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# Elections to be Saturday

Three City Councilmen and two School Board members will be elected in two separate elections in Haskell Saturday.

School district voters will cast their ballots in the Community Room of Haskell National Bank. City election ballots will be cast at City Hall. Voting will be from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. in both elections.

Seeking two-year terms on the City Council will be Jerry Stocks, Darrell Smith, Gary Druessedow, Sam Rodriguez and Robert Kramp. Stocks and Smith are incumbents seeking re-election.

A third incumbent whose term is expiring but is not seeking re-election is Joe Cortez.

School Board candidates are Roger Moeller, Hollis Calloway, Randy Phemister, Tommy Watson and Bill Dumas. School Board terms are for three years.

Moeller is an incumbent. A second incumbent completing a term on the board, David Davis, is not a candidate for re-election.

A 38-year-old New Mexican will begin medical practice in Haskell in July.

Dr. William D. McSmith Jr. plans to move to Haskell after completing internship June 30 at Tucson (Ariz.) General Hospital.

McSmith has agreed to a contract with the Haskell Memorial Hospital District whereby he will be provided with operating facilities and will be given an income guarantee.

McSmith is a graduate of the College of Osteopathic Medicine of the Pacific in Pomona, Calif., which he attended from 1982 to 1986.

Prior to medical school he was a physician's assistant (family practice) in Albuquerque from 1978-1982.

A 1966 graduate of Farmington, N.M. High School, he served in the U. S. Army Special Forces from 1967 to 1971.

He was a pre-med major at the University of New Mexico from 1971 to 1975 and a health science major at Eastern New Mexico University in 1975-76. He attended Wichita State University in 1976-78, acquiring a physician's assistant degree.

McSmith and his wife, Carol, were in Haskell March 6-8, and met a number of people here. They have three children.

The hospital board hopes to begin construction soon on a clinic on hospital-owned property on the south side of the hospital. The modular building will be large enough to serve two doctors. The clinic will not contain lab and x-ray facilities.

Details of the clinic are not finalized, but it is expected to be ready for occupancy by the time of Dr. McSmith's arrival.

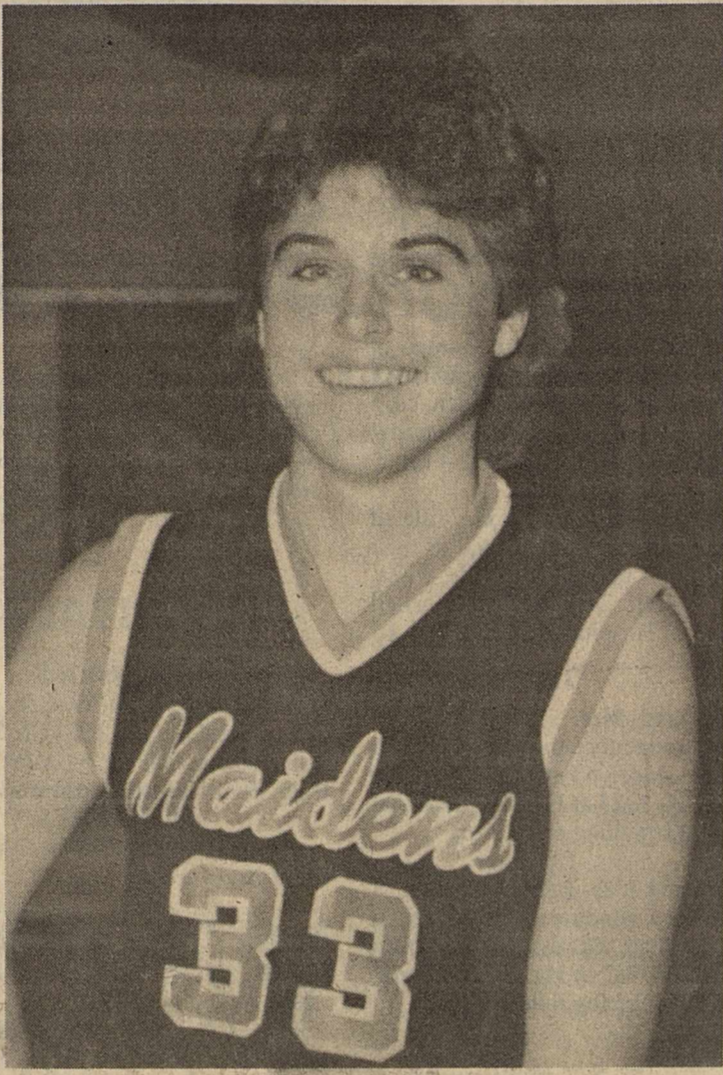

# City considers tax on phone service

The City Council last week took under consideration an ordinance which would make telephone service subject to the city sales tax.

