**ABOUT A YEAR AGO**, congress was tearing into our income tax system, under the guise of "tax reform." We thought at the time that most taxpayers would be in for a rude shock, and so far we haven't seen or heard anything to make us think differently.

As one analyst said this week: "The new law, like the old one and every other income tax law ever enacted in the USA, is a patchwork quilt made up of the rules and regulations the most powerful lobbyists in Washington wanted—or were willing to settle for."

Jeff Riggensbach, writing in *USA Today* says "In essence, taxation is a form of robbery. It is the process by which government seizes from its citizens the money it needs to pay for its activities. In order to keep everything fairly civil and minimize the likelihood of armed resistance to the tax collector, the government negotiates with those it is robbing and agrees to follow certain rules and rob some more than others. But everyone is robbed to one extent or another. There is, therefore, no such thing as "fair" taxation. Robbery is never fair."

The worst part about the new tax set-up seems to be that it is more confusing to the rank and file taxpayer. More people than ever before are having to have professional help in filing their taxes in 1988.

We always thought that if something was "simplified," then it was made easier. Apparently this isn't the case when you let congress do the simplifying. It comes out sort of like the camel, which has been called "a horse put together by a committee."

If we were serious about being fair, one expert said, we would abandon taxation altogether in favor of voluntary methods of funding government services—like user fees and lotteries.

Another commentator says that the flat tax would take care of all the problems inherent in the income tax system.

"A 16 per cent flat-rate tax on personal and corporate income would have balanced the 1983 federal budget—the year of our first \$200 billion deficit. A 19 per cent flat rate would have balanced the budget and allowed the first \$6,000 of income to be exempt from tax, dropping the effective tax rate on a \$10,000 income to 7.6 per cent and that on \$20,000 to 13.3 per cent," says Paul Craig Roberts, another writer on the subject.

We're not sure what the answer is, but like last year, we're hesitant to turn the problem over to congress to solve.

We have always maintained that you shouldn't complain about the status quo, because a change could always be worse. By the time April 15 comes and goes, we'll all know whether or not this happened in regard to "tax reform."

## Sugarbeet Acres To Show Increase

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced today that the country's farmers intend to plant 1,290,600 acres to sugarbeets. The estimate was based on a nationwide survey conducted by USDA March 15.

The national planting intentions figure represents an increase of approximately 1.6 per cent from last year. Of that total, Texas and New Mexico growers are expected to plant 35,000 acres beginning in late March. That will be an increase of seven per cent over 1987.

Locally, the acreage for harvest next fall is expected to be 35,000 according to D.L. Printz, agricultural manager, Holly Sugar Corporation.

"The outturn from that acreage should approximate 760,000 tons," the spokesman said, with

probable total farm value of about 24 million dollars.

The sugarbeets will be processed at the Hereford plant where some 377 year-round and seasonal employees will help turn the crop into refined sugar having a wholesale value of about 38 million dollars.

Processing will not commence until September, Printz said, but in the meantime the plant is undergoing a stem-to-stern overhaul.

Sugarbeets and beet sugar have been an integral part of this area's economy for 24 years, Printz said.

"The grower-processor partnership in the beet sugar industry works well. Together we pump approximately 120 million dollars into the local economy."

During the final test, it was reported that all the eggs landed safely and did not break.

