## She likes Haskell Young Australian nearing end of stay

She's half way around the world from her home, but Jodie Taylor has fit Haskell like a glove.

The 17-year-old Australian has lived here since August of last year. She's a 1987 graduate of Haskell High School.

She likes the local environment so well that she's staying around for the summer.

Jodie is not an exchange student. She came here on her own from her home in Melbourne. While visiting Mexico on a Girl Scout trip when she was a junior, she ran into Nancy and Leiza Morales of Haskell, who invited her to come here and go to school during her senior year. She accepted the invitation. She arrived last August.

She lived in the Morales home until just recently when she took up quarters with Duward and Gwen Campbell, who have played hosts to a number of foreign exchange students in recent years.

Her father, Glyn Taylor, came to visit her May 24 and was here for her graduation. He stayed until Monday of this week when he returned to Australia. Her mother and 19-year-old brother, Craig, visited her in the spring.

Jodie had an interesting year at Haskell High. She took part in most activities, including journalism and band.

She said some of the courses here were easier than in Australia. World history, for instance, was about like what she had in the seventh or eighth grade. English, she said, is on about the same level. American history was different, as it was new to her.

In Australia, Jodie attended Dandenong High School, which has a student body of about 1,000. Fifty-two percent of the students are ethnic, she said. Greeks, Italians and other Europeans, as well as Asians, make up much of the enrollment.

Australian students go to public schools 13 years, beginning with kindergarten and prep school. High school is grades 7 through 12.

One big difference in the schools here and those in her native country is the big emphasis here on sports. The competitiveness here is far greater than in Australia, and Jodie likes this.

In concert band in Australia, Jodie said she practiced once a week. Here, it's every day.

Although Australia still is a member of the British Commonwealth, the government is independent. The population has grown a lot in recent years, but still is only 16 1/2 million. Only the coastal areas of the continent are populated.

Many foreigners have migrated to Australia. Only Athens has a greater Greek population than Melbourne. In the 1960s, the government gave incentives to settlers, which brought about an influx of foreigners. Wheat and cattle are the chief agricultural products, but these are produced by the big operators. Settlers are primarily involved in dairying and raising truck crops. The climate is mild, with the winter coming in the months of June, July and August. "Forty degrees is cold," says Jodie.

When she returns home, Jodie plans to enroll in nursing school. After completing that she wants to go to airline stewardess school. She hopes to visit Europe during Christmas this year. The next year, she says, she's coming back to Haskell.

## Attends Honors Institute

Darla Griffis, daughter of Donald and Gracie Griffis of Weinert, attended the Phi Theta Kappa Honors Institute in Charlottesville, Va. She was inducted into Phi Theta Kappa last fall at Western Texas College in Snyder.

Phi Theta Kappa is the junior community colleges' National Honors Fraternity, which requires at least a 3.5 grade-point average for membership. Darla had a 4.0 GPA this past semester. She will attend Texas Tech this fall.

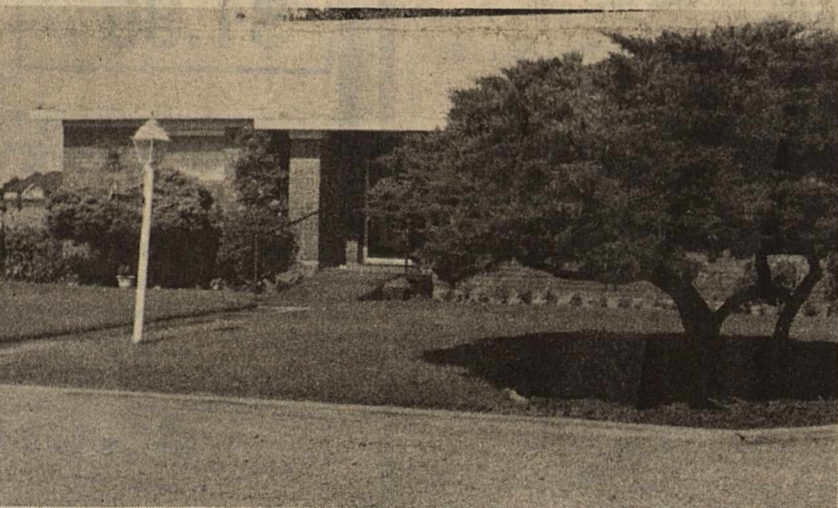
She was one of 300 students nationwide who qualified to attend the Honors Institute.

