Accidents to take 40 lives

The Department of Public Safety estimates that 40 persons will die in traffic accidents in the state during the upcoming 4th of July holiday period.

For counting purposes, the National Safety Council has designed the 78-hour period from 6 p.m. Thursday, July 2, through midnight Sunday, July 5, as the holiday period.

Last year, 41 persons were killed in Texas traffic accidents during the 4th of July period, with four others subsequently dying of injuries suffered during the period.

"Even though the 1986 and 1987 holiday periods are the same length, we're hopeful that fewer persons will die this year, in keeping with the steady decline in traffic deaths we have been observing in recent years," said Col. Leo Gossett, director of the

Though the number of holiday vehicle deaths varies from year to year, the causes of fatal accidents do

"Last year, slightly more than 6 out of 10 traffic fatalities resulted from accidents in which either speed or driving while intoxicated were listed as contributing factors,' Gossett said. "The message is clear--high speed or driving under the influence of alcohol, and often a combination of both, can kill motorists. It's also very important to remember to wear that safety belt and make sure very young children are in child safety seats.

As in years past, the DPS will conduct its Operation Motorcide program during the 4th of July period, with periodic reports on the number of traffic deaths occurring during the 78-hour counting period.

Additionally, as part of Operation Holiday, DPS Highway Patrol commanders will be assigning added personnel to patrol the state's highways.

Partisan politics fill Capitol halls

AUSTIN - - Impeachment remarks flew like bullets in an old fashioned "cowboy shootout" and partisan politics filled Capitol halls when lawmakers reconvened last week.

The heat on Gov. Bill Clements has never been hotter as some lawmakers scorched him for his role in the ponygate scandal, as depicted in the freshly released Methodist bishops' report.

Two House members, Paul Moreno, D-El Paso, Al Edwards, D-Houston, filed a resolution to begin a inquiry geared to Clements' removal. Lena Guerrero, D- Austin, and Debra Danburg, D-Houston, were also vocal for in starting the probe now.

Attorney Gen. Jim Mattox said his office is investigating whether Clements broke any state laws during Ponygate or committed other impeachable acts.

By the end of the week, cooler heads urged members to work instead on the task they couldn't finish in regular session, the forging of a new state budget in the face of dwindling revenues.

Hobby Sets Pace

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby quickly established the pace of the special session by zipping his previous

budget plan through the Senate in a quick two days.

His opening gambit was to retake his position held when the curtain rang down a month ago. (Clements responded in kind, promising to veto Hobby's budget because it needs new taxes.)

"His administration has been unfortunate for the state, as there have been other unfortunate administrations, but I see no grounds for impeachment," Hobby said.

Make no mistake about it. The opposition is intense between the Hobby and Clements political camps, and may diminish only with the political demise of one or the other.

Here It Comes!

So stuck in the middle again with the burden of forging a budget compromise is Speaker Gib Lewis and the House.

Their package doesn't spend as much as Hobby's, but opposes Clements because it will necessitate almost a penny increase in the state sales tax.

Partisan Survival

But partisan survival instincts probably won't let Texas walk gracefully into the next decade.

This Legislature is already controversial for many reasons. Judgment Day lies ahead.

The '88 presidential election. particularly if a Texan is a candidate, will attract many Texans to the polls to approve or disapprove the acts of these legislators.

In '90, political parties will want to tilt the Legislature in their favor as they begin to redraw boundaries. That, too, will pull all the stops out of the election.

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

Editor: Although the insurance legislation passed in June by the Texas Legislature has been called "reform" legislation, the consumers of Texas actually lost a key safeguard of their interests while getting little or nothing in return.

Since 1957, the Attorney General's office has had the statutory authority to intervene in insurance rate cases on behalf of the public interest. The 1957 legislation was passed in the wake of nuemrous and almost continuous insurance scandals of the mid-1950s, including the ICT Insurance Co. scandal involving the company's president and state insurance officials.

In April 1957, a special House investigating committee heard testimony of widespread fraud and corruption, including monthly payments to the son-in-law of one state insurance commissioner and questionable payments to another commissioner and the state's chief insurance examiner. The investigation was conducted with the help of then Attorney General Will Wilson.

In response to such flagrant abuses of the regulatory process, the Attorney General's office was given statutory authority to be the public's watchdog at the State Board of Insurance. Under my administration, we have used this authority to the fullest extent and opposed rate hikes automobile, workers' compensation and medical malpractice insurance---to the obvious displeasure

of the insurance companies. As a result of Senate Bill 2 passed this June, the Attorney General no longer will be allowed to appear on behalf of the public in property and casualty insurance rate cases. This includes automobile, workers' compensation and commercial liability insurance. Instead, the legislature has created a division of consumer protection within the State Board of Insurance.

