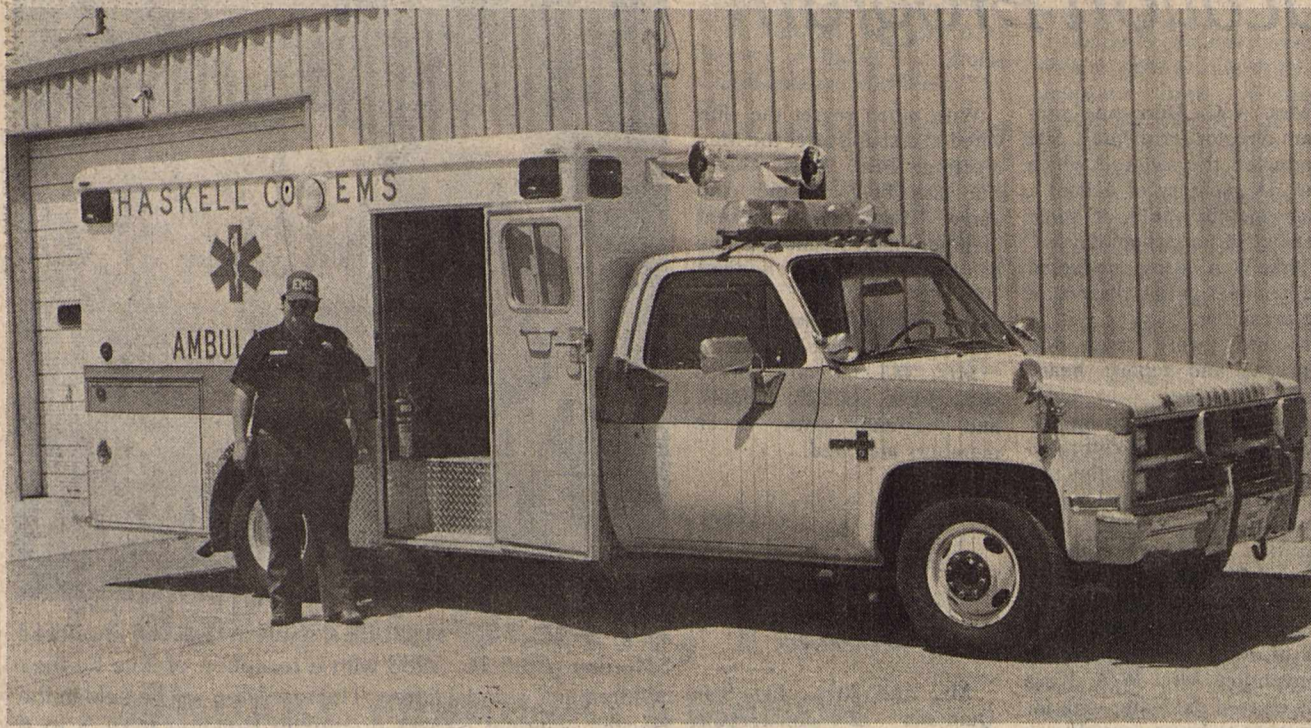

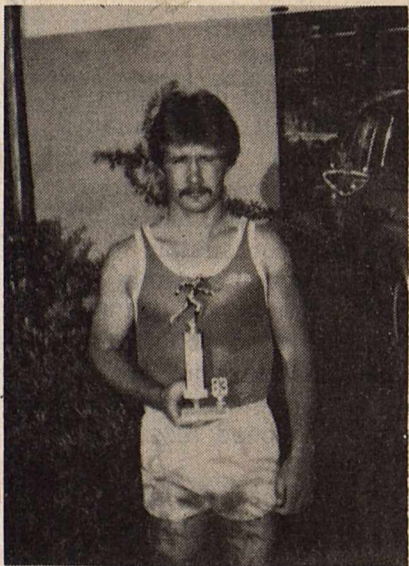
Raja Hassen, chairman for Economics, reported on the state of the town, the county, the state and the country in general and the forecast of specialists.

