Dates given for spraying pecan trees

May 23 through May 31 are the dates set for spraying pecan trees for control of the pecan nut casebearer, County Agent Max Stapleton has announced.

The pecan nut casebearer is the No. 1 insect threat to pecan production, said Stapleton, and it accounts for total crop losses in many years on unsprayed trees.

Timing of the insecticide application is crucial, said Stapleton. Insecticides currently labeled for casebearer control do not kill eggs. They only kill the casebearer while it is feeding on treated leaves, buds and nuts. Also, once the casebearer has entered a nut, the insecticide will not provide control.

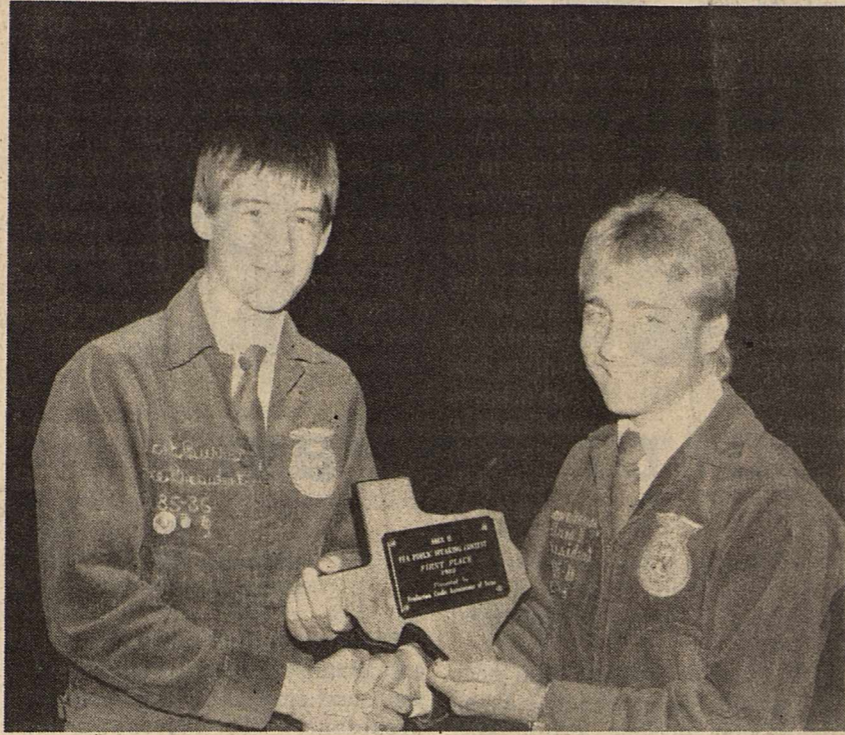

Teachers not happy despite test results

AUSTIN—The first Soviet fallout was recorded as minimal and no health threat in Texas last week, but the falling out between teachers and education reformers heightened.

Reformers who thought teachers would be appeased by their 97 percent success rating on the competency test were wrong.

Instead, the state's largest teacher group, Texas State Teachers Association, sued to have the test thrown out for racial discrimination.

About 18 percent of black and six percent of Hispanic teachers failed. Only one percent of Anglo teachers failed.

State Education Commissioner Bill Kirby predicted the lawsuit would be thrown out of federal court because the state took every legal precaution in giving the test.

Worse news issued last week: nearly half of public school students failed at least one part of the three-part basic skills exam, part of the 1984 school-reform law.

Budget Error Found

Even those who failed probably got off lighter than state employees after an error was found in the Comptroller's state spending report. One was fired; two resigned.

Comptroller Bob Bullock, who tolerates few mistakes, corrected his April report to indicate spending was up only one percent, not 25 percent as he reported two weeks ago.

Like a doctor tending a patient hourly, Bullock has been monitoring the ailing state budget monthly as Texas hurtles toward a projected \$1.3 billion deficit.

He has been critical of Gov. Mark White's austerity program for lacking the teeth to trim 13 percent in state agencies. Bullock's monthly scrutiny gives it teeth.

Texas House Summoned

House Speaker Gib Lewis plans to call all 150 state representatives to a one-day briefing on state spending, the budget and major education issues this month to prepare for the regular session in January.

His action underscores the governor's reluctance to call a special session this summer prior to the November elections. The Republicans want White to call one to cut the budget.

Lewis, a Democrat who lives in what has grown into a GOP district, faces a Republican candidate, strength unknown.

Appointed Judges

Texas Supreme Court Chief Justice John Hill wants a new system to appoint state judges instead of electing them.

Reasoning that judicial candidates appeal to voters more by name identification than bench qualifications, Hill suggested that non-partisan committees submit a list of five names for each seat. The governor would choose one for Senate ratification.

ents clashed over the collection of a telephone tax that was repealed last session.