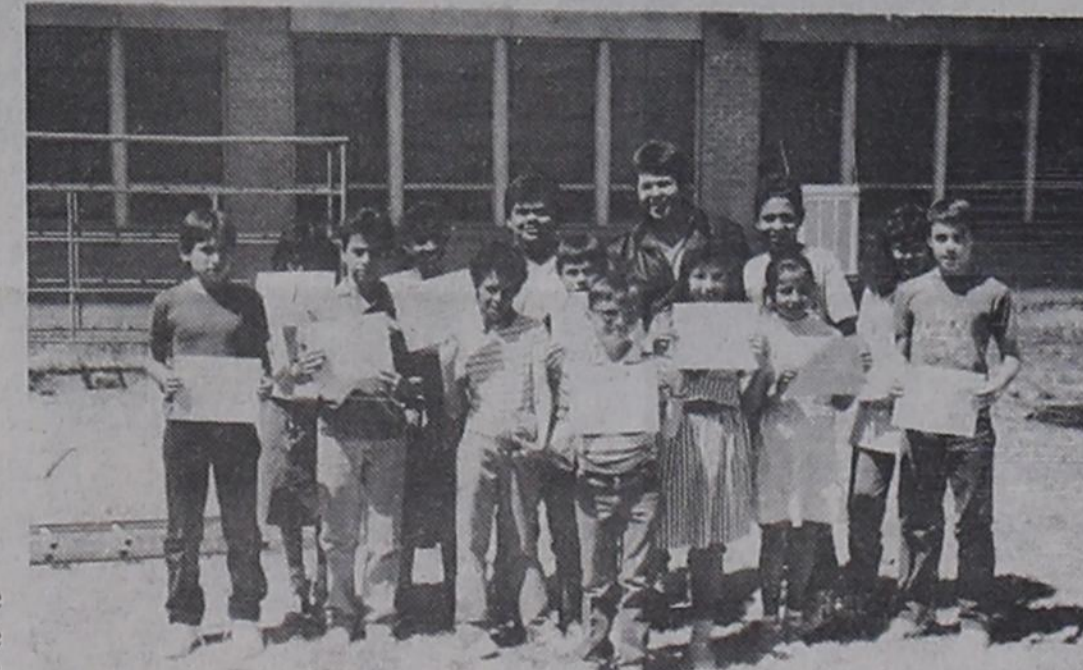

**WIN PLACES...**Students who won fourth, fifth and sixth place in the Egg-stronaut program pose for the Blade camera.

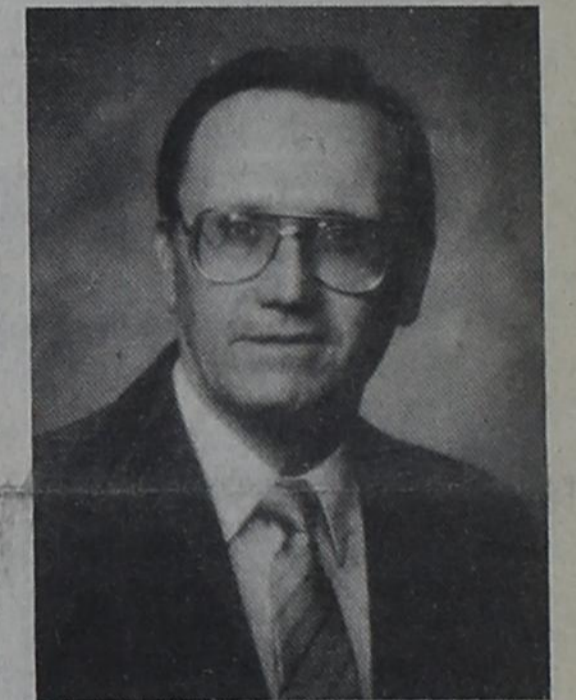
## BHS Play Honored

Ella Jo Stormes and her five children were chosen for the "Participant of the Month" award from the Body Connection.