Wins Age Group In Marathon

Last Saturday, April 9, at 7:00 a.m., 75 runners began Abilene's Marathon of the Great Southwest. One of the competitors was Haskell's Will Pace, a sophomore at Abilene Christian University. Will completed the 26 mile 385 yard course in 3 hours and 12 minutes placing 11th overall and winning his age group of 13-19 years.

This was only Will's second marathon. Last December he ran the Dallas White Rock Lake Marathon in 3 hours and 26 minutes in a field of over 3,500. He finished 39th in the 16-19 year group which consisted of 79 runners.

Asked what he thought of Abilene's marathon, he stated that Abilene's route with its many overpasses located throughout the course was much tougher than the flat surface around White Rock Lake. "I believe I could have done better in Abilene's marathon, but I'm still new at marathons and learning how to run them," he commented.

In the future Will hopes to run a time of 2 hours and 50 minutes which would qualify him to run in the prestigious Boston Marathon.

The chairman of the Building and Construction Committee, Ben McGee, was absent from the meeting, but has reported his plans to invite all representatives of the building industry to make collective efforts. A special recognition is also planned for them.

Dr. Ed Harris reported on the plans of the Community Betterment Committee which includes working with the Beautify Haskell committee, the city, the county, the fire department, service organizations, agencies and for cultural, educational and recreational activities.

The chairman of the Agriculture and Ranching Division is Tommy Richardson. He reports that farmers will be consulted as to their problems and to assure them the Chamber will help with any positive approach to solving them. Farmers and ranchers will be recognized at a special function to be hosted by the Chamber later in the year.

Doris Phemister, chairman, announced that over 200 merchants were given special invitations to attend the April 6 Retail Trade Coffee at the Haskell National Bank Community Room. Her committee proposes a schedule of promotions over a year's period, including the reinstatement of Dollar Days and Sidewalk Saturdays as well as multi-sales.

The Industrial and Professional Committee, Abe Turner, chairman, is charged with expansion of industry and in locating two doctors, an optometrist, a shoe repairman and a commercial upholsteryman. They will undergo extensive training prior to the committee's pursuit and will work very closely with the Industrial Foundation.

Charles Thornhill, chairman, said the Transportation Committee will be concerned with aviation, trucking, bus lines, railways, motor freight, etc. since good transportation is vital to all endeavors.

According to chairman Hank Sherman, the Chamber's Fair Olympics will be held during the

Haskell County Fair, with expanded races and entertainment between events.

In charge of Tourism and Conventions, is Kay Smith. She is putting together a pamphlet listing Haskell attractions and facilities and is compiling brochures and information concerning travel attractions in Texas.

Don Comedy, a second vice president and chairman of the Membership committee, reported that an all-out membership drive is being planned during the Spring, in which individuals, businesses, professionals will be asked to join the 134 members who are now active with the Haskell Chamber of Commerce.

