City Council Members Finalize Creek Plans

Members of the Haskell City Council discussed final details of the Rice Springs Creek project during their regular meeting Tuesday night.

Work on the project should begin in the very near future according to City officials. The work will start on the south end of the creek and will begin as soon as a few remaining property easements are obtained. The easements are necessary for the project and property owners who have not completed easements are urged to do so as soon as possible.

The project will involve cleaning and shaping the creek with special emphasis on bridges and bottlenecks which are currently retarding the flow of water through town. Much of the project will be funded with a \$500,000.00 grant which was recently approved.

In other action Tuesday night, Council members agreed to a small increase in water rates. The increase became necessary following an increase in the cost of water to the city from North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority. The increase to the city started last October in the amount of ten cents

per thousand gallons of water. The City increase will not affect the base cost of water and all minimums will remain the same. The increase of twenty cents per thousand will apply only to water used above the minimum. Council members agreed to the increase on water above the minimum in an effort to hold costs down for low volume users which are predominately elderly people living

on fixed incomes. Council members also agreed to accept a five year lease on a motor grader from Godsey Equipment Co. of Abilene. Godsey's low bid in the amount of \$64,380.00 was accepted as a five year lease.

Members of the Council also agreed to support a disaster plan presented by Tom Watson, City-County Disaster Coordinator, and provide office space for Watson.

Council members changed the fiscal year of the City to run from October 1 to September 30. They also approved an increase in the hotel/motel room occupancy tax from 3% to 7%. The tax is collected from customers of local motels and

is used to promote tourism in the City.

Members of the Council also discussed a paving project on Av. J East and held a public hearing on a paving project on Northeast Third.

Queen Contest Slated For Rodeo

That's whut it wuz!

We've had weak, spineless, spiritless sand-laden winds here in the past several months that some of our more timid folks called sandstorms.

But Tuesday was the real McCoy—it moved real estate, signs, mobile homes, obscured the sun, grated the nerves, and sent newcomers looking for the exits.

It was the kind that made Red River wetbacks long for Okie skies, Arkansaw'ers pine for the hot springs, and Louisiana webfeet'ers look for a four wheeler that could carry them back to the swamp and frogs.

A lot of scientists and historians have tried to figure out what happened to the dinosaurs on this earth several hundred million years ago. Dozens of theories have been propounded as the the cause of their sudden extinction: a meterorite hitting earth, another ice age, a fastmoving virus, a drastic change in climate:

No one really knows. A few people know what happened to the prairie dog of the plains.

At one time, prairie dogs were as plentiful on the plains as buffalo and lasted a lot longer. Colonel Rufus Shafter, in his exploration out of Fort Concho at San Angelo into this area, reported in his journal of hundreds and hundreds of prairie dog villages.

And chroniclers of this area of Texas have reported that at one time, a prairie dog town extended from a few miles south of Seminole all the way to ten miles north of Levelland—and the town was estimated to contain over two million prairie dogs.

Trail drives of sheep and steers avoided the area because of the crippling prairie dog holes.

Prairie dogs were here on year—and gone the next. But the mystery is not as unsolvable as that of the dinosaurs. Sandstorms done in the prairie dogs.

Prairie dogs in this area fell victim to a sandstorm like the one that blew thru here Tuesday...only worse.

We remember Uncle Andy

would whistle across the South Plains so dark, so laden with sand, that the little varmints had difficulty breathing.

And in the real mean sandstorms, the winds whipped sand and dust at groundlevel into whirlpools of solid sand, causing the natural survival instincts of the 'dogs to force them to start digging—upwards.

The sandstorms were so bad and so thick with sand that prairie dogs became used to digging upwards from their holes. Uncle Andy described many a horseback ride through a sandstorm where he swatted prairie dogs out of the air with his Stetson—like swatting flies with a flyswatter.

Uncle Andy claimed the prairie dogs got so used to climbing up through the sandstorms that it was nothing for pilots flying over the area to report seeing prairie dogs at 3,000 feet—and climbing.

It was Uncle Andy's pet theory that the climbing antics developed by the prairie dogs in efforts to get above the sandstorms that was responsible for doing them in.

As suddenly as the weather changes in West Texas, Uncle Andy believed that the prairie dogs got caught in a particular mean sandstorm in March of 1938 when the sun disappeared for three days, chickens never left the roost, cows didn't give milk but once a day, and windmills pumped mud.

The wind stopped as suddenly as it started—and caught the prairie dogs at seven thousand feet—and climbing. The varmints fell, like the arrow, to earth.

Uncle Andy swears it rained prairie dogs from heaven like hailstones shot from a cannon for two solid hours...said his milk cow came into the barn with two and three dogs speared on each horn...and the rumble seat of a Model A Ford caught 83 prairie dogs in less than 12 minutes.

Uncle Andy didn't know what happened to the dinosaurs—but he knew about prairie dogs.

And we haven't had any sandstorms like he mentioned—until Tuesday.

TREATMENTS Windows are your biggest heat losers; they lose almost five times as much heat as an uninsulated wall! Even with

weatherstripping and storm windows, heat still pours through the glass. Moreover, because shades, shutters and curtains are "movable" insulators, they allow you the flexibility of adding extra insulation when

you need it and removing it when you don't. They can provide extra warmth on

winter nights, and be opened or raised during the day to allow sunlight to enter and naturally warm the room. On summer days, movable insulators such as shades keep hot air out and reduce your air

conditioning load. When it cools down at night, you simply roll up your shades. An effective window insula-