Further discussion and action on the proposed ordinance is expected at the next Council meeting.

The ordinance would repeal an exemption now granted telecommunications services.

Rate of the tax imposed would be one percent, the same as the City imposes for other local sales and uses.

The telephone company is now exempt from city sales taxes

(although it does pay the 5.25 percent state sales tax) since its operation is subject to the franchise fee of approximately \$7,000 a year. The law allows the City to repeal this exemption through ordinance.

Consideration of the ordinance comes at about the midway point of a fiscal year which has seen declining city revenues. Sales tax collections, franchise fees and water sales all are running below last year, Administrator Robert Baker said.

If passed, the ordinance will become effective with the beginning of the next fiscal year Oct. 1.

# Computers help Tech student overcome physical handicap

It's a new term at Texas Tech University, and freshman Scott Tooke is knuckling down to the complexities of his accounting classes.

The work, often requiring sophisticated math, is tough. It could be even tougher for Tooke, a bright 19-year-old whose mobility and speech are seriously inhibited by cerebral palsy.

But thanks to a powerful, hand-held computer--and some original thinking by technicians at Hewlett-Packard Company--Tooke is keeping pace with the class.

Tooke, an honors graduate of Lubbock's Coronado High School entered Texas Tech last fall as an accounting major. Using a wheelchair to get around and a Prentke Romich "Light Talker" communication board to "talk" and do his assignments, he has quickly adapted to campus life.

But math presented a problem. Tooke had little trouble performing

three-digit multiplication and division in his head. But his college courses called for more complex calculations. In high school, a six-year-old friend had helped, punching calculator keys at Tooke's command. In college, without his young assistant, Tooke soon realized he needed a new computing tool.

He took his dilemma to Texas Tech's biocybernetics lab, which assists disabled people with mobility and communications problems. Tooke suggested that the lab mount a calculator so that he could punch its buttons with his nose. But James Koerlin, Texas Tech lab's director, figured technology could do better than that. Koerlin called HP's calculator support group in Corvallis, Ore., and explained the problem to J. Lea Bailey, an HP technician.

She was excited by the challenge. After contacting Prentke Romich for technical information about the "Light Talker," Bailey and her team got to work. Within days, they had designed software that would link Tooke's "Light Talker" to the HP-71B hand-held computer, using standard HP interface modules. By Thanksgiving, Tooke had his new equipment and was learning to use it.

The operation is simple. Tooke moves a light-tipped wand across the "Light Talker's" keypad, pointing to various numbers, letters or functions. The HP-71B performs the calculations without Tooke ever having to touch the computer's keys.

Koerlin, who has worked with Tooke through the project, praised the setup. "With the HP-71B, Tooke should be able to perform all the math he will need through college, at the graduate level and on into his career," said Koerlin.

Bailey said the new software is generic enough that it could be easily adapted to other, similar communication devices used by the disabled.

And Tooke? He looks forward to the new term, new classes and using his computer. Asked how things are going, he moves the wand across his keypad and his answer pops up on the HP-71B's display panel: "Busy!"

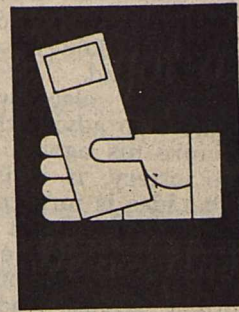

## Session resembles collision course

AUSTIN—At a certain stage, the legislative session resembles a passle of freight trains hell-bent on a collision course, driven by engineers determined not to give an inch.

Lawmakers reached that stage last week. Why?

Overcrowded Texas prisons closed their doors again last week for the umpteenth time, the Texas crime rate was reported up 15 percent, and federal authorities stayed two death penalties here. And all the while, Texas faces a federal court order for not solving a prison problem that has lingered for years.