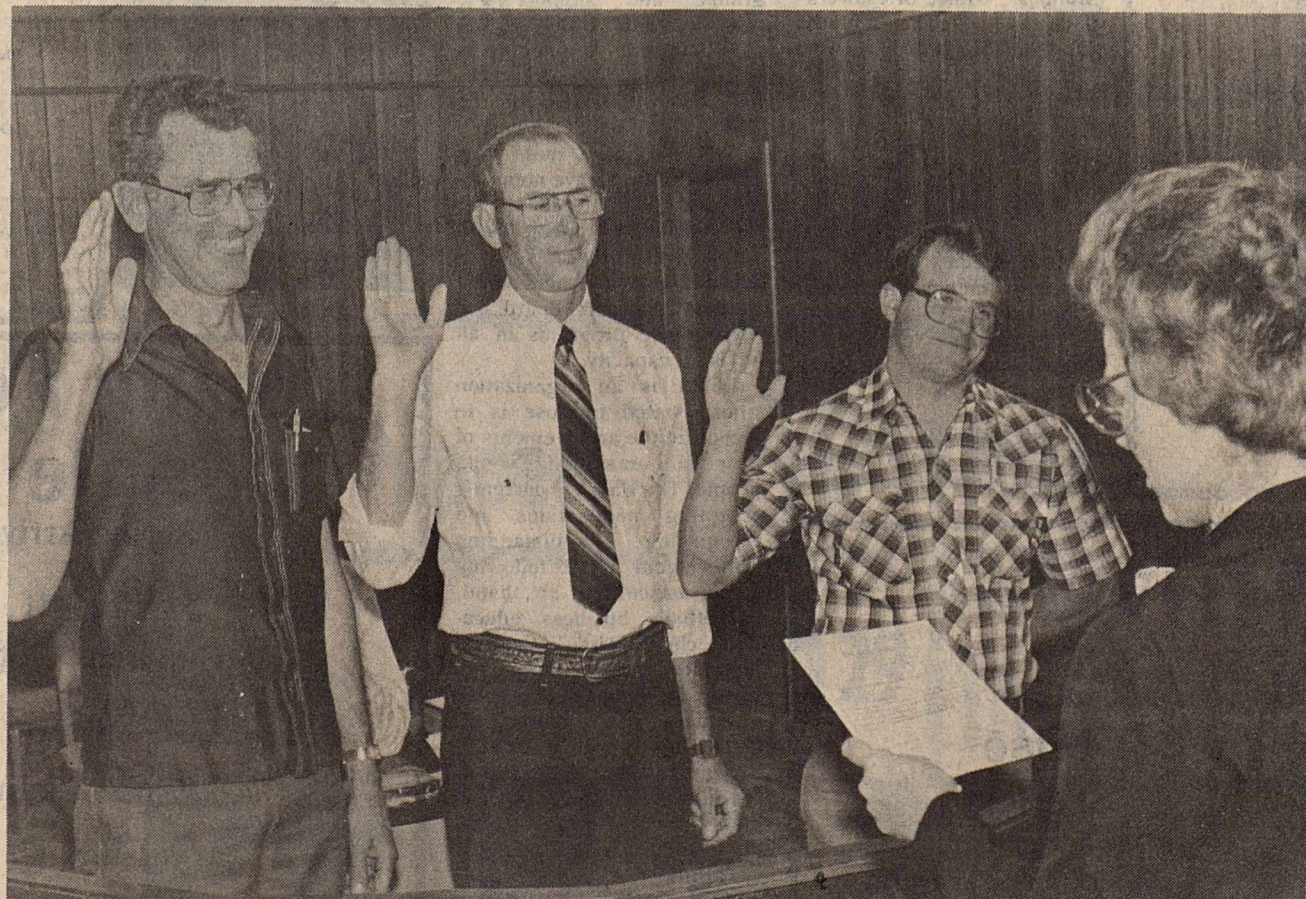

May 20 Is Uniform Cotton Planting Date

May 20th has been set as the cotton uniform planting date for Haskell County. Boll weevil infestations have increased during the past two years and the boll weevil infestation during last September and October was the heaviest since 1976.

Uniform planting prevents the production of squares ¼ grown or larger until the first week in July. Squares smaller than ¼ grown will not support the development of boll weevil larvae. Since boll weevils survive 10 to 22 days after they emerge from overwintering habitat only those female weevils that emerge after mid June in most years

can survive long enough to deposit their eggs in squares that will support the larvae. Uniform planting does not cost anything but when all producers cooperate it will reduce the weevil infestation level and damage during the entire growing season.

Data from boll weevil traps in 1982 indicated that overwintered boll weevils emerged into late June and in some cases early July. These later emerging boll weevils infested the earlier planted fields. In some cases these were early June planted fields. The cool conditions last year apparently allowed the weevils to emerge later and survive until after ¼ grown squares were present in the earliest planted fields.

Temperatures this past winter have not been low enough to greatly reduce overwintered weevil populations. According to information provided by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Entomologist, Dr. J.E. Slosser and Mr. Rex Price as of March 21, 25% of the overwintered weevils have survived. In years of severe winter conditions only 5% survival has been observed.

