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Local Tribe Wins Indian Battle, 21-13

The battle of the Indians, Haskell vs Quanah, ended in the Indians from Haskell evening up their season record to 2-2 with a 21-13 win.

The Indian offense exploded for 314 total yards; 292 yards rushing and 22 yards passing; while Quanah

mustered 229 yards total offense; 212 yards rushing and 17 yards passing.

Quarterback Todd Harris led the rushing attack for Haskell with 109 yards while halfback Stanley Payne led Quanah with 185 yards rushing.

Haskell led off the scoring surge when fullback Robert Ivey took the

hand-off from Harris and ran 22 yards to the two yard line and was then hit and fumbled.

The ball rolled into the end zone, and center Shawn Lane fell on the ball for a touchdown with no time left on the clock in the first quarter. The PAT by Harris was good.

Quanah came back and tied up the game when runningback Mark Guzman carried the ball over from the one-yard line for a touchdown with 3:52 left in the first half. The PAT by Craig Moore was good. The touchdown came after a Haskell fumble on the four-yard line which Quanah recovered. The touchdown came on the second play of the drive.

Haskell took the lead for good when Ivey powered his way into the end zone on a fourth and inches situation with 55 seconds left in the first half. The PAT by Harris was good. This put Haskell up 14-7.

Quanah put a scare into Haskell when Payne tiptoed in from two yards out on a fourth and goal to go with 6:57 left in the ball game. The score was now 14-13. Quanah went for two on the PAT and the pass fell incomplete.

Haskell added an insurance touchdown with 2:28 left in the ballgame when Harris ran around the right end from seven yards out to put Haskell up 20-13. Harris connected on the PAT to put Haskell up 21-13.

Several Indians contributed largely on defense. End Jimmy Burson led the defensive surge with 12 tackles followed by linebacker Ivey with 11, cornerback Felipe Arredondo and linebacker Lane with 10 and safety Joel Torres with 9.

End Harry Henry broke his arm the first play of the game and will miss the rest of the season.

The Indians opponent this week will be the Iowa Park Hawks. The Hawks are 4-0 after trouncing Stamford 31-13.

Game time is 8 p.m. at Indian Field.

Judy Hayes Is Guest Artist

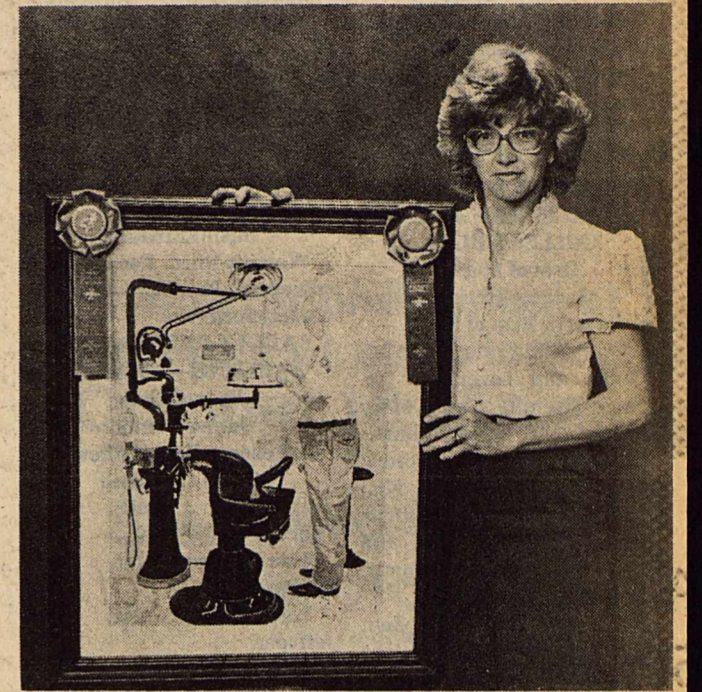

AMENDING TAX RETURNS
 In 1983 approximately two million taxpayers filed amended returns for prior years, in most cases to get refunds of taxes they had previously overpaid, often because a deduction had been overlooked or some other error was discovered which resulted in an overpayment.
 Millions of other taxpayers did not file for refunds because they were either afraid of the complexity, had not kept adequate records, or because the deadline had passed for filing a claim or because they were afraid of triggering an IRS audit for that year or other years. In other words, a "don't rock the boat" feeling commonly prevails.
 There is much to be said about most of these reasons. They may be perfectly valid and perhaps amended returns cannot or should not be filed. However, fear of the complexity of filing is not a valid reason.
 Generally, an amended return must be filed within 3 years from the day the original return was filed, or 2 years from the time the tax was paid, whichever is later. Any returns filed after April 15th are treated as if they were filed on that date. The 3 year deadline is extended to 7 years if the claim is based on a bad debt or on worthless securities, and is extended to 10 years when credit for foreign taxes is involved.
 If you believe that your prior years return should be amended, discuss the options with your tax advisor.

