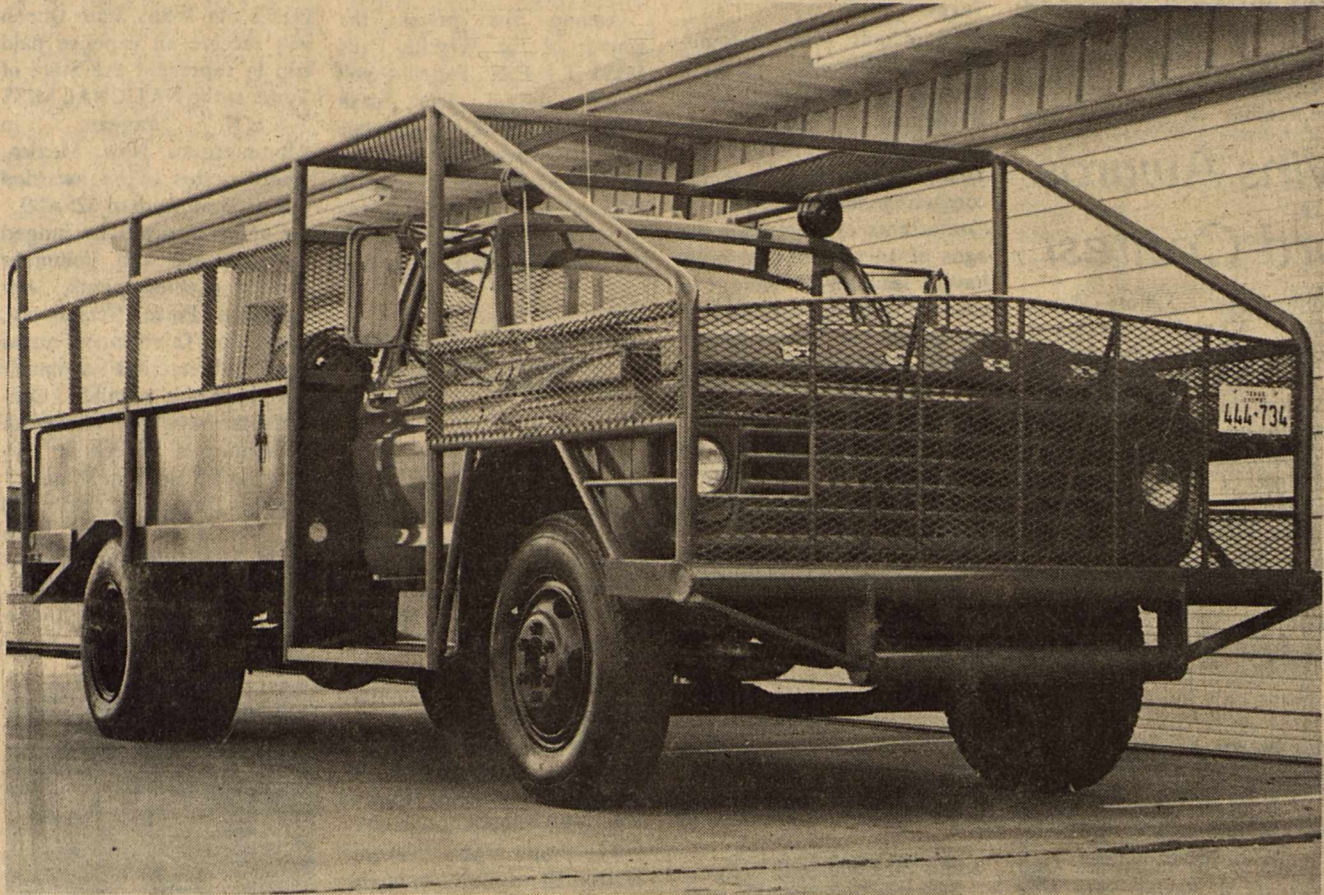

## NEW RURAL FIRE TRUCK

Members of the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department recently completed construction on a new rural fire truck. The Ford chassis carries a 1,000 gallon water tank and an auxiliary high pressure pump. The department has received \$1,802.42 in donations toward the purchase of the \$15,045.30 truck. Members estimate that the truck would cost in excess of \$40,000.00 if members had not done all work on the truck. Rural residents and landowners are invited to make donations to help pay for the truck at the fire station or any member of the department.

## Sam Newcomb Withdraws From State Rep. Race

State Representative candidate Sam Newcomb of Breckenridge Tuesday announced his withdrawal from the 64th Legislative District race.

A news release from Newcomb Headquarters Wednesday stated:

It is with deep regret that due to a previously unknown health problem, I must withdraw my candidacy from the 64th District State Representative race. I want to thank each and everyone of you who have worked so hard on my behalf and supported my campaign financially.