## Sales tax receipts continue downward

The City of Haskell's check this month for sales taxes was for \$8,361.73.

While the latest check compared quite well with last year's check of \$8,620.70 for the same period, the year-to-date total stands 13.41 percent below what it was at this time in 1986.

Haskell has received \$72,649.04 during the first six months of this year, compared to \$83,904.38 for the first six months of 1986.

Rule was the only other county city receiving a check this month, it being for \$1,017.78.

For the year, Rule stands at \$15,292.39, Rochester has gotten \$3,531.15, Weiner's total is \$1,428.02 and O'Brien stands at \$924.51.

Countywide, sales tax collections this year are down by 16.51 percent, reflecting a trend which is noted throughout the area and throughout the state.

Jones County is down by 13.87 percent, Knox County by 15.99 percent, Throckmorton by 19.2 percent, Baylor County by 20.95 percent and Stonewall County by 24.78 percent.

Instructors for the swimming classes which begin next week have been announced by Jimmy Lisle, swimming pool manager.

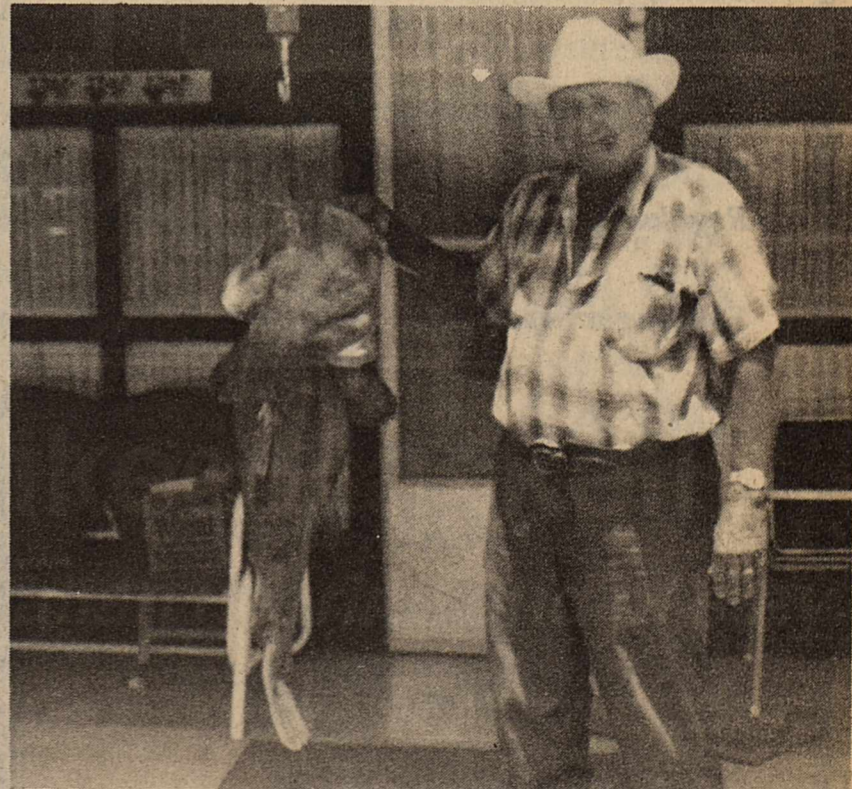
Lori Peiser will be instructor for the beginning class, Lisle will instruct the novice and intermediate classes, and Randy Stone will be instructor for the advanced class.

A business meeting was held in which Allan Toliver of Wichita Falls was elected president and Lynda Perin Rexrode of Sherman was elected secretary-treasurer.

