Annex Defeated In Close Voting

A light turnout of Coke County voters in Tuesday's elections resulted in approval of four of the seven constitutional amendments on the ballot and the rejection of a proposal to build a courthouse annex by a narrow margin of five votes.

Coke County went along with the rest of the state in approving amendments 1, 2, 3 and 7.

Teachers Work, Kids Play Nov. 14

The teacher workday at Robert Lee School previously scheduled for Nov. 11 has been changed to Nov. 14. Students will attend classes on the 11th and will not attend school on Monday, the 14th.

Amendment No. 4 apparently was approved by the entire state but was voted down in Coke County.

No. 5--To authorize formation of agricultural and marine associations: 162 for; 203 against.

No. 6--To authorize electronic banking devices: 131 for; 237 against.

No. 7--To make changes in appellate courts: 193 for; 176 against.

RL Steers to Finish Season Friday Against Wall Team

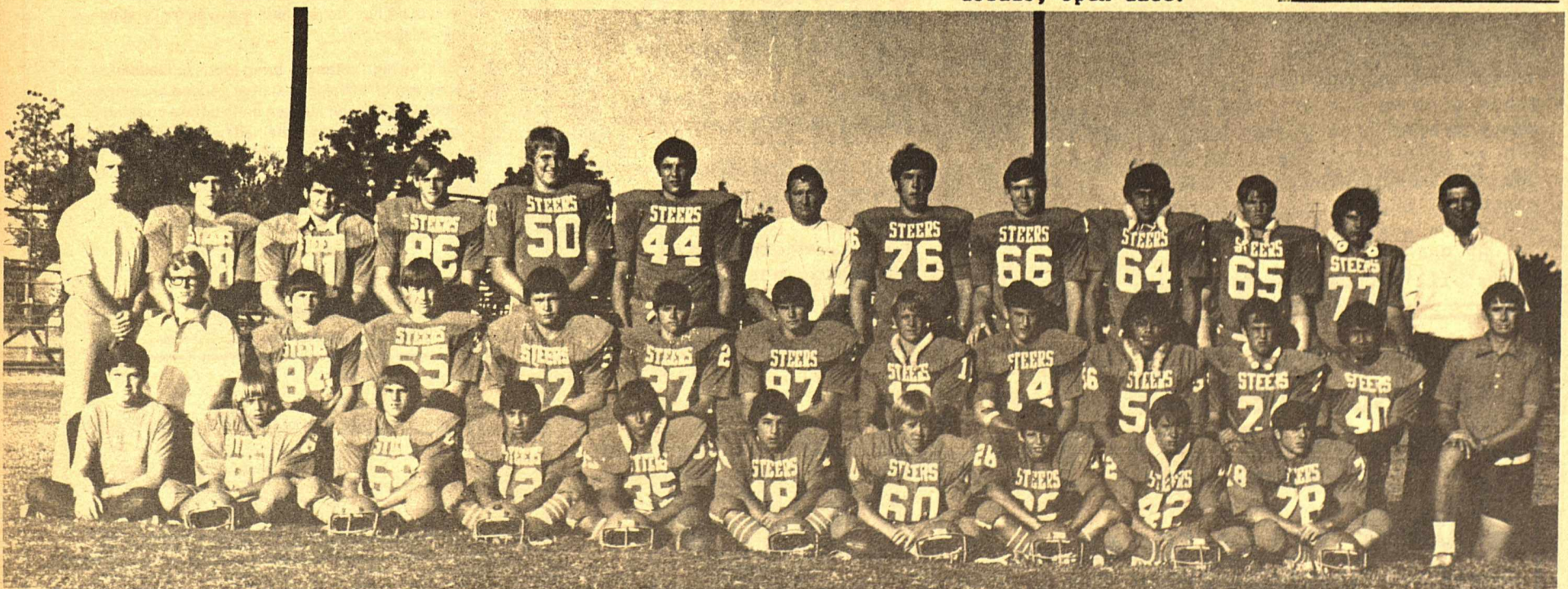

Social Security Faces Problems

The social security system, on which millions of Americans depend, faces serious financial problems.

A good many Americans, about one in every seven, now receive social security benefits. Many more of us are currently working and contributing towards future benefits we will receive when we retire.

In short, the social security system touches the lives of almost every American family.

The social security system is made up of three trust funds. Since 1975, two of the trust funds have had more expenses than income due to high unemployment and inflation.

Quite simply, the two trust funds have spent more than was paid in. As a result, without immediate Congressional action, two of social security's three trust funds will be out of money within five years.

In an effort to save the system from bankruptcy, I supported, and the House has now passed, HR 9346.

This bill amends the

Social Security Act in order to restore financial health to the social security system.

In addition, the bill seeks to solve other, long-range difficulties the system will face.

For example, right now, for every one person who receives social security benefits, three people contribute to the system.

However, by the year 2000, there will be only two, not three, working persons to support the benefits paid to each retiree. This results from the declining American birth rate.

To provide for this change and assure that funds will be available for payment of benefits, HR 9346 calls for an increase in social security taxes; the bill also increases the amount of wages which can be taxed for social security. And it provides for equal treatment of men and women by the system.

