The Robert Lee Steers won a victory over Irion County last Friday night, 38-12, to earn a shot at the District 6-B championship. The win gave the Steers an 8-2 season record and a 4-1 district record.

The Robert Lee team rolled up a huge 425 yards rushing and 108 yards passing, for a total of 533 yards gained.

Terry Ross was the top scorer for the Steers with three trips across the double stripe for touchdowns and one run for two extra. points. Kerry Gartman drove in on keeper

plays for two tallies and Brett Clark scored the other TD.

Ross' touchdowns came on a 15 yard pass completion and on runs of 47 yards and three yards. Gartman carried the ball over the goal line on two one yard plunges. Clark's counter came on a 19 yard run.

Clark was the leading ground gainer with 222 yards in 17 carries. Ross gained 146 yards in 15 carries; Gartman made 59 yards in 14 tries; and Edwin Wilson carried one time for 1

Ross was the only Steer to intercept a pass during the game.
