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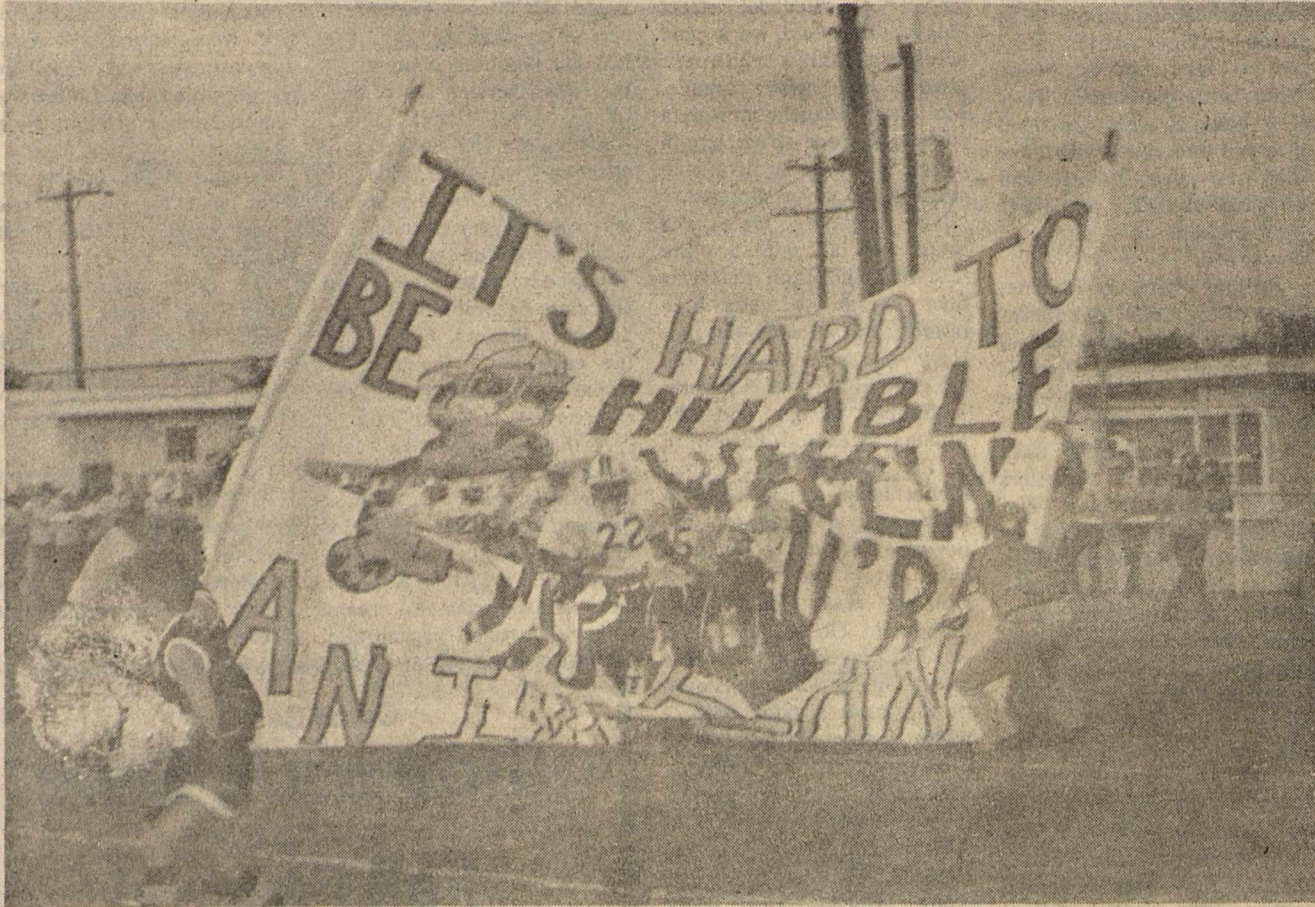

# State Ranked Munday Downs Tribe, 20-2

The Haskell Indians started the 1984 football season on a sour note, suffering a 20-2 loss to the number one ranked Class A Munday Moguls.

The Indians scored first when tackle Joseph Perez trapped Mogul tailback Todd Thompson in the end zone for a safety with 7:17 left in the first quarter. From here on it was a Mogul ballgame.

Quarterback Dent Offutt sprinted around the end and scampered 26 yards to put the Moguls in the lead for good. The run came with 2:19 left in the first quarter. The PAT was no good. The score remained 6-2 at halftime.