What the bill does not do is force all federal civilian employees into the social security retirement plan. Original-

ly, the bill would have placed three million more beneficiaries under the already ailing social security system.

I was firmly opposed to this proposal. Such a plan could have been disastrous for both the federal employees forced to participate and for the social security system itself.

The proposal was removed and is not a part of HR 9346 as passed.

The social security system must be financially sound. Reform is necessary. We are obligated to protect the 33 million Americans who receive benefits each month and the 104 million Americans who pay into the system.

Let us hope that this bill will pass the Senate and be swiftly enacted into law. Texans and all Americans across our nation deserve to have the trust and safety this legislation will bring so we can look to a more secure future after retirement.

A basic principle of "product safety" is that equipment designed to be operated by people must not be incompatible with common human characteristics, conditions of use, or even conditions of misuse, notes the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Krueger Critical Of Proposed Hospital Policies

Cong. Bob Krueger of Texas criticized proposed Health, Education and Welfare National Guidelines for Health Planning which would result in the phaseout of hospital beds and care units across the nation and throughout Texas.

"These proposed rules seem arbitrary and unjust," Krueger said, speaking of HEW guidelines printed in the Sept. 23 Federal Register. "Certainly they do not take into consideration the special needs of non-urban areas for quality health care."

One such case is McKenna Memorial Hospital in New Braunfels where the obstetrics service could be completely cut off within five years. Under the proposed regulations, expectant mothers there would have to travel 30 minutes one way to the nearest obstetrics unit at Northeast Baptist Hospital in San Antonio. The regulations could also seriously affect hospitals in counties throughout the 21st Congressional district, possibly closing obstetrics units in Coke and Concho counties as well.

"Citizens in communities such as New Braunfels have worked to develop unique and responsive care centers," Krueger said, "and they deserve to keep them."

If implemented, the guidelines could close obstetric units in all cities of under 100,000 that do not have 500 deliveries annually. An exception would be made if a unit served an area in which travel time to the next nearest facility is more than 45 minutes.

Regulations could also affect the number of beds hospitals would be allowed to maintain, pediatric units and many other services offered.

Krueger emphasized that the regulations are not yet final and that the comment period is open until Nov. 22.

"These directives go contrary to the spirit of the Rural Health Care bill recently passed by Congress, which calls for using more nurse practitioners and physician extenders to improve non-urban health care," Krueger said.

"The Rural Health Care Act allows many more people to receive care close to home. These

HEW regulations would force some expectant mothers to travel many miles not only for delivery but, in some cases, for vital prenatal care.

"By centering health care exclusively in urban areas, smaller towns such as New Braunfels and others stand to lose fine obstetrical and other units because of regulations which fail to consider the very specific needs of particular communities. "These needs must be seriously taken into account before guidelines are considered," Krueger said.

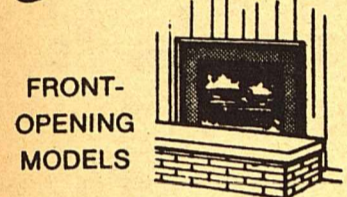

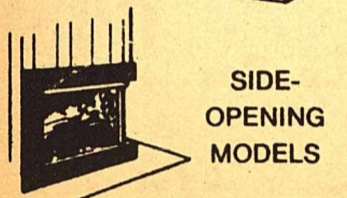

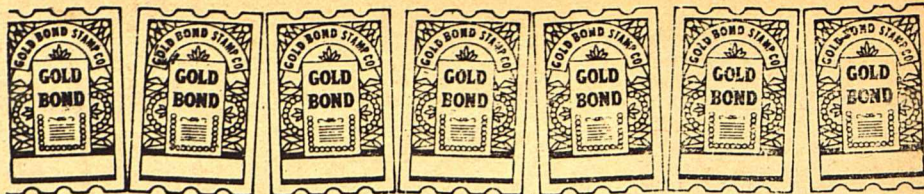
Two completions in the county were reported this week.

Fisher-Webb, Inc., of Abilene No. 1 Cargile was completed for a daily potential of 160 barrels of 42 gravity oil with gas-oil ratio of 700-1.

Completions was through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,302-27 feet. Well site is 12 miles northwest of Robert Lee. It is located 1,980 feet from the north and east lines of Section 308, Block 1-A, H&TC Survey.

Sun Oil Co. No. 8-A Central National Bank, current second well in the F.P. (Pennsylvanian) pool, has been completed for a daily potential of 89 barrels of 44 gravity oil, with gas oil ratio of 787-1.

It was finaled through perforations at 6,071-99 feet, on a 12-64-inch choke. It is 2,036 feet from the south and west lines of Section 72, Block 2, H&TC Survey. 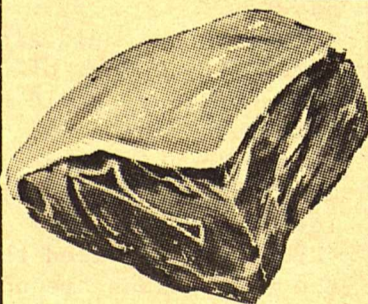