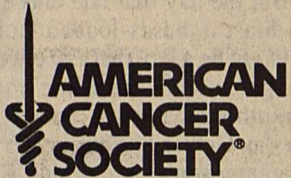

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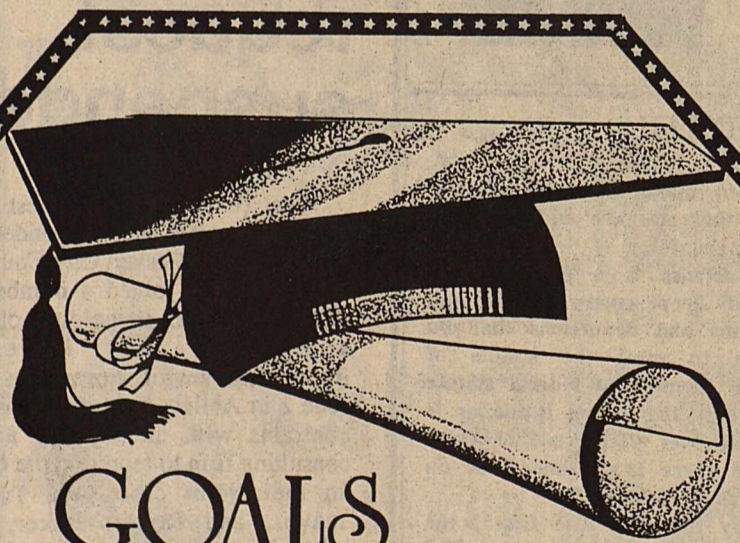

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# Commentary

## Court justices facing pressure

AUSTIN—On the heels of the no-budget 70th Legislature, two Texas Supreme Court justices face pressure for their resignations and possible impeachment.

However, the Legislature, due to grapple soon with massive budget cuts or taxes, is in no mood to be distracted from that task until it's over.

Still the question of whether the special call should be widened to include impeachment is an issue that will probably be discussed until adjournment.

Justices C.L. Ray and William Kilgarlin were publicly reprimanded for seven counts of misconduct last week by the State Commission on Judicial Conduct. It's the first time the Commission has disciplined high court justices.

Governor Bill Clements, a Republican, quickly called for the two Democrats to resign, as did state Senator Frank Tejada, D-San Antonio, who last year chaired the House panel which pursued the alleged wrongdoings.

### Rides and Funds

The Commission reprimanded Ray for accepting free plane rides, trying to transfer court cases for

fire on the budget issue, won't risk pushing lawmakers on a probable bipartisan issue this special session.

If the sentiment still smolders, the governor could call a special session for impeachment later.

Certainly, Ray and Kilgarlin have been controversial figures related to at least three important issues this past year: the Tejada Committee probe, the proposal to change to appointed judges, and tort reform, where critics complain the two justices too often side with plaintiffs.

### Clements, SMU

Ironically, the governor revisited the site of another probe last week, when he testified before a bishops' committee investigating "Ponygate," the play-for-pay scandal of the SMU football team.

Clements, a former SMU board governor, was questioned for three hours about his knowledge of the illegal activities, but declined to name others who knew of the illegal payments. The exchange was termed "friendly."

### Other Issues

- State Comptroller Bob Bullock set the stage for a grim special session by forecasting that revenues for the next two years will be about \$700 million lower than earlier projected. He stressed that Clements inherited a bad situation.

- Houston oilman Jack Blanton, a former Southwest Conference tennis champion, was elected chairman of The University of Texas System regents last week.

- Dallas financier Jess Hay did not seek reelection after Clements publicly sought to prevent Hay, a top Democratic fundraiser, from keeping that post.

- The Texas Low-Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Authority last week began its third statewide search for a low-level dump site. The agency expects to complete the search by summer, 1989.

- West Texas isn't taking it lying down. Backers from Odessa, Midland, San Angelo and Big Spring areas are working to have the feds consider their region as a site for the proposed supercollider.

- A state group passed over this area and submitted Dallas and Amarillo as the two Texas sites, but the mavericks are considering end-running that decision.

### City of Haskell sells two lots

The City of Haskell last week agreed to sell two lots on which old city water wells are located.

