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PRO changes asked

Changes to the federal government's Medicare Peer Review Organizations (PROs) must be made in order to protect rural health care in Texas and across the nation, Congressman Charles Stenholm has told a U.S. Senate panel in Washington.

Stenholm appeared before the Senate's Finance Subcommittee on Health last week to relay much of the information and comments he heard from area residents at a day-long meeting March 14. Several from Haskell attended that meeting.

At the Senate hearing, the Stamford Democrat said, "West Texans accustomed to fighting hard for their survival are willing to make the sacrifices which naturally come as a part of their chosen rural lifestyle. They are not willing, however, to be forced to do battle with their own federal government. And it is precisely the federal government which they see as the greatest threat to the survival of rural health care today."

"I refuse to be a defender of either wasteful spending or bad medicine in rural Texas or anywhere else in the country," Stenholm continued. "I believe in the concept of federal oversight in a program which currently requires a budget of \$75 billion for 30 million beneficiaries. Physician peers are the best qualified individuals to make those determinations. But while the concept of peer review is sound, I feel there is plenty of room for improvement in the way the law is written."

PROs were initiated during the past decade as a means of overseeing "quality care" and ensuring proper utilization of health care by Medicare beneficiaries. However, under the current system of peer reviews, many doctors feel humiliated, harassed and reluctant to treat patients. The sanctioning of doctors could cripple the availability of health care not only for Medicare beneficiaries, but for entire rural areas.

The congressman raised the possibility of biases and insensitivities in the peer review system to rural concerns. "At the beginning of this year, sanctions had been recommended against 20 Texas doctors and 16 more sanction cases were pending," Stenholm said. "Of those 36 cases, 32 involved rural physicians. It's difficult for me to believe that 88 percent of all the questionable physicians in Texas practice in rural areas."

Stenholm recommended several changes, emphasizing two areas. He said, first, the PRO law must contain improved due process to allow the physician the right to present his side. Second, he said an amendment to the PRO also should provide for administrative hearings and reviews as a part of the sanction proceedings prior to implementing any sanction.

"Currently, the sanctions come first and then the appeal follows, implying a 'guilty until proven innocent' attitude," he said.

Smith topped the vote-getters with 244. Stocks polled 229 votes and Kramp had 178.

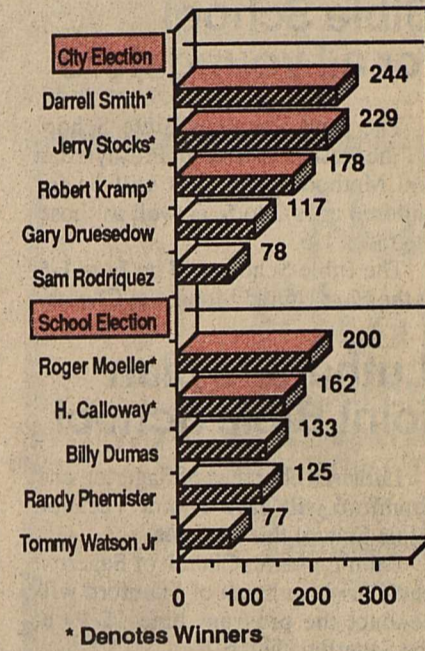
Other candidates were Gary Druessedow who had 117 votes and Sam Rodriguez who polled 78.

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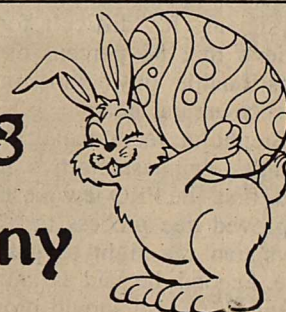
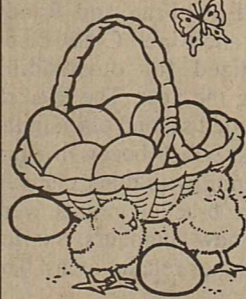

Farm Bill requires insurance

The U.S. Department of agriculture and the Farmers Home Administration have recently been publicly emphasizing the new relationship between crop insurance coverage and emergency-loan eligibility in 1987.