 2 eggs, beaten
 4 cup all purpose flour
 Combine, scalded sour cream, sugar, butter and salt; mix well and let cool to luke warm. Dissolve yeast in warm water in a large mixing bowl; stir in sour cream mixture and egg. Gradually stir in flour (dough will be soft). Cover tightly, and chill overnight. Divide dough into 4 equal portions. Turn each portion out onto a heavily floured surface, and knead 4 to 5 times. Roll each into a 12x8 inch rectangle. Spread one fourth of filling over each rectangle, leaving a ½ inch margin around edges. Carefully roll up jellyroll style beginning at long side. Firmly pinch edge and ends to seal. Carefully place rolls, seam side down on greased baking sheets. Make 6 equally spaced x shaped cuts across top of each loaf. Cover and let rise in a warm place (85 degrees)

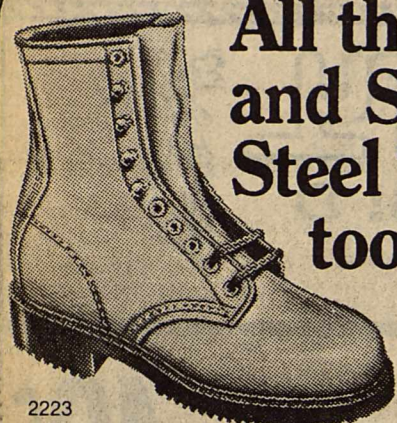
From then on, the square will be lined with food booths and refreshments, games and contests, and artists and craftsmen. Also, live musical entertainment will be featured throughout the day.

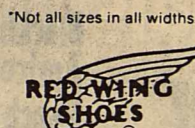

Conservation Viewpoints

USDA Soil Conservation Service

Jim Hudson, District Conservationist with the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District, presented the annual report of activities to Directors, September 21, 1984. In his opening statement Hudson noted that "although 84 has been extremely dry and seemingly bleak, conservation held ground solidly." The SWCS board ventured into several new areas in 84 and also strengthened old projects.

"For the first time, Haskell SWCD if participating in the Goodyear Conservation Awards Program and also began a Fishpond stocking program this year," said Hudson. "We have seen the need for these and other past programs and hope to be able to assist more people with their conservation needs."

said R.V. Earles, chairman Haskell SWCS.

In 1984 the following activities were accomplished by the Haskell SWCS. 24 new District agreements prepared on 6,042 acres, 20,199 acres of conservation agreements were revised. 547 cooperators and other land users were serviced with 161 producers applying conservation practices.

In the area of conservation contracts, 30 applications on 14,482 acres were received for assistance thru the Great Plains Conservation Program. 12 GPCP contracts on 5,035 acres were prepared, with 10 on 4229 acres being certified for funds. 2 mini Long-Term Agreements on 415 acres were also approved.

186 acres of grassed waterways were vegetated and acres of critical area planted. 1,302,747 feet of ten acres were constructed on one irrigation system on 133 acres was installed.

Views From City Hall

I haven't used this media in several months to inform the citizens of Haskell what is happening in City Hall. I will make every attempt to have an article in this paper at least every other week. It is very important for the people to know what we are doing with your money.

During the past few months, I have been working closely with the Mayor and Council on a new budget that begins October 1, 1984. We prepared a "want" list of all the things that we would like the City to have and anticipated our revenues for the new fiscal year. Then cuts in the "want" list started. Several items just could not be done at this time because of insufficient funds. One item was health insurance for the city employees. Although we felt it was needed, primarily because of low wages, it has to be cut. Another important item that was cut was a new garbage collection system that would have used dumpsters all over town instead of the barrels.

Even with the numerous cuts, the revenues were still short. Our tax rate for last year was .1677. The new budget reflects a tax rate of .215. What this means to the property owner is approximately \$.05 on the hundred dollar evaluation. For example, a \$36,000 home, the tax increase would be \$18.00 per year. This increase will give the city the additional funds to balance the General Fund which includes Fire, Police, Corporation Court, Parks, Streets and Administration.

