High Speed Chase Ends In Jailing Of Suspect

A 46 mile high speed chase March 22 throughout most of northwest Haskell County ended in the arrest of a 24 year old Oklahoma man.

Calvin David King, of Sayer, Ok., is currently in jail in Haskell County awaiting local charges and extradition to Oklahoma on felony warrants.

The chase began about 3:55 p.m. when Benjamin Sheriff's Office radioed Haskell County of a possible drunk driver between Munday and Haskell on U.S. 277.

DPS Trooper II James Davis heard the call and met the suspect vehicle about 2 miles north of Haskell. The vehicle failed to stop and the chase continued south to the First Baptist Church, where the suspect turned west. The vehicle then proceeded north on Av. L and west on F.M. 2163. The chase continued on farm/market roads and dirt roads throughout the northwest part of Haskell County.

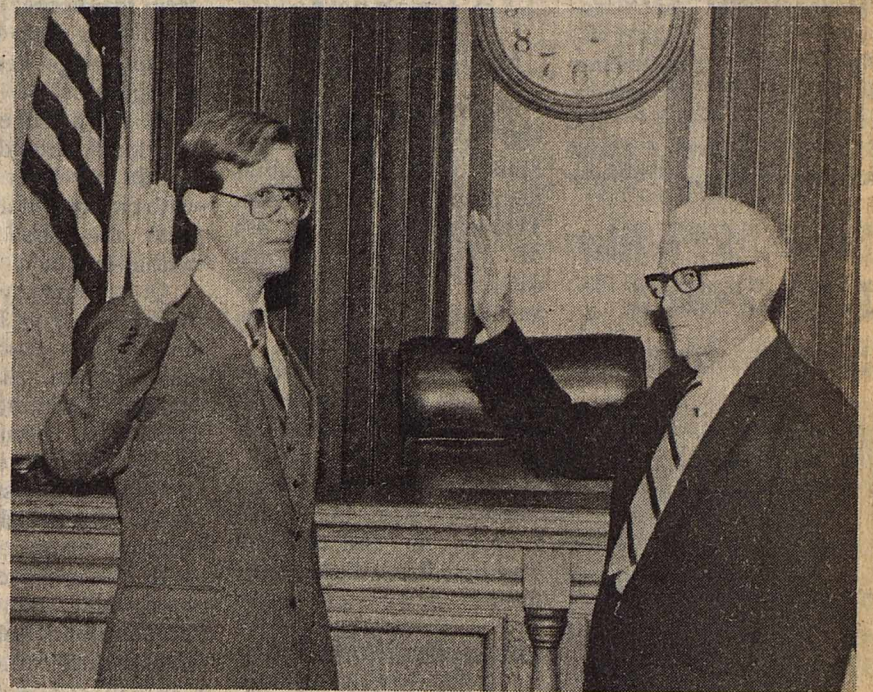

Eggs & Ham Need Special Care

Hard-cooked eggs and ham are familiar foods that get special treatment at Easter. It's this "special treatment" of decorating and hiding Easter eggs or serving a fresh ham for a large family gathering that raises questions about food safety, says nutritionist Dr. Dymple Cooksey.

Q: Is it safe to eat the hard-cooked eggs used in an Easter egg hunt?
A: Yes, but they must be handled properly. First, cool hard-cooked eggs in cold water immediately after cooking and then

refrigerate until they cool all the way through. If any eggs crack while cooking, don't use them for the hunt since bacteria can easily get through the openings and contaminate the eggs.

Q: How long can ham be safely refrigerated?
A: Uncured ham will keep in the refrigerator from 3 to 5 days. It will keep in the freezer from 4 to 8 months.



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
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WHAT'S A FAIR PRICE?

A seasoned land auctioneer used to begin each of his auction sales with the phrase "We're here to get as much as we can - you're here to buy it as cheap as you can - what am I bid?"