Evelyn Cobb, who represents National Ag Underwriters in this area, stressed that the newly effective provision of the 1985 Farm Bill prohibits emergency loans for crop losses that could have been insured under multiple-peril crop insurance programs sponsored by the Federal Crop Insurance Corp.

Farmers seeking disaster emergency loans from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration for crop losses in 1987 will need to have crop insurance if it is available.

Federally subsidized multiple-peril crop insurance is available for virtually all major crops grown in this area.

The last date to apply for insurance coverage in this area for cotton and grain sorghum is April 15.

Budget cuts, taxes stymie Legislature

AUSTIN—Lawmakers stymied by whether to balance the budget with cuts or taxes heard some good news and some bad news last week.

The good news came in a landmark decision from Attorney General Jim Mattox, who ruled the Legislature can carry a deficit into the next fiscal period, where it must be resolved.

The bad news came in the form of a threat from Gov. Bill Clements to bring the legislators back into special session if they do not expand his budget cutting authority.

The Mattox ruling allows the Legislature to delay taking care of an estimated \$1 billion deficit in the next fiscal period beginning September 1. Lawmakers were greatly relieved.

Comptroller Bob Bullock, who must certify that new budget, had sought the official ruling and argued the rollover violated the constitutional pay-as-you-go principle.

'Improper,' Not Illegal

Mattox said the issue was whether the Comptroller would have additional powers to force the Legislature to bring spending into balance with revenues. He doesn't, and neither does the attorney general, Mattox said.

The ruling interprets that the state can end a fiscal period with a deficit, but the next budget must include funds to erase it or stand in conflict with the Texas Constitution.

Mattox also commented that he thinks what is taking place in the Legislature with regard to the deficit is "improper."

"Now, it's the clock, not the Constitution, that those in the saddle need to watch," Bullock said.

Breathing Room

The legislative leaders breathed a sigh of relief. Many had commented that an adverse ruling would have prevented state government from functioning.

On top of that, the Legislature is grappling now with a governor who won't let them raise taxes even a little. The AG ruling allows the governor and lawmakers to concentrate on their struggle with each other.

Special Session Threat

Clements promised special sessions if lawmakers do not reform the tort laws and expand his budget cutting powers.

In response, 16 Democratic senators scoffed and signed a letter

of opposition to giving the governor budget authority. Clements scoffed back.

The Senate

In other action, the Senate passed the private prisons bill, which Clements may veto. The bill allows private contractors to build and operate prisons.

Senators also approved a measure allowing tobacco smoking in public places in designated smoking areas. Bars, tobacco shops and restaurants with small capacities are exempt and can designate their places as smoking areas.

And a bill was passed requiring Texas motorists to prove they carry liability insurance before purchasing license tags or vehicle inspections.

The House

The dramatic action occurred in the Appropriations Committee, which adjourned for the week with its chairman, Brownfield Rep. Jim Rudd, declaring it was impossible to meet state needs without exceeding Clements' budget restraints.

The committee has already approved more than \$1 billion over the governor's limit, with more spending yet to be addressed.

Rudd conceded the House panel will start over this week, but that major decisions will have to be made.

Other Highlights

• Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby endorsed Democratic presidential hopeful Gary Hart, who swung through Texas garnering support.

• Former Delaware Gov. Peter du Pont visited Dallas Republicans to woo support for his presidential bid.

• Clements blamed former SMU football coach Ron Meyer for orchestrating the illegal payment scheme to football players. He said Meyer, now in the NFL, recruited boosters to make lucrative offers to high school players.

• Texas officials who knew nothing of the negotiations were surprised about a new U.S.-Mexico agreement to allow hazardous waste shipment for disposal between the two countries. Brownsville state Sen. Hector Uribe said it will turn Mexico into a dumping ground for the U.S., and that he was really concerned for Mexico. Other Texas border state senators, fearing a stack-up at crossing points, have joined him to require that the state receive advance notification of waste shipments. Apparently the federal rules were promulgated a year ago without notifying state officials.