An official in the Secretary of State office in Austin told the *Free Press* Wednesday that Newcomb's name would still be on the May 5 Primary ballot because of the late time of withdrawal.

Newcomb was not available for comment Tuesday following the announcement from Jim Cox, his campaign treasurer.

Newcomb's withdrawal from the race leaves two candidates in the race for the seat being vacated by retiring Representative Joe Hanna of Breckenridge.

The candidates are Rick Perry, 35, a Haskell County farmer and

rancher and Dr. Kenneth Neighbors, a retired history professor of Olney.

The 64th District includes eight counties: Callahan, Haskell, Hood,

Palo Pinto, Shackelford, Stephens, Throckmorton and Young. Total population of the district is about 110,000 and there are a total of over 58,000 registered voters.

## Kiwanis Club Political Rally Set April 28 At Corral Bldg.

Members of the Haskell Kiwanis Club will sponsor a giant political rally at 5:30 p.m. at the Haskell Corral Building.

All candidates on the May 5 Democratic Primary ballot have been invited to attend and will be granted time to speak.

The event will be held outside if weather permits and inside the Corral Building otherwise.

Members of the Kiwanis Club will

also have food and drinks for sale at the event and invite everyone to plan to attend, enjoy supper and visit and hear the candidates.

Candidates will be allowed to speak for three to five minutes and are asked to arrive early to draw for speaking positions.

District Judge Joe Williams, a member of the local Kiwanis Club, will serve as master of ceremonies.

## Crop And Livestock Reports Due Back By Mid May

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in mid-May for 1984 crop information and mid-year livestock inventories.

State Statistician Dennis Findley emphasizes that information from these surveys is very important to the entire agricultural industry. "A good response on these surveys is essential so accurate figures will be available for each county and state."

Results of the confidential interviews, conducted by mail or in person by field enumerators, will be

published late in June. "These estimates will help farmers and ranchers adjust their operations and plan their future marketings," Findley added.

To reduce survey costs, Findley is urging farmers and ranchers to return the mailed questionnaires as soon as possible. The reported information will be combined for state and county estimates.

Annual county estimates are published for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, field crops, small grains, fruits and pecans, vegetables and cash receipts from the sale of farm products.

## Area Sales Tax Receipts Mixed For This Period

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent checks totaling \$46.3 million in local sales tax payments to the 985 cities that levy the one-percent city sales tax.

"These receipts are up more than 16 percent over last year," Bullock said. "This is just exactly where I estimated they would be when I gave the Legislature its estimate of revenues last year. Texas is in the thick of the national economic recovery. Let's just hope we stay there."

Houston received the biggest check—for \$8.6 million—which brings the city's 1984 total to \$45.8 million, up 9 percent over what Houston had received by this time last year.

Dallas received \$5.6 million, boosting 1984 payments to more than 19 percent over 1983.

San Antonio got \$2.7 million, bringing that city's 1984 total payments to date to \$14.9 million.

Austin's \$2.2 million check boosted the city's year-to-date total more than 28 percent ahead of last

year. Fort Worth received \$1.7 million, compared with \$1.2 million for the same period last year. El Paso got \$1 million, with 1984's year-to-date total now better than 22 percent ahead of 1983.

Bullock also sent checks to the state's three Metropolitan Transit

Proceeds will be used for Auxiliary projects to benefit the Haskell Volunteer Fire Dept.

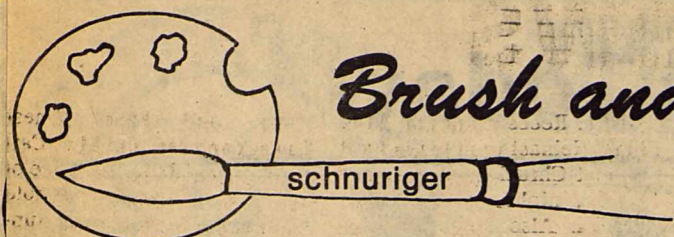

## Brush and Palette

It was very early on the morning of the first Easter day. A voice spoke out of the hush but one word: "Mary." That was enough. She fell at his feet, crying, "My Master." That voice speaks to us today, this Eastertide. With those who are grief-stricken, with those whose hopes have faded, with those whose courage has gone, we shall, with Mary, fall at the feet of our risen Lord and proclaim Him "King of Kings and Lord of Lords".

We are being prepared for the burst of Spring with the tulips and Iris bursting forth with all their elegant beauty. The vivid reds of the tulips — some are crimson, some are scarlet and some are Cad Red light. Some have white centers

and some have Cad Yellow centers dotted with black. Only God can create the beauty that we enjoy at this time of year after the severe winter we had. It is such a joy to see some bright colors — every color in the spectrum, blending with some of the yet-to-come greens.

