## Steers Trounce Bronte 21-14 In District 6-B Opener

The Robert Lee Steers came out on top in every department, including the scoreboard, to win the Coke Championship last Friday night. The Steers downed the visiting Bronte Longhorns 21-14 in an exciting football game played to a stadium full of shivering fans.

A brisk wind blew most of the game, bringing in the season's first real cool spell. The lowered temperatures sent a chill through those sitting in the stands but made the hard-fought activity of the players easier.

Terry Ross made two of the counters for Robert Lee while the other one came on a 60 yard pass play to David Lackey from Brett Clark. Wes

The Steers took the kickoff and started from scrimmage on their 38. Clark and Ross made good gains and a pass from Gartman to Lackey was good for 23 yards and put the ball on the 12. Ross picked up 9 to the 3 and the next play moved the ball to the 2 for a 1st down. Ross fought his way across the double stripe for the first Robert Lee score. Sawyer added the PAT and the score was 7-6 in favor of the Steers.

The Steers kicked off and the Longhorns made two 1st downs before the Steer defense forced a punt. Time ran out before the Steers could get another scoring drive going.

### SECOND HALF

The Steers took the second half kickoff and were downed on their 35. Then went to work immediately as Clark dashed for a 27 yard gainer to the Bronte 38. The then carried for another 1st on the Longhorn 23. It was from that point that Ross went around left end for the second Steer touchdown. Sawyer's kick made the scoreboard read 14-6.

Dear Mr. Editor:

I see by the papers that Mr. Krueger keeps saying that Senator Tower is just a vote and not a voice in the Senate. Even if that were true I don't know that it would be so bad. Considering all the hot air that comes from Washington, maybe we need a little less noise and a little more voting. Particularly when we look at Mr. Krueger's voting record and his attendance record.

Mr. Krueger's attendance record is almost unbelievable. He has literally abandoned his duties as a Congressman for the 21st District. He attends only about 25% of the sessions so that he can devote 75% of his time to politics. In recent weeks he has missed many important votes, including those on military construction, tuition tax credit, gun control and reducing economic aid to South Korea, which incidently, will greatly curtail this area's agricultural exports. He has also missed votes on the B-1 bomber, medicaid, mass transit, the Postal Service, federal judgeships, and the Humphrey - Hawkins bill.

When confronted with this poor record of representation, a spokesman for Krueger said no one in his congressional district had complained about Krueger's absenteeism. As a resident of the 21st District, I am complaining!!!!!!

ALCOHOL AND DRUG ABUSE GROUP MEETS

The Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse for Nolan, Rannels and Coke Counties met Friday night, Oct. 13, at the Longhorn Lodge in Sweetwater. Thirteen members were present and new officers, directors and board members were elected.

W.A. Green of Robert Lee and Ben Oglesby of Bronte were elected for three year terms as members of the board of directors from Coke County.

Goals of the council are to work with schools and communities in cutting down on alcohol and drug related problems and keep people aware of this ever increasing problem.

The council is funded by counties, cities, United Way, Texas Commission on Alcoholism and Texas Department of Community Affairs.

STOP LAWN WEEDS NOW--- Winter lawn weeds can be stopped cold by applying a herbicide before they emerge, says a weed specialist. This means applying a pre-emergence herbicide such as benefin (Balan), bensulide (Betasan, Pre-San) and DCPA (Dacthal) in early October. Atrazine and Simazine are also effective herbicides but are labelled for use only in fertilizer mixtures and should not be applied near young trees or ornamentals.

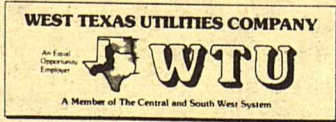

The Longhorns took the kickoff but couldn't made the needed 10 yards. The Steers then tried but had to punt. On the next series the Longhorns made a 1st, then a pass interference against the Steers gave Bronte a 1st on the Steer 7. Tidwell ran around right end for the score and Doggett ran for 2 extras. The score was knotted at 14-14.

The Steers took the kickoff and after three tries had to punt. Bronte moved the ball to the Robert Lee 39 where a fumble was recovered by Sawyer. A couple of plays later Gartman tossed the ball to Clark who threw a boomer to Lackey. The play covered 60 yards and was good for 6 points. Sawyer's kick was good and the score was 21-14 with less than a minute left in the third quarter.