White told telephone companies to quit collecting part of the gross receipts tax which was eliminated when White signed a sales tax on some telephone services.

Clements criticized White and his utility commissioners for allowing the double taxation to take place.

—The Texas Democratic Party confirmed that despite its efforts to repel followers of extremist Lyndon LaRouche, some infiltrated via uncontested slots.

The party also told Railroad Commission candidate P. S. Ervin he cannot use the nickname "Sam" on the ballot again since he could not prove it was commonly used the past two years.

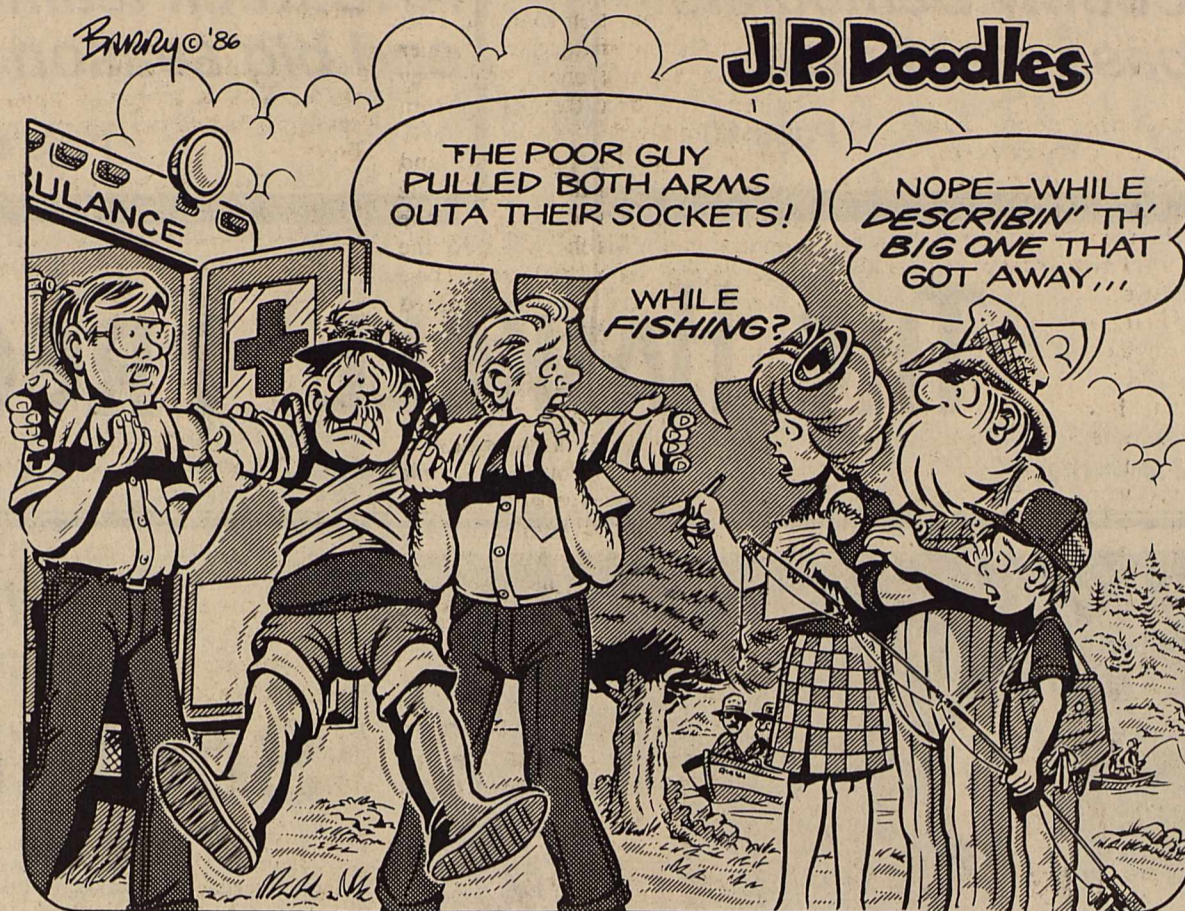
Ervin capitalized the nickname to confuse voters' identification with the late North Carolina Sen. Sam Ervin and knock long-time party activist John Poulard out of a runoff with John Sharp.

—Andy Briscoe, who finished second in the governor's race, called for party unity but stopped short of endorsing White. Briscoe indicated he will run for some office again.

—Convicted serial killer Henry Lee Lucas said Attorney General Jim Mattox was right for criticizing law officers who accepted dozens of fake murder confessions from him.

Last week Mattox's report accused Lucas of playing a hoax on the criminal justice system.