I wish for each of you a joyous Easter Season.

Q. I've been using felt-tip pens for sketching but they seem to be drying out so fast, do you have any suggestions for their care?

A. The tips are made of felt or nylon and are reservoirs for free-flowing inks that dry instantly. Because of this quality, I have stored them in a tightly covered jar, which

seems to prolong the life of the ink. There is an industrial product that has refillable carbon ink and a choice of replaceable tips. Another suggestion is to place a damp sponge in to the jar when storing.

Q. Should a hung painting be lighted in the same direction that the lighting is portrayed in the picture?

A. Yes, for true light effect. It is always a good idea to place a picture light over any picture, or sometimes below the picture, to give exciting light effect.

Q. I have a terrible time removing the tops from my tube paints. Could you give me some suggestions?

A. Yes, San Antonio friend, use a match, then the pliers. I have used hot running water on acrylics to open them. If you will remember to dip the end of the acrylic tube in water before replacing the cap, it will open easier the next time.

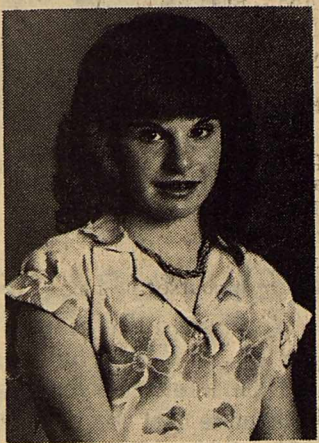

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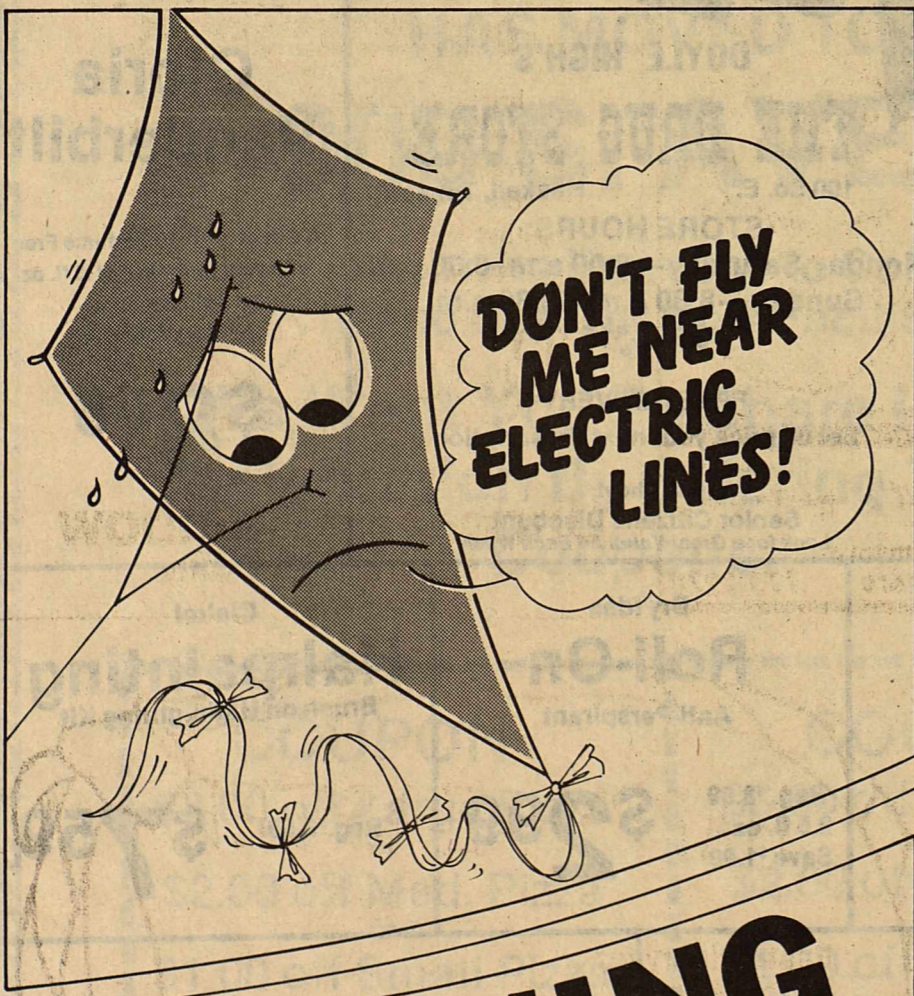

# More Tips On Weatherstripping

Second in a series

Weatherstripping material is used to seal air leaks around windows, doors, and all movable joints in a home. It is available in felt, foam rubber, flexible vinyl, and metal strips and can be purchased by the running foot (meter) or in packages that contain enough material and tacks to weatherstrip an average size, double-hung window or a door. Install weatherstripping: - Around loose-fitting window sash and casings; - Around loose-fitting entrance doors; - Around doors or any openings between heated and unheated spaces. Don't overlook the opening to your attic! For more information about weatherstripping and caulking contact the County Extension office, 101 South Ave. D in Haskell, phone no. 817-864-2546.

