Members of the West Texas Press Association gathered in Lubbock last weekend for their mid-winter meeting and heard the same basic ideas from several speakers outside the newspaper industry.

Bob Gorilski, former NBC news correspondent, and current director of information for Gulf Oil Co., to West Texas Publishers and Editors that newspapers are the only form of news dissemination which believes that the media should educate the public.

He cited several examples of negative reporting by television shows such as 20/20 and 60 minutes which do not "cover the new", but attempt to "uncover a scandle". He added that the same things occur in newspapers but to a lessor degree and generally for the purpose of educating the public rather than to create a scandle.

Several studies cited by Gorilski revealed that readers of newspapers are consistantly more knowledgable concerning current events than are individuals which only see and hear

radio and television news. Later in the program Congressman Charles Stenholm addressed the group and expressed his observation that newspapers generally are more objective in reporting political happenings than

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday returned \$114.3 million in smaller.' Houston received the largest local sales tax payments to 974 cities

who levy the one-percent city sales Although the payment is the largest single one returned to cities since the rebates began in 1968,

Bullock warned merchants and city officials not to make too much of it. "Our sales tax goose is still laying golden eggs but they are not growing as fast as they used to." Bullock said. The Comptroller pointed out February allocations,

based on sales made in December, are traditionally the biggest of the "Last February we made an allocation that was 16 percent

higher than the previous year, which was 16 percent higher than the year before that," Bullock said. "This February, our allocation is only 7.49 percent higher than February 1982. And a good deal of this is because of streamlined procedures we're using to get as much city revenue back to the city that collected it just as soon as possible. If we took out the part improvements, the rate of growth are collected by the Comptroller.

check, for \$21.8 million, down 2.5 percent from February 1982. Dallas' check for \$13.1 million was up more than 17 percent from the previous

San Antonio received \$6.3 million, up 9.7 percent. Fort Worth got \$4.2 million, up nearly 15 percent over last year. Austin's \$4.3 million was up 26.4 percent over last year but El Paso, continuing to suffer the effects of Mexico's economic troubles, received \$2.3 million, down 4.2 percent from last February.

Bullock also sent February rebates to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. The Houston MTA received \$25.5 million, up 2.5 percent from last February. The San Antonio MTA got a check for \$3.6 million up 8.5 percent from last year.

The City and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated of the increase due to processing monthly to the cities in which they



Medical researchers at Texas A&M University have successfully used a mirror image of a. popular glaucoma drug to develop a new treatment that apparently eliminates dangerous side effects. The new drug is D-timolol. Its structure is an p.m. Tuesday Feb. 22 in First exact mirror image of Ltimolol, an agent first marketed under the trade name Timoptic.

Glaucoma is caused by a buildup of pressure in the chambers of the eye and primarily affects persons over

age 40. People can develop the ailment as young as age 20, said Dr. George C. Y. Chiou, head of medical pharmacology. Un-





County Food Stamp Funds Show Decrease

The State of Texas paid \$5.48 million for food stamps last year and of that, Haskell County received \$234,400.

In Haskell County alone 607 people participated in the food stamp program, 146 less than were registered for the statefunded food assistance program the year before.

According to figures recently released by Texas' Department of Human Resources in its annual report, the state's social assistance tab reached \$1.8 million in 1982. That figure represents an \$11.5 million increase over 1981 expenditures.

Haskell County's share of that record figure totalled \$1.3 million, and decrease of \$47,253 over the previous

Food stamps for children accounted for 56 percent of the value of stamps issued in fiscal year 1982, the report said. Adults caring for dependent children took in 20 ercent and the rest distributed to the elderly and disabled adults living alone.

Over 31 families in Haskell County received state aid to make it through last year, according to the report. The county distributed \$36,000 among 93 individuals. Payments statewide averaged \$34.52 a month per person, barely more than a dollar a day. This figure puts Texas second lowest on the list of average payment for social assistance of all states, second only to Mississippi.

Almost half (49.2 percent) of aid to families of dependent children went toward unwed parenthood. About 122,000 women helped under such programs were of childbearing age, the report said. The report contributed the high percentage of unwed childbirths to unintended pregnancy because, the report said, those women are "fertile and sexually active."
