

## Students do well on tests

Forty-nine of 50 Haskell High School students taking the TEAMS tests in October mastered the language arts section of the examination. Forty-seven of 50 passed the math section.

The results represented an improvement over last year when 35 of 38 passed each section. This was a reversal of state figures which saw fewer mastering the tests this year than last, primarily because higher grades were required this year.

A Texas Education Agency analysis used results from TEAMS and a similar nation achievement test to estimate how Texas students compared to their peers nationwide.

The analysis showed that last year Haskell juniors scored at the 57 percentile on the math section of the TEAMS test, meaning that they fared as well as or better than 57 percent of their peers nationwide. This year's juniors scored at the 74 percentile. The analysis showed that reading scores in Haskell improved from the 51st percentile to the 56th this year, and writing jumped from the 54th percentile last year to the 64th percentile this year.

After that pitch, Jordan discussed his work and invited questions from his audience. In answer to one question, he said the weather should be all right for the Christmas parade.

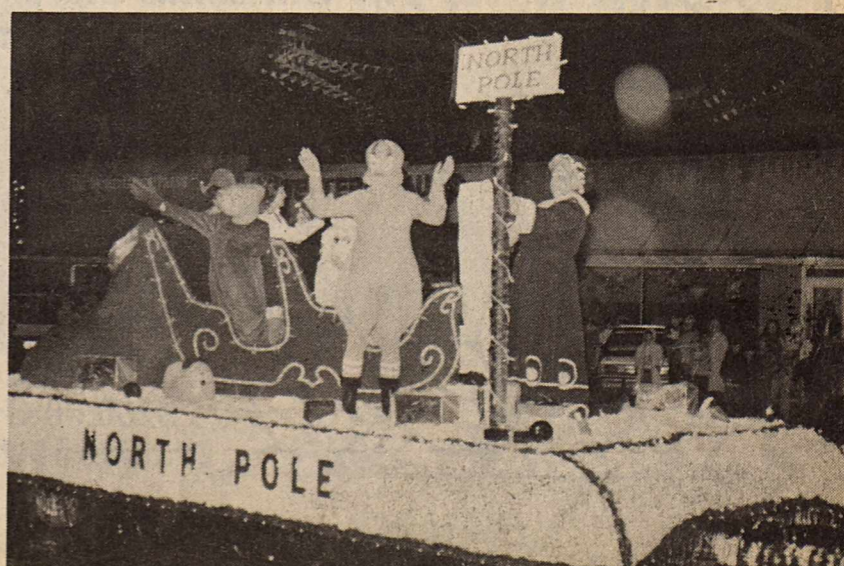

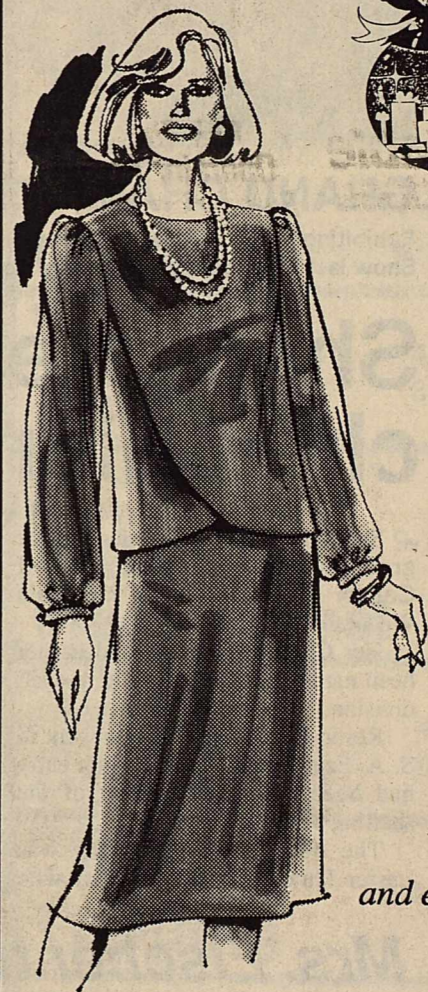

## Mattox blasts insurance industry

AUSTIN—Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox was full of fight last week, first blasting the state insurance board for raising workers' compensation premiums and then hopping on a GOP legislator for what Mattox termed a "racist" fundraising letter.