Additional Ways to Reduce Air Infiltration  
Energy-wise homeowners can reduce air infiltration even further by sealing or closing "heat wasters."

- Repair loose door latches

and tape unused keyholes. - Keep exterior doors tightly closed, as well as doors leading to the attic, basement, and attached garage.

- Close off infrequently used entrances and consider adding vestibules at those commonly used.

- When a fireplace is not in use, close the damper securely.

- Cap unused flues or chimneys.

- Close off unused rooms, especially those on northern or windy sides of a dwelling, and reduce the temperature in these areas.

- Keep the overhead doors of an attached garage closed.

- If zone heating is used, close doors between areas with different thermostat settings or install doors if there are none.

- If you sleep with a window open during the winter months, weatherstrip and close the bedroom door so that heat from the rest of the home will not be lost.

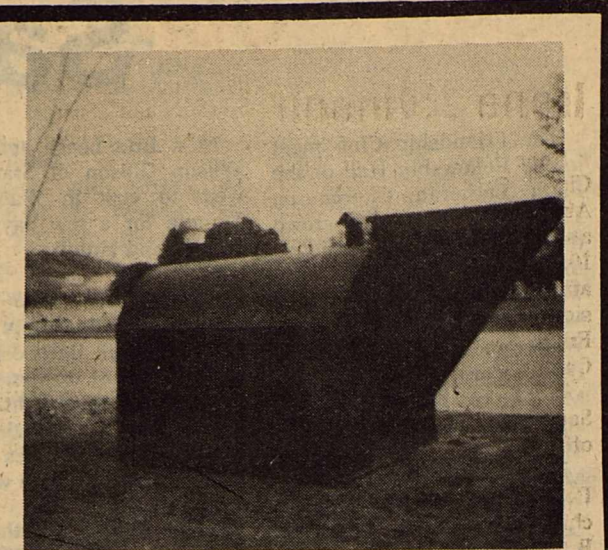

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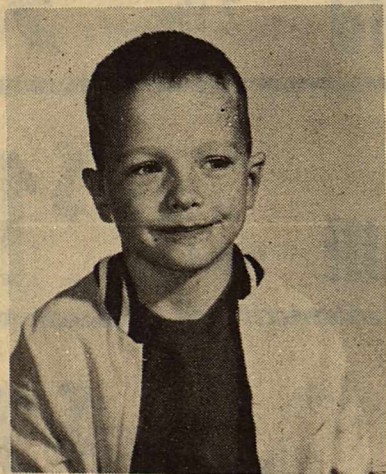

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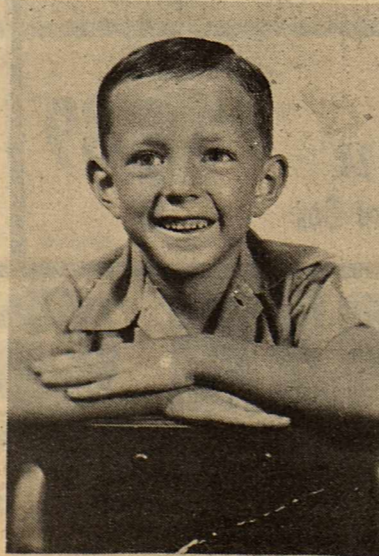

## Caring For Elderly Could Be The Next Big Family Issue

Caring for elderly parents and other relatives may be the next big family issue to confront our society, says aging specialist Dr. Judith Warren.

While needed attention is being focused on caring for the elderly, more attention must be directed toward those who are doing the caregiving, says Warren, a home economist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

The elderly most affected by illness — those 75 and over — have grown by nearly 40% in the last ten years, she says. Victims of heart attacks, strokes and broken bones now survive and live for many years, although sometimes in an impaired condition. In addition, nearly 40% of those 65 and over suffer from some chronic physical or mental disability.

Many of these impaired older adults rely on a family support system to assist in daily activities ranging from personal care to grocery shopping and chauffeuring. Family members provide about 80% of the care the elderly receive, explains Warren.

Family caregivers are usually middle-aged women, who may still have teenage children at home, or "young-old" women about ready to retire, says the specialist.