With 6:38 left in the third quarter, Offutt scored again. His second touchdown came on a 2 yard quarterback sneak. The Moguls decided to try for 2, and tailback Tim Collier carried it over for the 2 points.

The Moguls scored once more with 3:29 left in the ball game. Offutt

again sneaked over the goal line on a 4th down and goal to goal from the three yard time. The PAT again was no good.

The Indian offensive was almost at a standstill, only gaining 79 yards total offensive. The Mogul offensive, on the other hand, mustered 266 yards rushing, while the Indian defensive shut down the Moguls passing game.

The Indians were played with penalties and turnovers. The Indians suffered 78 yards in penalties and 4 fumbles. These mistakes stopped many of their drives.

The Indians have also been hampered by injuries. Ricky Rojas, Randy Roewe and Seth Pace all had to sit out the Mogul game while Kelly Strickland will be sidelined the whole season with a shoulder injury.

The Indians opponent this week will be the Electra Tigers. They have been ranked number one in the state in Class AA by some polls and in the top 10 in many others.

Game time is 8 p.m. at Electra.

## Gramm Campaign Addresses Issues During Haskell Stop

Saying that there was a difference between a "yellow dog Democrat a Yellow Dogget Democrat", Congressman Phil Gramm, of College Station, brought his campaign to Haskell Sunday, in an attempt to win more support in his election bid against Democrat Lloyd Doggett.

Appearing at the Fire Station here, Gramm asked the supporters to look at his record and review the issues facing the voters: namely, those issues of controlling Government spending, providing for a strong defense, and upholding strong family values.

Reminding the backers present that the seat which he was seeking had been held by such notable Texans as Sam Houston and Lyndon Johnson, Gramm asked each one present for their support in the election.

"I came to Haskell looking for a job. Your job was the hard one...you had to leave the Cowboy's game, and come out in this heat just to hear me talk," quipped Gramm.

He continued, "The choice of Texans has never been clearer. This choice has nothing to do with

partisanship, but it has everything to do with personal philosophy. In the six years I have been in office, I have supported spending controls. In the eight months which my opponent has been campaigning against me, all he has talked about was raising taxes."

Saying that the Government needed to treat the taxpayers dollars "with respect", Gramm said the first act of Congress should be to pass an amendment to the Constitution which would mandate a balanced Federal budget. He said that the Government needed to have to operate on a budget, "just like you and I have to."

On the subject of defense, Gramm said that he wished that the Soviet Union could be bound to a peaceable and noble agreement, but that the only sure way to bring about peace was by having a strong defense.

Again attacking his opponent, Gramm said that he had always supported the B1 Bomber and the MX missile, and his opponent never has backed either.

Gramm also cited legislation which was passed in 1982 and 1983 which provided for better pay and

benefits for the military as a tool for aiding the stronger defense.

The College Station congressman said he was committed to seeing that America got it's money's worth when purchasing spare parts for the military, stating that he was very involved in seeing to it that fraud and wrongdoing was halted.

Changing to the job situation, Gramm said that he felt that the right to join a union should not be a condition for holding a job, also stating that he had always supported right to work legislation.

Adding that he and Cong. Charles Stenholm had been supportive of the Reagan economic program, Gramm reminded voters that since the inception of that program, there had been a reduction in inflation, holding it down to the lowest point in 20 years, that the nation had dug out of recession, and that there were more jobs in the private sector now than in previous times...some 850,000 of these in Texas alone.

Jumping to the issues of agriculture, Gramm said that he was concerned about the water resources in Texas. He also said that the Government had the means by which to strengthen the REA, and credit programs to the farmers.

He also said that he felt that a deal with Korea to purchase Texas blend cotton was necessary.

"In 1985, we need to re-write the farm bill to bring a better balance between supply and demand, and take action to make sure that our agricultural products are marketed in such a way as to insure fair competition abroad."

"We need to make sure we are treated the same way we treat others," said Gramm, after voicing support of a reciprocal trade agreement with other nations.

Phil Gramm said he was old fashioned in his beliefs that the voters came first.

"When it came down to choosing between Tip O'Neil (Democratic speaker of the House), and my people, I chose my people."

Saying that he always served his constituents first, ahead of political interests, he called for a new coalition of Republican, Democrats, and Independents, who could share many common concerns.

A group of Haskell County farmers and landowners will receive a total of \$220,000.00 as a result of an out-of-court settlement in a three year old Haskell County suit.

The settlement occurred as members of a jury panel were filing into the 39th Judicial District Courtroom Monday afternoon. Jury panel members were instructed to appear at 10 a.m. Monday but attorneys in the suit were holding hearings and panel members were instructed to return at 1 p.m.