Because of this high level of weevil survival it is imperative that producers wait until the uniform planting date to plant their cotton. Weather conditions this spring will be important in determining the number of weevils that survive long enough to infest cotton. Warmer

conditions in May and June will get a high percentage of the weevils out earlier. Weather conditions in July will determine the level of weevil population increase. A larger weevil population can be expected if temperatures are below normal and above average rainfall is received during July.

Because of the high level of participation in the PIK program, many fields near favorable weevil overwinter habitat where boll weevils have been a major problem in the past will not be planted. The overwintered weevil that would have infested these fields will have to move to neighboring fields to find cotton. The longer it takes them to locate squaring cotton the higher will be the level of mortality.

Uniform planting will be the first step in making sure boll weevils are not a major problem early in 1983. In weevil "hot spot" areas early season boll weevil control measures may also be needed.

New Councilmen Take Oaths Of Office Tuesday

Two new members of the Haskell City Council and one veteran Councilman received the oaths of office Tuesday night and all members of the Council reorganized during their regular meeting.

Jerry Stocks and Darrell Smith received oaths as new Council members and Hugh Horton took the oath as a returning member of the Council.

Horton was also elected Mayor Pro-tem.

During the reorganization of the Council, Mayor Franciene Johnson made departmental assignments to members. Council members and their departments include: Horton, sanitation and equipment; Bill Lane, water and sewer and ambulance; Larry Gilliam, streets; Smith, parks, airport and maintenance; and Stocks, fire, ambulance and sheltered workshop.

Special plaques of appreciation for retiring Councilmen Guy Kennedy and Archie Jones were presented by Mayor Johnson.

Official election results reported during the meeting included: Stocks, 319; Horton, 262; Smith, 218; Earl Proctor, 178; Jones, 175; and Kennedy, 145.

Mayor Johnson reported to new Council members the accomplishments of the Council during the past year including: the purchase of a backhoe, pickup, one-third of a new ambulance (purchased in cooperation with the County and hospital), riding mower, new scraper, new airport hangar, lighted tennis courts, and a new bridge in park. Other accomplishments included the completion of job descriptions for City employees, an option for the purchase of a new landfill, uniforms for employees, the adoption of a retirement system for employees and the receipt of a \$500,000.00 grant for flood prevention work on the creek.

In other action, Council members approved a resolution on paving program with the City paying one-third of the cost and property owners paying two-thirds. Council members also discussed the North-east third paving project and agreed to hire an engineer.

Conservation Viewpoints

When should I plant the grass in my waterway? This question is on the minds of many Haskell County producers. Now that spring is here, the seeding of grasses becomes a key issue for people that plan to establish their waterways and later build terraces that will outlet on these grassed areas.

Waterway vegetation is not simply plowing the ground and throwing out some seed. A plan is needed for a waterway or any other area being seeded, to become established with a good stand of grass.

The plan, is to develop a clean, firm seedbed, whether using Kleingrass or Bermudagrass. The ground should be chiseled and disked at least once for most soils in Haskell County. These practices

normally have been completed by this time, but do not necessarily have to be insured a stand. Following this the seeding of the chosen grass is the next part of the plan.

The Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District has a cultipacker seeder available for use in planting grass. This seeder packs the soil, deposits the seed and presses the seed into the ground to prevent overcovering of the seed. Other methods of seeding are available including the use of disk opener type drills, hand seeding and aerial seeding. The plan is to see which method most fits your needs.

After preparing the land and seeding the grass, another issue comes along. The question of fertilization. The Soil Conservation Service

recommends that all waterway plantings be fertilized with nitrogen and phosphorous to aid in grass establishment. After all, if you go to the time and expense of shaping, plowing and seeding an area, you do expect to get a stand of grass. These practices are too expensive not to complete the plan and see a grass stand develop.

For recommendations on types of grass most adaptable, seeding rates and fertilizer requirements, contact the SCS in Haskell.