Research shows that these caregivers face many tasks

which can be both stressful and difficult. They include:

- \* compensating for the emotional drain from constant responsibility.
- \* avoiding a severe drain on physical health and strength.
- \* balancing the giving of assistance with responsibilities to other family members.
- \* managing feelings toward other family members who do not regularly help.
- \* dealing with medical, health and social service professionals.
- \* performing basic activities of daily living for the elderly parent or relative.

Some researchers suggest that one way to provide care for the elderly is to provide services for the woman in the middle, says Warren.

For all family caregivers, both homemakers and those employed outside the home, satisfactory services can make it possible to keep a loved one at home longer than would be possible without help, she maintains.

Adult day care and adult sitters provide one type of support for caregivers, notes Warren.

Over 800 family members and those seeking employment as adult caregivers have taken part in Extension education programs about home care for the elderly. But many more private and community programs will be needed to keep up with our aging population, she adds.

## Stenholm Introduces Legislation To Standardize Farm Programs

Congressional hearings have been scheduled on a bill by Congressman Charles W. Stenholm (D-Stamford) that simplifies and standardizes farm programs.

The House Agricultural Committee will consider the bill at a hearing in Washington May 2, while a subcommittee will examine the proposed legislation May 7 in Oklahoma City, Stenholm said.

The legislation will simplify and standardize the way acreage bases and yields are assigned to producers. Stenholm said the bill would make federal farm programs simpler, more predictable and fairer.

"Right now, our system of bases and yields isn't all it could be," he said. "It's not fair to many farmers, it's unpredictable for the rest, and it leaves too much discretion

to the USDA's bureaucratic whims. It needs to be changed and put into permanent law."

An acreage base, or number of acres to be planted, is assigned to farmers who wish to take part in federal farm programs, Stenholm said.

A yield measures how many bushels or pounds per acre the farmer is assumed to produce. Both bases and yields are important when farmers decide whether to participate in the programs.

Stenholm's proposal assigns bases for both overall farm acreage and individual crops. It ties yields to actual records and gives farmers more flexibility than they now have in deciding for themselves how much of a given crop they will plant. The bill, called the Agricultural Efficiency and Equity Act, applies to wheat, feed grains, cotton,

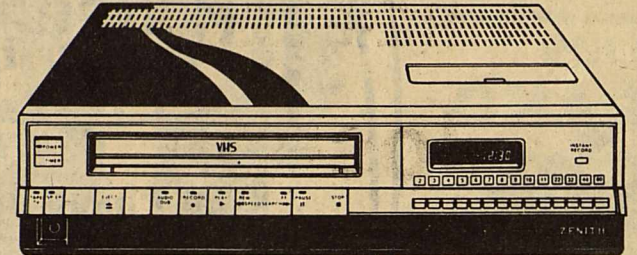
and rice.

"I want to commend both Chairman Kika de la Garza (D-Texas) and Subcommittee Chairman Tom Foley (D-Wash.) for scheduling hearings on this bill," Stenholm said. "I believe it's an important first step on the road to a workable 1985 Farm Bill."

Farmers and others who are interested in testifying at either of the hearings should call Chris Abram at 202-225-2171 or Congressman Glenn English's (D-Ola.) district office at 405-231-5511.

Stenholm said he will also participate in farm policy forums in Amarillo and Vernon, Texas, April 23 and 24. The forums have been organized by Congressman Jack Hightower (D-Texas) to gather local input for the 1985 farm legislation.

