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## Haskell Receives Sales Tax Check

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent checks totaling \$35.1 million to 974 cities that levy the one-percent city sales tax.

"Our total payments to cities so far this year are still running about one percent behind last year," Bullock said in sending the July checks to the cities. "Texas was slow to enter the national recession and we are still lagging behind in the recovery. Most major Texas cities are beginning to show higher tax receipts than last year, but the border and oil and gas producing areas are still substantially behind."

Houston received the largest check—\$6.8 million—bringing this year's total to \$75.8 million, down 9 percent from 1982. Dallas' payment totaled \$4.2 million for a total \$45.9 million, up 8 percent from last year. San Antonio's payment was \$2.1 million, putting 1983 receipts at \$22.6 million, a 9 percent increase.

Austin's July payment was \$1.5 million, bringing the year's total to \$15 million, 15 percent over last year. Fort Worth received \$1.3 million to put the city's 1983 total at \$14.8 million, up 8 percent from 1982. El Paso's check was \$798,000, with 1983 total payments down 10 percent from last year.

Bullock also sent checks to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA received \$7.8 million, down from last July's payment of \$9.4 million. San Antonio received \$1.1 million, bringing the yearly total to \$12.4 million, up 10 percent over 1982.

The City and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

The July checks were for taxes collected on sales made in May and reported to the Comptroller by the end of June.