And House Speaker Gib Lewis ended a week of orientation for freshman lawmakers by predicting the Legislature will have to pass some type of tax bill in 1987, despite opposition from incoming Gov. Bill Clements.

Mattox blasted the insurance industry for requesting a 31 percent raise in workers' compensation coverage premiums, but said the state board staff's recommendation of 17.7 percent was no less "outrageous."

Instead, premiums should be cut by an average of 9 percent, he said. Mattox's figure was based on the advice of a Washington, D.C. insurance consultant hired by his office at \$125 an hour.

Meanwhile, the Texas insurance industry prepared to ask the state board for permission to exclude from negligence liability coverage family members injured in accidents caused by other family members.

### Official English

The letter decried by Mattox was signed by state Rep. Jim Horn, R-Lewisville, and sent to raise money for the proposed "English First" amendment to the Constitution.

Horn responded by stating that his letter and position has nothing to do with racism.

The letter indicates a radical movement in the U.S. is promoting foreign languages to the same status as English, and warns of fragmentation of society along language lines.

### Taxes Needed

Speaker Lewis, who blocked the special session tax bill for weeks, told legislators-to-be that unless the numbers change on a projected multi-billion-dollar deficit, they can expect to vote on whether to pass new taxes.

Incoming Gov. Clements won election by vowing to veto any tax increase approved by the Legislature, but Lewis said last week he doesn't see how Clements will do that.

Lewis favors broadening the sales tax base and perhaps lowering the rate in the process. While he is waiting for Clements' plan, he said the idea of writing a one-year budget for 1988 in regular session and a 1989 budget in special session "might have merit."

One key senator, Ray Farabee, D-Wichita Falls, said the Legislature would probably make Mark White's temporary tax increases permanent, but that one-year budgets weren't feasible.

### Anti-White Voters

A follow-up Texas Poll to the November election indicates that even though Republicans recaptured the Governor's Mansion, voters are not moving away from the Democratic Party into the GOP.

The survey also claims that more than one-third of Bill Clements' votes were cast primarily against Mark White. Clements got almost one-third of the Hispanic vote, and fared better with affluent, educated, urban white voters.

Almost half of voters questioned said TV ads by both were distorted and negative.

The displeasure with White spilled over into public disapproval of the Legislature's solution during two special sessions called to handle the state deficit.

