Art Buchwald, in a recent syndicated column discussed editors from different viewpoints which included The Editor as he sees himself; as seen by his wife; as seen by the reporter; as seen by the publisher and as seen by the reader.

Not so surprising, the editor thought rather highly of himself, over-worked, underpaid, and always getting a bad rap.

Again not so surprising was the editor as seen by his wife. Wives only see editors at 2 in the morning while handing him the phone.

According to Buchwald neither publishers or reporters thought too highly of the editors thinking only of liable suits in the case of the publisher and of severely edited stories in the case of the reporter.

The real clincher came as Buchwald described the editor as seen by the reader: "Wears shirtsleeves in the office and polyester suits with unmatched pants and jackets to dinner parties.

Either looks like Jason Robards or Ed Asner, depending on whether you saw "All The President's Men" or watched "Lou Grant" on

television. He is responsible for all the bad news in the paper, especially the unfair and libelous articles about the reader's (A) political party, (B) religious affiliation or (C) favorite sports team. The editor is held accountable not only for printing the news but also for the news itself. He has too much power and you can't wait to see him cut down to size.

The columnist concluded with his opinion of an editor: "Forthright, brave, intelligent and honorable, the editor is not only a credit to his profession and his race, but the one indispensable person in a free and thriving democratic society."

Pretty lofty ideals for an editor but a thriving democracy is a two way street between a free press and an informed society. Only when readers become interested enough to get involved in society will a democracy thrive.

Editors, like all humans, have their faults and make mistakes.

Each of us can make our city, state and nation a better place by working together and keeping a positive attitude.

McLendon was charged with the shooting death of Wade Martin, 14, of Haskell on June 9, near Sylvestor. Martin was with McLendon, and an ex-stepbrother, Mike Douglas, at the time he was shot.

Commissioners Okay Purchase Of Air Coolers

Haskell's County Commissioners approved the purchase of two new evaporative air conditioners for the jail, in their regularly scheduled session, Tuesday, June 25.

The purchase of the new air coolers will come to approximately \$1,740. These are to be bought locally.

The progress report on the work being done at the jail was also given to the Commissioners by County Sheriff Johnny Mills and Commissioner Bud Turnbow.

The County Treasurer reported to the Commissioners on the senior citizens program.

Two requests for additional equipment for two of the precincts were to be advertised for bidding. In precinct four, bids are being advertised to purchase a new motor grade These bids will be opened at the Courthouse on July 8, at 10 a.m.

Precinct 2 is in the process of advertising for bids to purchase two 14 yard dump trucks, and these will be used vehicles, not new ones.

The Haskell County Appraisal Board budget was presented to the Commissioners and a copy of the yearly audit was also given.

All Haskell County citizens are asked to remember that the Courthouse will be closed July 4 in observance of Independence Day.

Four Indictments Handed Down By Haskell County Grand Jury

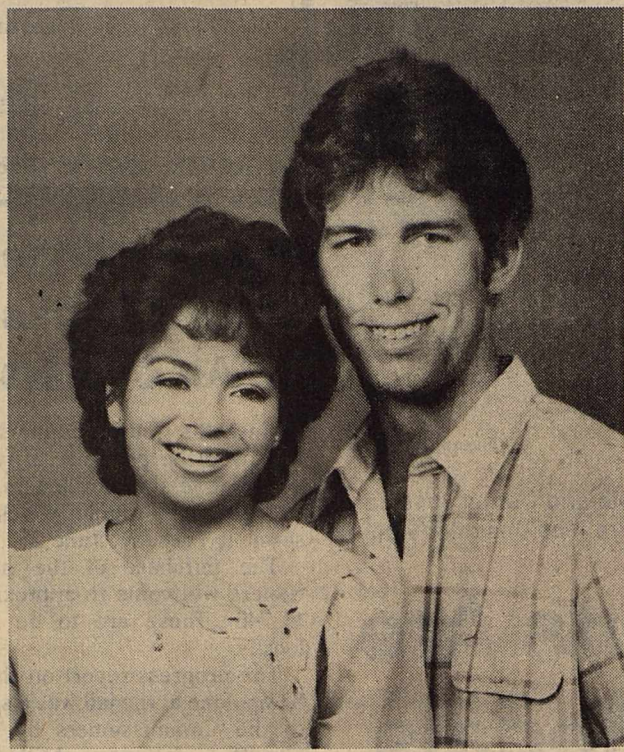

Conservation Viewpoints

USDA Soil Conservation Service
Assisting
Haskell Soil and Water
Conservation District

Two young men from Haskell are assisting local producers with conservation matters this summer. Monty Moeller is a student trainee with the Soil Conservation Service and Randall Frierson is working with SCS as a Conservation Technician for the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District.

Both Monty and Randall began work on May 28, just as the season for construction of summer practices began. They will be focusing much of their efforts towards conservation practices on cropland, with some range and pasture activities.

As a student trainee, Moeller will also participate in administrative training along with planning of complete conservation systems. Following his work and

training this summer he may be eligible for a future position with the SCS following graduation from Tarleton State University in May 1986.