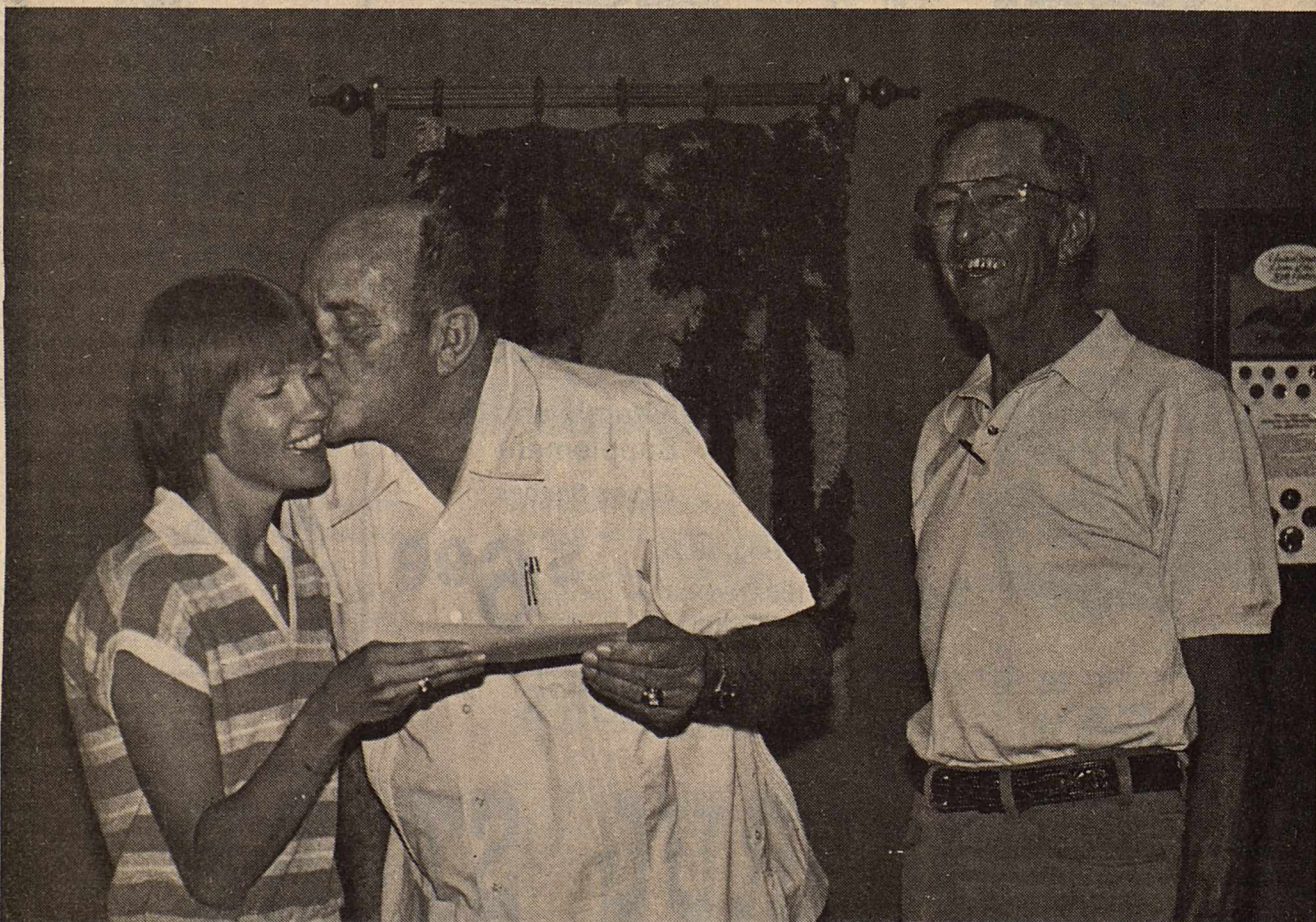

### City Of Rule To Increase Water Rates

Beginning July 10, Rule citizens will be paying more for water according to Rule Mayor L.R. Denton.

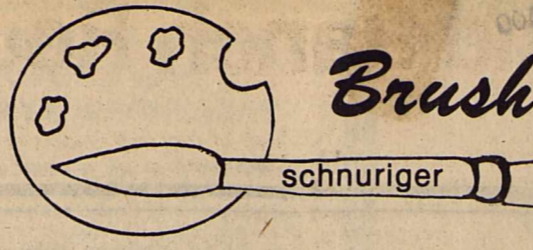

# Brush and Palette



**Q.** My shadows look like there is no substance within them. Am I making them too dark, or not grading the values correctly?

**A.** It's hard to answer your question without seeing your work. Shadows are almost always affected by the reflected light and the color that is visible of the object, which is darker in value. The additional color in the shadow may add some life to your shadows. Remember, a shadow is always darker as it leaves the object and becomes lighter as it moves away.

**Q.** Ivory Black in my backgrounds results in an uneven painting. How can I correct this?

**A.** You did not mention what black you are using. If you are making an absolute black background, without admixtures, Lamp Black or Mars Black will be a better choice because of their opacity. Ivory Black is transparent.

**Q.** What colors should I use for clear skies?

**A.** Clear days are depicted with clear, bright colors, usually greatly lightened with white. Many variations of blue make a sky more atmospheric looking. A sky should not be too blue - Texas skies are not really blue - look at them! Try Thalo Green and white to the sky area first, then blues can be added to it. The greenish hue tends to add warmth so necessary to balance the cold blue colors.

**Q.** How can I make a stormy sky?

The stormier the day, the less color is visible. The colors must be duller. To dull blues, mix Umber into the sky blues.

**Q.** What about clouds? With a blue cold sky, what color should the clouds be?

Clouds on a sunny day are warm - white and yellow. If

you observe clouds to be cold, they can be painted with white and any cool color. If these clouds are not very light, add your colors into a tone of gray. I cannot stress enough that painting successfully is more a matter of value - the tone of things - than it is of color. Color only further dramatizes the tonal effects. Have you studied color lately?

**HINT:** "Life is a measure to be filled - not a cup to be drained."

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

# More Infestations Of Pecan Webworm Being Observed

Fall webworms are not commonly a problem for most commercial and home pecan producers in Haskell County but more infestations are being observed than usual. This past winter was very mild and that is one possible reason

for the greater abundance of this pecan pest.

The female fall webworm moth lays masses of greenish-white eggs on the pecan leaves. The egg masses are covered with scales from the females body.

When the eggs hatch the larvae begin to feed on the leaves. At the same time they produce a loosely woven dirty-white web. As the larvae feed and grow they continue to construct the web and eventually the web can cover entire branches. The larvae feed for 4 to 6 weeks.

After completing their development the larvae crawl down the tree and pupate in loose cocoons in debris, under the bark or in loose soil.

There are two generations each year. The larvae of the summer-fall generation after completing their development, pass the winter in the pupal stage.

Light infestations of fall webworms can be controlled by pruning out affected branches and destroying the larvae.

