New Postal Facility To Open Next Week

Haskell residents will begin using a new Post Office next week according to local Postmaster Joe Alves.

Alves said the move to the new facility located at 201 S. First Street will be completed over the weekend and will be open for business Tuesday, Feb. 19. One reason the move was scheduled this weekend was because of a holiday next Monday in observance of George Washington's birthday. Regular box section delivery will be offered Monday at the new facility.

The new facility was built and will

be owned by the U.S. Postal Service instead of renting or leasing a facility as had been done in the past. The new building contains 5400 square feet as compared to 3200 square feet in the present building. Other improvements include additional parking, a larger number of boxes and improved loading dock facilities.

Cost of the new facility was approximately \$400,000.00.

Alves asks for the cooperation of local residents during the change. "It will take us some time to get organized in our new facility and we

need the help and understanding of our customers". Many of the box numbers will change when the move

is completed and Alves asks that all businesses and individuals whose box number has changed please notify magazines, newspapers and

other regular mailers of their new box numbers as soon as possible. Change of address forms are available at the post office.

Any person who has a problem with their keys to their box is asked to notify the postmaster.

Principal's Contracts Renewed By School Board Members Thurs.

The Haskell Board of Trustees met in a regular session on Thursday Feb. 7 at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building.

The call to order was issued by David Davis at 7:36 p.m., and Roger Moeller moved that the minutes of three previous board meetings be approved. This action was seconded by Pat Henry, and was passed.

The resignation of three board members were accepted by the Board, those resignations being from Jerry Hannsz, Sammy Larned and Max McMeans.

In the resignation from McMeans, it was stated that his resignation was due to the fact that he no longer lived in the school district, and that it, "had nothing to do with Mr. Lanier or anything that is going on."

In the resignation of Jerry Hannsz, Jerry asked that Mr. Lanier and the Board members accept his resignation, saying that he had "enjoyed serving on the board."

In Sammy Larned's resignation, he just stated that he was resigning as vice president of the school board and as a trustee.

Pat Henry moved that the resignations be accepted and the

second came from Mike Guess.

Then, board members voted to reorganize the board, and David Davis was selected as president, with Mike Guess as secretary.

In other matters, Pat Henry asked the Board's attorney, Royce Adkins, if the school board would be required to appoint three new members. The attorney said that this was not necessary.

The March meeting of the school board was set for March 12th. It was originally set to be held during the Spring Break. The motion was made by Mike Guess, and seconded by Roger Moeller, with an unanimous vote.

The board voted to amend the election order for the upcoming school board election, and instead to have the following places on the ballot: a one year term, unexpired; a two year term, unexpired; and three two year expired terms.

Persons interested in filing for any one of these positions, need to be sure that they stipulate which of the terms they are filing for when filing.

Next, the board members were to set a date for the hearing on the contract of Supt. James Lanier.

The school board then went into an Executive session at 7:54 p.m. to discuss this matter.

At 8:39 p.m., the board room was reopened to the visitors who were present, and Mike Guess moved that, "at the request of James Lanier, the request for the hearing has been cancelled."

Roger Moeller seconded this motion, and it was approved by an unanimous vote.

Mr. Lanier said in a statement regarding this action, "We're not trying to run something by...we've reached a compromise."

In a resignation from Business manager Patricia Sams, the board accepted her resignation, effective March 1. Mrs. Sams will be moving to Slaton, Texas.

The action on the resignation was so moved by Pat Henry and seconded by Mike Guess, and was approved by the board.

Pat Henry said, during the meeting, that because some people might not know that there would be an opening, that a special meeting be called by the board, just to interview persons for the position of business manager.

The contracts of principals Clayton Neal and Bill Blakley were renewed in a motion introduced by Pat Henry, and seconded by Roger Moeller, following this recommendation by Supt. Lanier.

Both were rehired.