The settlement was reached shortly after lunch and District Judge Joe Williams excused the jury panel members with his thanks.

The suit dates back to the June 8 and 9, 1981 spraying of herbicides on mesquite pasture owned by Violet Frazier of Abilene. The ranch is in the southeastern portion of Haskell County.

According to the petition, the spraying was performed by J.M.

Christensen of Christensen Aviation, Inc. of Munday.

Both Frazier and Christensen were listed as defendants in the suit.

Plaintiffs included: Bobby Howard, Jr.; Bobby Howard, Sr.; Frank Moeller; Walter Kretschmer; Allen Moeller; G.J. Moeller; Roger Moeller; K.H. Baker; W.R. Moore, Jr.; Burlie Peiser and Ben Nanny.

Also Charles Pribyla; Leonard Weise; Brian Bredthauer; Gertrude Swan Estate; Herman C. Kretschmer Estate; Mary Zeliske; Ernest Peiser; George Moeller Estate; W. R. Moore, Jr., trustee; Willie Peiser; and Hollis Howard.

Petitions in the suit requested over \$300,000.00 in damages in connection with lost income and additional exemplary damages.

According to the petitions about 3,500 acres of cotton was damaged as a result of the spraying.

Gerald Huffaker, a Tahoka attorney representing the plaintiffs, announced Monday that

Christensen would be responsible for \$100,000.00 of the settlement and Frazier would be responsible for \$120,000.00.

Final settlement of the case was scheduled for September 12 in the District Courtroom to determine exact dollar amounts each plaintiff would receive.

Damages requested in the petition ranged from a low of just less than \$5,000.00 to a high of just over \$121,000.00. Huffaker said that the plaintiffs would receive from 70 to 90 percent of the damages sought in the case.

## School Board Members Meet In Tues. Session

Members of the Haskell ISD Board of Trustees met in a regularly scheduled meeting on Tuesday night, Sept. 11 in the Board Room of the Administration building.

The 7:30 p.m. meeting was called to order by vice president Sammy Larned, in the absence of president Jerry Hannsz.

Minutes of the previous month's meeting were read by David Davis, and were approved unanimously.

In other action, the Board members received their district football passes, and a resolution to borrow money for a portion of the Sept. payroll for the school district was approved by the board.

Because of new stipulations on school policies coming under House Bill 72, the Haskell ISD Board had to review their policy towards Senior exemptions, and due to this factor, there will no longer be senior exemptions in the Haskell School District, according to Supt. James Lanier.

Seniors had been exempted from tests the last semester of their senior year, but regulations which have come under the new school legislation have now prohibited this policy.

The Board also approved a policy for tutorial times for students in both the Elementary and secondary school, who are in need of help in one or more of their classroom subjects.

These tutoring session will begin at 3:30 p.m. and last until 4:15 p.m. each Tuesday and Thursday afternoon, starting after the first six weeks of school. There will be two Elementary tutors and two secondary school tutors, and these will be certified teachers who are from the HISD staff. Teachers will serve as tutors on a rotating basis, and will be paid, said Lanier.

On the agenda also was a discussion of the water needs at the Elementary School. The Board decided to study the situation further in order to assess the needs of the school, and will at some time later, possibly decide to dig a well on the Elementary campus.

Bills were approved for payment in the regular session of the board meeting, as well.

