Indians Drop Bi-District To Seagraves By One Point

In what could only be termed as a heartbreaker of a loss, the Haskell Indians lost to the Seagraves Eagles, Friday night, in their bi-district bid.

With a final score of 55-54, the Indians ended their basketball season with a 25-2 season record.

Scoring leader for the Haskell boys was senior Shane Hadaway, who had 30 points. He was followed by seniors Robert Ivey with 12, Ricky Rojas with 8, and Todd Harris with 4.

Haskell led most of the ballgame. The Indians were ahead by one, 16-15, at the end of the first period, and 31-29 at the half. In the third period, the Eagles came back and tied the score at 39, then they held on to stop Haskell by a single point, 55-54.

Shane Hadaway made a last second shot, which made the margin only one point. Fans watched as the shot entered the hoop just as the buzzer sounded.

For Coach Jim Dan Raughton,

the year, and this game in particular, has been bittersweet.

City Council Tables Rate Hike-Airport Bids

The Haskell City Council met Tuesday night in the Council Room of the City Hall.

Mayor Abe Turner called the meeting to order, and Councilman Larry Gilliam gave the invocation.

The minutes of the Feb. 12 meeting were read and approved.

The first item of business was discussion of the Lone Star Gas Company proposed rate increase.

In two previous meetings, the council discussed with representatives from Lone Star Gas a proposed increase of 2.01%. City Councilmen did not approve the increase at their last meeting. Lone Star Gas then asked to present an alternative proposal at this meeting.

Councilmen seemed to be reluctant to approve the increase since they felt that the consumers who used the least amount of gas would be paying the highest amount of the increase.

The rate hike request was tabled until the next council meeting on March 12, so that City Attorney Joe Thigpen could look over the proposals.

Bids were opened for the airport renovation project. There were eight bids offered on the job. David Todd, an engineering consultant, was on hand to open and read the bids. Base bids ranged from 105,553.50 to 144,520.50. Alternate bids ranged from 143,652.16 to 177,523.50.

No bid was officially accepted at the council meeting, because the TAC officials wanted to go over the base bids and the alternate bids and decide which would be the best ones for the city. The project includes resurfacing and relighting the airport. About \$110,000.00 of the project will come from a TAC grant. The actual awarding of the bid will be done at the next meeting of the council.

Council members approved a zoning board recommendation that lots 3 and 4, outlot 0, be rezoned so that a machine shop could be put in at that location. Councilman Jerry Stocks made the motion seconded by Councilman Joe Cortez and unanimously approved by the council.

Mayor Abe Turner and the

Council approved a Proclamation setting March 2, as Texas Exes Day in Haskell. A proclamation to that effect was read by City Manager Bob Baker.

The city is still looking for an insurance company to cover emergency vehicles. Forms were sent to the Texas Municipal League, and another area insurance agency had been called as well, reported Bob Baker.

Council members discussed the condition and the problems they are facing with the city-owned pool. No action was taken on that matter, but they are expected to ask for bids for pool renovation, and other requirements.

Several departmental reports were given by Bob Baker.

It was mentioned that the first handicapped dumpster unit was delivered here Tuesday. It was put into place by Dave Miller, director of waterworks, and by City Manager Bob Baker.

The City of Haskell is attempting to hire a new police officer. Monnie Hise has resigned to accept a position with the Snyder police department at the end of the month.

State House To Hold Haskell County Day

State Representative Rick Perry (D-Haskell) has announced that the Texas House of Representatives will hold "Haskell County Day" next Tuesday, March 5.

The special event will begin with a reception in the Speakers Dining Room at 8:45 a.m. followed by the opening of the session at 10 a.m.

Highlights of the session will include the opening prayer by Jim Crain, minister of the Haskell Church of Christ, a resolution to be adopted by House members designating the day as Haskell County Day. Dr. Joe Thigpen will be designated as physician for the House during the day and the entire Haskell County delegation will be recognized.

During the reception, Haskell residents will have an opportunity to meet and visit with other Representatives and State officials.

A special tour of the Capital building for the Haskell County group will begin at 2 p.m. in the Rotunda. In addition to the regular tour of the building, members of the Haskell delegation will be greeted in the House chamber by Sergeant-at-arms Ron Hinkle and his assistant, Lee Parsley, who will explain the voting machines and all the Haskell people will be allowed on the floor.