Former Williamson County Attorney Ed Walsh, who prosecuted the Lucas conviction, is in a Republican runoff election seeking to oppose Mattox in November.

Inventors don't get much credit these days. There are no Edisons, Bells or Morses. No Mergenthalers, Howes or Fultons.

Most inventions today are creations of teams working in company laboratories. When a product is created, it belongs to Proctor and Gamble, General Motors or IBM. An individual is seldom mentioned.

It hardly seems fair.

I was reminded of this the other day when I received a mailing from Associated Milk Producers, Inc. Along with a bunch of material promoting June as National Dairy Month was a two-page listing of "milestones of dairy history in the United States."

Among the revelations was that Dr. Hervey D. Thatcher of Potsdam, N.Y., invented the milk bottle in 1884.

Big deal!

How in the world can history glorify Doc Thatcher while making no note of the John Does who produced television, the computer, the jet airplane and disposable diapers?

Personal recognition seems to have stopped about the turn of the century. The fact sheet says the ice cream cone was "created in 1904 at the St. Louis World's Fair, but it doesn't mention the name of the creator.

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Resolution calls for betting in Texas

In resolutions adopted at their convention Saturday, Haskell County Democrats called for parimutual wagering in Texas, a tax break for Texas truckers and the abolishment of the Railroad Commission.

A fourth resolution opposed a state income tax.

The resolutions were mailed to the Texas Democratic party in Austin for presentation at the state convention June 27-28.

The resolution on betting pointed out that sagging oil and gas prices and a depressed agricultural market have had serious consequences on the Texas economy at a time when New Mexico and Louisiana draw substantial amounts of revenue out of Texas because of parimutual wagering.

The trucking resolution pointed out that out-of-state truckers are paying no taxes and therefore can haul for less than Texas truckers.

The resolution calling for the abolishment of the Railroad Commission stated that the commission was set up over 50 years ago to control the oil companies, but it is now protecting the oil companies instead of helping landowners in the problems of salt water disposals and pollution problems. It called for the these duties to be taken over by other state agencies.

County Democrats also elected delegates and alternates to the state convention.

Delegates include Larry Beauchamp, Cole Turner, Rick Perry, Bobby Howard, George Mullino, Sharon Mullino, Melba Howard, Janice O'Neal, Susan Turner, Dusty Garrison, Frankie Beauchamp and Reida Harris.

USDA Soil Conservation Service

Conservation District

Forty producers owning cropland in Haskell County made bids to enter 5,231.3 acres into the Conservation Reserve Program. Bids for 1986 and 1987 were completed Friday, May 16.

Local producers who are accepted into the program will be returning highly erodible cropland to permanent vegetation.

The area of most concern in CRP is the dollar bid or yearly rental rate. Bids made during the second

round of "sign-up" range from \$30 per acre to \$99.50. Producers should be notified by June 1 of accepted bids and information concerning plan development.

The Soil Conservation Service will assist those producers with accepted bids in the development of their conservation plans and in the schedule of work to be completed prior to establishment of permanent vegetation.

ABOUT YOUR CHILD

WHAT ROLE DOES VISUAL ABILITY PLAY IN A CHILD'S DEVELOPMENT?

At first glance, one would think, "Hey, that's an easy one! If a child can't see or has poor vision, he's going to have some problems. Sometimes physical intervention can help such as surgery or wearing glasses."

However, there are other areas of visual ability besides "sightedness". These areas include visual perception, visual-motor coordination, visual association, visual discrimination, and visual memory. And, oh, what fun we could have trying to explain, interpret, and condense these terms. Perhaps another time.

What we must realize is that each of these areas do exist and affect the visual ability of your child. A developmental "lag" in any one area can cause problems for even the most intellectual of children. Some of the noticeable problems may be one or more of these;

- difficulty organizing
- difficulty starting or finishing a task
- easily distracted by movement or anything that "catches his eye"
- short attention span
- clumsy; awkward in his movements; "falls over his own feet"
- reverses letters, numbers, or words
- gets hit by the ball more often than others
- not too thrilled with reading or other visual-based tasks or games
- poor grades in school
- difficulty controlling behavior
- difficulty "seeing" the consequences of his actions

Perhaps your child exhibits none of these problems. That's wonderful! But do remember, that the greater the development of the visual skills, the greater the child's capacity for making learning more effective.