Frierson will receive primarily the same training as Moeller with only slight differences. Employed by the Haskell SWCD, Frierson will assist primarily by staking and checking various conservation practices. After graduation from San Angelo State University in May 1986, Randall plans to work in business finance, possibly agriculture financing.

Monty and Randall have good agriculture backgrounds and understand the functions of agriculture and SCS. We are proud to have them available to assist county producers.

The View From Here

Haskell County, and its residents, are very fortunate to have such a high calibre ambulance service.

Many cities and counties much larger than Haskell would appreciate having the type of service that we all enjoy here.

Of course, most of us just take for granted that we have a fine ambulance service, and never really consider that it is the exception rather than the rule.

Casey Caldwell and Don Glandon, our two paramedics, along with the help of Dr. Wayne Cadenhead, M.D., have helped to bring intensive care out of the emergency rooms of the hospitals into the virtual living rooms of this county with the advent of the mobile intensive care unit.

Keep in mind that this development did not just happen...it was the desire of futuristic minded people who compose the Ambulance Service Board of Directors, as well as the efforts of the two paramedics and Dr. Cadenhead, that all of this became possible.

GOOD FAITH!

Have you ever heard of bargaining in "good faith"? Whenever real estate is sold it is said that the buyer and seller bargain in good faith until they reach an agreeable price and terms. During the so-called bargaining process, each seeks assurance that the other is bargaining in "good faith", that they are really a sincere buyer (or seller).

Over the years, a practice evolved of having the buyer put up a quantity of money (or other valuable) to show that his bargaining was "in earnest" (hence the term "earnest money") or "good faith" (hence, "good faith" earnest).

Today the term earnest money deposit is a common phrase used to designate the money tendered by the buyer. The more money tendered in "good faith", the more serious the buyer is thought to be. And although there is no set amount of money required by law to bind an agreement, a seller will generally give stronger consideration to an offer accompanied by a reasonable sum of money as opposed to an offer backed by little or no cash.

Since most real estate contracts call for the forfeiture of that deposit if the buyer fails to close the purchase, it is generally believed that a sincere buyer won't mind giving a deposit, while an unsure buyer won't want to risk a penny.

ASCS Urges Farmers To Report Acreages By July 15

All Haskell County farmers are asked to certify their 1985 planted, diversion, conservation reserve and other program acreages with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

"Certification is the procedure by which farmers report their program acreages to insure their eligibility for receiving the benefits of price support, deficiency payments and other farm program benefits," Glenn R. Brzozowski, County Executive Director, said.

In Haskell County, the final certification dates for program, other spring seeded crops and ACR are: All Crops—July 15. Cotton, Grain Sorghum, Corn, Guar and any other Spring Seeded Crops, ACR.

Brzozowski said that growers not participating in the 1985 programs

should report their acreages to insure future benefits and protect acreage bases.

After certification, the ASCS county office will select farms at random to verify that acreage reports are accurate and have aerial photographs available for farmers to identify their fields.

"Certification is particularly important to producers of quota crops such as peanuts. In addition to these crops, however, all other crop acreages must be reported," Brzozowski said.

Spring seeded crops may be certified at any time between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. "We encourage farmers to certify as soon as possible after planting and not wait until the deadline date to report their acres," the ASCS official said.

NOTICE OF INTENT TO IMPLEMENT RATES

As this is a new service offering, we are unable to determine the number of customers who may be affected. Currently, there are no known prospective customers. Until any customer utilizes this new offering, there will be no effect on the revenues of the telephone company, and in any event, the telephone company does not expect revenues to be affected by more than 2 1/2 percent. These proposed rates, where applicable, will provide tariffed local exchange access to customers who then will provide shared or resale services to tenants.

These proposed rates have been suspended by the Public Utility Commission of Texas and will become effective as proposed or modified by order of the Commission on a date to be determined by the commission.

The proposed rate schedule is on file with the Commission for public inspection and is also available at any business office of General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible. TAX PLANNING

LATE-FILING PENALTIES

If you filed your personal income tax return (1040) after April 15 without getting a valid extension, you face a late filing penalty. This penalty amounts to 5% per month of the unpaid tax due up to a maximum penalty of 25% of the unpaid tax. In addition to this late-filing penalty, you may also be subject to a penalty of 1/2 of 1% per month of your unpaid tax for not having 90% of your tax paid by April 15, even if you filed a valid extension. These penalties are in addition to the regular interest that is assessed on the balance due and the underpayment of estimated tax penalties.

The 5% per month late filing penalty can be excused if you can show that you had "reasonable cause" for late filing. Excuses that the Internal Revenue Service may accept as reasonable cause for late filing are as follows:

1. Death or serious illness of the taxpayer or a member of his immediate family.
2. Unavoidable absence of the taxpayer.
3. Destruction by fire or other casualty of the taxpayer's place of business or business records.
4. Delay was due to erroneous information given the taxpayer by the IRS.
5. A timely request for needed tax forms was not answered by the IRS.
6. The taxpayer personally visited an IRS office before the time to file, but was unable to meet with an IRS representative.
7. The return was filed on time but in the wrong IRS district office.
8. The taxpayer was filing for the first time and was ignorant of the law.