On top of that, the State Treasurer warns on a weekly basis that state checks will start bouncing in the fall unless taxes are raised.

And still, half-way through the session the legislative leadership isn't close to agreement on how to solve the prison problem or fiscal deficit.

But just as the freight trains seem to avoid collision at the last minute, perhaps this Legislature will too, for the leadership is proving flexible. They just don't agree.

### Latest Prison Solution

Governor Bill Clements altered his opposition to new taxes to support a proposal to let voters decide whether they want to bear a \$750 million sales tax hike dedicated to new prisons.

Clements said he wouldn't mind letting citizens vote on all tax issues, reviving the initiative and referendum issue.

But Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby,

"The lottery is a dead skunk in the middle of the road," Hudson said.

Bullock also wrote lawmakers to advise them not to require his agency to oversee the lottery, if it is legalized. "The idea is foreign to us, and frankly, we've got our hands full with our current tasks."

For emergency purposes, the lottery seems dead, although time remains to pass it for long term revenue goals.

### The Senate

Texas Senators approved and sent to the House measures to allow limited alimony payments here for the first time, to allow the state to condemn ingress-egress easements through private property to get to state land, and to repeal property taxes on pleasure boats.

The alimony bill would allow judges to order alimony payments in cases where a marriage had lasted at least 10 years and one spouse had no ready job skills because of a homemaker role. Opponents argued it opens the door to sweeping payments.

The ingress-egress bill allows the state or its lessees to claim a road through private land to landlocked state tracts.

### The House

Speaker Lewis joined supporters of a bill allowing private citizens to carry handguns, despite opposition from lawmakers. But Lewis, who owns a gun shop in Fort Worth, said police officers are overreacting. Only Texas bans carrying handguns.

If passed, citizens of sound minds could carry guns everywhere except to school grounds, polling places, government offices, places that sell alcohol, or while drinking and driving.

The House also voted to allow prison guards to use force against inmates for self-defense or to prevent escape.

### Other Highlights

- Amid continuing "Ponygate" rumors, Gov. Clements denied he and other SMU officials knew of schemes to fix grades or hire coeds to provide sexual favors to football recruits.

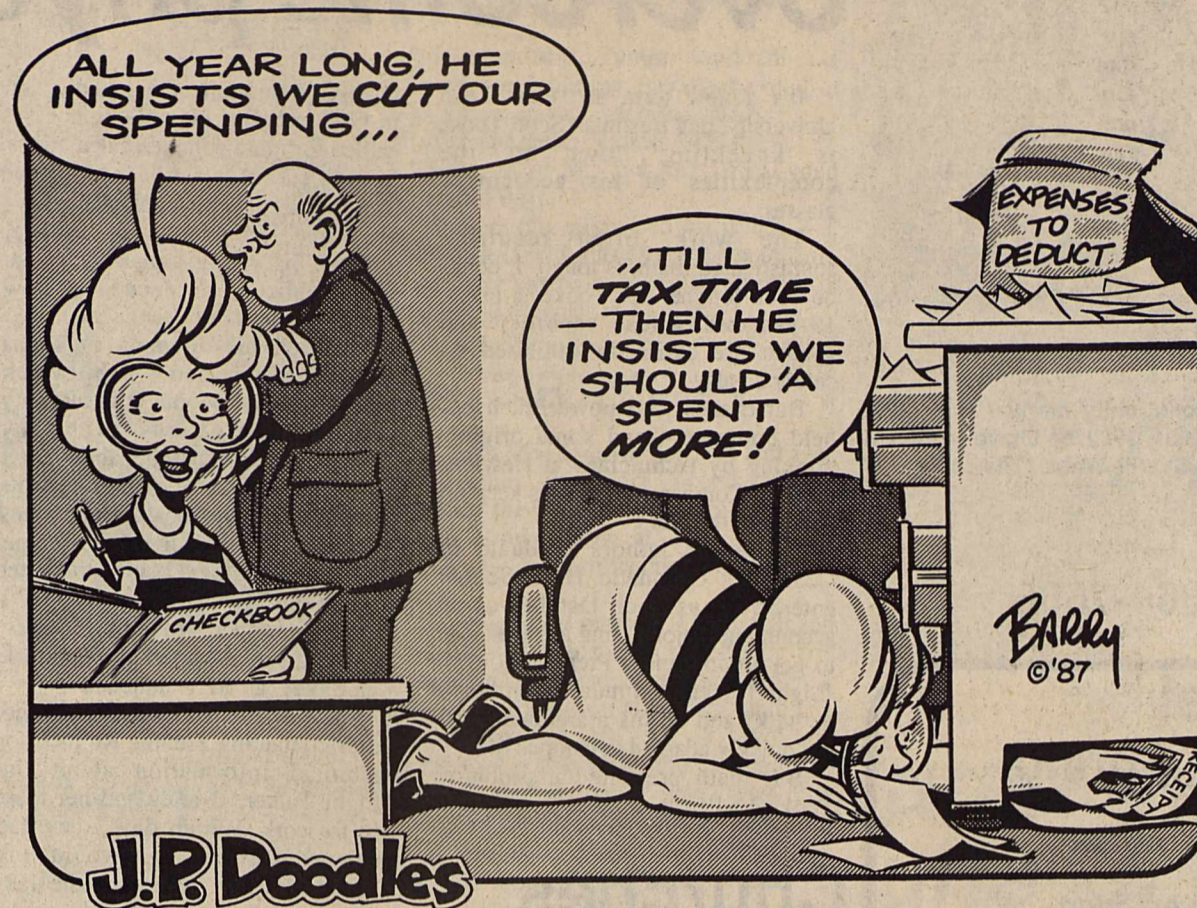
- His UT regents nominee, Louis Beercherl of Dallas, was approved after he told the nominations panel he did not secure the post by promising to oust chairman Jess Hay.