A block of rooms has been secured at the Villa Capri at reduced rates for members of the Haskell County Delegation. Reservations may be obtained by calling toll free, 1-800-528-1234. To receive the special rates, the reservation clerk should be told that the room is with the "Haskell County Delegation". Rates are \$40.00 for a room with one person and \$50.00 for a room with two double beds no matter how many persons.

A presentation Texas Flag which has been flown over the State Capital will be presented to Haskell

County during the day by Rep. Perry.

Perry said the special day honoring Haskell County residents was scheduled with the hopes that a large group of people from across the county could attend and have a first hand chance to get "behind the scenes during a session".

"Throughout the campaign last year, we spent most of our time away from Haskell County trying to meet voters in the other parts of the District. We hope this special day will serve in some small way to show our appreciation to the many friends in Haskell County who were so supportive and understanding during the campaign," said Perry.

They have seen many of their employees come running from every corner, aisle, and counter when the Plectrons go off.

For those who pre-ordered, the cookies you have waited for will be delivered during this time. If you did not pre-order, there will be plenty for you to buy from your local Girl Scouts.

Seven varieties are available this year: Thin Mints, Shortbread, Caramel deLites, Peanut Butter Patties, Peanut Butter Sandwiches, Pecan Chocolate Chip, and Lemon Pastry Cremes. All sell for \$2.00 per box. They freeze well, so buy enough to enjoy year-round. Buy extra for the following delicious recipes:

Heavenly Cream Cake
1 cup heavy cream
1/2 cup instant cocoa mix
dash of salt
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
48 Girl Scout Shortbread Cookies

Whip cream, adding cocoa mix gradually. Beat in salt and vanilla until mixture is quite thick. Using about half of the cream, spread some of the mixture on each cookie and stack together side by side in a roll, placing on a platter or serving dish. Frost roll with remaining cream covering all of the outside. Store in refrigerator several hours or overnight. (Dessert improves, the longer it stands.) Slice diagonally. Serves about 8.

Brownie Pie
14 Girl Scout Thin Mint Cookies
3 egg whites
dash of salt
3/4 cup granulated sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

1/2 cup chopped nuts
Roll cookies to crush. (If cookies are warm and chocolate soft, chill slightly before rolling.) Beat together egg whites and salt until soft peaks form. Add vanilla. Add sugar gradually, and beat until stiff peaks form. Fold in cookie crumbs and nuts. Pour in greased 9 inch pie pan. Spread evenly. Bake in a slow oven (325°F) for 35 minutes. Remove from oven and cool completely. Serve with whipped cream garnished with chocolate bits, or shaved chocolate. 8 servings.

Peanut Cream Dessert
1 cup whipped cream
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 tablespoons sugar
24 Girl Scout Peanut Butter Sandwich Cookies

Whip cream with vanilla and sugar. Spread some cream on each cookie and stack cookies, side by side to form a roll. Cover roll with remaining cream being sure to cover completely. Refrigerate several hours or over night. (The longer this dessert stands, the better it gets.) To serve, spoon some of the roll onto a dessert plate. May be topped with more whipped cream and crushed cookies. 8-10 servings.

Ice Cream deLite
Shortening
1/2 cup chopped almonds, toasted
1 cup chopped Girl Scout Caramel deLite Cookies
1 Quart vanilla ice cream, softened
1/2 cup nondairy whipped topping (thawed)
Generously coat inside of 5-cup mold with shortening; press in chopped almonds. Place in freezer. Meanwhile, stir chopped Caramel deLite Cookies and whipped

topping into ice cream. Carefully spoon into prepared mold. Freeze. Unmold and ready to serve.

Layered Lemon Pastry Pie
1/4 cup butter or margarine
3/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup lemon juice
Dash salt
3 slightly beaten eggs
1 quart vanilla ice cream, softened
1 9-inch Graham Cracker Crust

One package Girl Scout Lemon Pastry Creme Cookies

In medium saucepan melt butter or margarine; stir in sugar, lemon juice, and salt. Cook and stir until sugar dissolves. Add eggs. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened; chill. Place 1 pint ice cream in graham cracker crust. Spread with half of the chilled lemon sauce and top with crumbled Lemon Pastry Creme Cookies. Freeze pie till firm. Repeat layers with remaining ice cream, lemon sauce and crumbled cookies. Freeze until firm.


