### Bush solid with Texas Republicans

AUSTIN—Texas Republicans flocked to Houston last week for their party's nationally televised presidential candidate debate, while Texas Democrats entertained the advances of candidates seeking their support.

Meanwhile, Secretary of State Jack Rains predicted a low turnout for the Nov. 3 general election, a forecast reinforced by the small amount of pre-vote political activity.


A new poll with no surprises indicated Texans strongly favor Vice President George Bush among Republicans and give Jesse Jackson a narrow edge among Democrats, with most voters undecided.

An unrelated Houston poll shows the stock market collapse did not affect the personal finances of most Texans. Fifty-five percent of respondents said they felt no impact, and only six percent said the collapse had a major impact on their positions.

In San Antonio, officials of urban counties meeting there approved a resolution asking the governor to call a special session of the Legislature to deal with prison overcrowding.

Private Prisons

Gov. Bill Clements, stumping for the proposed prison construc-



tion bonds, told the group he wants Texas to build 19,000 new prison beds in 1991 to ease overcrowding, but a prison reform group said more beds won't solve the problem.

CURE, Citizens United for Rehabilitation of Errants, prefers the state commit to probation and parole reforms, and base sentencing guidelines on prison capacity.

Clements fared badly in last week's popularity poll, and Attorney General Jim Mattox, appearing at the same San Antonio meeting, rapped the governor for lack of leadership.

Mattox Also cast doubts on some of the bond proposals, saying he didn't "like moving away from a balanced-budget position." But some may recall that it was a Mattox official opinion last session that allowed the Legislature to issue cash management notes, or borrow, to accommodate state spending. Mattox is now running for governor.

#### **Funds Questioned**

State Sen. Frank Tejeda, D-San Antonio, asked two Supreme Court chief justice candidates to return campaign contributions from law firms and lawyers with

cases pending before the high court.

But his targets, Supreme Court Justices Robert Campbell and Ted Robertson, said it would be impossible.

Reports show Campbell, since 1985, has received \$212,868 in contributions from parties with pending cases.

Robertson files show \$27,400, or 52 percent of his 1987 campaign funds came from parties with docketed cases.

Te jeda, who chaired the special legislative panel which last year investigated charges of improprieties of two other justices, said returning the money would remove the perception that justice is for sale in Texas.

#### Lease Questioned

Comptroller Bob Bullock and Land Commissioner Garry Mauro said there was nothing wrong with the lease by which Bullock manages some 1,880 acres of state land in South Texas. A news probe turned up no evidence of special treatment.

The news account quoted some area landowners' suspicions of a "special deal," but also reported Bullock is paying more than anyone else offered.

Bullock shares the lease with a lobbyist, George Garland, and has built fences and seeded some areas to reclaim arid brushland.

#### Other Highlights

• An Austin state district court ordered Texas A&M University to release files from its 1986 in-house probe into football recruiting violations, specifically records dealing with the recruitment of quarterback Kevin Murray.


The court order was in response to a lawsuit filed by the Fort Worth Star-Telegram under the state's open records act.

• The State Board of Insurance opened hearings on a proposal to raise workers' compensation insurance rates by over 43 percent.

• State Rep. Juan Hinojosa, D-McAllen, said reports he was quitting his seat were wrong. He will stand for re-election next year and possibly run for chairman of the House Mexican-American

• The Texas Supreme Court ruled unanimously that mandatory lie detector tests for state mental health employees are unconstitutional. The state began using the tests in 1983 amid probes of patient abuse.

• The number two mental health official, Deputy Commissioner Dr. Frankie Williams, announced she will retire at year's end. The top official quit less than a month ago.



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

Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching

## Watching Washington

After years of fighting and numerous stops and starts in negotiations, many Americans were surprised when the Central American nations reached a peace agreement last August.

It is not totally the agreement I would have preferred. And I have grave doubts about the willingness of the Sandinistas to negotiate away any of their power and to allow significant political opposition in Nicaragua.

But we must be mindful of the fact that the Central Americans them-

selves—including the leaders who have been most supportive of U.S. policies in that region—have embraced this agreement.

As part of the agreement, the Nicaraguan government pledged that as of

this week it will be in compliance with the Guatemala City agreement, including requirements for restoring freedom of the press, lifting the state of emergency and allowing opposition parties to operate without interference.