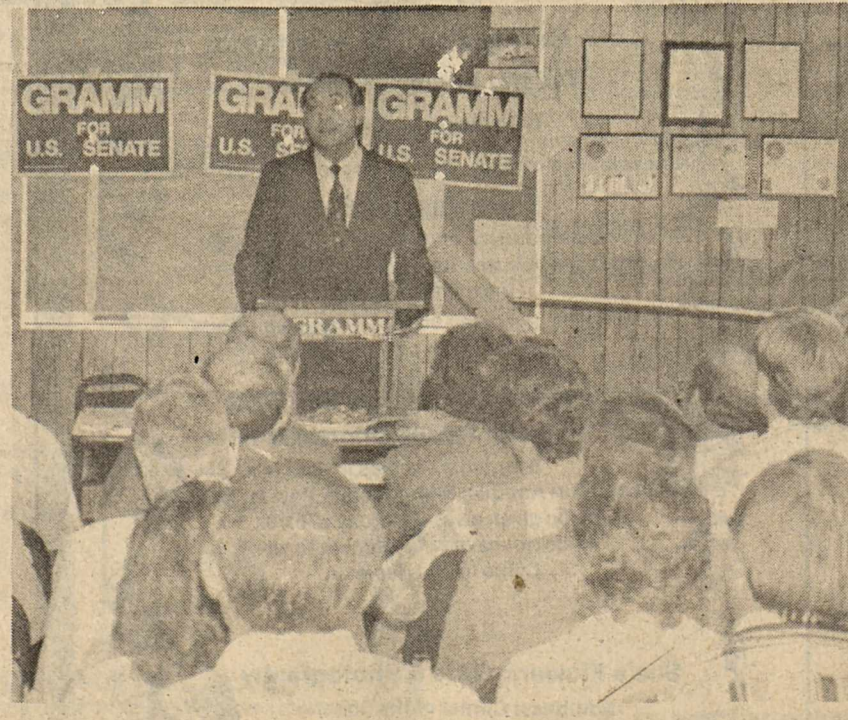

# Beauchamp, Peel Wed In Candlelight Double Ring Ceremony

Gena Rene Peel of Rule and James Lyndon Beauchamp of Rochester were united in marriage September 1, 1984 in the First Baptist Church of Rule. Bro. Bob Moore of Ft. Worth officiated at the 8 p.m. double ring wedding ceremony.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Saffel of Rule. The groom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Beauchamp of Rochester.

Wedding music was presented by Susan Turner, organist of Rochester and Donna Byrd, soloist of Rochester. The music sung during the ceremony included "The Wedding Song", "All My Life, All My Love", and "I've Waited A Lifetime". The traditional wedding march was played as the bride and her father entered the church auditorium.

The church was decorated with two baskets of white gladiolus and greenery decorated with large navy bows. They were set in front on each side of the church.

The double ring wedding ceremony was conducted in candlelight before a stand holding 18 candles banked with greenery and decorated with navy and grey flowers and held a navy bow. Flanked to each side was 15 candleholders on a stand entwined in greenery and flowers.

The bride was given in marriage by her parents. Her father kissed the bride as he placed her hand in the groom's for marriage. Her father was attired in a silver grey tuxedo with a white tuxedo shirt, wearing a navy blue carnation boutonniere.

The bride's gown was designed of silk organza with a border design of silk embroidered morning glories entwining upward from a scalloped edge finished in a silk satin stitch. The fitted bodice and short sleeves were

The proposed tariff restructure will not result in any increases in the overall revenues of the Company. The proposed effective date for the tariffs is September 20, 1984. All customers and classes of customers will be affected by this filing.

The restructure in the basic long distance service (MTS) results in an overall decrease in the revenues received by the Company from such service of approximately \$100 million. While this proposed restructure results in an overall decrease in revenue, certain MTS rates are proposed to be increased to more nearly recover the access charges approved by the PUC for such service.

AT&T Communications has also filed restructured tariffs designed to more closely recover access costs for private line, DATAPHONE\* Digital Service (DDS), OCC facilities, WATS, 800 and directory assistance services. These restructured tariffs result in an approximate overall revenue increase of approximately \$100 million from increases in its WATS, 800, DDS, OCC facilities and private line rates, and institution of a charge for directory assistance.

The result of these proposed tariff changes and the restructure of our service offerings is to more nearly recover access costs from those services for which such access costs are incurred.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 6, 1984

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 29 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides to state-chartered banks the same rights and privileges that are or may be granted to national banks of the United States domiciled in this state. For example, if national banks become authorized to maintain branch offices, this amendment would extend the same privilege to state banks.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bonding capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% (2/3 for The University of Texas System and 1/3 for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded purposes for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and maintenance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and The University of Texas at Austin.

House Joint Resolution 19 also annually appropriates \$100 million in each fiscal year, beginning September 1, 1985 (from the first money coming into the state treasury that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution) for the use of those

agencies and institutions of higher education which are not included in The University of Texas or Texas A&M University Systems and, therefore, not eligible to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program. The amount of this appropriation could be adjusted every five years by a 2/3 vote of the Legislature, but could not be adjusted in such a way as to affect outstanding bonding indebtedness. Each institution of higher education that is eligible to participate (i.e., those institutions of higher education outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems) would be authorized to expend directly its share (such share to be determined pursuant to an equitable formula) of the \$100 million appropriation for the purposes of acquiring land, constructing and equipping buildings or other permanent improvements, major repair and rehabilitation of other permanent buildings or improvements, and acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials. Additionally, each institution would be authorized to issue bonds backed by a pledge of up to 50% of its share of the \$100 million annual appropriation for the purpose of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

Except in the case of fire or natural disaster and in other extraordinary cases, verified by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature, all institutions of higher education would be precluded from receiving appropriations of general revenue funds for the purposes of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to create from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the Permanent University Fund, and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the legislature to provide for the payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of officers, employees and agents of the state or its political subdivisions, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units authorized to make arrests, who die in the course of performing hazardous official duties. Payments to surviving spouses and dependent children of

such officers, employees, and agents are already authorized by the Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of certain public servants killed while on duty."

### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties if a majority of the voters in each of those counties vote in favor of abolishing the office of county treasurer in a local election to be held on the issue. All the powers, duties, and functions of the office of county treasurer in each of these counties would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties."

### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which provides a new method of filling a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call together the committee of the whole Senate within 30 days after a vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The committee would be required to elect one of its members to perform the duties of the Lieutenant Governor until the next general election. This individual would continue his duties as Senator at the same time that he performs the Lieutenant Governor's duties. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the committee of the whole Senate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor."

### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-asset-backed life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or company has limited life and health group policies of political subdivisions to non-mutual insurance companies. The amendment would permit mutual insurance companies to bid for those policies.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment to permit use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies authorized to do business in Texas."

### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."

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

## Ag Commodity Options Now Open To Farmers, Ranchers

Sometime this fall farmers and ranchers will likely be able to buy and sell agricultural commodity options, giving them another pricing tool to assist in price risk management.

"An option is a contract that gives the buyer the right, but not the obligation, to buy or sell a particular commodity at a specified price for a specified period of time," explains Dr. Ernie Davis, economist in livestock marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "The proposed commodity option trading will include live cattle, hogs, soybeans, corn, wheat and cotton."

Option contracts are of two types—"call" and "put"

options. A call option gives the option buyer the right, but not the obligation, to buy an underlying futures contract at a specified price. A put option allows the option buyer to sell an underlying futures contract at a specified price.

"In other words, the call option buyer has the right to take a long position on the futures if it is to his advantage, and the put option buyer the same of a short futures position," said Davis. "The new trading system will give the buyer of an option contract the right to take either a long or short position in the futures market for a

specified futures commodity."

According to Davis, options can give agricultural producers the opportunity to lock in a specified futures commodity. "The most recognizable advantage to hedging with options, says Davis, is that a producer can enjoy additional profits from cash markets should the cash price of his commodity increase. This is because he is not locked into a price position unless he exercised that option.

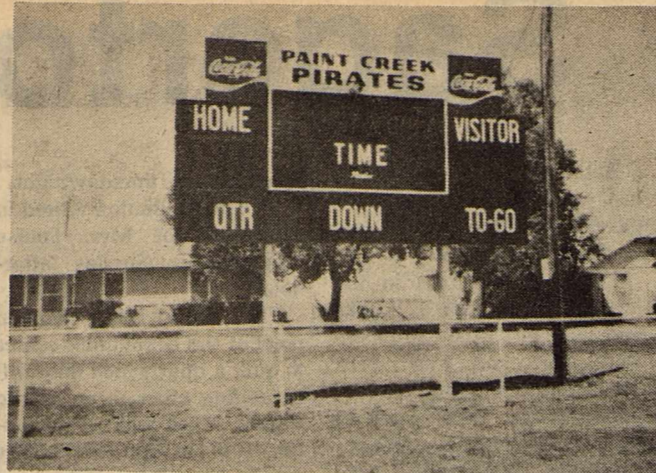
## PC Football Fields Sports New Scoreboard And Concession Stand