The City employees were not given a raise in this new budget. They received a raise last April and the City absorbed the added costs until this new budget became effective. A new employee starts out with the city at \$675.00 per month. They are required to work five and one-half days a week, with

very few added benefits. In our Enterprise Fund, which includes Water, Sewer and Garbage, additional funds were also needed. One of the primary reasons was because the City was required by the State of Texas to purchase a new landfill. We just couldn't bury any more trash in our old one. This new landfill will cost the City \$96,000.00 for the land and several thousand more to dig the pits, build and all weather road and other items that will be required. The sewer plant's electricity has gone from \$7,159.00 in 1979 to \$18,500.00 in 1984. The City has not raised the sewer rates since 1978. Employee cost and other items at the sewer plant certainly cost more now than they did in 1978.

The council decided the garbage and sewer rates needed to be adjusted to reflect these additional costs. The garbage rates were increased by \$2.00 for residential customers and the sewer rate was increased by \$.80 on the base cost. Also a new more equitable schedule was initiated on garbage collections at the commercial establishments. The water rates were not raised. It might be interesting to note that Haskell's new tax rate of .215 is still lower than almost any community of its size in the State of Texas. As a comparison, the following is a list of communities and their tax rate: Stamford .746; Cisco .52; Comanche .492; Jacksboro .59; Roscoe .50; Knox City .573; Rotan .42; Winters .52; Anson .63; Clyde .41; Paducah .25. Also our water, sewer and garbage rates are the same or lower than most communities.

All of these increases are necessary if the City is to meet its obligations to the citizens. They were tough, well thought-out decisions made by members of the City Council. The City does not have any debts and maintains a reserve fund in case of emergencies.

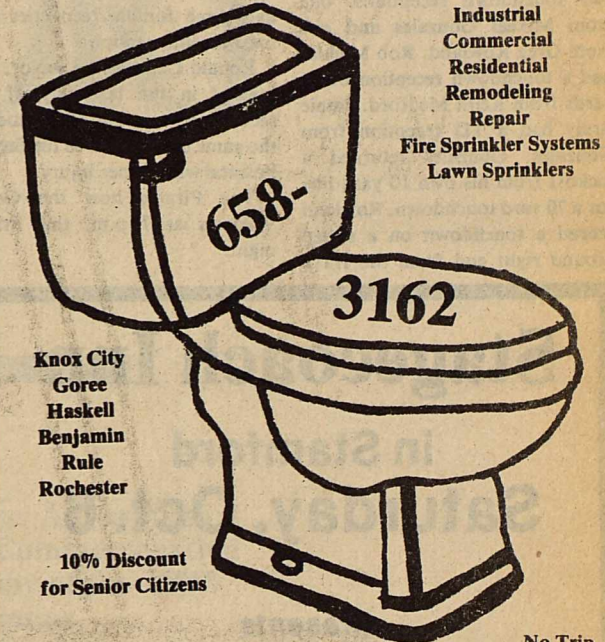

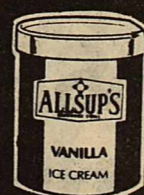

Superintendent's Views

HB 72 requires that each school district must be accredited by the Texas Education Agency. The law further directs that the State Board of Education shall establish standards which a school district must satisfy to be accredited and shall adopt an accreditation process in accordance with provisions of the law. A new three year monitoring cycle will be established during the 1984-85 school year which replaces the current five year monitoring cycle. We will have to make certain changes in order to meet standards. However, this part of the bill will create no particular problem for us.

Each teacher, including a teacher who directs extra curricular activities, shall teach in the classroom not less than four hours each day. We only had one teacher that this effected, the band director. He will teach a class in computer literacy in order to meet this standard.

Each school district must employ a sufficient number of certified teachers to maintain an average ratio of not less than one teacher for each 20 students in average daily attendance. Beginning with the 1985-86 school year, a school district may not enroll more than 22 students in kindergarten, first or second grade. This will cause us to have to hire another kindergarten teacher.

A student may not be given credit for a class if the student has more than five days of unexcused absence during a semester. The compulsory attendance law has been changed to every child in the state who is as much as seven years of age, or who is less than seven years of age and has previously been enrolled in first grade, and who has not completed the academic year in which his 16th birthday

occurred shall be required to attend 170 days a year. This total includes excused absences.

The school district must require 70 for a passing grade and there will be no social promotion. The State Board of Education will develop rules regarding promotion. School districts are required to provide written notice to parents at least once every six weeks. The grade notice (report cards) must include all subjects or courses taken by a student, but must also state the need for a conference on those where the grade is equal to less than 70.

All students are required to take final examinations.

The State Board of Education will provide rules to provide a basis for the development of advanced placement examinations. We will not develop these tests until the board has established criteria.

A school district is required to provide tutorials for student having difficulties. I will cover this in the next column.