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


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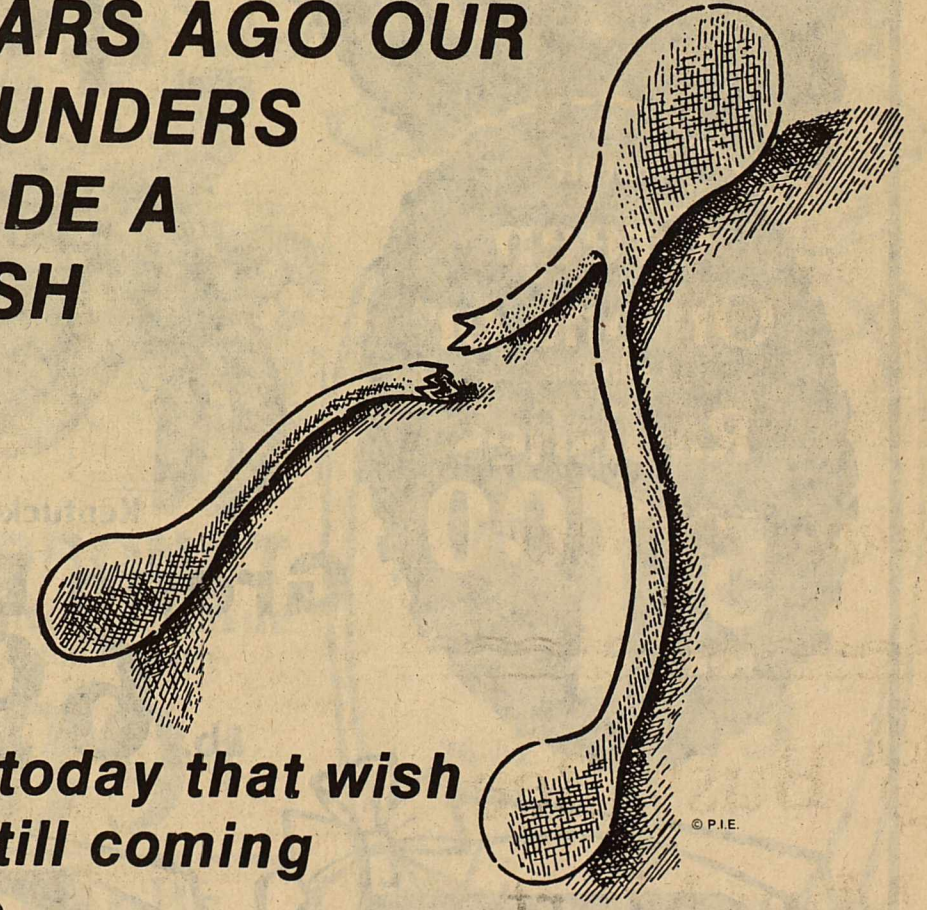
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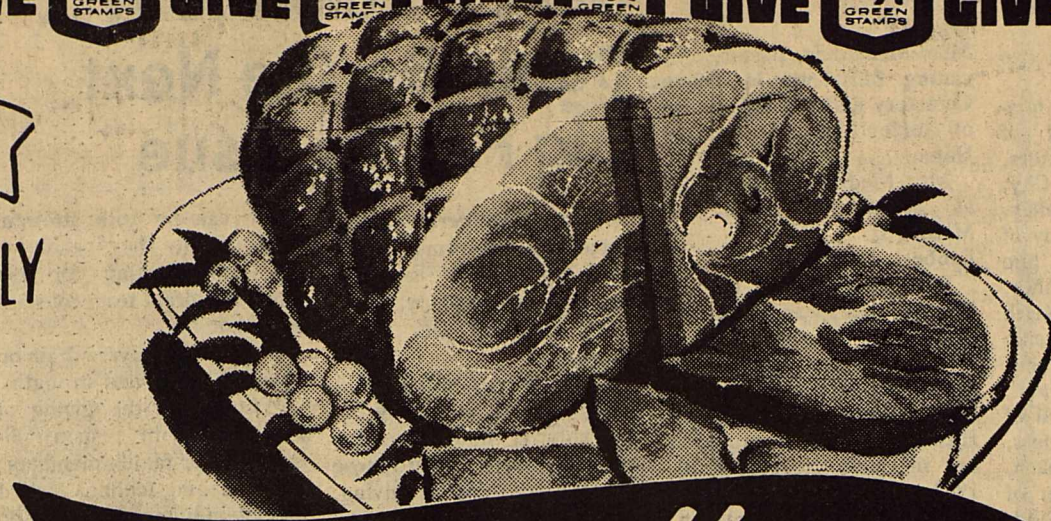

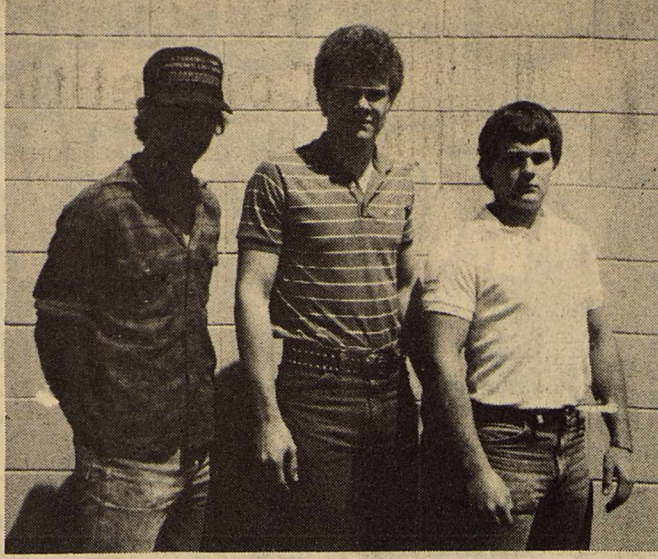

## Superintendent's Views

HB 246 has now become Chapter 75 of the Texas Education Code and the official regulations concerning curriculum in Texas. The State Board of Education during the third and final reading on March 10 adopted the code, changed the implementation plan one more time. There were other minor changes during the reading. The next step is the implementation of this drastic new curriculum on the local level.

