were not cast. Consequently, the election ended in a tie, and the Commissioners' Court has called for another referendum on the matter. The second election has been called for Dec. 16.

Apparently, Coke County Commissioners are trying to get a real opinion from the voters of Coke County in this second attempt. In the first election they decided to hold elections in only one box in each precinct which is permissible by law. However, the second election will see balloting places set up in each of the legal voting precincts of the county. In addition to the two voting places in Bronte and Robert Lee which were used in the first election, voting boxes have been set up in Tennyson and Green Mountain, making a total of six boxes in the county.



Small Towns Deserve Consideration

The small towns of rural Texas are special places with very specific needs.

Yet the very things that give rural towns their distinctive style are the elements government agencies often overlook when they create public policies and laws.

Based in sprawling metropolitan Washington, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare is guilty of

this. With the proposal of recent National Guidelines for Health Planning, HEW has failed to consider the special needs of the small town for quality health care. The guidelines, not yet approved but printed in the Sept. 23 Federal Register, would result in the phase-out of hospital beds and care units across the nation and throughout Texas, especially in non-urban areas.

McKenna Memorial Hospital in New Braunfels is such a case.

Citizens in New Braunfels have worked for years to develop a care center responsive and sensitive to community needs.

Yet their obstetrics service could be completely cut off within five years under the proposed HEW regulations, leaving expectant mothers forced to travel 30 minutes to the nearest obstetrics unit at Northeast Baptist Hospital in San Antonio.

McKenna Memorial is an example of what could happen to many small town hospitals, should HEW guidelines go into effect. And McKenna is by no means an isolated example.

HEW regulations could seriously affect hospitals in counties throughout the 21st Congressional District, possibly closing obstetrics units in Coke and Concho counties.

In fact, all U.S. cities of under 100,000 stand to lose obstetrics units unless they have 500 deliveries every year. An exception would be made only if a unit served an area where the next nearest care center was more than 45 minutes away.

The proposed HEW regulations are not final. A comment period is in effect until Nov. 22 and already HEW has been flooded with angry mail.

I believe this anger is justified.

Since HEW did not consult with local Health Service Agencies while compiling their rules, the local agencies now have no way of complying with the rules.

A Congressional subcommittee rooted out the facts.

Although specifically required to consult with national councils and state agencies before presenting guidelines, HEW chose not to consult.

Instead, the rules were printed and a 60-day comment period tacked on. Fortunately, the response has been so great HEW officials might now well wonder if they wouldn't have been smarter to do their consulting beforehand.

If HEW has initially failed to recognize small town needs, we must not let them overlook these needs completely. Letters to HEW are important. I have added my voice, writing in protest of these guidelines, to Sec. of HEW Joseph Califano.

Washingtonians, like any big city people,

tend to think of mass transportation with metro lines humming, buses roaring and taxicabs only a call away, as a way of life.

Having been brought up in a small town myself, I realize that in rural areas cars are often difficult to come by. Subway stops are not a part of the local landscape. And expectant mothers may have a rough time finding a way to travel 45 minutes one way for pre-natal care even before the baby is born.

We can not and should not take a national average, and like a national shoe, try to force

it on every local foot. Flesh-and-blood people with legitimate needs should always be our foremost concern. The smaller town must be seriously taken into consideration before HEW guidelines go even one step further.

ACCIDENT CONTROL

The cardinal rule of gun handling is to always keep the barrel pointed in a safe direction. Firearm accidents in or on "home" premises alone cause more than 1,200 deaths annually, reports the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

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
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MR. AND MRS. D.A. COUNTS

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

of health reasons, will be able to vote by mail.

As was so clearly indicated by the first election tie vote, the annex question is highly controversial. The west side of the county voted for it and the east side voted against it. The trend was quite obvious, but some were for and some were against on both sides. In Precincts 1 and 3 (the west side) 162 were for while 75 were against. On the other hand, in Precincts 2 and 4 (the east side) the voters were much more firm in their stand against the annex, as they voted only 27 for and 121 against. A small absentee vote gave 5 votes for and 2 against.

LIBRARY IS QUESTION

Probably, there never would have been an election at all, if it had not been for the fact that a home for the Coke County Library was tacked onto the annex building.

Most everyone was for building the annex building to house offices of federal agencies in the county, including the Extension Service, the Soil Conservation Service, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and the Farmers Home Administration.