30 Years Ago April 11, 1957

Prize money amounting to more than \$2,000 to be offered contestants in the seven rodeo events at the 1957 Rice Springs Roundup was set up at a meeting of directors of the Saddle Tramps Riding Club, sponsors of the event.

Some children can't, or won't, cry for help when they need it - even when their lives may be in danger. They are the thousands of victims of child abuse and neglect whose suffering may go unchecked for years, often permanently impairing their health and development and sometimes costing their lives. Such children may be too young, too terrified, or simply too confused to tell anyone about it.

But even without being told, you can spot the symptoms of abuse and neglect if you know what to look for in a child's appearance and behavior and in the parent's or caregiver's behavior.

If you suspect a child has been abused or neglected, the law requires that you make a report to the Texas Department of Human Services and a law enforcement agency. Persons making reports in good faith are protected by law from liability, and their identities are kept confidential.

Your phone call may be that child's only cry for help.

Ovens not all same

The compact microwave ovens that have become a fixture in many singles' apartments, college dorms and office lunch rooms can't perform like the larger ovens.

The difference, says home economist Dr. Susan Quiring, is in the cooking wattage. "Most microwave recipes and package directions on prepared foods are

developed for ovens with wattage outputs of 600 to 700 watts. The smaller ovens typically have lower wattage outputs from 400 to 500 watts," explains the Texas A&M Extension Service specialist. She says that one of the factors that determines cooking speed is output wattage.

CHECK YOUR RETURN CAREFULLY

When your 1986 tax return is completed, you may feel like putting it in the mail and heaving a big sigh of relief. But you should take the time to check your return carefully. The IRS holds you fully responsible for the completeness and accuracy of your own return whether you or a paid professional prepared it.

If you've already filed your 1986 tax return, take it out of the drawer and carefully review it anyway. If you find an error or an omission, you can amend the return for up to three years after the date of filing or the due date on the return, whichever is later.

The more complicated your tax affairs, the more you need such a review. If you prepared your own return, consider having a professional review it. If you paid to have it prepared and you have concerns, getting a second opinion from another accountant may be worthwhile.

Accountants do many amended returns as the result of oversights in the original preparation. Probably the most frequent cause for amendment is that the original return did not take advantage of income averaging, a step that saves taxes when income jumps considerably over prior years. Other common problem areas include moving or job-hunting expenses, deducting non-business bad debts, deducting worthless stock, and Schedule C business expenses. Occasionally, very simple things are overlooked - such as child care expenses or choosing the most advantageous filing status.

You'll be reviewing your tax return in the hopes of finding additional deductions and credits that will reduce your liability or increase your tax refund. However, you may find missed income that the IRS will spot if you don't. The IRS now presumes taxpayer negligence if you omit income on your tax return that is reported to the IRS by a third party on a Form 1099 or other information return. Your review could prevent your being assessed a 5% negligence penalty by the IRS.