The administration and board of education are responsible for this implementation. During the past three years, as much work as possible has been done. We changed the passing grade to 70, did away with exemptions with the exception of passing seniors during their final semester, and made athletic schedules for this coming year in such a manner as to not miss any academics. We have been staffing with Chapter 75 in mind the past few years. We adopted an absence policy last summer which will cover the demands of Chapter 75 with a few minor changes. We changed our required units for graduation to 23. We adopted a promotion policy which will satisfy with a few revisions. However, the final adoption created a need for several other policies to be adopted by the board this summer. We must develop a policy concerning mastery of the essential elements. A method of documentation of this mastery must be developed. Adoption of new transcripts will be required. The administration must create new schedules which will cover this program both in courses offered and time lines.

The legislature is probably going into special session concerning education which will delay the budgeting process. We still have not found a band director and we have the heating and cooling renovation in the primary wings. You can readily see what will happen to our summer. The old adage that

schools lock their doors in May and not reopen until September is no longer true. In fact, it has not been true for many years. However, this summer looks particularly grinding.

In regards to Chapter 75, I honestly feel that it can have an excellent effect on our school program. It calls for the public demanded return to the "basics". It speaks to the need of better organization of curriculum in both a scope and sequence manner. It standardizes basic courses throughout Texas. We must adopt a positive attitude concerning these changes so that our students will benefit. I will be writing other columns concerning the impact of this new set of regulations dealing with the specifics in the future.

#### PARTNERSHIPS—WATCH OUT

Joint ownership of business ventures can cause many problems. It makes little difference whether the business is large or small.

If you met someone on Friday night and got married the following Monday, you would probably be considered hasty and unwise. Yet in business it happens all the time. We have no cultural requirement for a business courtship. The shortcomings to hasty business marriages are endless.

Don't form a partnership unless you have a good reason to do so. If you don't need the technical expertise or financial backing of another individual, don't take him on as a partner.

All joint ventures, whether they be partnerships or closely held corporations, are going to terminate. It's possible, but rare, that they terminate because one of the partners dies of old age. More commonly, the termination is due to business failure, disability of one of the partners, disagreement of the partners or disagreement of the spouses.

What happens to your joint venture assets if you become totally disabled? What if your partner dies? Will his spouse become your partner? What happens if one partner simply wants out? What if all this happens just months or weeks after the joint venture is formed? What if it happens after the business is worth mega-bucks?

Engage the services of an accountant and an attorney to help draft a complete partnership agreement. Entering a partnership is not the time to try to save money on professional fees. All of the unpleasant contingencies should be covered in the partnership agreement so that the inevitable termination is provided for. This partnership agreement will not substitute for a courtship, but it will help eliminate some of the problems inherent in joint ventures.