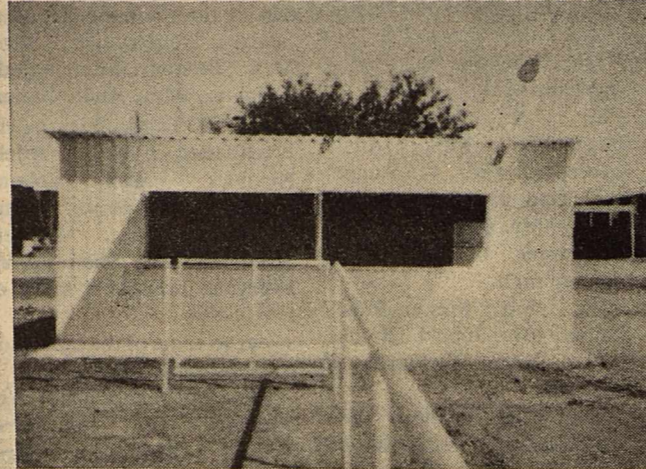

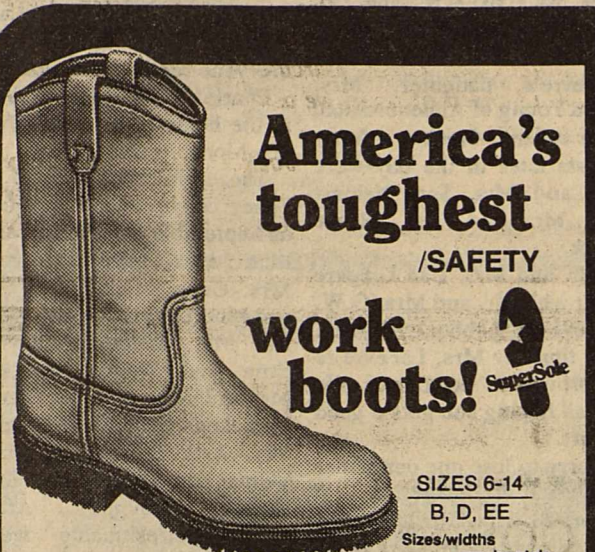

# Superintendent's Views

(Continuation of report on HB 72)

HB 72 spoke not only to the financing of schools but also to the operation in several general areas. For instance the legislature did not change the number of days in the school year. There will still be 175 days of instruction for the students plus 8 days of inservice for teachers. However, 4 of these days must be for preparation. Two of these preparation days must be immediately prior to the opening of school and one at the end of each semester. Previously we were required to have 5 inservice days and three preparation days.

Another area spoken to in HB72 is the organization of schools. Any school district which identifies 15 or more eligible students shall offer pre-kindergarten classes. A four year old child shall be eligible for pre-kindergarten if he/she is unable to comprehend the English language or is from a family whose income is at or below subsistence level. Pre-kindergarten classes shall be offered on a half day basis. They will be funded in the same proportion (state-local sharing) as the rest of the program but will not be part of the basic grant. This segment takes effect for the school year 1985-86.

The school districts that are required to offer a bilingual or special language program shall be required to offer a voluntary summer program for students of limited English proficiency who will be entering kindergarten or 1st grade. Students will not be required to attend but schools will have to offer the program. This program will operate during the summer of 1985 and must be conducted on a 1/2 day basis during the 8 weeks immediately preceding the opening of school. It will consist of intensive language training. Rehabilitation dis-

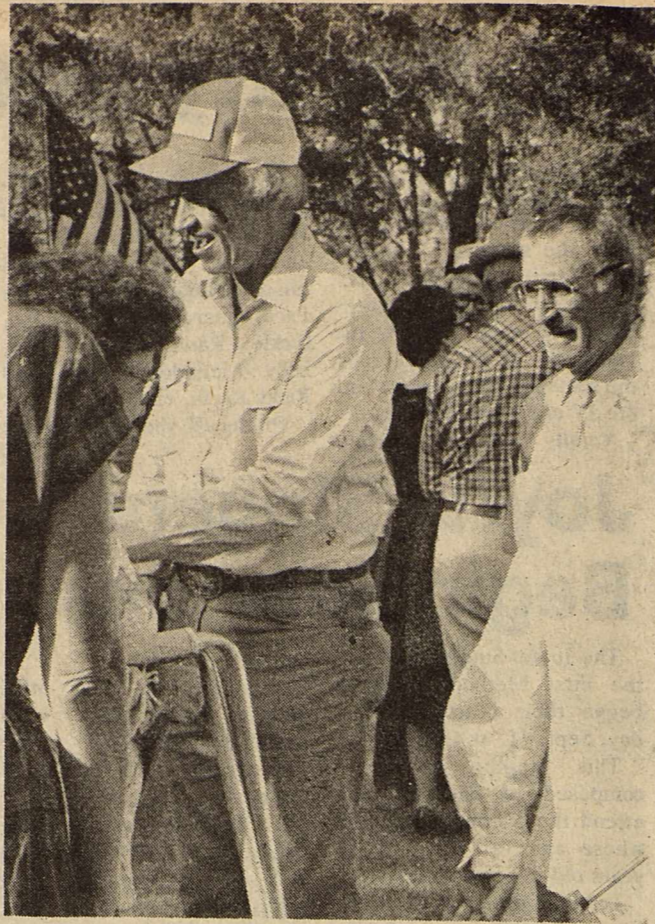
tricts such as Texas School for the Deaf will be continued as well as gifted and talented programs.