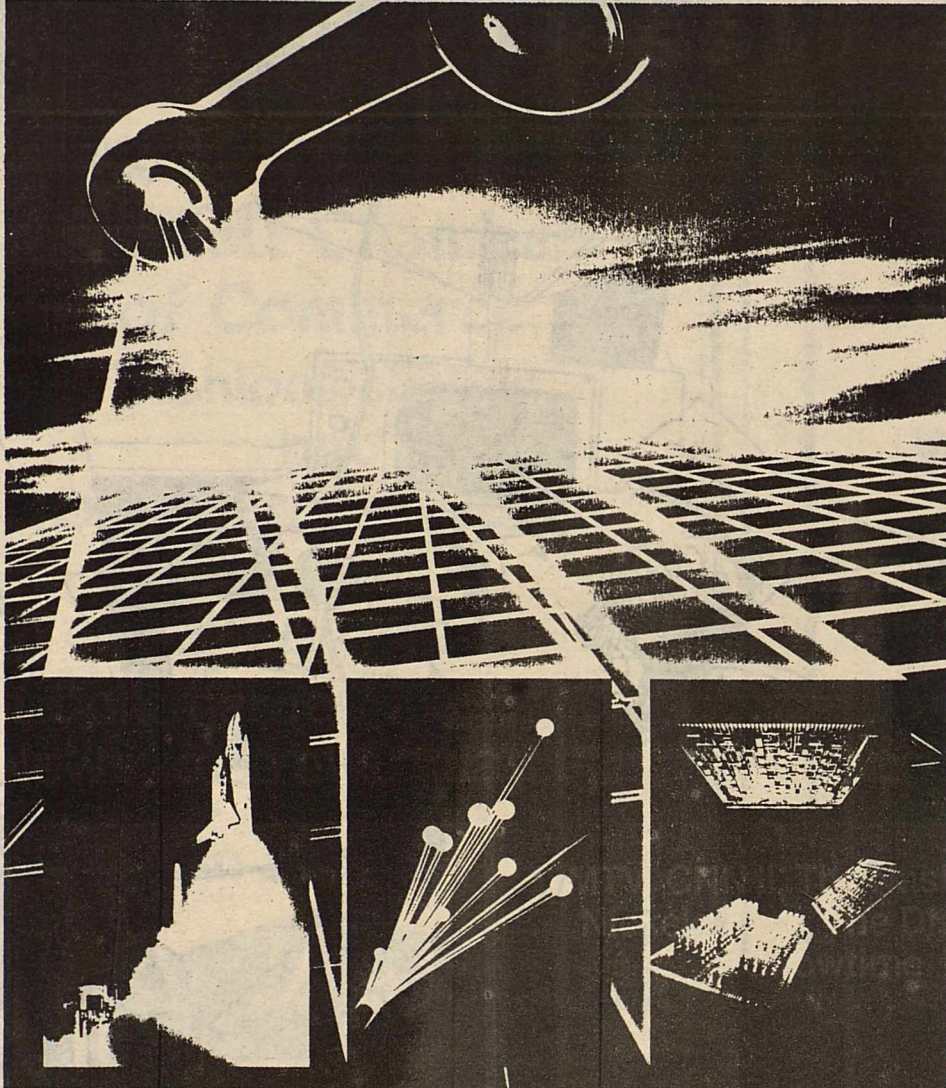
Lois, who continues her services in all chamber activities. They have four children, Cathy Marian and Tod, Flint and Sid Richardson and are the proud grandparents of eight.