So what is a "fair" price on real estate? The term used by mortgage lenders, appraisers, and real estate brokers to identify a "fair" price is "fair market value". The definition of "fair market value" is "that price which a buyer is willing to pay and at which price the seller is willing to sell, both parties being knowledgeable about the subject property and neither party being under any time pressure to buy or sell".

A good starting point for determining a fair price might be an opinion of value, also known as a "Competitive Market Analysis".

Such an analysis uses information on similar properties which are 1) "For Sale" now, 2) already "Sold", and 3) "Expired" (properties which did not sell). Properties "For Sale" now indicate what the competition is asking. Properties already "Sold" show what buyers are willing to pay. And properties which have "Expired" indicate what buyers are not willing to pay. By comparing similar properties in each of the three categories it's possible to arrive at an educated opinion of "fair market value".

Their excitement had been replaced by varying degrees of stolid plodding through activities perceived designated to demonstrate the extent of their personal failure. The effect had been that rather than being taught the curriculum they had been taught that they couldn't learn. This sad state of events multiplied by the millions is the gravest problem of America's mass produced educational system.

Understanding that each child is unique and has value just because he was created in God and image, educators need to be content with being sure each child has mastery of basic life skills, and then emphasize that child's individual interests and talents to let him know that he is important and his contribution is valued.

Having been so fully involved in extra curricular activities, I fully oppose even the one week suspension of a student from such activity. What could be more harmful than to prevent a child from doing that which he finds most stimulating and enjoyable to force him to

concentrate on an area where he is already a failure. I would prefer that a student failing a class be given a week's grace to catch up before being

threatened by the loss of extra curricular privilege.

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METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through the meter device.
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
- (3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.

Sheltered Workshop Is Seeking Jobs For Clients

Employers!! Are there jobs each month that just really get you down? Do you just hate to have to lick all of those stamps, stuff all of those statements into envelopes, and seal them every month at statement time?

Have you ever thought, of asking the clients of the Haskell Sheltered Workshop to do these jobs for you?

The sheltered workshop is looking for jobs for their clients to do in the workshop, which is located at 10 North Avenue D. All of the clients who work there are specially trained to handle a variety of duties, and have experience in packaging, disassembly, collating, stapling, inserting papers, etc.

For the past two years or so they have been working with Trammell Bit and Spur Company, doing their leather wraps on the bits.

This workshop is under the guidance of the Texas Mental Health/Mental Retardation services and is directly supervised by the Abilene State School.

Mary Jennings is the workshop director, and has been for the past three years. She makes sure that the work which goes out from the workshop has been done properly and to the employers specifications.

The city and county helps fund the workshop in part.

The workshop has a board of directors and currently serving on the board is Charles Reed, president; Jerry Stocks, vice-president; Willie Faye Tidrow, sec./treasurer; Judge B.O. Roberson, Ronnie Chapman, Joe Cortez, Robert Baker, Sophie Hix, Mrs. Ila Corley of Rochester, and Joel Fox.

The original project for the handicapped was begun 13 years ago by the late Aubrey Headstream who started an arts and crafts program which ran half of a day, with a children's program the other half of the day.

Now, however, the State is beginning to use the sheltered workshop as the opportune place to have the handicapped go for training, a place to develop social skills and to develop self esteem for having done a good job and earn some money at it.

The clients of the sheltered workshop earn piece work wages based upon the minimum wage for an average person.

Say for example, if the average worker can stuff 10 envelopes in one hour, and the workshop client can only do one an hour, he would earn 1/10th of the regular worker's wages, which at minimum wage would be about 33 cents per hour.

All of the jobs which are secured for the clients are evaluated by the officer of procurement of the Abilene State School and a time study is done on each one to determine the amount of time involved and the cost involved for the employers and the workshop manager.

Haskell's workshop tries to foster in its clients the values of punctuality, good work habits, work tolerance, and social and work skills.

"These clients can do just about any job if it is repetitive, and does not require detailed thought process. They are supervised continuously and none of their work goes out before it is inspected and scrutinized," Mary Jennings said.