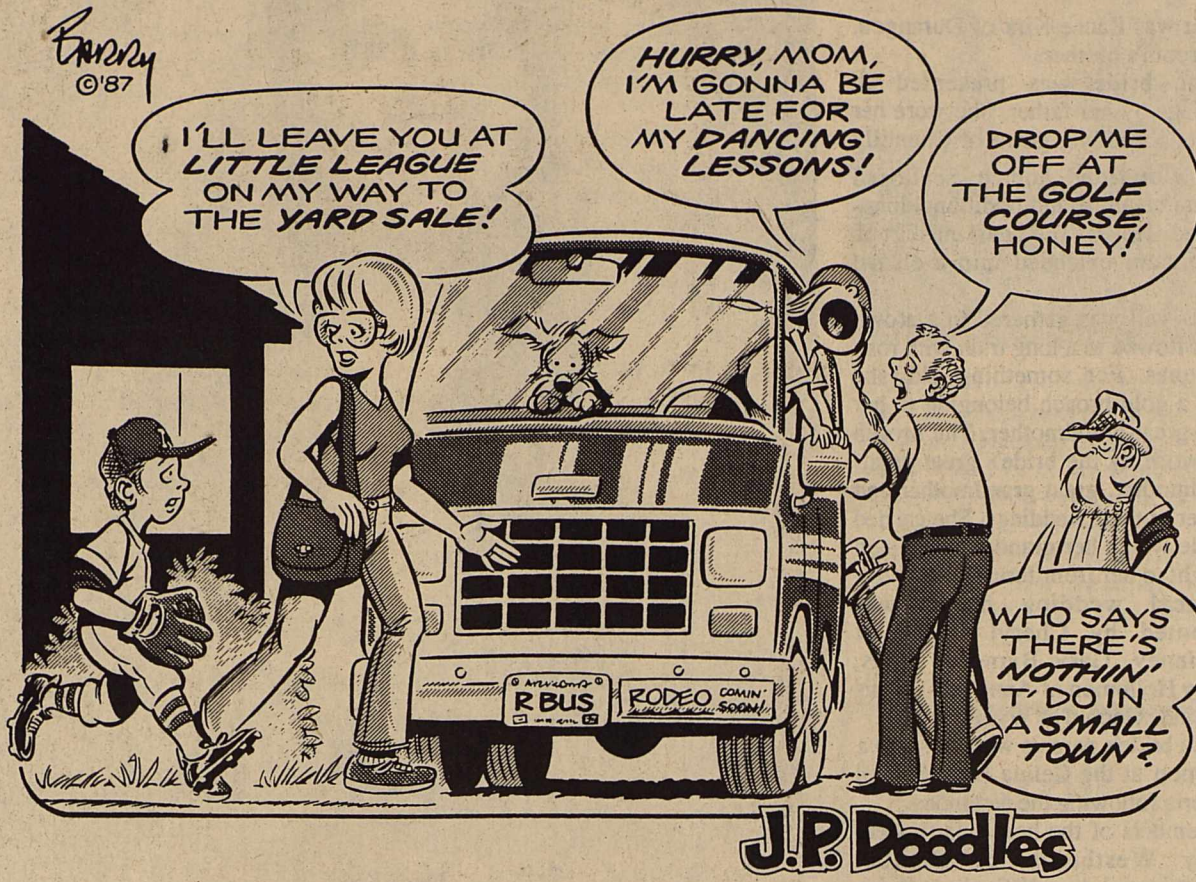

Can you put this on the front page?

It's a common question around the newspaper, and my answer is always an evasive one.

The last time I promised someone that I would put a story on the front page was on Nov. 22, 1963. I had told a Baptist preacher that I would run a story on a Thanksgiving service on page 1. At the time, I couldn't think of any local story which would be more deserving. Two hours later, history changed course. A picture of John F. Kennedy covered the entire front page of our next edition.

Some people and some events don't get the media attention that others do, even though they may be just as important. It's often a matter of timing.

Lou Gehrig, the great Yankee first baseman of the 20s and 30s, was one of these. He spent the prime of his career in the shadow of his more illustrious teammate, Babe Ruth. Just about every time he would perform a remarkable feat, The Babe would do him one better.

Lou hit more grand slammers than anyone who had ever played the game. But the day that fate chose for him to blast a bases-loaded homer would likely be a day that Babe would win the game with a dramatic homer in the ninth inning.