City Council Discusses Items At Tuesday Night Session

The Haskell City Council met at 7 p.m., Tuesday night in the Council Room of the City Hall. All of the councilmen were present, as were Mayor Abe Turner, City Manager Bob Baker, and City Atty. Joe Thigpen.

After the preliminary business of the minutes, the rate increase proposed by Lone Star Gas was look at by the Council.

Council members decided to ask the Railroad Commission for a ruling on the rate increase. Lone Star Gas officials asked the council if they could come back in 30 days and offer the city a counter-proposal for a lesser increase amount, and they are set to do that.

Mayor Pro Tem Larry Gilliam handled the business on the matter of naming a bank depository for the city.

The First National Bank of Haskell was awarded the bid for the depository of City funds by the Council.

Mayor Abe Turner and City Atty. Joe Thigpen did not enter into any discussion on this matter, as they are involved in the local banking industry, one as a president, and the other as a director.

The City's CD's will be handled by both of the local banks, it was decided, as long as the rates are competitive.

The election of April 6 was set by the Council. Three aldermen: Jerry Stocks, Joe Cortez, and Darrell Smith, will be coming to the end of their terms on the City Council in April. Stocks has refiled for the Council.

The election judge was named as Sue Pate, with Desmond Dulaney as alternate judge, and Bob Baker as the absentee clerk.

Council members voted to pay the judges \$5.00 per hour, and the clerks \$4.00 per hour.

Clerks will be named by the respective judges.

Bill Lane, Sr., and E.J. Stewart

were appointed by the Council to serve on the Zoning Commission. Charles Thornhill was named as the new chairman.

Mayor Abe Turner will be signing the documents for the Creek Project on Thursday, Feb. 14, at 1:30 p.m. in the City Hall. The mayor was previously given authority to do this.

City Manager Baker said that he anticipated that the city's insurance would be cancelled as of March 10, because the company which they were going through, St. Paul Insurance, no longer wanted to insure emergency vehicles. This policy was issued through the Lanco Insurance Agency in Haskell. Baker said that he will try to find another company, locally, who might carry the city's policy, but if he could not, he would look into the policies offered the city by the Texas Municipal League. A special called meeting is likely to be held prior to March 10 in order for the council to address the insurance issue.

The purchase of a used police vehicle, being purchased from the Dept. of Public Safety is in the works for the council. The cost of the vehicle is \$4250, and will be replacing a 1980 model.

One hundred rollable dumpsters have been ordered by the city to accommodate the elderly and the handicapped who will have a hard time taking their trash out, Baker said. These should be delivered in 60 days at the latest.

These dumpsters will be issued to the elderly-handicapped on a need-priority basis.

As Baker told the council, "There are some people who just cannot take out their trash, because they are physically unable. We (the City) need to make sure that they are taken care of, and that their trash gets taken care of, even if it means a special pick up."

The City will be making application with Community Development for a \$500,000 block

grant, which will be used to obtain street improvements, waterline improvements, and drainage improvement for the southwestern portion of Haskell. A consulting firm from Abilene, Randolph-Gilbreth and Assoc., will be making the application for the city in June. The city made a similar application last year.

They attend the First Baptist Church in Weinert. Many friends and relatives attended the reception for the couple where everyone enjoyed the afternoon.

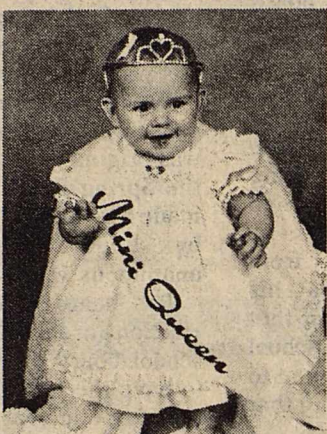

Over the past several years, concerned citizens have been putting pressure on our schools and state government to improve our educational system. Hence, the birth of H.B. 72. With its conception came reforms with new and increased expenses in our school systems.

More recently, tax bases across the state have decreased in value which in turn reduces the revenues of our school districts and state government. Then comes a bill from our state legislature to increase taxes.