- U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop asked the Legislature to provide sex education in schools to warn about AIDS.

- Land Commissioner Gary Mauro and his predecessor Bob Armstrong said they will go along with a U.S. Department of Interior recommendation to add some 245,000 acres to the Coastal Barrier Resources System.

- Attorney General Jim Mattox was asked to probe the case of Death Row inmate Clarence Brandley, accused of killing a student, after new testimony came to light.

- Two rival state government groups joined forces seeking pay raises and benefit increases.



For 10 years I knew this guy who worked as a lineman for Public Service Co. of New Mexico, and for 10 years his lunch menu never varied.

Each day he, or his wife, fixed him a Spam sandwich. It was always the same--Spam, bread and mayonnaise. There might have been an apple or a cookie, but never a deviation from the main course.

I recalled this the other day when I read that Senate Majority Leader Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., dines three times a week on Spam, bread and mayonnaise.

This piece of information came from a story on the upcoming 50th anniversary of Spam, the much-maligned little loaf of meat in the blue-and-yellow can.

Hormel introduced it as an unnamed product in 1937, and since then, has dumped 4 billion cans of the compressed pig parts on the world market.

After competitors started producing a similar product, Hormel started a contest among employees, offering a \$100 prize for the best catchy name. The name Brunch was about to be selected when a Hormel executive suggested the name Spam, short for Spiced Ham, and the contest came to an abrupt end.

An advertising blitz touted Spam as "the new miracle meat." Since no one knew when people were supposed to eat the stuff, Spam's ad agency covered all bases by recommending Spam for breakfast, lunch, dinner and between-meal snacks.

What is thought to be radio's first singing commercial plugged the product. George Burns and Gracie Allen, along with Artie Shaw and his 23-piece orchestra, advertised Spam on network radio.

Spam got a bad name during World War II when Hormel produced C rations for the armed forces. While the meat therein was often called Spam by complaining GIs, it was made from a recipe furnished by the Army Quartermaster Corp., and was not Spam.

Today, Spam commands 75 percent of the canned meat market share. There's a Spamorama in Austin where would-be chefs throw together such tasty treats as Spamales and Spamoni ice cream. There are Spawiches and Spambled Eggs.

It rolls off the assembly line in three plants at the rate of 450 cans a minute. That's 168 million cans of Spam heading for American supermarkets this year.

I guess my New Mexico friend was no odd ball after all. Maybe he was just ahead of the times.

who dislikes both dedicated funds and I&R, killed it in the Senate, and then warned that checks definitely will bounce soon, unless \$2.5 billion is raised.

### Lottery Teetering

Earlier, hopes had been raised that the prisons could be built with state lottery revenues, if the Legislature could hurry up and propose a constitutional amendment for voters to approve.