Another area addressed in HB 72 is in the area of student management or discipline. It must be implemented by the school year 1986-87 with all teachers trained by December 1986 to use this discipline plan. Parts of this portion of the bill must be implemented this year. This part which must be addressed immediately is dealing with incorrigible students. The board will be required to revise policies to deal with this type of student.

HB 72 authorizes and encourages local districts to establish cooperative programs with the business community and other educational and governmental institutions to recruit qualified but non certified persons to provide secondary students (grades 7-12) with specialized skills and training in mathematics, science, computer science, and related technological subjects. However, these programs require a considerable amount of planning and paper work and restrictions on the non certified personnel involved.

Another area addressed in HB 72 is the payment of teachers retirement or TRS. Districts must pay the employer's portion (8.52) to TRS for the amount of salary which is above the minimum salary such as paraprofessionals, clerks, cooks, custodians, etc. Districts are exempt from this payment if the prior year maintenance and operation tax rate equals or exceeds 125% of the state average. This portion is effective with the 1985-86 school year.

**Conservation Viewpoints**  
USDA Soil Conservation Service

Some areas of Haskell County have received enough rainfall to boost grass and crop production along with filling many farm ponds. Due to the numbers of new ponds constructed and clean-out of old ponds, the fish population is down. Now is the time to consider restocking or initial stocking of these ponds.

The Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District will accept orders for fingerling fish thru September 17, 1984 for delivery on September 24. Channel catfish are recommended for most ponds in this area but bass and bluegill or redear are also available.

An average pond will need 50 catfish and 2 pounds of fathead minnows in this area. The Conservation Service staff can assist you in determining your needs. Stop by the SCS office at 510 South 2nd or call 817-864-3212 for assistance.

Channel Catfish (3'-6") at 30.00/100; Fathead Minnows at 7.50/lb; Bass (3'-4") at 80.00/100; Bluegill or Redear (Fry-1") at 35.00/100; (1'-2") at 45.00/100; and (Adult) at 95.00/100.

Order of catfish (minimum of 50 per order), minnows (minimum of 2 lbs) and bluegill or redear (minimum of 50) will be thru September 17 for delivery on September 24.

**West Texas Utilities Prepares For Formal Rate Hearing**

After months of preparation, which included providing several thick volumes of written testimony and answering hundreds of questions from intervenors, West Texas Utilities Co. representatives will go to Austin on Monday, September 17, for a formal retail rate hearing before the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

WTU filed the rate case on June 8, asking for an increase which would boost annual retail revenue by \$30.8 million. This would be a 12.4 percent increase over the test year revenue on which the case is based.

In support of its request, WTU filed seven volumes of testimony by Company officials and expert witnesses on subjects covering all aspects of WTU's operations. Since the filing, auditors employed

by the Texas Municipal League, which is intervening in behalf of several cities, have dug into WTU files to check data, while requests for information have come from all intervenors as well as from PUC staff. In bulk, the written requests for information are three volumes thicker than WTU's original filing.

Response to WTU's rate request has been varied. Of the 82 incorporated towns in the service area, 36 denied the increase, 19 suspended the case, while 6 denied the increase and joined 21 towns which had previously ceded jurisdiction over rates to the PUC.

Denying the increase were Alpine, Anson, Aspermont, Balmorhea, Ballinger, Benjamin, Big Lake, Blackwell, Bronte, Buffalo Gap, Clarendon, Clyde, Cross Plains, Crowell, Dodson, Hamlin, Haskell, Hawley, Iraan, Jayton, Know City, Lawn, Lueders, Memphis, Merkel, O'Brien, Putnam, Rankin, Rochester, San Angelo, Santa Anna, Sonora, Sterling City, Tuscola, Tye and Woodson. WTU appealed each of these cases to the PUC.

Suspending rates were Abilene, Baird, Childress, Cisco, Eden, Estelline, Impact, Junction, Melvin, Menard, Munday, Paducah, Quanah, Spur, Stamford, Throckmorton, Vernon, Wellington, and Winters. Ceding jurisdiction were Marfa, Miles, Quitaque, Rising Star, Turkey and Valentine.

Towns which had already ceded jurisdiction are Albany, Chillicothe, Dickens, Eldor-

ado, Goree, Hedley, Lakeview, Matador, McCamey, Mertzson, Moran, Paint Rock, Presidio, Roaring Springs, Robert Lee, Roby, Rotan, Rule, Shamrock, Trent, and Weinert.

Consultants for the Texas Municipal League, which is representing 13 cities filed testimony this past week with the PUC recommending that instead of receiving a \$30.8 million increase in revenue WTU should cut its request by \$9.1 million. Although this appeared to suggest a rate reduction, WTU officials pointed out that the cities actually are recommending an increase in base rates, but suggesting that the Company's fuel cost estimates are too high.