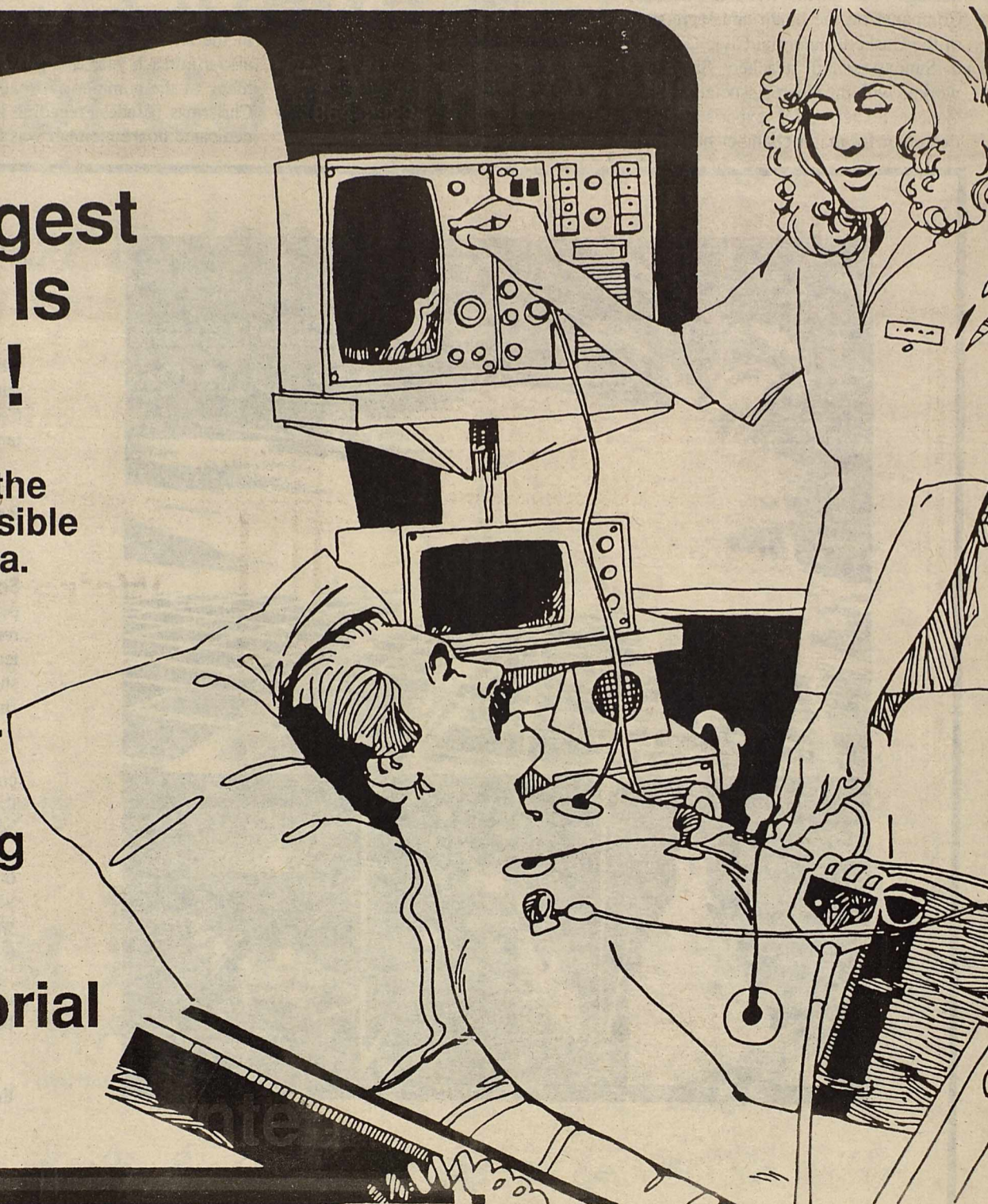

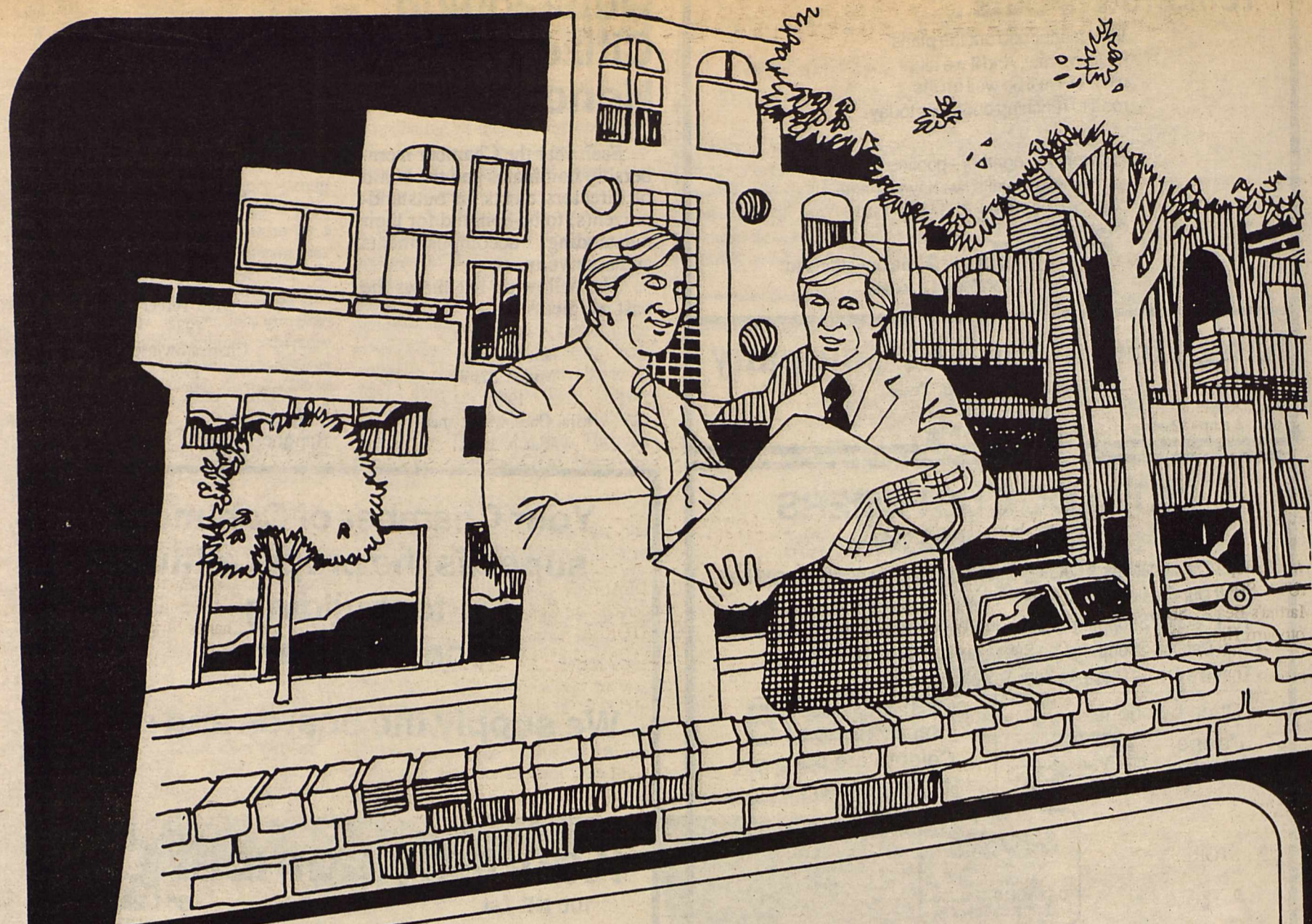

Chamber adopts ambitious goals

There are 16 members of the Board of Directors of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce, rotating tenures and elected by the entire membership.

Officers are elected by the board itself.

Goals include:

1. Making known the resources of Haskell and promoting the town in its endeavors.

2. Working with other organizations and groups in close cooperation, and often serving as an umbrella for combined efforts.

3. Actively pursue industrial development, working closely with the Industrial Foundation to this end.

4. To expand retail trade.

5. To sponsor seminars, etc., for community betterment.

6. To plan activities to draw large crowds to Haskell.

7. To publicize our town.

8. To attract tourists.

9. To offer membership to all businesses and any individuals who want to support their town through the Chamber.

10. To keep abreast of developments in agriculture and oil interest.

11. To maintain liaison with churches and schools.

12. To be aware of resources and their availability.

13. To spearhead such activities as determined by the Board of Directors and membership to enhance and promote Haskell.

The Chamber office is located at 526 South 2nd. The Haskell Chamber of Commerce is financed through membership dues and any projects from the annual banquet and the Country Dinner Theater held in the fall.

Chamber organized in 1936

The Haskell Chamber of Commerce was organized in 1936 with Dr. T.W. Williams as its first president.

It evolved from another organization, The Board of City Development, of which R.C. Couch Sr. was president.

The goals of the first Chamber were very similar to those of today - retail trade, expansion, industrial development, community betterment, tourist attraction, agribusiness, oil interests and a community spirit of unity.

Board of Directors 1987 - 1988

The Board of Directors of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce is elected by the entire membership and includes members from a variety of fields and represents a wide age span.

They were chosen because they were already established as leaders in their community through their businesses, service clubs, churches, etc.

Each Board member will be given specific assignments but the group will continue to work collectively as well.
