# Three Resign From Board Following Monday Session

Three members of the board of trustees of Haskell Independent School District have submitted their resignations following the second special called meeting of the board in seven days.

Board president Jerry Hannsz, Vice President Sammy Larned and Max McMeans each submitted written letters of resignation this week to board secretary David

Davis. All three board members have indicated that they would make a public statement concerning their resignations at a later date.

The board split 4-3 on the issue of renewing Supt. James Lanier's contract on Jan. 10 and has remained split since that time.

The board met in a special called meeting Monday night to continue

the process of non-renewal. In the absence of President Hannsz, Sammy Larned presided at the meeting.

Mike Guess made a motion to hire local attorney Royce Adkins to represent the board and Pat Henry offered a second. The motion passed 4-2 with Guess, Henry, Roger Moeller and David Davis voting in favor and Larned and

McMeans opposing. Immediately following the motion to hire Adkins, the board voted by the same margin to enter an executive session to discuss reasons for non-renewal. Almost two hours later the session opened. Henry made a motion to instruct the vice-president to notify Lanier of the reasons for writing of non-renewal of his term contract. The motion passed by the same 4-2 margin.

Larned expressed his thanks to about 15 people who had attended the meeting and asked them not to come to a board meeting just because there was a controversy. He added that perhaps there would not be as many problems if more people came.

Larned also referred to a petition supporting Lanier and urging the board to renew his contract. The petition was not on the agenda and was not discussed further than request that it be placed on the agenda of the next meeting. There were approximately 200 signatures on the petition.

## ASCS Office Needs Reports

Haskell Co. ASCS Executive Director, Glenn R. Brzozowski is urging farmers to report any changes in their farm operations which could affect farm program benefits for 1985.

"Farm records must be up-to-date in order for us to help producers get full program benefits," said Brzozowski. "If a farm will have a new owner

effective for 1985, or if a change is made in the operation of an existing unit, producers should notify our office."

He said plans to combine farms or divide a farm should be requested as soon as possible because reconstitutions require special processing as well as county committee approval.

"Likewise, farmers who want to

establish proven yields for 1985 feed grains or wheat should assemble proof of production records for this year's crop."

The ASCS official said production evidence must be kept separate for each year and for each farm. Producers will be given the opportunity to request a proven yield until March 1 if production evidence so warrants.

## Council Handles Lengthy Agenda

Haskell's City Council met Tuesday night, at 7 p.m., to discuss a lengthy list of items on their agenda.

Present at the meeting were Mayor Abe Turner, City Manager Bob Baker, Councilmen Kenny Watson, Jerry Stocks, Larry Gilliam, Darrell Smith, and City Atty. Joseph Thispen. Councilman Joe Cortez was absent.

Darrell Smith gave the invocation, and Bob Baker read the minutes of the previous meeting of January 8, which were approved.

The Council then addressed itself to the S.E. Braly case, as Mayor Turner asked Atty. Isaac Castro, representing Braly, if his client had anything to add to their prior request that Braly's position be reinstated, and that the city pay him his back wages. Castro said that they had no additional requests.

Turner, in turn, then quoted Article 6252-17 section 2, Subsection E of the Texas Openings

Meeting Law, and the Council chose to go into closed session for a private consultation with their attorney. This occurred at 7:10 p.m.

The Council reopened their chambers at 8:10 p.m., and the Mayor asked the Council what their pleasure on the matter before them be, and Larry Gilliam entertained a motion to not reinstate Braly nor give him any back pay. This was seconded by Darrell Smith, and passed on a vote by Gilliam, Smith, and Watson. Stocks abstained from voting.

At that point, Castro and the Bralys left the Council chambers.

Lone Star Gas and its local manager Roy Washburn, and Technical advisor Rick Vaughn from Fort Worth were present to ask the Council for their approval of a 2 percent rate hike.

After much discussion on the matter, the Council decided to ask the Gas company for a 30 day period whereby they could look at the request more closely. Lone Star will be on the Agenda for the Feb.

12 meeting. A lengthy discussion of the Creek Project was entered into by the Council.

Bids for the project were opened prior to the meeting, with the lowest bid being offered by Bob and Bobby Nobel of Colorado City.

In the Council meeting, members began the arduous task of deciding what deductions could be taken on the project in order to hold down the cost overruns.

The Council decided to reduce the downstream splash pads from 10 foot to 4 foot at a cost reduction of \$8825; they approved the deletion of all rip rap in the park and north of the Rule highway at \$9120; and gave their okay on the deletion of all seeding of grass for the creek project, for \$19,600. Councilmen also approved the change out of a box culvert to a low water crossing on South 1st at a savings of \$25,000, and deleted all waterline adjustments for \$25,880, thus with a total savings of \$88,425 on the project.

Jerry Stocks made the motion to award the bid to the Nobel construction firm, subject to the changes made by the Council, and there was a second by Kenny Watson, and the motion carried unanimously.

