluation at the Center.

Once a promising plant is selected for advance testing, the Center determines the cultural and management techniques required to establish and grow these plants. A

limited seed production area is maintained at the Center to produce seed for field testing and also to provide seed growers with Foundation Seed to establish a commercial source of seed for the plant once it is officially released.

Some of the most recent releases from the Center are: 'Selection 75' kleingrass, 'Mason' sandhill lovegrass, 'Alamo' switchgrass, 'Aztec' Maximilian sunflower, 'Shoreline' common reed, 'Nucses' and 'Llano' buffelgrass, 'T-587' oldworld bluestem, 'Saltalk' alkali sacaton, 'Lometa' indiagrass, 'Rainbow' wildplum and 'Yellow Puff' littleleaf leadtree.

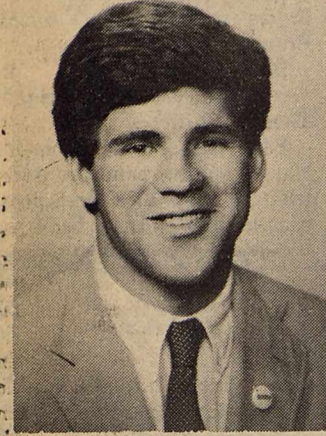
another church. Their congregations are asked to follow. They accept.