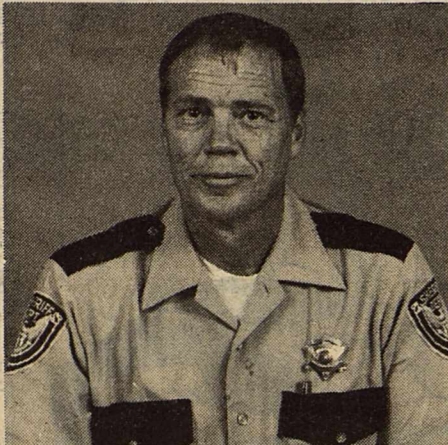

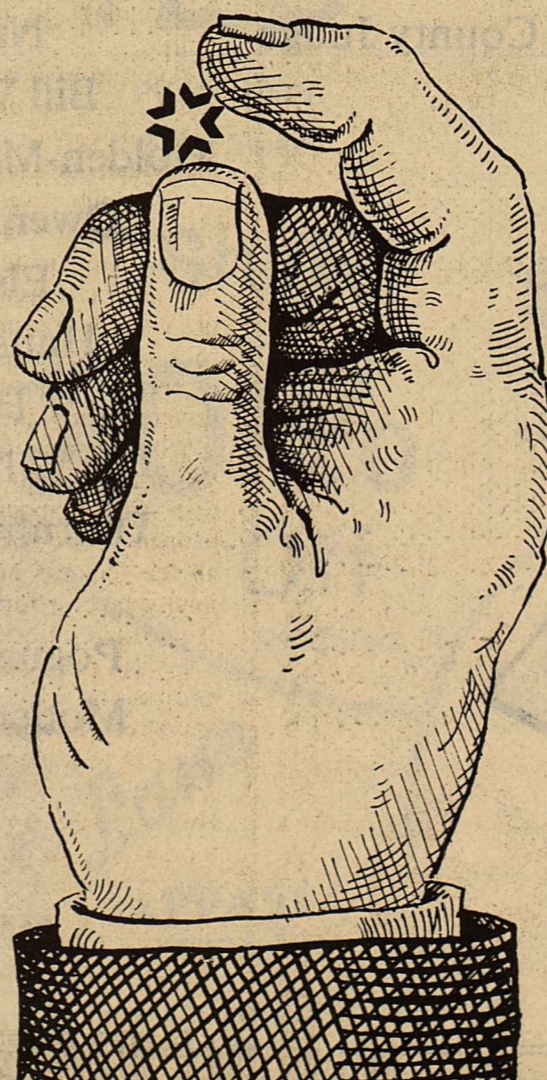

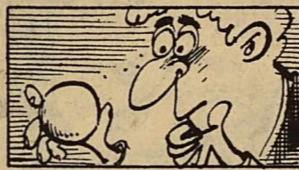
## Work And Earn Allowed Under SSI

The Supplemental Security Income program contains provisions which allows recipients to work and earn wages. Further provisions permit the spouses and parents of children under age 18 to work. There are incentives for this in the form of income exclusions. However, for these exclusions to apply, the Social Security Administration must know about the work and the amount of earnings. The recipient is responsible for reporting the amount of gross wages earned, the periods of work, and any changes in the amount of earnings.

The importance of reporting work activity timely cannot be overemphasized. Since the Supplemental Security Income payment is computed using all countable income, an overpayment can occur very quickly. Also if the report is not made timely, a penalty of \$25, \$50, or \$100 can be assessed. It should be clear that failure to report work and wages can result in a large overpayment that must be refunded. This can be avoided by timely reports of work by a recipient, recipient's spouse, or the parents of children who receive supplemental security income payments. For a report to be considered timely, it should be made within 10 days after the close of the month in which it occurred.

The Dyess Air Force Base Hospital is sponsoring its semi-annual Health Week May 1-4.

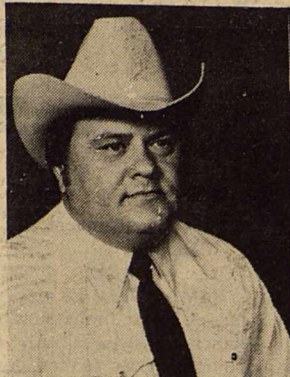

# Farm Bill Hearings Set

Congressman Jack Hightower announced today that two days of hearings will be held in the 13th Congressional District to give the public an opportunity to comment on the development of the 1985 Farm Bill now being planned by congressional committees.

Hightower, who will chair the hearings, has scheduled them for Monday, April 23, at 2:00 p.m. in Amarillo, and Tuesday, April 24, at 10:00 a.m. in Vernon. Both meetings will be held at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center in those communities.

Farmers, ranchers, agribusiness, and all other interested representatives of farm concerns are invited to attend and testify, as is the general public.

"I want to give food producers and others in our part of Texas a chance to tell Washington exactly what they believe should be done to make our farm programs work better," Hightower said. "I will be taking the actual transcripts of everyone's testimony back to the full House Agriculture Committee, and it will become part of the record for the committee members to review as they develop the 1985 Farm Bill.

"It's very difficult if not impossible for most people to take time to go to Washington, so I thought we should try another approach," Hightower said. "It's essential that we start early this year to establish more effective, long-term solutions to the problems we now face in our farm communities, as well as future problems that we can see down the road. It's also essential that the policy makers in Washington hear directly from the people who know the most about the problem." Hightower said.

Individuals interested in testifying should provide a written copy of their testimony if possible. An official stenographer will also record all testimony for eventual presentation to the House Agriculture committee by Hightower. Those wishing to testify should contact the nearest Hightower district office in Amarillo, Vernon, or Wichita Falls. The number of people wishing to speak will be limited by the time available. Comments should be limited to no longer than ten minutes per person as much as possible.

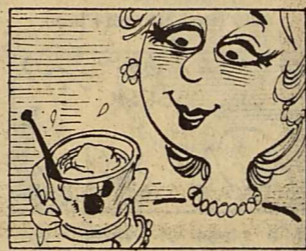

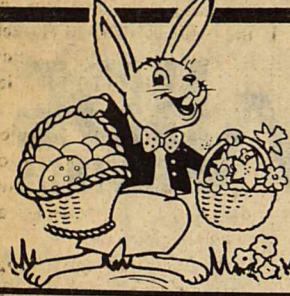