I'll be watching closely to see how much of the Sandinista's pledges are

for real and how much are for show.

Compliance—or non-compliance—by the Sandinistas will be moot, however, if Nicaragua's democratic institutions, such as the press and labor and business organizations, lack the funds they need to peacefully exercise the rights that supposedly have been restored to them.

To help do that, I proposed—and the Senate unanimously approved—a provision to assist opposition political parties, independent news media, democratic labor unions and the nation's business association.

It adds \$250,000 to the appropriation for the National Endowment for Democracy, an organization composed of business, labor and political parties and operating under a mandate from Congress to promote democracy abroad.

This sum is intended to bolster, supplement and expand existing but inadequate funding.

It will help democratic opposition parties, unions and the nation's business association in their educational efforts. Also, LA PRENSA, the independent Nicaraguan newspaper that has recently been allowed to resume publishing, would receive additional assistance in buying newsprint, repairing presses and hiring back staff.

The increased funding is for the next four to six months. During that time, we hope to reach a valid judgment as to whether—or how much—things have changed in Nicaragua. If needed, we could vote additional aid later.

This is a separate issue from aid to the Contras, an issue which has been the source of some harsh debate and which should be considered on its own merits.

Considering the tenor of that debate, it is particularly reassuring that

Fast food was what you ate during Lent; there were no FM radios, tape recorders, electric typewriters, word processors, MUZAK, electronic music, discodancing, or decaffeinated coffee.

In the senior citizen's youth, cigarette smoking was fashionable, grass was for mowing, Coke was a refreshing drink, and pot was something you cooked in.

If you think the youth of today have to face a lot of changes in the world, think how today's senior citizens have to adjust to the world's changes.

For instance, my mom was born before the first airplane was flown, came to West Texas in a covered wagon, and washed clothes on a rubboard and washpot even when I was small, and she's still under a century old.

Not so at a station in Stamford where 15.1 gallons registered \$15.59. My computer shows that to be \$1.03+ per gallon.

# Reduce cholesterol in diet

Eating a well-balanced diet can contribute to reducing your cholesterol intake, says a Texas A&M nutritionist.

Dr. Dymple Cooksey suggests

Dr. Dymple Cooksey suggests following the U.S. Dietary Guidelines by eating a variety of foods from the basic food groups, reducing total fat, saturated fat and cholesterol and increasing fiber intake.

She notes that using low-fat dairy products, trimming visible fat from meat, removing skin from poultry, and avoiding fried foods will also help reduce saturated fat and cholesterol in the diet. In addition, Cooksey says moderating intake of certain high-cholesterol foods, such as eggs, shellfish or organ meats like liver is important.

However, following a balanced diet and watching your intake of high-fat foods is not enough, according to the nutritionist. You should still have your blood cholesterol level checked by a physician. "Diet alone will not reduce blood cholesterol levels for some people she emphasizes. "Some people diagnosed by their physicians as having high cholesterol will respond to the initial diet modification, while others may require a more restrictive diet or drug treatment."



The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over -An annual physical examination and annual mammogram. IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.



#### MAGNETIC MEDIA REPORTING

Certain taxpayers are required to file information returns with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) on magnetic tape or floppy disks.

If you are required to file more than 50 information returns for the payment of dividends or interest, you must file the returns with the IRS on magnetic media. For example, if you have 31 Forms 1099-DIV (dividends) and 20 Forms 1099-INT (interest), your total information returns exceed 50 and you must use magnetic media.

If you are a broker or barter exchange, your information is reported on Form 1099-B and magnetic media filing is required regardless of the number of returns to be filed. The real estate 1099-B has the same requirements, however, it appears that waivers will be liberally granted for 1987 if the total of forms being filed is less than 250.

Other Forms 1099 and various miscellaneous information returns must be filed on magnetic media if you'll be filing 250 or more of such information slips. The requirement for 250 or more is for each individual type of information slip. If an employer expects to file 250 or more W-2s in 1987, the

employer must submit the W-2 information to the Social Security Administratrion on magnetic media filing. The 250 is a new requirement; in 1986 the level was 500 returns. If you are required to or if you want to file on magnetic media, you must first receive approval from the IRS. An application for magnetic

media reporting must be filed on Form 4419 at least 90 days before the If meeting these requirements will pose an undue hardship on your business, you may request a waiver from this filing requirement. Your request must be submitted at least 90 days before the due date of the

If you're required to file on magnetic media and fail to do so, you will be subject to a penalty of \$50 for each information return up to a maximum of \$100,000.