One day Gehrig hit four homers in one game, something which Ruth had never done, nor anyone else at that stage of baseball history. Surely, he would get the next morning's sports-page headlines in New York.

But fate's choice of timing once again bowed its ugly head. His performance occurred on the very day the legendary John J. McGraw chose to announce his retirement as manager of the cross-town Giants.

If he had played in another era, Gehrig might have been considered by some as the greatest of them all.

Instead, he was generally known as that other Yankee.

Lou got some redemption, or at least his reputation did, when Paul Gallico (or was it Callico?) wrote "Pride of the Yankees." It was made into a movie which became one of the best of the Hollywood classics.

But again the great Yankee was short-changed. He died a year before the book was published.

True old time baseball fans recall the heroics of this son of German immigrants, while the rank and file associate his name with the disease which killed him.

Such is life.  
And death.

a campaign contributor, soliciting funds from attorneys with cases before the court and for pursuing a libel suit against a Tejada committee witness.

**IRS AUDITS AND YOU**

There are some steps you can take to make an audit of your tax return less likely and, in the event that you are audited, steps that you can take to make that experience less painful.

To avoid being audited, your best defense is a good offense. File an accurate, complete return, and keep good records and supporting documentation for income items and deductions that you claim. Keep your records long enough to meet the statute of limitations for the tax return related to them. The federal statute is three years from the later of the date the return is due or is actually filed. The statute is six years if over 25 percent of gross income is omitted from the return, and there is no time limit on fraudulent returns or where no return has been filed.

Two kinds of audits are conducted by the IRS. The first is the office audit, an examination done by correspondence or at an IRS office. The IRS will ask for information or documentation related to specific items on your return. These audits can often be concluded very quickly by providing the requested information. The second kind of audit is the field audit which is usually conducted at the taxpayer's home or place of business. Questionable items on the return have been identified by the IRS, but the agent is not limited to these in his examination.

The IRS uses a complex system to select returns for audit. In general, your return will be at higher risk for an audit if you take certain kinds of deductions (deductions for tax shelters, home office or travel and entertainment, for example), if your occupation involves cash income, (taxi drivers and waiters, for example), or if your income is high.

If your tax return is actually selected for audit, your best strategy is to be cooperative and provide the requested information promptly. Unless the problem is simple and routine, contact your accountant immediately. A professional can put your mind at ease and very likely save you time and money.

On Tuesday, the Haskell team traveled to Jayton where it defeated the Jaybirds, 4-3. Jay Miller went all the way on the mound for Haskell.