In the introduction stage, there is a bill to close or consolidate schools with enrollments of either 250 or 500. I have heard both figures and do not feel the figure is relevant in this particular letter. What is relevant is that the state is wanting to close or

consolidate schools that in their own preference want to stay open. The reasons for this consolidation bill are many yet the main theme is to cut educational costs.

What infuriates people of small communities beyond imagination is the attack this proposed bill is making in their way of life, children, homes, and above all their freedom. Their freedom to choose whether they have a school or not. Their freedom to decide where their children attend school or their freedom to control their own way of life.

Many will agree that small schools are not economically efficient. If economics is the only thing you consider, yes, small schools should be closed. Our children are far more important than the almighty dollar and many things need to be considered. I am sure our legis-

lators are aware of these considerations.

If H.B. 72 and the bill to consolidate small schools control our schools in the future, many changes will occur in the way of life in our state. In the next 20 to 30 years, small towns of 1,000 people or less will be nonexistent. School building construction and bus manufacturing will be the businesses to have in the 1980's and 1990's. Homes and personal property in small towns can be bought with nothing down and pick up the payments. What we will all miss mostly is the

down to earth, well-rounded education our children receive in small town schools.

Citizens of Texas, we need to put our finger in the dike. The next time our state needs school reform or budget cuts in the next 10, 20, or 30 years, what enrollment figure will they shoot for? One thousand or maybe 1,500 kids. Think about it and act by contacting your representative and expressing your concern.

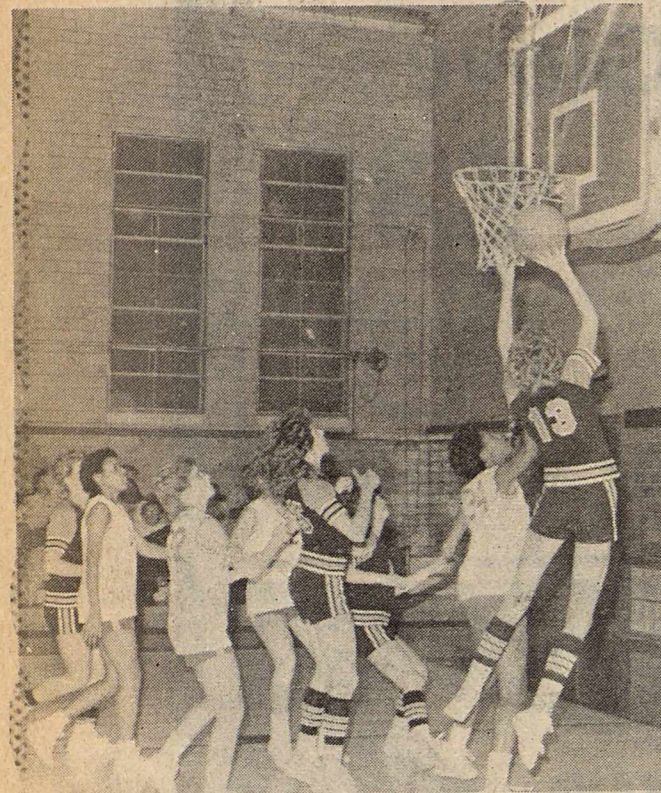

WHAT'S YOUR BUSINESS FORM?

Smart business people periodically review their business form (corporation, partnership, individual) to determine that they are getting the best tax breaks. Changes in the tax laws and in the profitability of your company determine the "form" your business needs.

One must weigh the advantages and disadvantages of tax and non-tax factors of a specific form of business. For example, the overall tax cost of operating as a partnership may be less for a particular business than operating as a corporation. On the other hand, a corporation offers several non-tax benefits not available to partnerships.

A common complaint of partners and sole-proprietors is that they are required to pay income tax on company profits even though they leave the money in the company for expansion. In the corporate form, the corporation pays its own income taxes. However, if the corporation sustains losses, these will be unavailable for the owners to take on their individual tax returns to offset other income.

