## State Crime Up 1.3% Over 1981 Totals

The Texas crime rate for the first half of 1982 was up 1.3 per cent compared to the same period last year, according to DPS Director Jim Adams.

Statistics gathered by the DPS Uniform Crime Reporting Bureau showed there were 3,083.1 major crimes reported for each hundred thousand of population in the first six months of 1982. The rate for the comparable 1981 period was 3,044.6 crimes per hundred thousand population.

"After three years of crime rate increases in Texas, we saw the rate decline a little last year. Although the rate is up slightly for the first half of 1982, this would indicate a continuation of the stabilizing trend seen last year," Colonel Adams said. "I would agree with Attorney General William Smith's recent comment that increased law enforcement professionalism is

partly responsible for this trend. It's my feeling that citizen involvement in crime prevention is also a factor."

"A total of 454,907 major criminal offenses were reported by Texas law enforcement agencies from January through June of this year," Adams pointed out. "For the same period last year, the number of crimes totaled 431,409. This 5.4 per cent increase in actual crimes is fairly consistent with the 4.1 per cent increase in population projected for this period."

Three of the four violent crime categories posted increases for the first six months of 1982. The number of assault cases rose 15.4 per cent, while robberies were up 8.4 per cent. Homicides increased by almost one per cent, while the number of rapes showed a slight decline of 0.3 per cent.

Auto theft led the property crime categories, increasing by 9.6 per cent when compared to the first six months of 1981. Larceny-theft offenses were up 5.5 per cent and burglary cases rose 2.5 per cent.

Property losses attributable to major index crime in the first half of 1982 totaled \$446.1 million. In addition, Texas authorities investigated 4,065 arson cases during the period which resulted in estimated losses of \$44.1 million.

Statewide reported arrests for the first six months of this year totaled 440,945, and 7.5 per cent increase compared to the same 1981 period. Reported arrests for driving while intoxicated were up 6.5 per cent for the first half of 1982, totaling

48,423.

Two police officers were killed in the line of duty by criminal action in the first six months of this year. Four other officers died as a result of duty-related accidents. A total of 1,805 officers were assaulted in the line of duty.

The state crime statistics are based on reports submitted by 749 law enforcement agencies representing nearly 100 per cent of the state population.

## To Be Re-Tried

## Court Of Criminal Appeals Overturns Alvarez Ruling

All members of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals have overturned a three judge panel ruling of the same court and stated that sufficient evidence existed to convict Alberto Perales Alvarez. The court did find a fundamental

error in the jury charge which required reversal.

The opinion, delivered November 17, reversed the opinion handed down in late July by three members of the court. The July reversal stated that there was not sufficient evidence to convict Alvarez and the four year old appeal was reversed.

Alvarez was convicted October 5, 1978, for the rape of a 19 year old woman who was found dead in the Haskell City Park July 4, 1977. He was sentenced to three years by a Haskell County Jury and has been out on appeal since that time.

The entire court stated in their opinion, that the confession of Alvarez was sufficient to prove the deficiencies found by the panel, and

held that the evidence supports the conviction.

The fundamental error in the jury charge, which was prepared by the presiding judge of the 39th Judicial District Court, requires reversal but allows the state to re-try Alvarez. The July reversal would have freed Alvarez and the state would not have been allowed to re-try the case.

According to the opinion, "There is no paragraph in the charge applying the law to the facts".

District Attorney Joseph Thigpen told the *Free Press* Thursday that the case would be scheduled for retrial early in 1983.

### TAX PLANNING

### INVESTMENT TAX CREDIT CHANGES (Cut-Back Imminent)

The 1982 Tax Act cuts back on the benefits of investment credit. If you're planning to buy equipment or other property that qualifies for the credit, careful planning could save you money.

Beginning January 1, 1983, the new law requires that the basis (depreciable value) of an asset be reduced by one-half the amount of the credit taken. For example, if you purchase qualified property for \$20,000 and take a 10% investment tax credit, you must reduce your basis in the property to \$19,000 (\$20,000 less one-half of \$2,000). This \$19,000 basis is used for cost recovery (depreciation) deductions and computing the gain or loss when the property is disposed of.

