March 18, 1977 Microwave Oven Recipes Given

> The article in last week's paper on microwave ovens is being continued in this issue with some recipes turned in by Mrs. Fay C. Roe, County Extension Agent.

Stuffed Eggplant

1 eggplant 1 pound ground round

g cup wheat germ

2 eggs 1½ cup milk

1 cup diced eggplant center

1 cup diced fresh mushrooms

½ cup minced onions 1 package meatloaf

seasoning mix Dash salt Sprinkle paprika

2 tablespoons chopped

parsley 1 cup Longhorn ched-

dar cheese grated Cut eggplant in half, remove center. Mix in bowl: ground round, wheat germ, eggs, milk, diced eggplant center, diced mushrooms, minced onions, meatloaf seasoning and salt.

Stuff mixture in both halves of eggplant put in glass baking dish. Mix in china bowl cheese sauce mix and 1 cup milk. Cook regular cook cycle

until it boils, turn to defrost until thick. Stir 2 or 3 times. Sprinkle cheese over top of meat in eggplant. Sprinkle with paprika. Cook 20 minutes on regular cook cycle. Let stand 2 minutes. When done sprinkle with parsley and serve. Serves 4. WINE BRAISED CELERY,

WATER CHESTNUTS AND MUSHROOMS

1 pound fresh mushrooms, cut in thick slices

4 cups diagonally sliced celery, 1 to

1½ inches thick 1 can water chestnuts, drained

½ cup burgundy

1 teaspoon instant beef bouillon

3 tablespoons lemon juice

2 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted

1 teaspoon salt

% teaspoon pepper 1 tablespoon parsley flakes

Spread half the mushrooms in botton of 2quart casserole. Cover with celery and water chestnuts. Top with remaining mushrooms. Pour wine over vegetables. Sprinkle with instant bouillon, lemon juice, butter, salt, pepper and parsley flakes. Cover. Microwave 6 to 8 minutes on high, or until celery

In 1976 the planting of flowers in home gardens increased 30%, while sales of vegetables remained stable. According to Thompson & Morgan, mail order seedsmen, of Somerdale, New Jersey, there were two reasons for this - a desire among Americans to beautify their gardens for the Bicentennial and a "come-back" of old fashioned cutting gardens. Texas sales during the month amounted to \$33,348,746, while sales for the first twelve months of 1976 totaled \$288,236,151 with 106% of the yearly sales goal of \$272.4 million achieved.

Firemen Have Several Calls in March

Robert Lee Volunteer Firemen have been fairly busy so far in March after no fires reported in January and only one during February.

The February blaze was a grass fire on the 24th at the south end of Robert Lee Dam. One truck spent about 30 minutes working on it and no damage was reported.

An alarm was turned in March 3 that a trailer house was afire, but it turned out the occupant was only trying to thaw out some frozen pipes and ignited a butane leak which blazed up but then went out. No damage was sustained.

March 8 and the early morning of March 9 was a busy time for the firemen when they made four calls.

The first was a grass fire about 13 miles west of Robert Lee in the ditch on Highway 158. A favorable wind permitted firemen to bring the blaze under control quickly and little damage was done. The same day a grass fire on Childress Street was doused quickly with no damage. The third fire on the day was at a trailer house on Commerce Street. Firemen answered the call at 6:45 p.m. and had the fire under control in about 45 minutes, but considerable damage was

HD Agent's Column - by Fay C. Roe

Approximately 385,000 Americans will die of cancer in 1977 as estimated by the American Cancer Society. Almost a third of them could survive with early detection and treatment. Certain trends in cancer incidence have become apparent in the past twenty-five years. Some of the noted differences by sex, race and geographical region are listed here: SEX: Lung Cancer is increasing in both men and women. Cancer is still the leading cause of death in women 30 to 54 years of age, but the death rate has declined somewhat since 1950--possibly due to increased use of Pap test and regular checkups. For every 45 women who died of cancer last year, 55 men died.

RACE: Cancer incidence has increased for blacks and decreased for whites. The cancer death rate is increasing much faster for blacks than for whites. These differences are attributed to environmental and social factors rather than to inherent biological characteristics.

GEOGRAPHY: Death rates from breast, colon, rectal and esophageal cancer are higher in the North for both whites and nonwhites. Both white and nonwhite women in the

South have more cancer of the uterine cervix. This information is from the--Journal of the American Medical Association (1-77) MEASLES

Genetic Researchers Supplying Cancer Clues

With a better understanding of the relationship between heredity and cancer, genetic researchers hope to better identify and assist those people who carry a potential from birth for developing cancer.

While inheriting a risk for cancer is far from being as simple as inheriting eye or hair color, it is known that for every type of cancer some people have a higher risk because of inborn genetic implications.

What is not known is exactly what factor or combination of factors have to be present to trigger the genetic potential some people seem to have for the disease.

How does one identify hereditary tumors? According to Dr. Louise C. Strong, director of the Medical Genetics Clinic at M. D. Anderson, past studies have shown hereditary tumors to share the following characteristics:

- They are likely to occur where a family history for that specific form of cancer exists.
- They often strike at an earlier average age than normally expected for that form of cancer.
- They are more likely to occur at paired organ sites, such as the lungs or kidneys, or at multiple sites at the same time.

Using these known characteristics as guidelines, researchers attempt to locate those cancers that are uniquely genetic in origin as opposed to those that are merely random associations of cancer in a family.

"Ultimately, we would like to identify the tissue that may be of risk for a cancer before it developes. into a cancer - to detect what it is that may happen to that tissue to make it ex-

press this cancer potential that we think it has," explains Dr. Strong.

To achieve that goal is no easy task. As medical detectives, Dr. Strong and her colleagues study thousands of hospital records and family backgrounds to better understand the patterns of the disease and how heredity might be involved.

As trained biologists and geneticists, they use powerful microscopes to search out the complex codes within each cell that direct replication and chemical activities within the body.

In doing so, they search for clues that would explain what breakdown or deficiency in that code leads to possible cancer-causing malfunctions.

Thirty years ago very little was known about heredity and the processes of passing bits of cellular information from one generation to another.

Today, great strides are being made in this field. In research centers throughout the world, scientists are building a better understanding of the relationships between heredity and cancer.

Identifying potential cancers before they strike represents a major step in preventing the disease and helping persons at a high genetic risk learn about early warning signs and the benefits of early diagnosis.


Vicky Conner and Richard Long Are Married in March 12 Church Rites

In the 880 yard dash Smith was second with 2:39.8. Renea Flanagan took sixth place.



"Production costs have doubled for many regions in the state in the past two years, but several commodities have been able to stay even with these increased costs."

State totals for 1975 were \$5.9 billion with livestock bringing in \$3,060,908,000 and crops \$2,785,683,000. Total cash receipts for 1976 are estimated to be more than \$6 billion.

Livestock and products in Coke County were valued in 1975 at \$5,-008,000. Crops totaled \$535,000.

AUSTIN -- First step towards setting game and fish laws for coming seasons will be taken during the week of March 21 - 25 when Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials will conduct public hearings across the state to present proposed changes in some regulations in those counties under P & WD authority.