All people in the Rolling Plains district are invited to

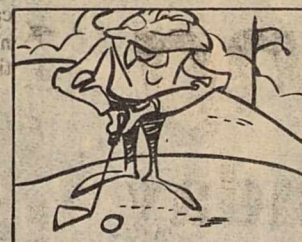
attend this free program sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and hosted by the County Program Building Committees in Knox and Motley Counties.

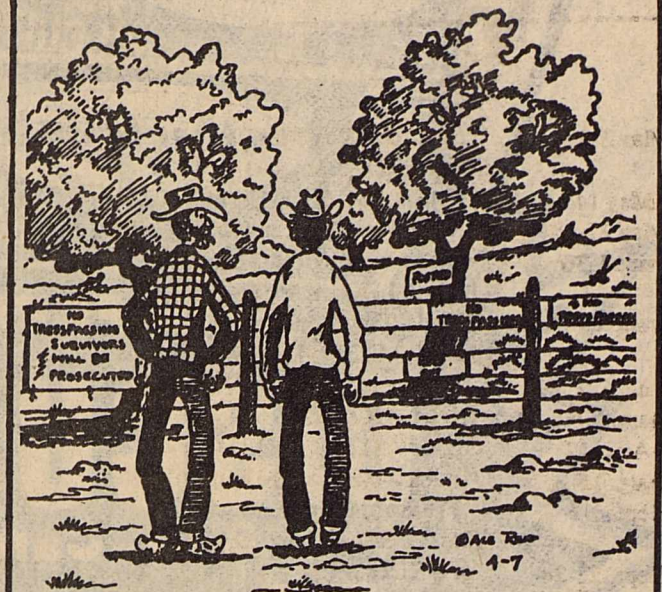

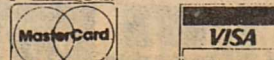

Superintendent's Views

This week, I am continuing repeating the TASB response to Governor White's budget proposal and its effect on the local situation.

If the 68th Legislature does not strike a reasonable balance between salaries and other components of the Foundation School Program, then school districts must either raise property taxes or reduce program and staff.

The first alternative, property tax increase, is not feasible in many parts of Texas. The 8% tax rate increase triggers possible rollback elections is effectively a cap on local taxes, particularly in rural areas where elections are easier to call. As of March 8, school districts have lost all three rollback elections held in Texas. (This is not true currently, Early ISD being an example of the opposite.) The Governor's budget could force districts to exceed the 8% level just to keep up with the salary increase he had promised.

The second alternative, reducing programs and staff, also is not feasible for many districts. Many programs and services, including workers' compensation, unemployment compensation, bilingual education, and special education, result from federal or state mandates that are not fully funded. Other expenses, such as utilities and debt services for facilities construction, represent significant fixed costs. Still other programs such as the arts, music, gifted and talented education, and athletics are the result of community expectations across the state. Unfortunately, these programs may be the most susceptible if local districts are forced to reduce services.

TASB is urging the 68th Legislature to place a reasonable share of any new monies appropriated by the state into categories such as maintenance and operation, equalization aid, compensatory educa-

tion, and transportation. These categories should receive at least 35% of new funds, with the remainder directly earmarked for salaries. In addition, TASB is supporting an increase in the sales tax of 1%, with the revenue dedicated to public education to relieve local property taxes. These proposals will help local school districts keep effective tax rate increases under 8% and continue to provide a quality educational program. This is the end of the TASB printout.

What is the effect on Haskell ISD? If this proposal is moved into legislation, the initial problem to our school district would be an increase in Local Fund Assignment. All new monies must be raised locally. In addition, we have eight excess units which are financed locally. The additional cost of these units (salary raises) will have to be absorbed locally. Our utility bills are running considerably higher than previous years due to rate increases. This will cost us additional money.

Whether this bill will pass as proposed is up for speculation, but the public certainly needs to become aware of the possibilities and the consequences.

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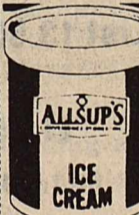

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