Fall webworms rarely cause economic damage to managed groves. At what level fall webworms will cause economic damage has not been determined. When fall webworms are causing excessive foliage loss, trees that are infested should be spot sprayed directing the spray at the web. The insecticide must penetrate the web to be effective. Suggested chemicals for fall webworm control are listed in the L-1350 "Suggestions for Controlling Insects and Diseases in Commercial Pecans." This publication is available at your County Extension Agent's office.

# Insecticides Control Peachtree Borers

The peachtree borer can greatly limit the life of peach, apricot and plum trees in Haskell County. The larvae feed in the cambium, just under the bark at the base of the trunk. Small trees are often killed due to the damage caused by a single larva. Larger trees can survive larger numbers of larvae but the damage may reduce the productivity of the tree.

Because the larvae feed beneath the bark and at the soil line they often go unnoticed until it is too late. Large amounts of gum mixed with grass can be found at the base of trees where larvae are feeding.

Peachtree borer eggs are laid by the female moth in August or September. The life cycle is completed in one year. The eggs hatch in about 10 days and the larval stage is completed in 10 to 11 months. Larvae begin feeding after hatching and feed intermittently during the winter and early spring.

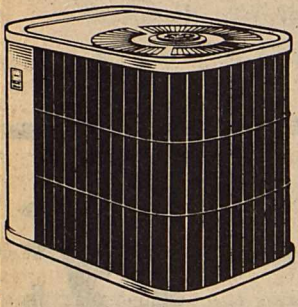
Insecticides for control of peach tree borers include chlorpyrifos (Lorsban®), endosulfan (Thiodan®) and paradichlorobenzene crystals (PDB). All three of these materials are labeled for use on peach and apricot trees but chlorpyrifos is not labeled for use on plums.

One well timed application of chlorpyrifos will control the peachtree borer. The application should be made in late August. Endosulfan should be applied twice, once in early June and again in mid-August. Chlorpyrifos should not be applied within 14 days of harvest and endosulfan within 21 days of harvest. PDB crystals should be applied between October 20 and November 15. Place a circle of the crystals on the soil around the tree, 2 inches from the bark. Do not allow the crystals to touch the tree. Cover the crystals with 6 inches of soil. Use ½ to 1 ounce of crystals based on the size of the tree.

Be sure to read and follow the directions on the label when using these three insecticides.

# Paramedic Program Exams Offered At TSTI

Pre-entrance exams for persons wishing to enroll in the TSTI-Sweetwater paramedics program are scheduled for July 27 and August 20.

According to Program Chairman C.L. Meeks, applicants to the program must be Emergency Medical Technicians, licensed to work in Texas.

The two-hour exam will be given at 7 p.m. on Thursday, July 27 and at 9 a.m. on Saturday, August 20. The exam is divided into five parts, testing general and specific medical knowledge.

The one-year paramedic program gives the student an extensive background in advanced emergency care. Students have the option of exiting the program after one quarter with certification in Special Skills or completing the full year.

Students spend over 700 hours in classroom and clinical situations, and study such topics as soft tissue injuries, extrication techniques, pharmacology and cardiology. Working closely with area hospitals, paramedic students make ambulance runs and

observe procedures in different areas of the hospital such as the emergency room, operating room and intensive care.

Cost for the exam is \$8, and all applicants must have completed the exam before being considered for the one-year program.

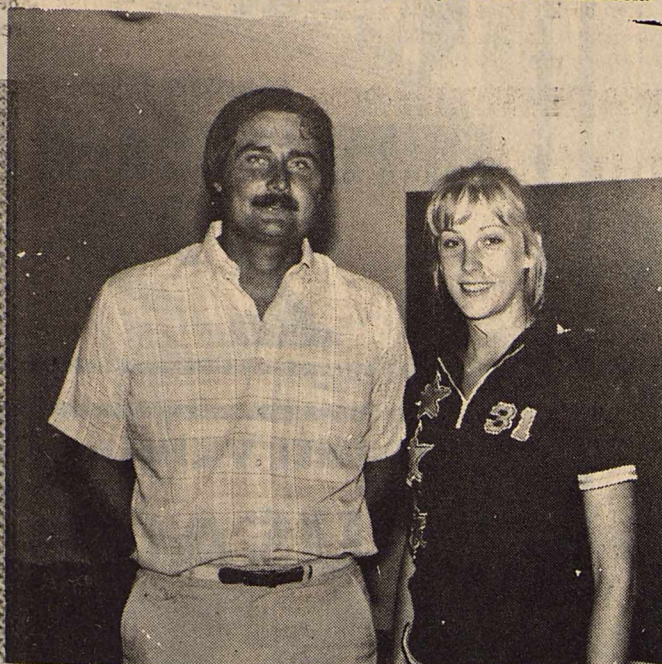

## Special Harvest For PIK Cotton Loans Offered

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will offer special "Harvest for PIK" loans to cotton farmers who do not have enough upland cotton under CCC loan to satisfy their PIK requirements, Everett Rank, executive vice president of the Commodity Credit Corporation, announced today.