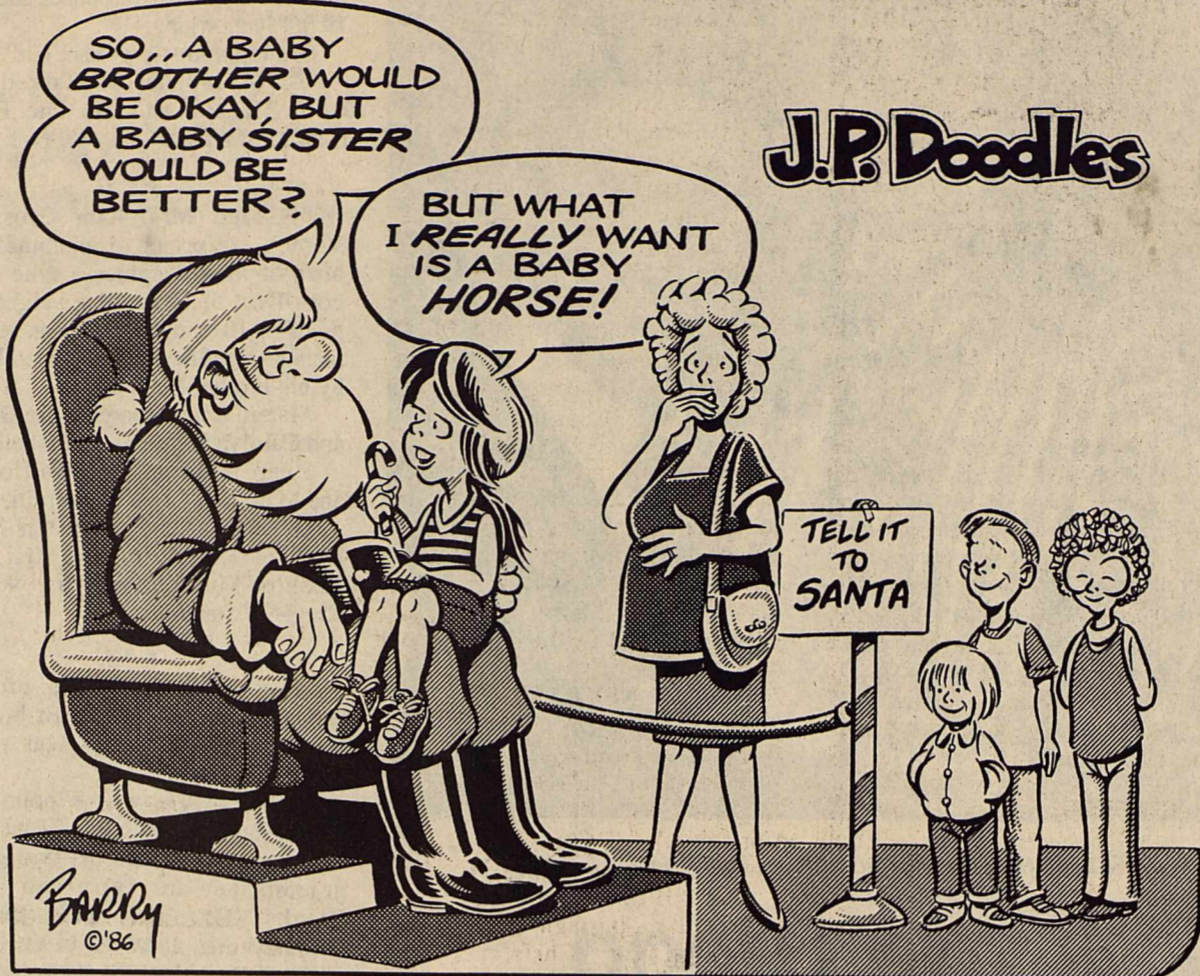

### 30 Years Ago Dec. 13, 1956

Before I buy my "Classic Service" from the telephone company, I would like to have an explanation of what is meant by:

"In compliance with the Federal Communications Commission, each residential and business single-line telephone customer will become responsible for the installation and maintenance of the telephone wiring in their homes or buildings."

I don't know how you can comply with the FCC. You can comply with an FCC order, or an FCC requirement, but to comply with the FCC is akin to complying with the FBI.

The assumption is that single-line telephone users will be required by the FCC to install and maintain their own telephone wiring.

That's not what the statement says, although it's pretty clear that it's what GTE wants its customers to believe.

My question is: "Is it now going to be a federal violation for the telephone company to repair a wire in your home unless you pay for it--either through the 'Classic Service' insurance policy or through a separate charge?"

I think not. It's just a way of raising your monthly phone bill a buck twenty-five and calling it something else. Then when time comes for a rate increase, it won't show up as part of the rate you're now paying.

But it's all soothed over with this classic piece of gobbledeygook:

"As deregulation moves forward, 'Classic Service' will help keep things more like they used to be--you can count on your Telephone Company to take care of all your communications needs."

I think GTE needs a new copy writer.

## TAX PLANNING

### NEW TAX WITHHOLDING FORM

If you're an employee, you and an estimated 100 million other people will be required to file a new Form W-4 with your employer. That's the tax withholding form on which you calculate the number of withholding allowances you're entitled to claim. Your employer uses the form to determine the amount of income tax to withhold from your wages.

The form has just been revised by the IRS, the first major revision since 1966, to bring it into line with the sweeping tax law changes brought about by the Tax Reform Act of 1986.

The old W-4 was two pages; the revised form is four pages. The IRS apologized for the complexity of the new form, but stated that it will get withholding closer to actual taxes owed than the previous form.

Although employees have until October 1, 1987, to submit the new withholding form, the IRS urges everyone to file a new W-4 earlier than that in order to avoid over or under withholding. If you have overwithholding, you are giving the government the interest-free use of your money. If you are underwithheld, you may be faced with penalties when you file your 1987 income tax return. The new law increases the percentage of taxes that must be prepaid from 80% to 90%. Unless you have prepaid that amount or as much as your prior year's tax liability, whichever is less, you may be subject to penalties.

Your employer will withhold taxes based on your old Form W-4 until you file the new one. If you haven't filed a new form by the deadline, October 1, 1987, your employer must withhold as if you had claimed one exemption if you're single or two exemptions if you're married.