The IRS is not required to accept any excuse for late filing. The burden falls on the taxpayer to convince the IRS that the delay was the result of "reasonable cause". Your accountant deals with the IRS on a daily basis, thus he can be of great assistance in seeking to get penalties excused.

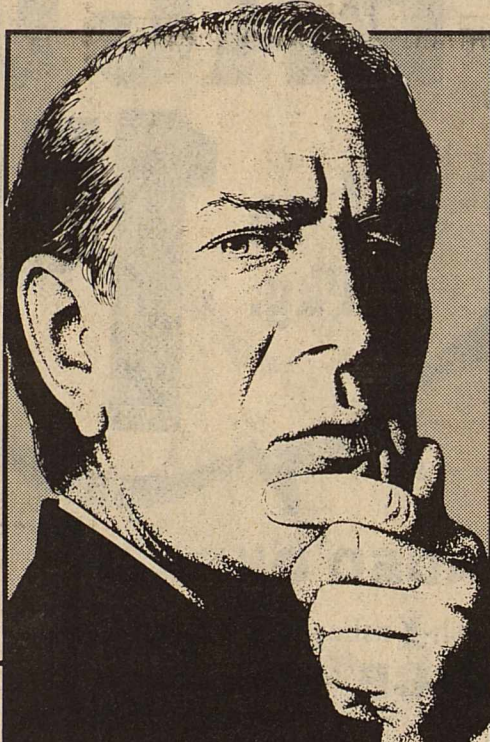

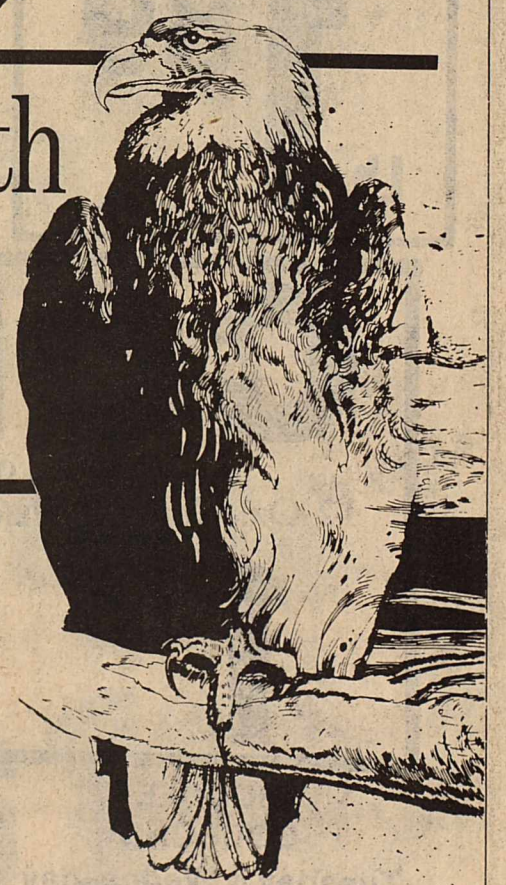

According to his grandmother here in Haskell, Mrs. Oleta Medford, the doctors said last week that Alan's tumor was dissolving and this caused them to believe that he was responding to the chemotherapy treatments.

Also an indication that the medication was working was that the white blood count had come up.

Mrs. Medford said that when the blood count is at a certain level, then Alan will be allowed to take another type of chemotherapy.

Also when the blood count rises to a certain level, the boy may be allowed to be transferred to the Ronald McDonald house, near the Children's hospital, where treatments can continue.

Alan will receive chemotherapy for 4-6 months steady, then, if the treatments continue to improve the condition, he will only have to take the medication periodically for three years.

According to the doctors in Fort Worth, the youngster had not had the cancer but perhaps only 8 weeks when it was diagnosed, but it had

already reached stage three.

However, the doctors also told family members that they felt that Alan would have a good chance of recovering from it.

"There are nine out of ten chances for recovery, the doctors said," replied Mrs. Medford.

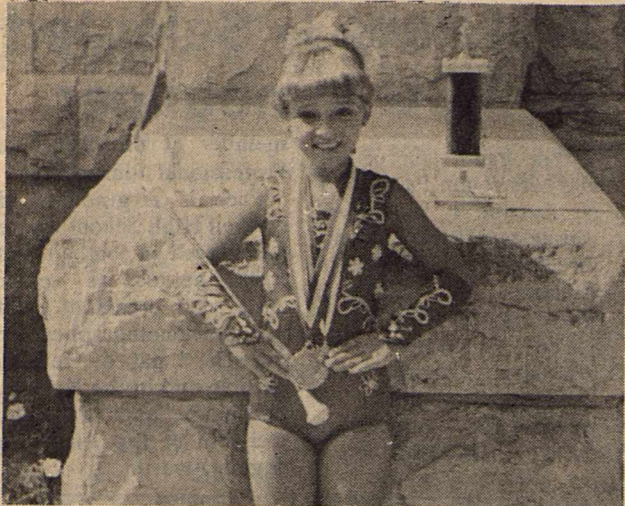