Then Comptroller Bob Bullock reminded lawmakers they had until April 1 to pass the issue if they want the revenues to be spent in the 1988-89 budget. That's the latest date to hold a constitutional election within the current session.

But House members led by Tyler Rep. David Hudson said they had 70 votes, enough to kill the lottery in the House.

## Work begins on pool

Work has started on the renovation of the bath house at the city swimming pool and a contract has been let for a new filter system and pump house.

A contract for the filter system was awarded last week to Caribbean Pools of Abilene which had bid \$48,942 for the project, which includes a pump house.

The City has hired a bricklayer, a plumber, a carpenter and an electrician for the bath house portion of the project.

Labor has been donated by Lewis Wilson, Ervin Frierson, Jerry Baldwin and Nanny Plumbing.

Renovation of the pool became necessary more than a year ago when the State Health Department condemned the pool for lack of a filter system. The pool operated last summer on a waiver from the health department.

Cost of the pool project is estimated at \$126,000. A matching-fund grant of \$63,000 was approved by the State Parks and Wildlife Commission. The remaining \$63,000 will need to be raised locally. So far, the City has contributed about \$5,000 in labor, which will count toward the City's portion of the cost. Donations will be requested from the public, and civic organizations will be asked to assist with either donations or fund-raising activities.

## Outreach program threatened

"I am not in favor of creating a problem somewhere else. Our duty is to people with mental illness," said B. O. Roberson, chairman of the Headstream Memorial Outreach Service Center in Haskell during a board meeting Friday.

Roberson was referring to House Bill 2324, recently introduced in the Texas Legislature. If enacted, it would turn the north campus of Vernon State Hospital into a unit of the Department of Corrections for treatment of inmates suffering from mental retardation or drug abuse disorders.

Local board members expressed concern for the ramifications of the bill as it would relate to outreach services in the Haskell area, since no provision is made in the bill for outreach programs.

Meeting with the board to discuss local services provided by the hospital and the outreach center were Sarah Meinzer, local center director; Jeff Bearden, Vernon State Hospital chief of community programs; and Jerry McLain, hospital information director.

Bearden pointed out that the Headstream Memorial Center served 202 people last year in Haskell, Stonewall and Knox counties. Service involved 2,422 patient visits in areas related to outpatient individual and group counseling, mediation services, family support groups, substance abuse counseling, day activity and skills training groups.

The Haskell-based center employs two full time staff members and a community services case manager, along with two physician consultants. They are assisted by about 12 volunteers, including nine

board members. Bearden said Headstream Memorial Center contributes more than \$50,000 annually to the local economy.

Additional treatment services are provided by a Vernon State Hospital traveling treatment team consisting of a psychologist, psychological assistant and social worker.

Last year, 36 patients from Haskell, Stonewall and Knox counties were admitted to Vernon State Hospital. Bearden said that without the outreach center in Haskell or the state hospital in Vernon, local patients would have to travel to hospitals in Wichita Falls or Big Spring for services.

Board member Lillian Hicks

expressed concern for the future of the hospital and center. "We need to write some letters," she said.

In other action, the board made plans for observance of April as Mental Health and Chemical Abuse Awareness Month. The outreach center is enlisting the help of area banks and other organizations in distribution of brochures explaining services of Headstream Memorial Center. Judges of the three counties will be joining in making joint proclamations regarding the month-long observance.

Roberson announced that new carpet will be provided for the outreach center building.

**EXTEND YOUR FILING DATE**

There are a number of reasons for not filing your tax return by April 15th. Some people have financial transactions or joint ventures which may be difficult to summarize by the April 15th filing deadline. Others simply don't get around to it. The "automatic" extension does not require that you state a reason for requesting additional time.

To avoid penalties for filing later than April 15th, certain steps must be taken. You must file for an extension and show and estimate of your tax liability. If your estimate of the total taxes due exceeds the amount you have already paid in, you are required to send the difference along with your extension request. If your tax estimate on the extension request is less than the tax on your final return, you may be subject to penalties.

The "automatic" extension period is from April 15th to August 15th. Additional time can be obtained by filing a request for further extension. This second extension requires that you state the reason for the delay. You will also be asked whether or not your tax returns for the three prior years were timely filed. You'll have to state whether or not your estimated tax payments, if any, were made on time.

