# **Creek Project Half Over** At \$239,000 In Costs

With half of the project completed, the creek project is running some \$239,036.18 at the present time, with the grant from HUD in the amount of \$500,000.

According to City Manager Robert N. Baker, the contractors are expecting to have the project completed by the end of August, if the weather permits.

The major changes in the creek are that it has been completely rechanneled throughout the park, and other changes in the city include that there have been low water crossings installed in the place of box culverts, as well as there being one portion of a road permanently closed.

One bridge will be built, and that is located near the First National Bank.

The street which will be permanently closed will be located at North Second and Ave. K, where the road runs into the creek itself

crossings on South Ave. F and on Third Street so that some \$25,000 could be saved on the project by not having to install box culverts or bridges. Each bridge costs about \$25,000.

According to baker, when the workmen get up to the bridge located on Highway 380, there will not be any reason to close the traffic there because there will not be anything done to that particular bridge.

Running adjacent to the Rule highway are some sewer lines, which Baker said would not be moved or displaced, except that they will be building new piers for these.

A breakdown of costs for the project includes: advertising-\$16.08; legal/court costs-\$7750.98; engineering consultants-\$45,439.50; rentals and leases for equipment-\$4,098.86 and \$25,877.72 for easements; capital improvements-\$193,280.04 for contractors.

The City of Haskell will pay the following: \$12,012.52 for waterlines, parts, etc.; \$10,858 for labor; \$3200 equipment rental, totalling \$26,070.52 for the city to pay on the project, at the midway point.