In the fourth quarter the Longhorns put together a drive and it looked as if they were going to tie the game again. However, after moving deep into Steer territory, the Robert Lee defense rose to the occasion as Kevin Roe intercepted a pass in the end zone to give the Steers the ball on the 20.

The Steers picked up three consecutive 1st downs to eat up the clock, the Longhorns couldn't move when they got the ball and on the next series the Steers ran out the clock.

The Steers gained 208 yards rushing with Clark making 118 yards in 21 carries; Ross 85 yards in 14 carries; Wilson 6 for 2; Gartman minus 1 for 2. In passing Lackey had two receptions for 84 yards and a TD, while Clark had two for 35 yards. Gartman threw three times for 58 yards and Clark one time for 61 yards and a TD.

Sawyer recovered a fumble and Wilson and Roe each had a pass interception.

If your child did not get to attend and wants to take part in this program, you can contact the library for more information.

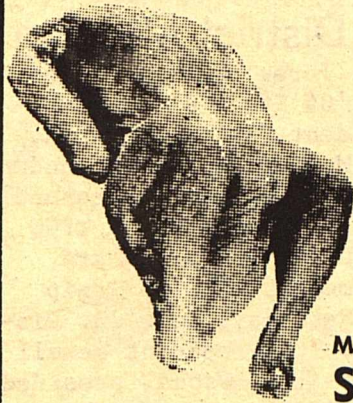

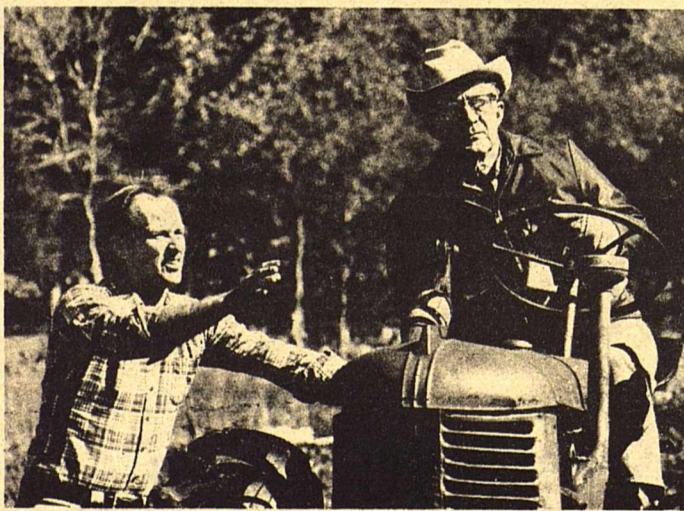

Services for Gayle M. Britt, 56, of San Angelo, were at 2:30 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 15, at First United Methodist Church in Robert Lee with the Rev. Lyle Pierce, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Robert Lee Cemetery under the direction of Shaffer Funeral Home.

Mrs. Britt died at 7:04 a.m. Saturday in West Coke County Nursing Home after being ill several months.

Gayle McCutchen was born Oct. 3, 1922 in Robert Lee, daughter of John Edward and Daisy Esther (McDorman) McCutchen. She grew up here and was a 1939 graduate of Robert Lee High School. She attended Texas Tech at Lubbock and then moved to Washington, D.C. in 1942 where she worked with the FBI. In 1944, she moved to Hanford, Washington and worked at the plant that manufactured the Atomic Bomb. She and Henry Britt were married Sept. 4, 1944 in Yakima, Wash. and moved to Seattle, Wash. They later moved to Odessa and lived there about seven years before moving to San Angelo in 1959. Mr. Britt died Oct. 13, 1962. Mrs. Britt continued to reside in San Angelo until four months ago when she moved to West Coke County Nursing Home. Before ill health forced her retirement, she was controller for Luther Transfer & Warehouse Co., Inc. (Allied Van Lines Agent) of San Angelo for 15 years. She was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include two brothers, Gordon McCutchen of Robert Lee and Joe McCutchen of Bronte; and a sister, Mrs. Charlie (Mary Lou) Salvato of San Angelo.

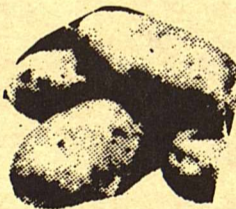