If you are not in the United States on April 15th, you have until June 15th to file your return. This does not require the filing of an extension form. When you file your tax return, you attach a statement showing your whereabouts on April 15th. Since the "automatic" extension is available to everyone, there is no longer a tax reason to be out of the country on April 15th.

Selection of textbooks for next year was little more than a formality since about one-seventh of the books come up for renewal each year.

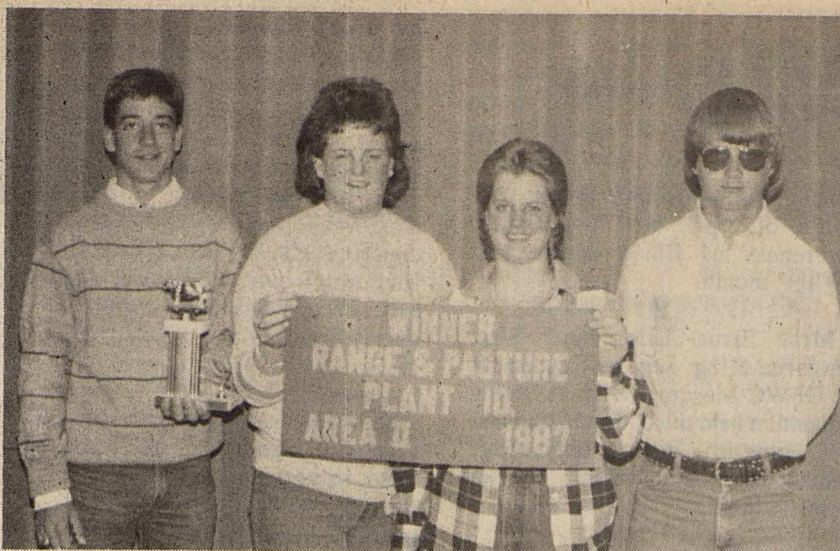
In other action, the Board:

- Made a slight alteration in the contract form for teachers, which stipulates dates to return contracts to the district.

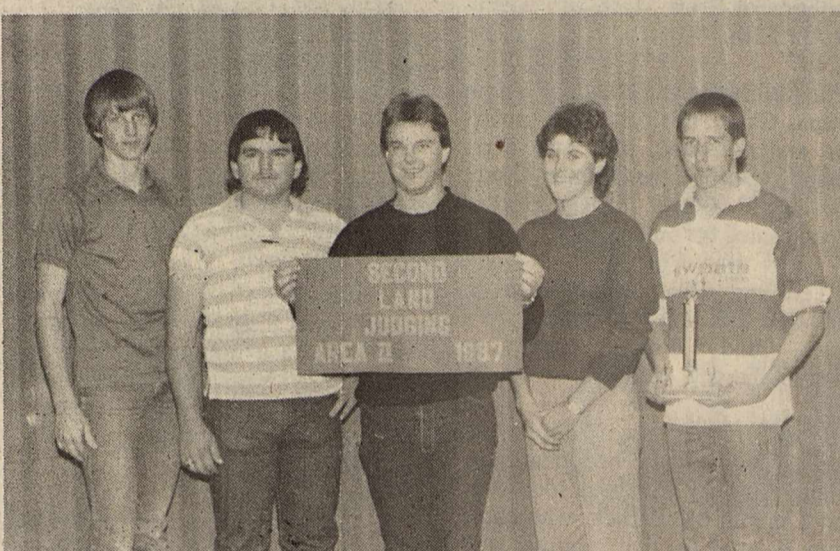
- Approved a pollution control study with an emphasis on an asbestos check of the school buildings.