There are two main disadvantages to being incorporated. First, the increase in payroll taxes may be greater than the other benefits to be gained. Second, there is a concern for "double taxation." A corporation must pay taxes on its profits, and when those profits are ultimately distributed to the shareholders, the shareholder will pay taxes on the dividends. With proper planning, small companies can avoid any serious problem with double taxation.

A type of "half-way" point between a partnership and a corporation is the "Sub-Chapter S" corporation. This is a legal corporation which for income tax purposes has elected to be taxed somewhat like a partnership.

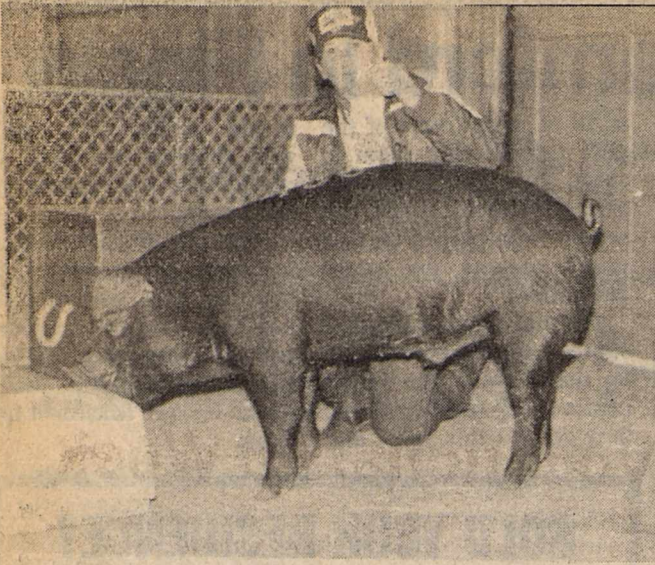

VA Payment Recipients Must File Income Report

A large number of veterans and other recipients of disability and death pension benefits from the Veterans Administration will fail to receive their regular payment on February 1, 1985. According to C.H. Herren, Veterans Service Officer for Haskell County, failure to receive the benefit payment will probably be related to the annual income report which is required by the Veterans Administration each year.

On November 1, 1984, all veterans, as well as widows and children of veterans, in receipt of disability or death pension from the VA received an annual income questionnaire card. This income report had to be completed and returned to the VA prior to January 1, 1985, or benefits would be terminated. Many of these pension recipients either lost the income report card, or failed to complete and return it by the deadline date, thus no benefit payment was sent on February 1, 1985.

Those who failed to return the income card can still do so and be reinstated if their entitlement continues. If the income card cannot be found at this time, a substitute reporting form may be obtained from

your local Veterans Service Officer of from any office of the Veterans Administration. Under current law, benefit payments cannot be resumed until the required annual income report is received showing all 1984 income and the anticipated income from all sources in 1985. In addition, if the annual accounting is not received by the VA, it is possible that an overpayment will be declared covering all benefits which were paid during 1984. It is, therefore, most important that the VA be provided with the annual income report as soon as possible.

Seniors, juniors and their parents are urged to attend the meeting.

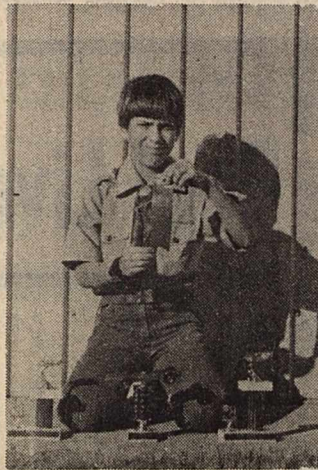

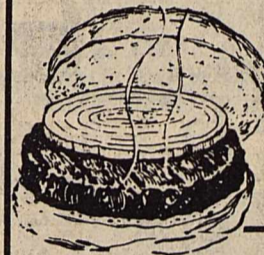
