### Perry asks for re-election

Saying that he wants to continue the work he has started, Representative Rick Perry (D-Haskell) has filed the necessary paperwork with officials in Austin to run for re-election to the Texas legislature. Perry is seeking his third term representing the 64th Distirct, which includes Callahan, Haskell, Hood, Palo Pinto, Shackelford, Stephens, Throckmorton and Young

"I have enjoyed serving the people of the 64th District for the past three years," Perry said, "and I hope they will send me back to Austin as their voice there. I believe we have made great strides in restoring fiscal responsibility to our state government, and I want to continue to work for all the residents of our

Perry cited his work on the Appropriations Committee as among his major accomplishments of this year's legislative session. "We were faced with some really hard choices," he said. "There were a lot of so-called experts who said we could never balance the budget. We made some deep cuts in state spending, including eliminating some agencies. But we managed to preserve necessary services, and I'm proud of the work

Perry also serves on the powerful House Calendars Committee and is chairman of Budget and Oversight for the Judicial Affairs Committee.

The representative noted what while committee work may seem unglamorous, it is very important to the legislative process, adding, "the better a member's committee assignments, the more he can do for his district." Perry also said that he is in line for a chairmanship of a major Ouse committee.

When asked about the future, Perry stressed the need to continue the efforts to re-energize the Texas economy. "It's showing some signs of improvement," Perry said. "Unemployment seems to have bottomed out, and things are beginning to look a little better. We have to keep working to insure our state's future, both for ourselves and for our children. Together, we make Texas even better, and lead her into e next century.

### 'Justice for sale' program criticized

AUSTIN-Two days after television's "Sixty Minutes" criticized the Texas Supreme Court as justice for sale, one high court judge charged that the broadcast was tainted.

He also blasted Gov. Bill Clements for publicly criticizing the court's decision not to review the controversial Pennzoil-Texaco megabucks lawsuit.

Justice William W. Kilgarlin told Capitol reporters the CBS net-



work had motives for slanting the program which focused on campaign contributions to Supreme Court justices from lawyers representing both Pennzoil and Texaco.

The Texas Supreme Court last month refused to review the lower court verdict which found for Pennzoil, and "Sixty Min-utes" reporter Mike Wallace said Pennzoil's lawyers gave more campaign dollars to judges than did Texaco's lawyers.

Kilgarlin told reporters that Wallace never asked him for an interview.

#### **CBS-Texaco** Link

He also said the network singled out Texas because CBS chairman and CEO, Lawrence Tisch, testified for Texaco and faced a grueling cross-examination by Pennzoil's counsel, Houston attorney Joe Jamail.

Kilgarlin said Texaco's lead attorney in the case, David Boies, had previously represented "Sixty Minutes" producer George Crile, when CBS was sued for libel by Gen. William Westmoreland. Crile was the producer of the network's segment which reported on Vietnam casualty numbers.

### High Court Fights Back

As for Clements, Kilgarlin said the governor should not denigrate a decision by saying it was bad for Texas business, but should focus on the law and the facts.

Kilgarlin's remarks are the first full-scale defensive against growing criticism of the sitting justices, all Democrats.

Clements and Texas Republicans have let it be known they intend to go after the judges at the voting booth with a full slate of replacement hopefuls.

### **GOP** Gains in Texas

Capitol Republicans took heart last week when the results of a poll taken before two significant events showed an increasing number of Texans are planning to vote in the Republican primary.

The poll, which the Texas

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Democratic Party criticized as "horribly skewed," indicates 58 percent of respondents favor Vice President George Bush and that as many will vote in the Republican primary as in the Democratic

The sample was taken in mid-November, before the U.S.-Soviet summit and the nationally televised presidential debate.

Texas Republicans had worried about a drop in GOP popularity following the "Ponygate" scandal and the Iran-Contra affair.

#### **Candidates Visit Texas**

Meanwhile, as the March 8 Super Primary date approaches, a record number of candidates are campaigning in Texas. Stumping the state last week were the three leading Democrats, Jesse Jackson, Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis and Tennessee U. S. Sen. Albert Gore.

The poll showed Jackson and Dukakis, two liberals, holding steady with Gore, a conservative, gaining a couple of points.

U. S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen-for-Vice President speculation was squelched by his spokesman Jack Martin, who said Bentsen is preparing for re-election and waiting to see who will surface as an opponent.

Possibles include Amarillo Congressman Beau Boulter, Dallas State Rep. Bill Ceverha, City Councilman Jerry Rucker, also of Dallas, and San Antonio lawyer Doug Harlan.

Green Thumb

By Gladys O'Neal Haskell Garden Club

Now that it's cold, and we're bringing our plants inside or taking them to a basement or warmer place, I want to say something about "The North Window."

A lot of people don't realize the advantages of the north window when it comes to creating a luxuriant green environment in the home. This window does, in fact, offer the ideal growing conditions of many of the plants found on the floor of the tropical rain forests. It is just a question of making the right choices.

Give this window its own personality. The small amount of sun which shines through the north-facing window will give the right type of plants a deep, green color, and keep them healthy.

On the other hand, if colorful, sunloving plants are chosen for such a window, not much pleasure will be gained from them. Choose plants carefully. Your north window can be the greenest and healthiest window in the room. Lots of plants can be placed together in a north window to

show the contrast between many different types of foliage. It is important to always keep an eye on

the light and humidity conditions. It is worth noting that plants growing in a north window are rarely

attacked by disease or harmful insects. Here are some plants for your north window: Cyclamen, Dieffenbachia, Ferns, Gardinia, Asparagus Fern, Philodendron, Spanish Pepper, Sword Fern.

A dry centrally heated atmosphere will keep the humidity too low. Prevent this by misting the plants frequently with tepid water. This will also help to prevent leaf-damage and attacks by fungi or harmful insects.

I hope you'll have an attractive "North Window" this winter!