All of these services have been provided rent-free housing for many years in the Coke County Courthouse. Crowded conditions have become more apparent through the years and the situation now makes it imperative that these offices be moved out of the Courthouse. The federal government will pay rent on all the offices except for those of the Extension Service agents, and commissioners feel that the \$8,000 plus rental justifies construction of the annex.

The Commissioners' Court proposes to pay for the building, which is estimated to cost \$100,350.00, out of Federal Revenue Sharing funds and time warrants. No bonds are to be issued and no tax raises are anticipated.

BOND SALES REACH 46 PER CENT OF GOAL

August sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Coke County were reported today by County Bond Chairman Gerald Allen. Sales for the eight-month period totaled \$20,588 for 46% of the 1977 sales goal of \$45,000.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$20,760,679, while sales for the first eight months of 1977 totaled \$184,224,319 with 63% of the yearly sales goal of 276.9 million achieved.

FARM POLICY REMOVES "BOOM," LEAVES "BUST" ---Policies designed to take the boom and bust out of agriculture have only removed the boom, leaving farmers to contend with the bust, says an economist with the Extension Service. The 1977 Food and Agriculture Act could lead U.S. producers back into the same policy dilemma of the 1960's due mainly to the 30 to 35 million ton grain reserve which will tend to hold prices near loan levels, With target prices in the four-year Act based on the national average cost of production, many small size family farmers may go out of business.

Dry cereals go beyond breakfast. For croutons, try unsweetened puffed corn, puffed wheat, or bite-size shredded wheat, corn, or rice.



FOOD COST CUTTERS
Food cost-cutting ideas take informed consumers and imagination with an eye on family likes and dislikes, according to Mrs. Fay

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C. Roe, County Extension Agent.

Some of the most economical cost-cutting guidelines focus on poultry, dairy products and other meat-buying strategies. They include the following:

--Use turkey in a variety of ways.

Generally larger birds are better buys with more meat in relation to bone. Use only a portion at first; save the rest for later.

To save the rest for later, turkey can be frozen uncooked or cooked. Uncooked poultry maintains a desirable flavor and texture longer in freezer storage than cooked poultry, however.

If buying a frozen bird, thaw it in the refrigerator just enough to cut it up. Then package uncooked parts in meal-size packages and freeze immediately for later use.

Or cook the whole bird, then cut up the meaty parts and use as sliced roast turkey. Then freeze.

Ideas for preparing uncooked turkey parts frozen for later include braising the legs and thighs in a little liquid for a "different" main-dish item. Also, slice an uncooked turkey breast across toward the bone, flour the slices and fry them--as a substitute for veal cutlets.

In addition, cover the bones and boney parts of cooked or uncooked turkey with water and boil. Use the broth for soup, gravy or in sauces to season casseroles. The meat that cooked off the bones is used in salads and casseroles.

--Remember that whole broiler fryers are often less expensive than quartered or cut-up chicken.

Cut them up at home to suit needs. Cut whole breasts into four or six pieces, so everyone has a part.

Chicken and dumplings uses the whole bird and stretches the chicken flavor further.

--Buy parts of chicken instead of the whole chicken IF the price per pound is low enough. Chicken breasts can cost up to 49 percent

more per pound than broiler-fryers and still provide more meat for the money. Thighs and legs can cost up to one-third more per pound.

--In meat buying, think about "cost per serving." Compare costs of meat, fish and poultry with that in mind. More expensive cuts--with less waste--are often better buys.

Boneless lean meat, fish and poultry give three or four servings per pound. Steaks, chops, fish steaks and cut-up chicken parts give only two to three servings. Whole fish, spare-ribs, chicken wings and other fatty or boney meats give only one to two servings per pound.

--Remember to slice cheese and luncheon meat at home, since pre-sliced is more expensive than buying by the chunk.

--To save on dairy products, use non-fat dry milk as a coffee-cream substitute. Also, for those who prefer the richness of whole milk, mix reconstituted non-fat dry milk together with whole milk in a half-and-half combination. Since non-fat dry milk usually costs one-third less than fresh milk, the half-and-half mix saves money.


--Remember frozen orange juice usually costs less than canned, bottled or fresh squeezed orange juice.

--Use less-expensive canned mackerel in casseroles rather than tuna, or mix the two.