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

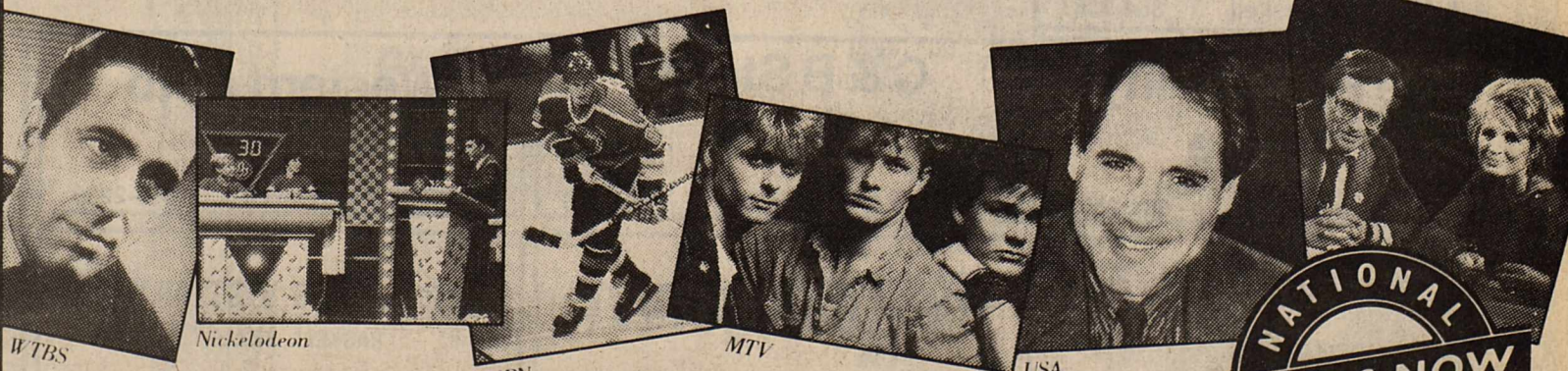

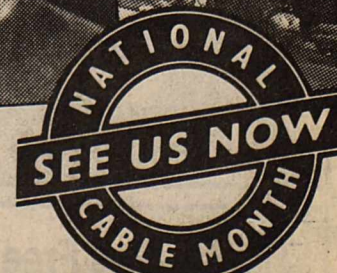
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## Rochester revival next week

## Seat Belt Survivors membership grows

A young Central Texas mother tells of the icy morning last year when she lost control of the family pickup, rolled the vehicle twice, and briefly lost consciousness. She awoke hanging upside-down, with blood in her eyes from a cut on her cheek. She was in pain from countless bruises, but otherwise was uninjured.

Her most vivid recollection, though, is of hearing her infant son's playful babbling, while his safety seat dangled in the wreckage.

Today, both mother and child are a year older, and are members of the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Safety Belt Survivors Club. They have joined a growing list of people whose only common link is that they have survived would-be fatal auto crashes by correctly using their seat belts and child safety seats.

Since 1984, Texas law has required that children under two years old must ride in approved child safety seats. Children 2 to 4 years old can be in safety seats or wear seat belts. A 1986 law further requires all drivers and front seat passengers to use seat belts, a factor leading to 229 fewer fatalities

among drivers and front seat passengers for the year.

David Zane, coordinator of TDH's Safe Rider program, said the laws save lives and prevent serious injuries almost daily. "Our files are full of survival stories," he said.

Zane said recent studies have revealed, however, that many child safety seats are not used properly.

The Texas Transportation Institute observed 15,131 children in 12 Texas cities in 1986 to find only 51 percent correctly restrained in safety seats or seat belts. Another nine percent were restrained, but not correctly or safely. The rest were riding unrestrained, in violation of the law.

Another study, by the U.S. Department of Transportation, showed that nationally as many as two-thirds of children observed were riding in safety seats that were installed or used incorrectly.

barbecue, there will be drawings for cash prizes.

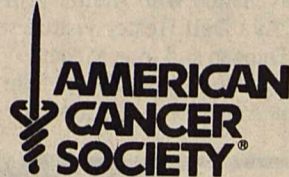

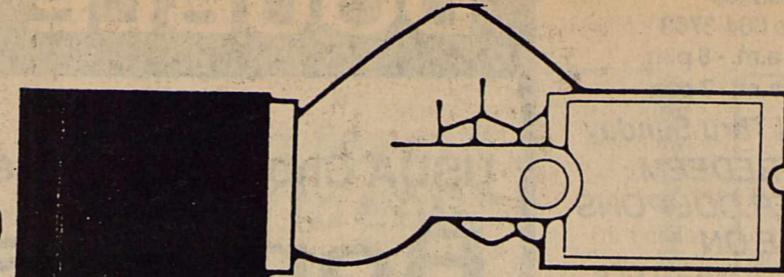