This column concludes the report on HB 72. This far ranging legislation has widespread implications for school districts. The bill will increase costs for school districts. It requires changes in student attendance. There are certainly many issues in the bill that needed to be addressed. However, there are certain weaknesses and fallacies which, hopefully, the state legislature will address in January.

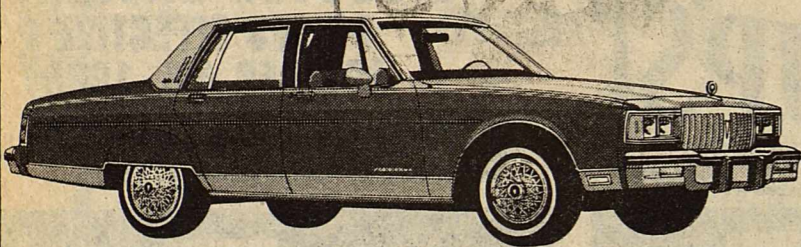

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METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through the meter device.
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
- (3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.

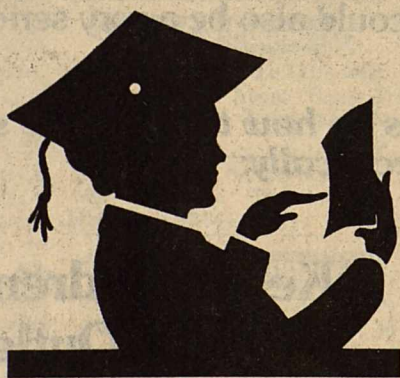

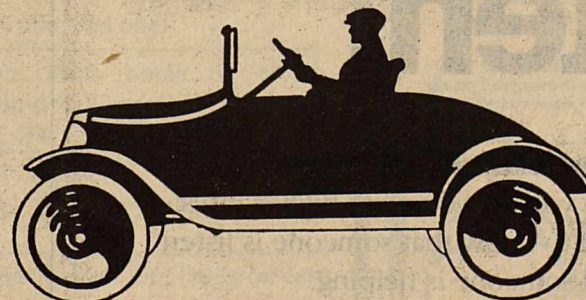

Army Friends Visit For First Time In 39 Years

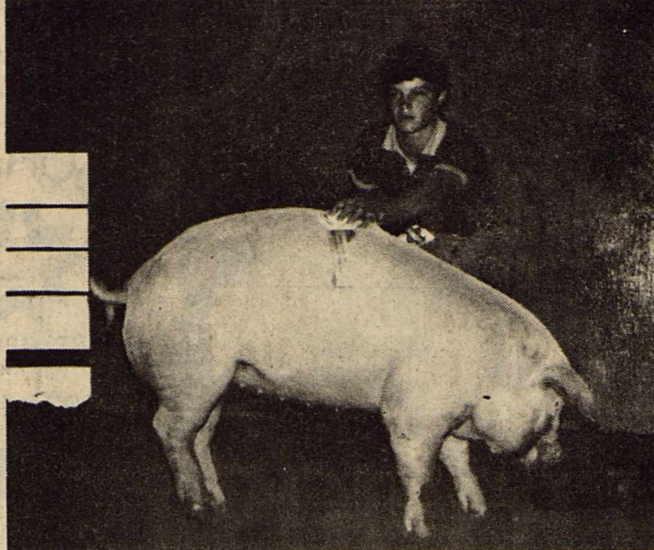

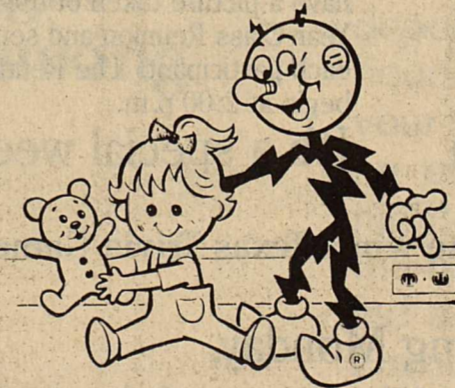

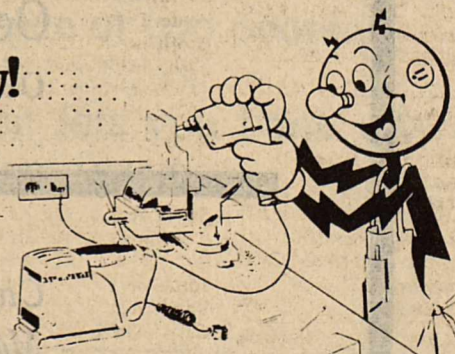