Right now they are in need of jobs to do. The

clients can do many tasks which most of us consider to be mundane, such as stuffing statements into envelopes, putting stamps on envelopes, stapling booklets together, and later in the year, they will be available to shell peas.

Since the first of this year, they have had pecans to shell, but this work is dwindling, and so they are needing other things to do.

This will be helping the clients earn an income, learn the value of a day's work for a day's pay and will also give the employers a break because the cost of labor won't be so high!

ARE THOSE EXTRAS TAXABLE? (Fringe Benefits)

Employers have found it easy to provide such fringe benefits for their employees as a company car, discounts on merchandise, free tickets to cultural and sports events, athletic facilities at the work place, and the like. The cost of fringe benefits was deducted by the employer but not taxable as income to the employee.

The 1984 Tax Reform Act makes it imperative for those giving and receiving fringe benefits to review the tax status of these benefits with an accountant. Effective January 1, 1985, the law specifies which fringe benefits can be excluded from income. Those not excluded under this law or prior law must be included in the employee's taxable income. The amount to be included in income is not the cost to the employer but rather the "fair market value" of the benefit. The employer is required to withhold income tax on taxable benefits, even those that are non-cash benefits. Other payroll taxes also apply to all taxable benefits.

The 1984 Tax Act lists six categories of non-taxable benefits:

- 1) Services that the employer provides to customers and which can be provided to employees at no substantial additional cost; for example, free or discounted plane tickets for airline employees.
- 2) Discounts on goods sold by the employer in his business; for example, retail merchandise.
- 3) Benefits which would be deductible by the employee if he paid for them himself; for example, business travel expenses or business club memberships.
- 4) Fringe benefits so small that keeping track of them would be unreasonable; for example, Christmas gifts or occasional meals provided for employees.
- 5) Athletic facilities provided on the employer's premises for the use of employees.
- 6) Reduced tuition provided to employees of educational institutions.

Superintendent's Views

Next Saturday, April 6, is the election day for school districts and cities. With the date falling on Easter weekend, there can be a tendency to neglect to vote. Yet it is very important for each of us to exercise our constitutional right and cast our ballot. Naturally, I can enumerate the reasons for voting in school elections better than other elections; therefore I will try to cover the main reasons as I view them why you need to vote.

The first reason is the fact that board members are dealing with the most important commodity of our community, our children. The school system in conjunction with the family and church, will play a profound role in the lives of young people. While board members are not directly involved with students, their policy making power can dictate the direction of the educational process. Policies adopted should bear the burden of careful study and serious, in-depth research to be sure that they create a learning atmosphere. Policies passed in haste in the heat of conflict can often reap severe consequences and place unbearable and nonbeneficial burdens on students. If students are the chief focus of the school system, then, it seems to me that all policies should be weighed by their effect on students and learning. Board members must be able to look at policies and situations and see any pitfalls which can create problems.

A second area in which board members must have qualifications is in the area of personnel management. Haskell ISD is one of the larger employers in the county with a payroll in excess of \$1,200,000. Haskell ISD has 82 total employees including administrators, teachers, paraprofessionals, and auxiliary personnel. The board can have a major effect on the lives and careers of each of these employees. Members should have the ability to be judgmental of overall performances and not narrow minded on individual issues. The State Legislature has protected at least some of these

people with House Bill 341; yet, boards still have the power to make decisions which can effect people and their future. Board members should have the capacity to eliminate personal feelings and prejudices from their decision making capacities.

A third area of importance to a board member is in the area of finances. The budget for Haskell ISD is close to \$2,000,000 per year. Of course, much of this is mandated by law with little decision to be made concerning its use. However, Haskell will raise approximately \$520,000 through taxes this year for the operation of the school. The board will and should have an important role in the spending and budgeting of these monies. The board has the obligation to see that these monies are used in a proper manner which will benefit the school philosophy and operation.