Ken Martin, a consulting engineer with the firm of Martin and Jacobs of Abilene said that the old, usable pipelines removed in the Creek project would be used, if possible, in helping the drainage problem on North Ave. A and around 14th street.

Martin said he would send out a surveying team, at no additional cost to the city, to take pictures of the problem and see what could be done to alleviate this.

A pre-construction meeting will be held in about a month for the Creek project.

In the discussion on the landfill, it was stated that there had, recently, been a large number of dead animals left at the landfill, and that the costs and manpower necessary to dispose of these carcasses was beginning to be prohibitive, economically, for the city.

David Miller, sanitation superintendent, asked Council members if it might be feasible for

the city to charge a slight fee for the disposition of these carcasses.

The Council agreed to check in this matter, and find out what other cities do in such a case.

The date of Feb. 26 was agreed upon as the day to open bids on the airport renovation. This project estimated to cost about \$110,000 and will be funded 75/25 by the Texas Aeronautical Commission.

Two vacancies on the Zoning Commission were to be filled appointments of the council members or by suggestion Baker. These vacancies were brought on by the resignation chairman Bill Comedy recently, and the resignation of council member Joe Cortez.

Baker told the Council that a past discrepancy in the books was found and cleared up by an auditor who was hired for a brief time find the problem.

He also told council members that Sue Pate had been contacted serve as Election Judge for the April 6 election, recommended a fee for election judges be raised \$5.00.

The City Manager also said that the city would be paying unemployment compensation to former employee and that it would be covered by the city liability insurance.

David Miller told the Council that the used M-Co truck was in operation, and that half of small dumpsters were in and the count of dumpsters to be put was at 300 plus. The new M-Co truck should be arriving in the next few days, he said.

Baker told the Council that in recent high wind, an electrical wire came unbolted from a hangar at airport and caught the tail section of a plane, so that hangar is without power. Baker said that cost of putting the wire on a plane was prohibitive, so he was looking into a solution for the matter.

Councilman Jerry Stocks gave report on the Ambulance Service and its funding. The Council praised the efforts of Ambulance Service.

It was agreed upon by Council that the old trash bar could be picked up by the city, a service to the citizens of Haskell.

Mrs. J.O. Blankenship, the program director, introduced Mrs. Edith James who gave an interesting and informative talk on wild flowers, the narrow leaf gageflower (in the Sun flower family) is also called snake roots because the roots are used for snake bites. The Evening Star Rain Lily bulb blooms well after rains. The red Gaillardia, a dark red bloom in the sunflower family, is found in pastures. The white Prickly Poppy is found in fields and pastures and all parts of the plant are poisonous. The Devils Claw is also known as Rains horn. The Texas Paint Brush (only annual) and a peresite plant.

Mrs. Lorene Dewey gave interesting information on birds and butterflies. The

Humming Bird is known as the little feathered acrobats with a long narrow bill, making humming sounds with its wings. The eggs are hatched in fourteen days and they need insects for protein. Insect spray may soon kill out birds.

The Monarch Butterfly is known as globe trotters because of their long travels. They are also effected by pesticides. Several states are seeking for federal protection for their butterflies.

Mrs. Blankenship discussed bird sanctuaries and displayed bird bath, seeds, and tree limbs.

She said birds need water, food and shelter. She showed some goards that are used bird houses. She also brought seeds to share with the garden club members. She reported on the Audobon Society in Abilene that counted 80 species of birds in a 15 mile radius circle of Abilene in 1984. She said Arbor Day was first celebrated by the state of Nebraska, then

Texas first celebrated Arbor Day in 1889 in Temple. Mrs. Blankenship said she had donated some Nendianes to be planted in the garden spot at the Haskell Memorial Hospital.

There were several horticulture specimens shared by several of the club members. Mrs. Edith James, her beautiful pansies, Mrs. Blankenship, ornamental Kale, blooming amaryllid and Kalancho; a pretty poinsetta by Mrs. Fouts; Linda King displayed a tree branch hung with packages of flower seed made into an arrangement. She called it "Cabin Fever" because of all the seed catalogues we receive in January and dream about planting in the spring, using the catalogues around the arrangement.

Mrs. Ira Davis lead the club in the conservation pledge.

In accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. (AT&T Communications) gives notice to all of its Texas customers that a new procedure for long distance billing was made effective on an interim basis on August 6, 1984 in Docket No. 5800.

The procedure referred to is "Rate Period Specific Billing" and it applies to all message telephone service (AT&T Long Distance calls) including non-REACH OUT Texas calls within the State of Texas. This new procedure effects all AT&T Long Distance customers. All intra-LATA long distance calls and all interstate long distance calls are currently billed using this procedure.

Under this procedure, customers are billed a specific charge for long distance calls according to the rate or rates in effect throughout the time of each call. If a call begins in one rate period and extends into a different rate period, the customer will be charged whatever rate is in effect for each portion of the call.