You may elect, as an alternative to this basis reduction, a 2% reduction in the investment tax credit taken. In other words, instead of taking a 10% investment credit for 5-year property, you take 8%, and 3-year property would get a 4% investment credit rather than 6%. Then there is no reduction in the basis of the property. In our example, you would take \$1,600 investment credit (\$20,000 x 8%) with no reduction in the \$20,000 basis.

These changes apply to property placed in service after 1982. Therefore, if you're planning new purchases, you have until the end of 1982 to place the property in service and get the benefits of the old law - no reduction in basis for the investment credit taken.

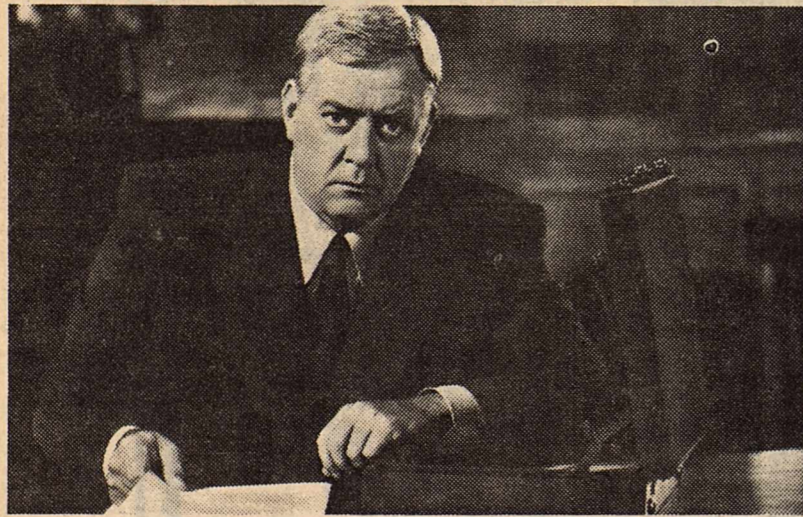
One exception worth noting is that if you had a binding equipment purchase contract in force on July 1, 1982, the property can be placed in service after year-end and still qualify for investment credit under the old law.

With these new rules in mind, you may want to order needed equipment now to be assured that you'll obtain delivery before year-end. Consider having a provision in the purchase contract providing for liquidated damages equal to the loss of tax benefits if delivery is not made by December 31.

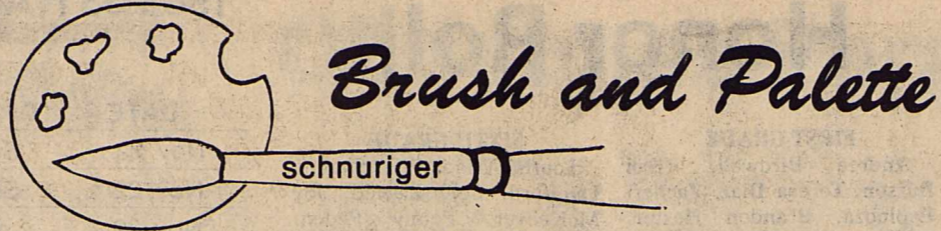
## William L. Pace III Receives Certificate From USDA

Q. What colors should be used in a landscape when they cross three or more colors on the ground?

A. A cast shadow is a relative complement to the color it's on. If a cast shadow of a tree falls along a yellow-green pasture, the cast shadow would be red mixed into a darker yellow green. If the shadow is on a dirt road that's in the yellow family, the cast shadow would be a mixture of violet added to the road color. When the shadow travels up the side of a red barn, green should be added into the red for the shadow.

Q. How can I paint a tin roof with rusty streaks running down it?

A. The roof is in the gray family. If the roof is tilted toward the sun, it will be a lighter value of gray. The rusty streaks could be white mixed with orange and Burnt Sienna.

Q. What colors should I use to paint an old weathered shack?

A. The subtle gray colors found in this type of construction presents a problem to the beginner because he generally has a heavy hand with color. Make a gray with black and white and add some Burnt Umber and Ultramarine Blue. There are many variations of gray that can be mixed - so make your own and add some cool colors to it, for the weathered boards.
