
The Piper's defense stopped the Indians twice on 4th down from inside the 10-yard line.

# Superintendent's **Views**

BY JAMES LANIER Superintendent, Haskell ISD

According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, nearly 1.8 million children disappear every year. While the majority are runaways, over 100,000 are never found. More tragically, an average of 2,500 children are buried each year without being identified.

On October 12, 1982, President Reagan signed into law the Missing Children Act which inspired many organizations to initiate fingerprinting programs. Fingerprints remain the same all through life. It is the surest means of identification known to man. It is an efficient tool of identification no matter how much time elapses between the child being reported missing and the possibility of the child being found.

Haskell ISD is planning a fingerprinting program in our continuing efforts to serve the parents and community. The basic purpose of the program will be to protect youngsters. Parents or guardians will receive a letter asking them if they desire the program. The school will not keep a copy of the prints nor will any law enforcement agency. The form upon which the fingerprints are placed will be returned to the family. The school's only role in this project will be to serve as the clearinghouse for

We, as parents, certainly hope and pray we will never have use for the fingerprints for identification. However, we cannot hide our heads in the sand and say it cannot happen with the bleak facts staring us in the face. As a parent, I know I would like to have some method of quick identification if one of my children were missing.

Through the laws mentioned above, the F.B.I. has established a method by which they can take these prints from parents and put them out nationally so that the chances of recovery are much greater.

The school board in their last meeting approved planning such a program for the parents who desire such protection. An important fact to remember is that there will be no encroachment on your right to privacy and you as parents will have the only copy of prints. Parents will be notified after we have finished the planning of this project.

Johnny Wheatley, directors from the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District will be in McAllen, October 24-26, 1983 to attend the Forty-third Annual State Meeting of Texas Soil and Water Conservation District Directors. The meeting will be held in the McAllen Civic

Center. Others attending from the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District are Kim Crawford, bookkeeper, and Jim Hudson, District Conservationist.

The purpose of the meeting is to review developments affecting Texas conservation programs. An array of top agricultural leaders and legislative and congressional officials will highlight the meeting. Speakers will include State Senators Grant Jones of Abilene, Bill Sarpalius of Canyon, U.S. Congressman

dent, Federal Land Bank of Texas, Austin and Billy Griffin, state conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Temple.

Approximately 1,000 SWCD directors including other conservation leaders are expected to attend the meeting.

Speaking during the Tuesday morning general session will be Senator Jones, Congressman Stenholm and Federal Land Bank president, Benson.

Senator Jones is currently Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and is a member of the Education Development Committee. He is also a member of the State Audit Committee and Legislative Budget Board.

Senator Jones represents Texas as a member of the Natural Resources and Environmental Quality Committee of the Southern Legislative

Conference.

Congressman Stenholm, whose career includes that of a former vocational agricultural teacher, executive vice president of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers Association, general manager of the Stamford Electric Cooperative and president of Double S Farms, Inc. is vitally active in Congressional agricultural

He serves on the U.S. House of Representatives Agriculture Committee and Subcommittees on Cotton, Rice, and Sugar; Livestock, Dairy and Poultry; Tobacco and Peanuts; and Conservation, Credit and Rural Development.

"Future Changes in Agricultural Financing" will be the topic of Benson's address. Benson, who was named president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas in 1979, previously served as a regionmanager, Secretary and