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



## Conservation Viewpoints USDA Soil Conservation Service

Texas pioneers used to brag that "other states were carved or born, but Texas grew from hide and horn." The saying is fairly accurate, because in the minds and hearts of many, Texas is Cattle Country.

But what's been happening to Cattle Country lately? In fact, the entire picture of Texas agriculture ha sundergone some drastic changes over the past few years, and just where producers to from here is anybody's guess.

To help bring this picture into focus, the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in late November for 1987 acreage, yield and production totals and end-of-year livestock and poultry inventories.

The confidential interviews conducted by mail, telephone or in person by field enumerators provide information used by producers to make their plans for the coming year.

"A sound marketing plan requires good, reliable information and some advanced planning. Information form our reports provides producers with solid facts and figures they can incorporate into their marketing plans for the coming year," state statistician Dennis Findley reported.

The Texas service will be trying to keep survey costs at a minimum this year because of budget custs made by the Texas Legislature, so Findley is urging producers to return their mailed questionnaires as soon as possible.

"Despite these cuts, we still plan to do our best to provide Texas farmers and ranchers with accurate, unbiased information they can use in making their day-to-day production and marketing plans," Finley said.

"Texas producers need all the information they can get just to help them survive these severe economic times."

Buddy Lane, club president, said he has named Dickie Greenwood chairman of the PolioPlus committee. Other members are Charles McCauley, R. C. Couch, Tom Hairgrove, Abe Turner and Jim Williams.

Lane said the club has set \$900 as its fund-raising target. The club will carry out a variety of activities to reach the goal, Lane said, the first being to ask the club's own members for financial support. He indicated that \$300 already has been raised.

A \$6 million child survival grant was awarded to Rotary International for its PolioPlus program by the United States Agency for International Development (AID). Recent announcement of the grant was made by U. S. Sen. Robert Dole in ceremonies in the U.S. Capitol.

Rotary has pledged to provide vaccine to immunize every child in the world against poliomyelitis. Rotarians in 161 countires are

working to raise \$120 million to buy the vaccine. The AID grant pushes the amount actually raised to more than \$50 million.

Sen. Dole said he was pleased that AID is supporting the Rotary PolioPlus program. He noted that while the disease has been controlled in the United States, it still kills many children in developing countries.



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
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

### In 42-6 romp

## Indians bury Hawley

The Haskell Indians exploded for six touchdowns at Hawley Friday night to rack up their third consecutive district 7-2A victory and set the stage for this weekend's showdown with Anson to determine their post-season status. The 42-6 victory, which brought Haskell's district record to 3-1, boosted the Indians' season mark to 6-3 and assured them of their first winning season since 1983.

Fred Shaw, who rushed 18 times for 170 yards, scored three touchdowns, Mark Young got two touchdowns and Derrick Billington added another on a 75-yard jaunt as the Indians put on their greatest offensive show of the season.

The Indians accumulated 463 yards via ground and air after taking total command of the game immediately after the opening kickoff. They scored twice in the first period, once in the second, twice in the third and again in the fourth before yielding a harmless touchdown to the Bearcats late in the

Young ran 28 yards on the very first play from scrimmage and followed that with scampers of 17 and 5 yards. After a fumbled snap went for no gain and Patrick Perez ran 11 yards to the 4, Young took it over on the next play, the sixth in the 65-yard drive. Chan Guess booted the first of his six consecutive extra points to stake the Indians to a 7-0 cushion with the game only two and a half minutes old.

At the 3:58 mark of the first period, Billington raced 75 yards for another Haskell score to make it 14-

The Indians went 80 yards in seven plays for their third score. Shaw got the touchdown from 24 yards out after he broke loose from one would-be tackler and hurdled over another. The drive had been highlighted by a 26yard Guess-to-Stephon Brockington pass and a 24-yard run by Billington.

Haskell made it 28-0 in the third period when Shaw went over from the 6 after another Guess-to-Brockington bomb had gained 32 yards. And a minute and a half before the third quarter ended, Young scored from the 5 on the third play after he had recovered a Hawley fumble at the 13.