Students donate software

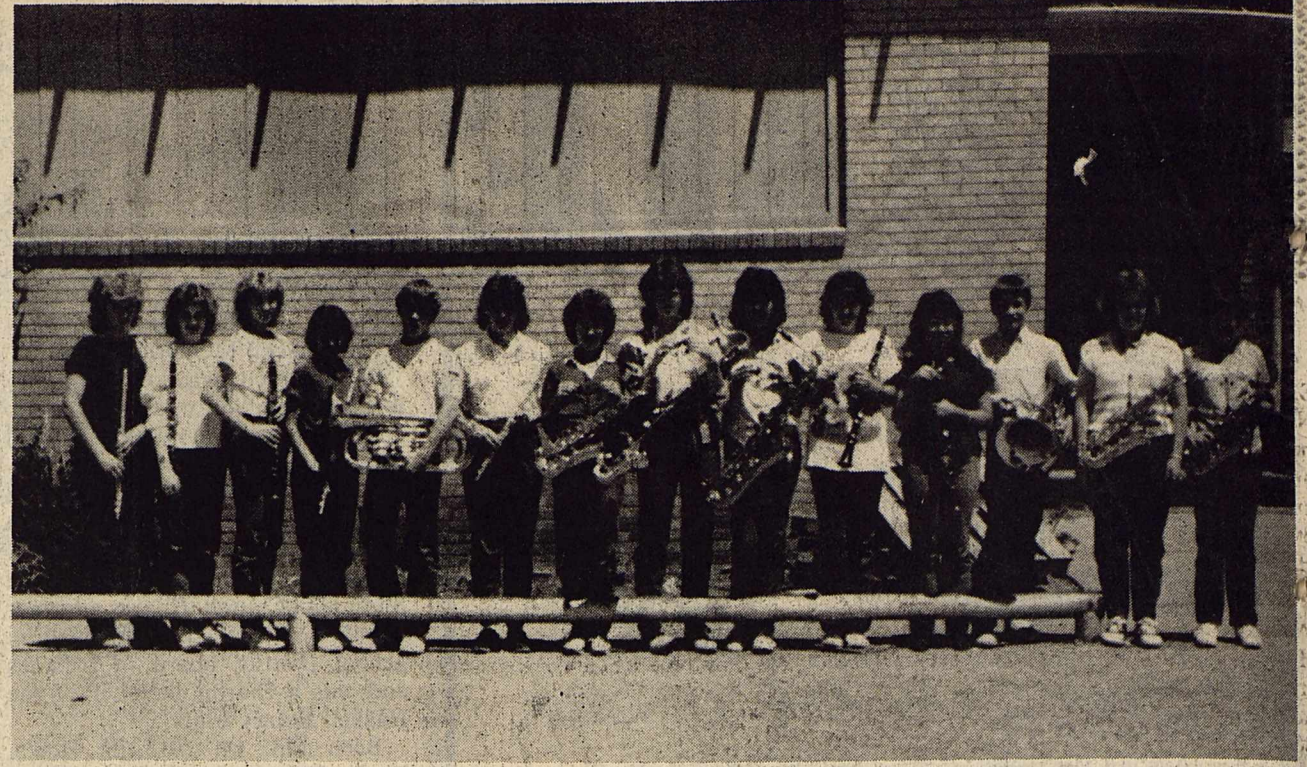
Members of the National Honor Society of Haskell High School will donate to the school a computer software program to be used in preparation for the ACT college entrance examinations.

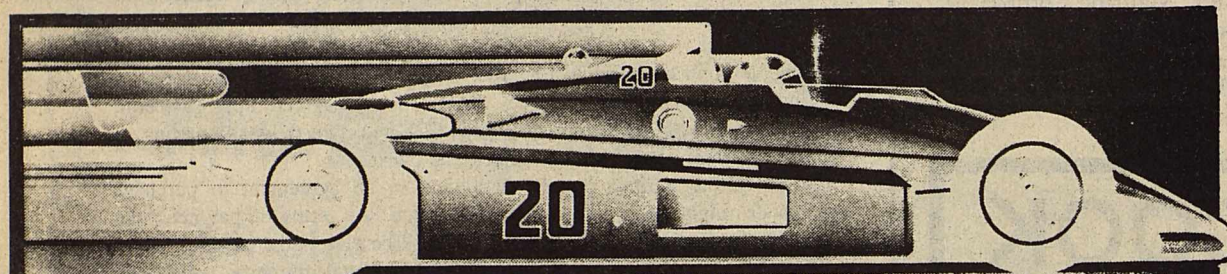

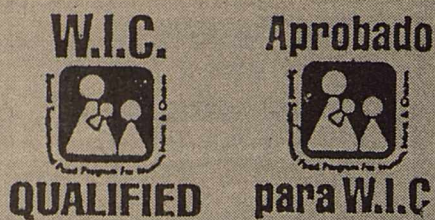

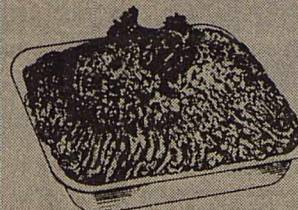