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Double Ring Wedding Vows Unites Schoepf, Daniels

Texas foundations give away more than \$362 million a year, according to the recently published eighth edition of The 1984 Hooper Directory of Texas Foundations. The Hooper Directory, published by the Funding Information Center in San Antonio, is the primary tool for non-profit organizations seeking information about Texas foundations.

The Hooper Directory is the only statewide directory of foundations in Texas. Each entry lists the foundation's assets, grants, income and contact person.

The current edition also includes expanded listings on over 800 of the largest

foundations in the state. The listings now include information about funding priorities, application procedures, grant restrictions, and complete lists of trustees. A new user's guide explains how to begin researching foundations and gives basic information about foundations in Texas.

The Directory was compiled from the 1983 Form 990's, the tax return each foundation is required to file with the IRS and the Texas Attorney General's Office. Additional information was gathered from a survey sent to all foundations in Texas. For the first time, this

information is available on a computer database. The creation of the computer database was made possible by generous grants from the Sid W. Richardson Foundation, the Hohlitzelle Foundation and the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health.

The essays must be postmarked no later than April 15, 1985.

The essay is limited to a maximum of 400 words and no letters of reference will

be accepted for consideration in the contest.

In addition to being a senior in high school, they must maintain a "B" average or better and plan to continue studies at a school of journalism. Once the winners are selected they must be enrolled in at

least three hours of journalism each semester he or she receives assistance.

The scholarships will be divided into payments of \$250 per semester for two semesters for two students. The essays will be judged by the Texas Press Association.

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Centennial Celebration Is Set By Texas Ex Students

A Centennial Tex-Mex Buffet and Celebration will mark the Grand Finale, on Saturday, March 2, of the 150th Anniversary of Texas Independence Day. After months of planning by members of the Jones-Haskell County Chapter of the Ex-Student's Association of The University of Texas at Austin. The event will take place at the Community Room of the Haskell National Bank, at 6:30 p.m.

A great deal of tradition and sentiment surrounds March 2 on the local level. In 1900, the Ex-Students Association adopted a resolution that provided that whenever two Ex Students of The U of T shall meet on March 2, they shall sit and break bread and pay tribute to the intuition which made their education possible.

One hundred years ago, in May of 1885, The University's first graduates gathered for the first Texas Exes meeting. They wanted to provide exceptional opportunities for the students attending UT and following for future graduates. The Association began with 13 alumni, and has grown to service more than 44,000 members with Texas Exes clubs all across the US and abroad. All funds received by these organization are from contributions and these charitable contributions go toward scholarships for area students who plan to attend UT/Austin.

The Jones Haskell-Chapter of ESA is made up of members and friends of the University Systems and represents every town and community in both counties.

As a special tribute to the 100th birthday of ESA/UT/A, Jones Haskell has invited "Mr. Texas EX", Crockett English, formerly of Haskell, to be the featured guest.

As a young man growing up in Haskell, it was evident to those who were close to Crockett, that he was destined for a life in the public eye. A Haskell native, he promoted free enterprise through his work with the family owned dairy. Crockett, Covell Adkins, Jack and John Kimbrough, delivered milk from

the English family dairy to families in Haskell. For recreation, they skated, ice--in winter--, in English Park, and played basketball at other times of the year at the first known indoor basketball court in Haskell County.

During the school year, the emphasis was on football and the team, which listed those dedicated Haskell Indians, is a legend to those who can remember "the good old days".

When asked how they remember Crockett English, his friends and acquaintances speak of him as "Mr. Personality, full of good will and optimism, as far back as the early thirties, when there was little about which to be optimistic.

Graduation, in 1935, took Crockett to Austin, where he became associated with The University of Texas and from that time on, his love for, and dedication to the principles it endows, made him the epitome of "the old school spirit."

Since 1935, Crockett has made so many contributions to UT/Austin and the Ex-Students Association that he is sought after as the featured guest all across Texas. Crockett and his wife, Jerry, come in contact every year with hundreds of Texas Exes. They are tireless workers on many ESA committees, although, The Affable Englishes, as Crockett and Jerry are known, say "The Ex-Student's Association is our big hobby."