Rank said a special procedure will be available for those producers who are required to harvest 1983 cotton for PIK but do not want a regular loan. Two options are available at the time the loan is made: the producer may receive the PIK cotton immediately and the proceeds from sale of cotton to CCC after the PIK availability date, or receive the proceeds immediately and the PIK cotton after the PIK availability date.

CCC will pay warehouse storage charges through the date the producer redeems his loan to satisfy his PIK requirements unless the producer elects not to pay the loan service fee.

"With this procedure," Rank said, "producers will be permitted to obtain their PIK commodities before the PIK availability date but will not receive payment for 1983-crop cotton sold to CCC to satisfy PIK requirements until the PIK availability date."

PIK availability date."

Rank said CCC also will offer to purchase cotton that has been ginned but has not been classed and is not stored in an approved warehouse. In this instance, the purchase price will be based on the 1983 loan rate for the base PIK quality for the area where PIK was earned. The cotton purchased by CCC will be used to satisfy the producers' PIK on a pound-for-pound basis.

Rank said producers should contact their local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service for further details on their loans, which will be available soon.

### MONEY (For a Growing Business)

Most people who have operated a small business have gone through periods of extreme cash shortages and have gone full-cycle searching for long-term funding.

There is no easy solution to small business funding problems. It may be of small comfort to know that all small businesses share this common problem.

Studies indicate that as much as 60% of all small business funding comes directly from the owner or his immediate family. Outside of your immediate family or friends, you may find funding from other private parties or from financial institutions.

There are some problems with outside private lenders. First off, they are few and far between. Secondly, they demand a rather high rate of interest and/or want to own a percentage of the business.

The main problem in using financial institutions for growing small businesses is that banks are not in the "risk" business. Many small businesses that require funding have no track record. Although you may be very optimistic about the company's future and have a glowing cash flow projection, the banker is not likely to rely on it for loan purposes. You may have adequate collateral in terms of inventory, real estate, etc., but if the banker feels that you will not have adequate after-tax net profits to service a loan, he is not likely to lend you money. Bankers do not want to liquidate your assets in satisfaction of their loan.

There are "money brokers" who advertise in various newspapers and business publications. Many of these brokers want to be paid in advance to locate possible lenders for you. Be very cautious of any such broker and ask for referrals and credentials. Any proposal by such brokers should be reviewed by both your attorney and accountant before you sign anything.

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## Public Notice

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective August 1, 1983, unless otherwise determined by the Commission.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission (PUC) at Austin, Texas, and with each affected municipality served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell's rate application.

As a result of the settlement of a lawsuit brought by the U.S. Department of Justice against AT&T, Southwestern Bell, on January 1, 1984, (or as otherwise ordered by the United States District Court) will no longer be a part of the Bell System, but will be owned by public shareholders. Under the terms of the settlement, Southwestern Bell has identified 15 areas in the state within which it may provide service, and the federal court with jurisdiction of the settlement has tentatively approved these areas, called LATAs (Local Access and Transport Area). On or about January 1, 1984, Southwestern Bell can not provide service between these LATAs, and in addition, must transfer to AT&T customer premises equipment that it leases to customers.