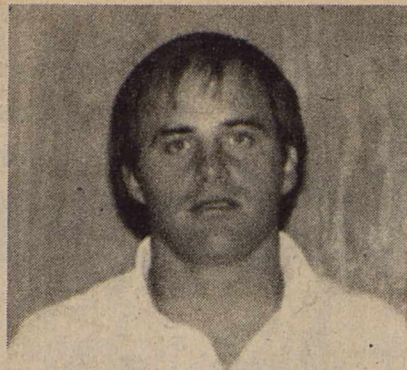

## Yearbook staff wins at Wichita

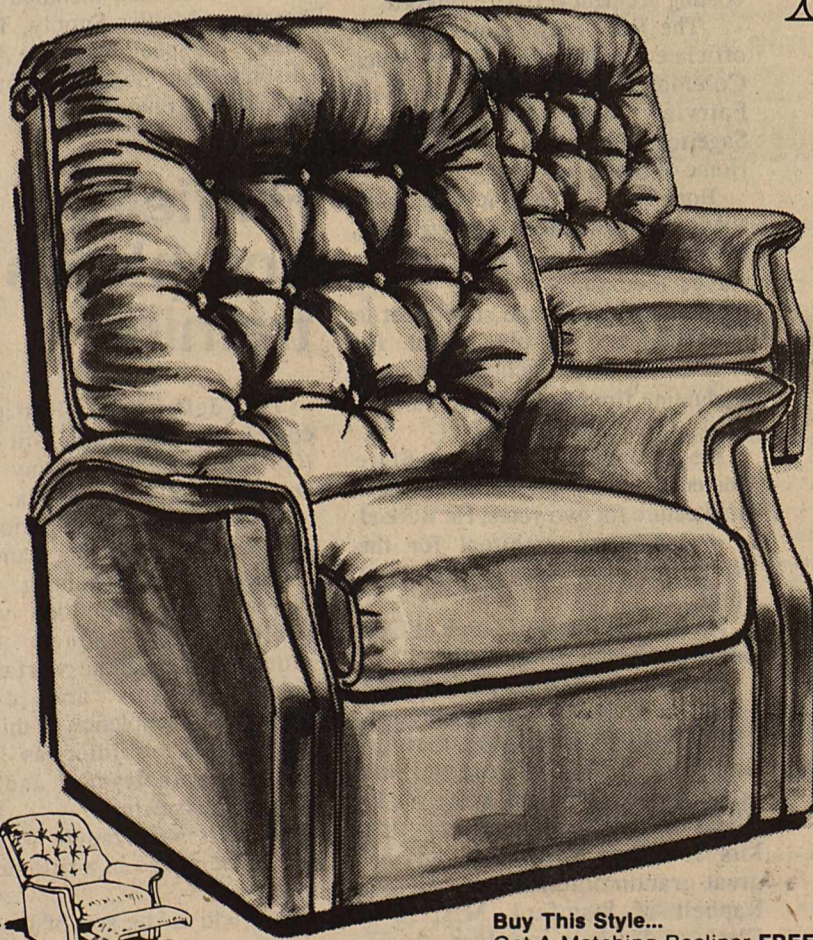

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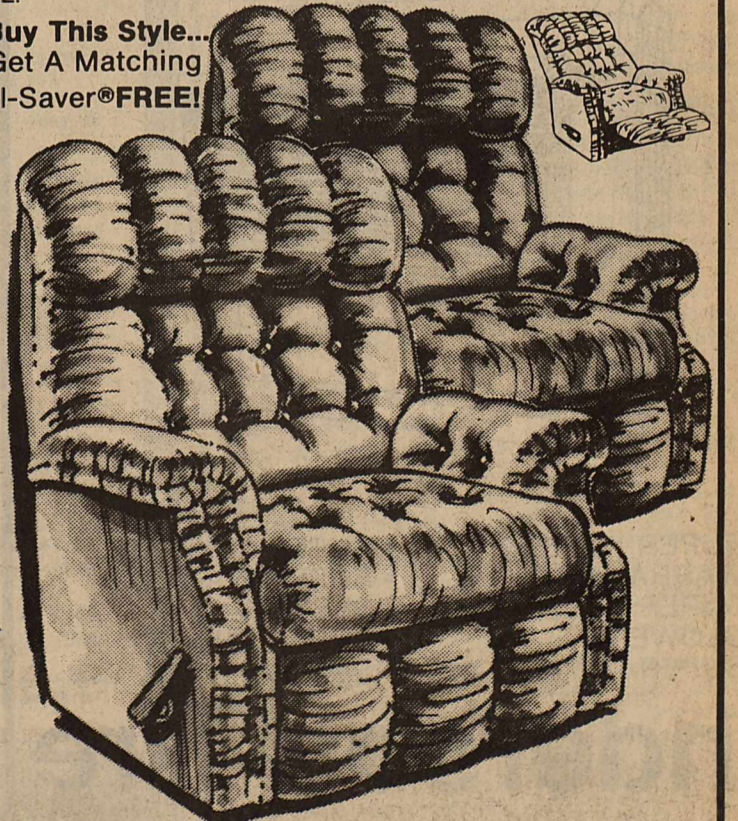

# Scouting deadline extended

Many producers are just now getting into their fields to plant. Therefore the sign-up date for signing acreage into the Haskell-Stonewall Pest Management Scouting Program has been extended to July 1.

Normally it takes about 120 days to set a cotton crop and get maximum yields. Due to the lateness of the season and cotton being planted on into late June, the time we will have to make a crop will be about 100 days. This makes it much more important to set and keep that first crop. This will mean protecting it

against insects such as thrips, fleahoppers, bollworms and boll weevils. Producers should either scout their own fields or hire someone to scout for them on a regular basis.