For example, if a customer places a call at 4:58 p.m. on a weekday and talks for ten minutes, the first two minutes of the call would be charged at the full weekday rate which extends from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The remaining eight minutes of the call would be billed at the evening rate which extends from 5:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. and includes a 25% discount. If Rate Period Specific Billing were not in effect, the entire call would have been billed at the higher day rate. Calls which extend from the evening rate period (25% discount) to the night and weekend rate period (40% discount) or from the night and weekend rate period (40% discount) to the day rate period (no discount) would also be billed according to the actual minutes of use during each rate period.

AT&T Communications anticipates a minimal increase of approximately .02% in its revenues or approximately \$250,000 annually.

A complete copy of the "Rate Period Specific Billing" tariff is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission.

**NEW RULES FOR 1985**

January 1 is the starting point for the requirement that adequate "contemporaneous records" must be kept to substantiate deductions taken for business usage of computers, airplanes, automobiles, trucks, boats, and other such property. Contemporaneous records are those that are kept at the time the equipment usage occurs rather than being summarized or estimated at a later date.

Taxpayers who do not have such logs or diaries giving specific data to support the tax benefits they claim will be denied the credits or deductions and may even be subject to penalties for negligence. Those who are affected by this change should begin their recordkeeping immediately; any delay could mean lost benefits.

The IRS says that individuals must charge a minimum interest rate on contracts, or the IRS will assign ("impute") an even higher interest rate. The government's concern over interest rates used in sales contracts stems from the fact that interest income is fully taxed while the principal portion of a contract is often preferentially taxed as long term capital gains. Sellers, therefore, are inclined to accept a lower interest rate in order to get a higher selling price.

A new law applies temporary "imputed" interest rates to sales effective January 1 through June 30, 1985. A seller must charge at least 9% interest when the borrowed amounts are \$2,000,000 or less or a 10% rate will be imputed (except for sales of new personal property). When borrowed amounts exceed \$2,000,000, a blended rate is used to determine whether additional interest will be imputed. This blended rate involves a weighted average of 9% on the first \$2,000,000 and 110% of the "applicable federal rate" on amounts over \$2,000,000. The law states some exceptions to the general rules.

# First National Bank Now Open





## Cotton Classing

Local cotton prices were weak to mostly steady in slow trading during the week ending January 18th; according to B.B. Manly, Area Director of the U.S.D.A. Cotton Classing Office in Abilene. Cotton sold at 200 to 650 points over CCC loan values, mostly at around 500 points over the loan. Grade 42, staple 31, 35 to 49 mike cotton sold at 51½ to 53 cents per pound. Cotton seed prices paid farmers ranged from 85 to 105 dollars per ton.

Producers made good progress harvesting cotton in areas north and northwest of Abilene. In

some areas the harvest has been practically completed with the exception of scrapping operations. About 19,000 samples were classed last week, which brought the seasonal total to 168,000 classed.

The quality of cotton classed during the past week was slightly lower than that of the previous week for several quality factors. Grades have been 31 percent white and 66 percent light-spotted this season. Less than three percent has graded as spotted in spite of an unusually high amount of rain fall during the harvest season. Grade 42

accounted for 35 percent of the samples classed this season. Twenty percent were grade 52, 14 percent were grade 51, and 13 percent were grade 41. About 32 percent of the total classing have been reduced in grade because of bark or grass content. About 76 percent have miked 35 to 49, and the average mike has been 37.4. Fiber length has averaged 32.1, with 25 percent staple 31, 24 percent staple 32, 20 percent staple 33, and 14 percent staple 34. Strength tests have averaged 24.6 grams per tex breaking strength for the season.

The second bid opened was from Bob and Bobby Nobel of Colorado City, whose total for the project was in the amount of \$480,820.20, to be completed in 270 consecutive calendar days.

Zack Burkett and Company of Graham was the third bid opened, and they offered to do the work for \$710,250.45, in a total of 150 days.

West Texas Construction, Inc., of Abilene offered a bid of \$712,673.10, and allowed 240 days for the project's completion.

And, the J.H. Strain and Sons Construction Company of Tye offered the amount of \$488,881.60 for the project, with completion to be done in 210 consecutive calendar days.

The lowest base bid was from Bob and Bobby Nobel of Colorado City, and Martin told Nobel that the bids would be taken under advisement at the City

Council meeting which was to be held Tuesday night.

Some of the Deductive Alternatives which the city and contractor must decide upon will include concrete work on the low water crossings, taking out the rip-rap in the channel, and seeding with grass for 14 acres. On this particular alternative, the City Council will only accept the seeding after the root system of the grass has taken hold, so it will not be lost in a hard rain.

The money for the project is being supplied in part from the U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development, and also by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept., according to City Manager Bob Baker.