Southwestern Bell has filed a proposed revised rate schedule with the PUC reflecting these changes. These rates would become effective August 1, 1983, if they are not suspended by the PUC; however, it is expected that they will be suspended and that the rates ultimately set by the PUC will become effective on or about January 1, 1984. If the rates were to become effective as filed, they would produce a 48.2% increase in Southwestern Bell's unadjusted test year revenues (or a 76.36% increase in Southwestern Bell's test year revenues adjusted to reflect the effect of Southwestern Bell's divestiture from AT&T). Any change in the rates for any interLATA services offered by AT&T or a subsidiary after January 1, 1984, could affect customers of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

### Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies

While Southwestern Bell has proposed no increase in rates for intraLATA interexchange toll services, any change in those rates could also affect customers of other telephone companies. Southwestern Bell is proposing changes in the structure of the present private line and foreign exchange services. Changes in these rates may affect customers of other telephone companies. ## J.R. Chatwell

J.R. Chatwell, a country-western musician who had lived in San Antonio for more than 40 years, has died. He was 68.

"J.R. loved his music more than anything," said his wife, Jewell. "He practiced all the time and would get together with his many friends and rehearse two or three times a week."

Mrs. Chatwell also said that her husband "never met a stranger. He liked everyone and had many friends."

The Chatwells would have celebrated their 45th wedding anniversary today, she said.

Chatwell played the violin with many legendary Texas bands until he suffered a stroke in 1968. But that didn't stop him--in the 70's he took up the piano and continued to perform and even record the master tapes for an upcoming

record album, which is hoped to be released posthumously.

Chatwell got his start in the 1930's when he joined Cliff Bruner's band in Beaumont. He played violin for the group and made records until 1942 when he moved over to Adolph Hofner's band in San Antonio. Between engagements he would "jam" with Walter Kleypas' Lone Star Band, which was very popular in the 1950's.

In addition to recording many records, Chatwell performed on local radio programs during his hey-day. And in 1979 he appeared with the Swing Pioneers on the "Austin City Limits" television show.

Chatwell recorded six original tunes at long-time friend Willie Nelson's studio in September 1982. His family hopes that the songs, recorded along with several other San Antonio musicians, will be made into an album by Columbia Records. The album is tentatively titled "Jammin' With J.R.-O", a name Chatwell picked up from his friends who loved his jazz-swinging style of country music.

Services for Chatwell were in Sunset Funeral Home.

Survivors include his wife, Jewell of San Antonio; a son, James; a daughter Joyce Ann Dikes; a brother, Tom, and 2 grandchildren, all of San Antonio, and three sisters; Louise DeJarnette of San Antonio, Lucy Williams of Rule and Mary Hagle of Stamford.

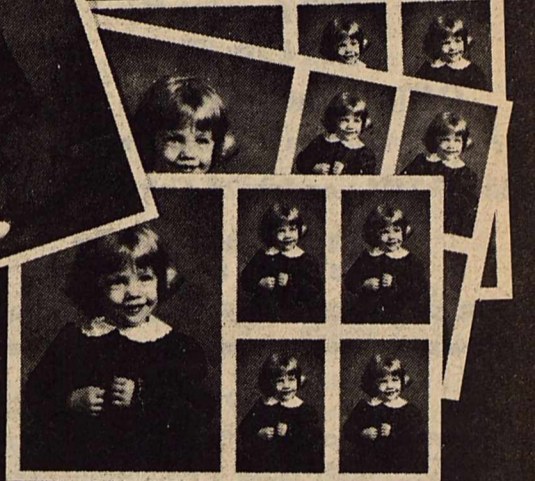

### Family Relationships Are Puzzling For Children

Have you ever noticed how puzzled young children can be when it comes to family relationships? They hear Dad

referred to as John, Father, brother, uncle, son, husband. A preschool boy who was asked about the other children in the family named "Sally," "Betty," and "Marla." "They're sisters," he explained. The teacher asked, "If they're sisters, what are you?" After a minute he replied, "I'm a boy sister."

### Mysterious disease killing newborn foals

**COLLEGE STATION** — A puzzling new disease is killing newborn foals nationwide and veterinary diagnosticians here are hoping to find clues before the current foaling season ends.

The mysterious disorder attacks the liver and produces symptoms similar to hepatitis, explained Dr. Robert Fiske of the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory, a part of the Texas A&M University System.

The foals appear normal at birth, but a few days later exhibit jaundice in the eyes and lips, staggering movements and may seem to be blind. Within nine days after birth, they all die despite treatment, said Fiske, a pathologist.

Cause of the malady — called neonatal foal hepatitis syndrome — is unknown, he said.

"There is a critical need to learn more about this potentially devastating disease," he said. "We are soliciting help from the veterinarian in the field when this disease is suspected."