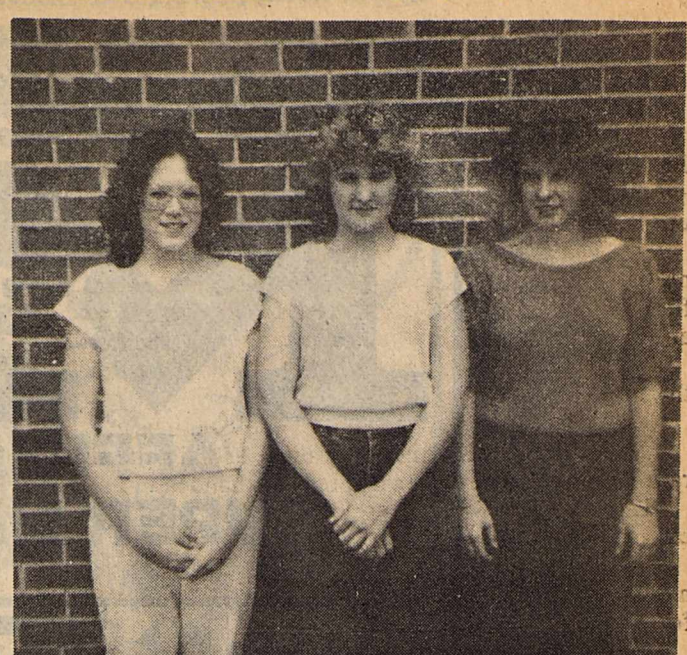
Board members have many other obligations such as serving as a grievance committee, helping the public understand the school programs and its purposes, overseeing the general development of the curriculum, etc. Yet we must remember that these people receive no pay and hold other positions to provide for their families. The time burden along requires a person who can budget his/her time effectively.

Haskell has a unique situation this year in that the electorate will be choosing five members. This election by itself can effect the operation of the school for years to come. However, 15 men have come forth to offer their services and efforts to the population. I truly believe that it is important that each of us study the men running for this most important office and go to the polls and VOTE.

The Haskell Co. Ambulance Memorial Fund needs your support. You never know when you or a loved one will need these services. What would happen if someday they weren't there because you didn't give your fair share? Think about it....

In Tuesday's action, the Comanches played against the Tomahawks, with the Chiefs going against the Warhoops, and the Sioux getting the bye.

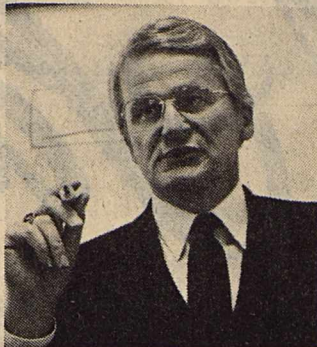
Thursday, action will

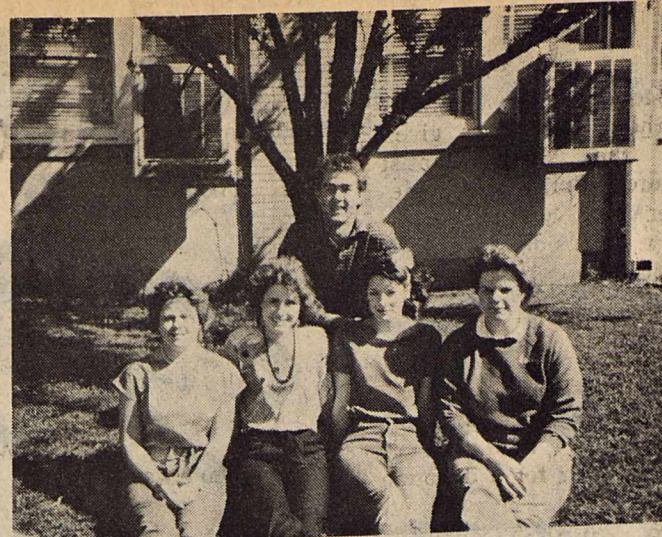
