

Candy Bar Cookies

Cream: 3/4 c. butter, 3/4 c. powdered sugar, 2 T. Pet milk, 1 t. vanilla, ¹/₄ t. salt, blend in 2 c. flour, Mix throughly. If necessary, chill for easier handling. Roll out half of dough at a time, cut into 3x11/2 inch rectangle, yeast. place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake at 325 for 12 to 16 min., until lightly browned. Cut with a pastry wheel so they will be pretty. Spread 1 t. of filling on each, top with $\frac{1}{2}$ t. of icing. Decorate with a pecan half.

The Texas Farm Bureau's Resolution Committee, comprised of forty-one farmers and ranchers, will meet in Waco Nov. 7-9 to prepare a set of policy recommendations from the 1,500 resolutions received from county Farm Bureaus. Those final resolutions will be presented to the voting delegates attending TFB's 50th annual meeting Nov. 27-30 in Houston.

Resolutions on state matters approved by voting farmers and ranchers in Houston will become state policy for the state farm organization in 1984. Adopted resolutions pertaining to national policy will be forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation convention Jan. 8-12, 1984, in Orlando, Fla. The TFB Resolutions Com-

mittee is composed of three leaders from each of the 13 Texas Farm Bureau districts across the state, the chairman of the TFB Young Farmer and Rancher Advisory Committee and the vice president of the state organization, who serves as the chairman.

The 216 county Farm Bureaus in Texas approved policy resolutions during their annual meetings in September and October. Issues covered included farm program provisions, the federal budget, inflation, interest rates, farm chemicals, state and federal regulations, and others.

The Committee's job will be to study the resolutions submitted by county Farm Bureaus and compile a comprehensive set of tentative resolutions to be voted upon by the more than 1,200





8th, is election day. There are eleven amendments to go before the voters. Two of these proposed amendments will effect schools. One amendment is to exempt charitable service and fraternal organizations from paying property taxes. Some of these organizations own buildings and even land and other revenue producing entities. "Texas taxpayers have a lot to gain and nothing to lose in voting for Proposition 5, the school bond amendment, in the November 8th constitutional amendments election. The amendment could

> It comes as a surprise to many people that the awesome resources the state of Texas dedicates to education are not taken into account by a national bond market when setting local school district ratings and interest bond rates. Local bonds are judged solely by the local district's situation

Proposition 5 would cure that by permitting qualified local school bond issues to be backed by the state's \$3 billion Permanent School Fund. The result would be better bond ratings and lower interest rates for our local districts.


The state's Permanent Fund would simply be lending its good name; it would not be paying off the bonds. Texas schools have a fine bond record. In the unlikely event of a default, the state would simply pick up the payments withholding the local by districts state allotment.

In local terms based on a small amount of research that I have done, the passage of this amendment would mean about a \$15 thousand on a \$500,000 bond issue for



Budgets Don't Have To Be Painful

Many people think living on a budget is like going on a starvation diet.

But a budget is simply a financial plan that enables families to achieve financial security and reach their goals, says home economist Nancy Granovsky. "Actually, a budget is more like a road map for charting where you want to go than a spending diet," she adds.

According to Granovsky, a specialist in family resource management for the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service, families can develop a livable, nonconstricting budget by following these steps: First, examine past spend-

ing patterns for at least two to six months. Use old receipts, check-stubs or other records to show where the money has gone and how much has come in during the same period. Or. keep close records for two to three months.

Then determine what percentage of spendable income has gone for major categories such as housing, utilities, transportation, non-mortgage credit payments, health care, food and clothing. If more than 25 percent goes for 'miscellaneous'', you will need to keep better records for a while in order to track your spending, says the specialist. Now you are ready to project ahead, using your past