A recent feature article in the UT/Austin ESA magazine "Alcalde" picture Crockett and Jerry permanent features at the Association Center which is directly across the street from Memorial Stadium. The Englishes are on hand early and late on football Saturdays and at almost all of the special events making people feel at home.

Crockett is a retired manager of a branch of Hemphill Book Stores and was always available to the students as a friend and sympathetic listener. He has been the recipient of the Ex-Student's Association Top Hand Award given

to outstanding volunteers and the Honorary T-Award from the Men's Intercollegiate Athletics Association.

Jerry English was with the Red Cross during World War II, and was Mrs. Beauford Jester's social secretary at the Governor's Mansion and later worked in the UT Registrar's Office. Both Englishes wanted an on-going relationship that would last with the ESA, the people on campus and The University, and they have fulfilled this desire through their leadership in the Association's Travel Committee and Host Committee for Association events. They have served as Cotton Bowl hosts for ten years.

He does not limit his volunteer work to UT but is active in Civic and Community work. The Englishes call Leander home now; Crockett is the current President of the Leander Rehabilitation Center Volunteer Association. Leander is only a few miles from Austin so he is able to commute. He is twice past president of the Rotary Club, Past President of the Austin Cyclic Fibrous chapter and is active in the Presbyterian Church. Both Englishes list as one of their hobbies "travel". They have been on more than 20 Flying Longhorn trips and often act as escorts, entertaining on board bus trips with quizzes and prizes he proves to amuse the travelers.

Known as a fund raiser "par excellence" Crockett is called upon to give of his time and talents in one of the Association's primary areas of concern, raising money for scholarships. Whatever they do, the Englishes believe in having fun. And in this belief, they do their best to see that everyone else is having fun, too.

The Jones-Haskell Chapter of ESA, UT/Austin, members and friends, are planning to welcome the Englishes to Haskell on Texas Independence Day and Texas Exes Day, March 2, 1985, and for Crockett, it will be "Welcome Home, Mr. Texas Ex."

4-H Livestock Entered At Houston

Twenty four 4-H club members will have livestock entered in the Houston Livestock Show, which is set for Feb. 26 through March 3.

The following 4-H members from Haskell County will be responsible for show animals in the Houston Livestock Show:

Chad Ballard, Mindy Ballard, Brad Bevel, J. Brad Bevel, Jimmy Burson, Patrick Burson, Chris Carver, Missy Davis, Chad Gibson, Shawn Gilliland, Dalyn Gilly, Kim Gilly, Joey Kimbrough and Kathleen Kutch.

County Extension Agent, Max Stapleton, is the advisor for the 4-H Show, all junior market livestock entrants.

Premium monies available for open and junior show exhibitors top more than half a million dollars in prize money and in premium auction prices paid in excess of market value. Prior to the Show, volunteer committee members contact auction buyers to guarantee that each market animal sold in the four junior auctions brings a price above the current market value of the animal.

Junior livestock competition includes beef heifers, dairy cattle, breeding sheep, goats, commercial steers, breeding rabbits, market lambs, poultry, swine and steers. For the second year, there will be carcass contests for the market lamb, swine and steer shows.

Beginning with the 1985 Fairgrounds in Brenham on Feb. 23-24. Sifted barrows

from Texas A&M University as poults from the same hatch. Weight limits are then eliminated in the market turkey show due to the standardization and control this rule imposes on potential entries.

Once again, in the market lamb, barrow and steer shows, the three-judge system will be used. This system helps insure selection of an animal based on production, feeding and carcass merit.

Junior market barrows were sifted at the Washington County Fairgrounds in Brenham on Feb. 23-24. Sifted barrows

were then loaded directly for sale through normal livestock auction consignment. Non-sifted barrows proceed to Houston and the livestock show competition.

In addition to its position as the world's largest livestock show, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is also the largest donor of agricultural scholarships in the nation. A total charity benefiting youth and education, the Show currently has 885 students on scholarships and annually commits \$1.9 million to its regular scholarship program.

However, this was just a sample of some of the other activities which the Youth Council and the young people of East Side Baptist are planning ahead.