At first glance, creating a public counsel for insurance rate cases sounds like a fine idea. The public counsel for utility rate cases, created by legislation in 1983, has been a benefit to the public, working hard to hold down utility costs. There is a huge difference, however, between the way the insurance public counsel and the utility public council vill work; and the public needs to be aware of these differences.

The important deficiencies in the new legislation are the following:

* The new public insurance counsel will not have an independent right to appeal insurance rate hikes that are granted by the State Board of Insurance. Instead, an interested policyholder who has the financial means to appeal and who requests the public counsel to join the appeal must first file the suit. Otherwise, the public counsel will be forced to sit idly by and watch the rate hikes take

* The public counsel will be a division of the State Board of Insurance itself and not an independent agency like the public counsel in utility rate cases.

* Senate Bill 2 allows insurance companies to retain premium overcharges even if a successful appeal results in rates being lowered. This means that insurance companies can charge the higher rates while an appeal is pending and never have to refund overcharges to consumers.

So, once again, the giant insurance companies have steamrollered the Texas Legislature into passing anticonsumer legislation. Because of a strong insurance lobby at the state and national levels, the giant insurance companies already enjoy favored status under federal antitrust laws and Texas' consumer protection laws. Now the lobby has successfully halted the only means of safeguarding the public interest in insurance proceedings.

All this at a time in 1986 when property and casualty insurance companies reported an increase of 60 percent in net after-tax operating income, compared to the previous year. No wonder the insurance companies claim 1986 was a "critical year" for the insurance industry. 1987 certainly will be a "critical year" for insurance consumers, who must continue to pay higher rates without a strong, independent public advocate.

During the next regular session of the legislature in 1989, I will push for either a return of the Attorney General to the rate-making process or an independent public counsel with full rights of appeal.



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

ATTENDS SEMINAR

Changes asked in review process

In a move to improve the process used to review physicians who treat Texas Medicare patients, the Texas Medical Associaiton approved 29 recommendations at its recent policymaking meeting in Houston.

TMA and Texas congressmen have been critical of the process used to assure that quality care is delivered to Medicare patients, stating that rural doctors are being held to unrealistic standards and that availability of care is being threatened.

Among the recommendations is one that rural hospitals be encouraged to seek agreements with larger nearby hospitals and clinics to assist in peer review. This more regional approach would make physician review more effective by including needed specialty expertise that may not be available in small rural hospital settings.

The majority of sanctions in Texas have been against doctors in rural parts of the state.

TMA also approved narrowing the definition of "gross and flagrant" violations to include actions that constitute an immediate health threat to Medicare patients. They also agreed that such violations be reported immediately to the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners and to the hospital where the physician has staff privileges.

The review process has been criticized for its subjective and sometimes misunderstood definition of "gross and flagrant" violations.

In a related item, TMA agreed to draw increased public attention to the financial hardships faced by Texas' small rural hospitals because of Medicare's reimbursement system.






Stamford rodeo continues

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

NEW IMMIGRATION LAW

Employers who hire illegal aliens are now subject to fines and possible imprisonment under the provisions of the new Immigration Reform and Control Act.

The new law requires employers to check the immigration status of workers hired from November 6, 1986, on, the date President Reagan signed the law. The enforcement date was moved from the original June 1, 1987, to July 1, 1987, for all but "very flagrant" infractions. This effective date marks the point at which the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) will begin citing offenders.

For a first offense employers will receive a warning, but after that citations can result in civil fines running from \$250 to \$10,000 per worker. Repeat offenders are subject to additional fines and up to six months imprisonment. As of June 1, 1988, no more warning citations will be issued.

Though the law places a significant burden on employers, the government has been slow in distributing information and necessary forms.

To comply with the new law, employers must fill out a Form I-9 for each new worker. The employer is to check documentation that verifies a potential employee's citizenship, legal residency, or intent to file for legal residency. The I-9 Forms need not be filed with any government agency, but they must be available for review on the business premises.

Employers cannot check only those workers who look like immigrants without opening themselves to charges of discrimination. The new law does not exempt any employers, but it does provide special rules for agricultural employers.

A bill pending in Congress would move the bill's start-up dates to October 1, 1987. In the meantime, however, employers should get details on the new law and take the necessary steps to put themselves in full compliance.