The Haskell-Stonewall Pest Management Steering Committee has organized a scouting program for the 1987 season. Cotton will be checked by field scouts who will be trained and supervised by Paula Verden, the entomologist for Fisher, Jones, Kent, Haskell and Stonewall counties.

Scouts will attend a scout training school and spend time in the field training with Paula, who will be checking behind the scouts to make sure they are not missing anything. A scout report form will be given to the

producer each week after the scouts check the fields. The entomologist also gets a copy of the report. All treatment recommendations will be made by the entomologist, then it will be the producer's decision whether or not to treat at that time.

Dryland cotton will be scouted one time each week for \$2.75 per planted acre. Irrigated cotton will be checked twice each week for \$4.25 per planted acre. Payment must be made in full before scouts will start checking fields. In the event acres are signed into the program, then these acres are not planted due to weather, there will be a full refund. If cotton is hailed out during the season, a refund will be given, percentage-wise, according to the amount of scouting that has been done.

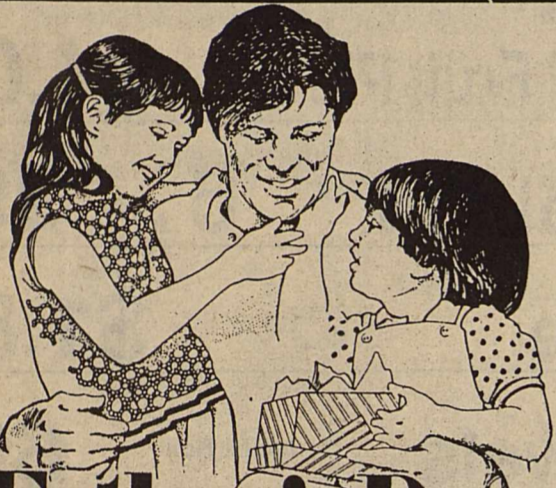

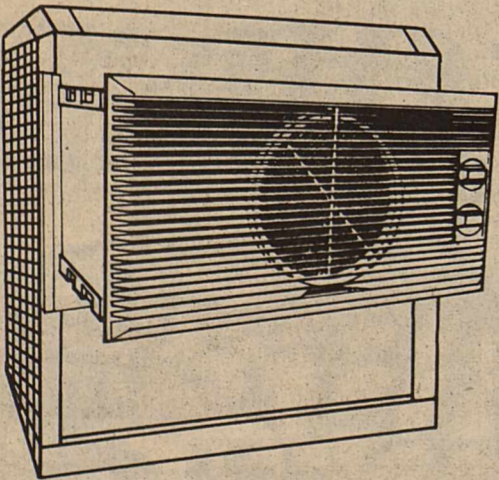

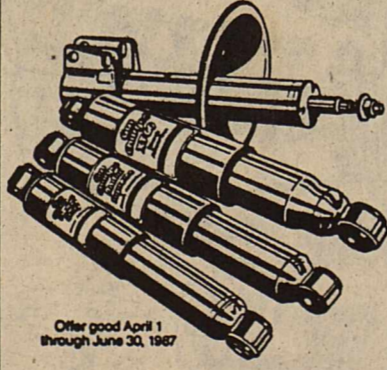

OSUT is a 12-week period which combines basic combat training and advanced individual training.

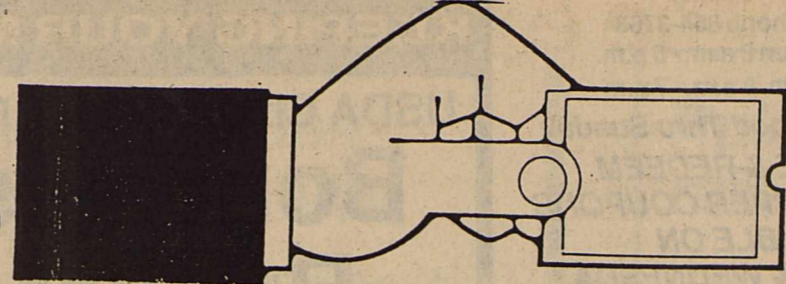