Even after lowering the return on equity from the 17 percent sought by the Com-

pany to 15.5 percent and reducing Construction Work in Progress from 100 percent to 40 percent, the cities' consultants still recommend a \$7.8 million in base rates. This amount, WTU official said, is "in the right direction, though inadequate to see the Company through its current construction program."

As for the fuel costs, the utility is allowed to recover its costs from the customers, based on factors set during rate cases.

If fuel costs are underestimated, the rates will be set higher during the following year. If the estimates are too high, any over-charge for fuel must be refunded by the Company with interest.

The hearing will begin at 1:30 p.m. Monday and is expected to last at least through the week.

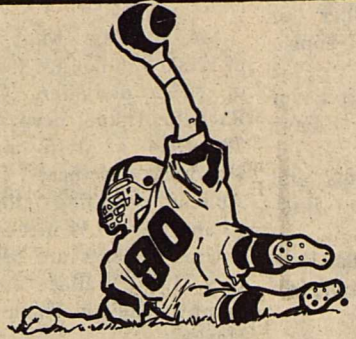

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## Haskell Boy Scout Program In Full Swing

The Boy Scout organization in Haskell is gearing up for a big year according to Eddie Hester, who is in charge of the Boy Scouts here.

Beginning with the Tiger Cub and Cub scouts, whose leader is Bill Perry, there are approximately 22 boys involved in this organization. Tiger Cubs begin as young as seven years old or when a boy has completed the first grade. At the present time, there are about 6 such youngsters in the Haskell group.

This particular facet of scouting began about three years ago, and in Haskell there is already enough interest being generated that a second Tiger Cub group is a possibility.

This group is unique in that its success hinges on the adult boy relationship. It is a family-oriented group, which is designed to bring the family closer together.

The motto of the Tiger Cubs is "Search-Discover-Share." The Cub scouting group has three segments: the Bobcats, which are first year scouts (8 yrs. old), the Bears, which are second year scouts (9 yrs. old) and the Webeles, third yr. scouts (10 yrs. old).

The actual Boy Scout troops begin at age 10 1/2 yrs. old. There are approximately 12 adults and 48 boys involved in the program here.

Four members of the Haskell troupe will be attending the 75th Anniversary of Scouting in America, in 1985. This will be a National Jamboree, which will be held at Fort A.P. Hill, Virginia. Those attending will be Bo Watson, Jerry Davis, Seth Pace, and Val Simms. These four are also working toward their Eagle Scout awards, and

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should be completed with these projects this year. The Eagle Scout award is the highest honor a Boy Scout can attain. Those who are to earn this must work on some project in order to be qualified to be an Eagle Scout.

Bo Watson's project is collecting aluminum cans during the months of Sept. and October, with all of the proceeds going to help the Ambulance service purchase a defibrillator.

Jerry Davis' project is to restore the old house and museum at the City Park with aid from the Haskell Historical Society.

The other two boys have yet to start on their projects. All Eagle Scout projects must be finished and the award must be made before the scout is 18 years old.

The Haskell Boy Scouts meet each Monday night at 7 p.m. at the Scout Hut, located at the First Methodist Church, which is their sponsor. The Cub Scouts will begin meeting at the Cub Scout hut which is located behind the American Legion Hall. The monthly pack meeting of the Cub Scouts will be held at the Elementary School.

In June 1984, the Haskell Boy Scouts were told they would be celebrating their 40th anniversary for the Troop 136.

Some of the activities in the organization this year will include participating in the Christmas parade, helping to collect cans for the EMS drive, and camp outs. In 1986, the organization has hopes to participate in the Texas

Sesquicentennial celebration. The Haskell scout troops are members of the Chisolm Trail Council.

Eddie Hester said that he has hopes of trying to organize a tri-county chapter of the National Eagle Scout Association. He said that he felt that there were as many as 15 former Eagle Scouts living in Haskell alone. The only prerequisite for membership in this organization is that one must have been an Eagle Scout.

According to Hester, this is quite a large number of Eagle Scouts for one place to have. He said that the percentage of those scouts who eventually make it to the Eagle Scout level might be as small as 1 out 100 scouts.

He also said that the former Eagle Scouts who live here are from all walks of life.

Hester still urged any boy who is interested in scouting to contact Bill Perry for Cub Scouting, Hester himself for Boy Scouting, or Randy Phemister, who is the unit coordinator for the Haskell group. It's never too late to become a scout.!