The IRS started mailing the new forms to employers this month. The new forms have "1987" printed in the upper right corner. Be sure you fill out one of the new forms.

## Soil conservation

Wet salinity areas in Haskell County have been monitored for several years to determine salinity levels.

Salt tolerance crops and grasses can be grown successfully when salt levels are within the numerical rating of 16 to 18. Grasses such as alkali sacaton, Saltgrass and Bermudagrass can be grown economically within the higher numerical rating of 18. Barley and cotton will grow in the lower rating of 16. Wheat and milo must have concentrations in the lower ranges to produce a good crop.

To reduce high concentrations of soil salinity on previously productive soil, underground drainage

has proven to be most effective.

Three years ago two practices were installed using plastic pipe for underground drainage. Significant improvement in toxic salt reduction has been monitored on these two sites.

Design and layout of an underground drainage system must be properly located in the affected area. Trial soil borings are used to locate water table and a suitable grade for drainage. Installation of underground drainage pipe is best installed with special digging equipment. A contractor so equipped lives in Rotan.

The installation of underground drainage systems is a conservation practice that has been approved for cost share under the Agriculture Conservation Program and the Great Plains Conservation Program. Program signup is expected to begin in December.

While consumers seem to gain from lower food prices, farmers are getting a continually smaller share - 31 cents of every dollar spent for food in 1985.

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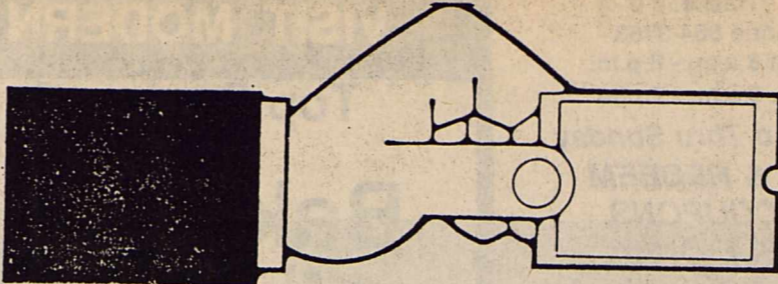

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION:

The Federal Emergency Management Agency gives notice of the proposed determinations of base (100-year) flood elevations, in accordance with Section 110 of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (Pub. L. 93-234), 87 Stat. 980, which added Section 1363 to the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (Title XIII of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (Pub. L. 90-448), 42 U.S.C. 4001-4128, and 44 CFR 67.4 (a)).

These elevations, together with the floodplain management measures required by Section 60.3 of the program regulations, are the minimum that are required. They should not be construed to mean the community must change any existing ordinances that are more stringent in their floodplain management requirements. The community may at any time enact stricter requirements on its own, or pursuant to policies established by other Federal, State, or regional entities. These proposed elevations will also be used to calculate the appropriate flood insurance premium rates for new buildings and their contents and for the second layer of insurance on existing buildings and their contents.

Pursuant to the provisions of 5 USC 605 (b), the Administrator, to whom authority

has been delegated by the Director, Federal Emergency Management Agency, hereby certifies that the proposed flood elevation determinations, if promulgated, will not have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities. A flood elevation determination under Section 1363 forms the basis for new local ordinances, which, if adopted by a local community, will govern future construction within the floodplain area. The elevation determinations, however, impose no restriction unless and until the local community voluntarily adopts floodplain ordinances in accord with these elevations. Even if ordinances are adopted in compliance with Federal standards, the elevations prescribe how high to build in the floodplain and do not proscribe development. Thus, this action only forms the basis for future local actions. It imposes no new requirement; of itself it has no economic impact.

Lessees and owners of real property in the City of Haskell, Haskell County, Texas, are encouraged to review the preliminary Flood Insurance Study and Flood Insurance Rate Map available at the address cited above. 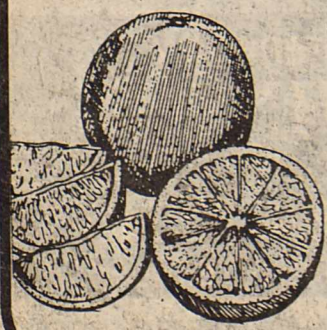