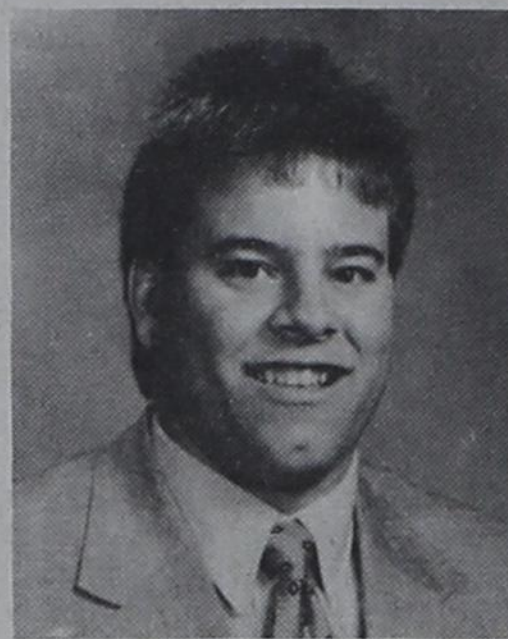

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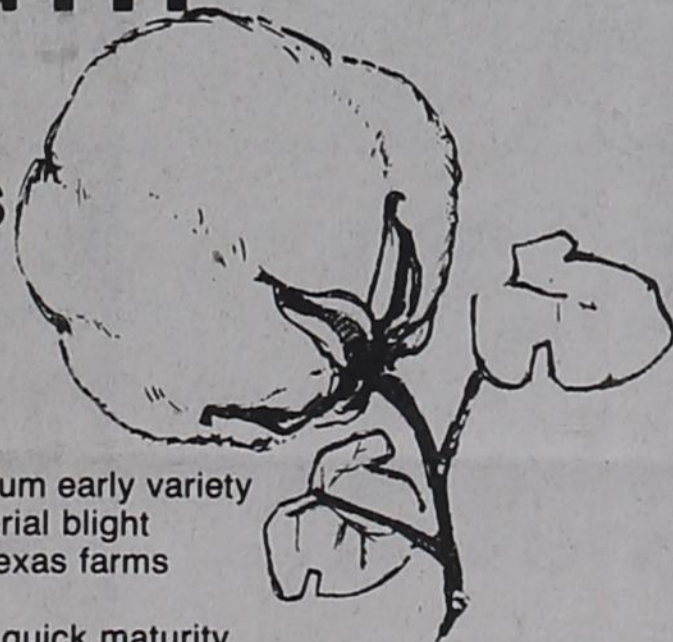

# Tooth Decay Is A Leading Disease

The leading noncommunicable disease is tooth decay. 98% of all Americans have tooth decay, but it is also one of the most preventable diseases.

There are several parts of the mouth. The tongue and teeth are part of the mouth. These parts of the mouth help the handling,

breaking down, and swallowing food and liquids. More than 80 varieties of microorganisms live in your mouth.

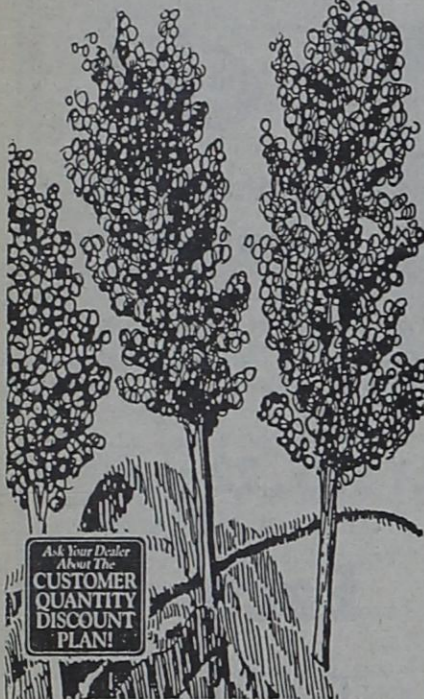
The sense of taste is determined by the taste buds on the tongue. 9,000 taste buds cover the surface of the tongue, palate, and top of the throat. The flavors people sense are a result of smelling food, not tasting it. For example, when people have head colds, they cannot taste the food because the sense of smell is blocked.

The teeth are the main part of the mouth. They shape the structure of the mouth. The periodontium support the teeth. Each tooth has two major parts. They are the root and crown. Some other parts of the tooth are the pulp, dentin and enamel. Children have temporary teeth, which come to a total of 20. Adults have 32 permanent teeth.

There are other disorders besides tooth decay. Periodontal disease, tartar, and abscessed tooth are some disorders. Also, halitoses, malocclusion, and orthodontics are along with this group of diseases. Gum disorders also occur. They are gingivitis and pyorrhea.

Several proper ways to care for the teeth are available. Brushing in the morning, after meals and at night helps. Flossing is also essential for proper mouth and teeth care.

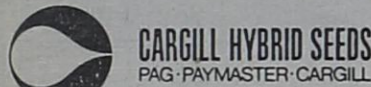
