Change of subject....I am quite upset with KVII-TV for canceling my favorite soap opera, "All My Children," and replacing it with the Geraldo Rivera talk show.

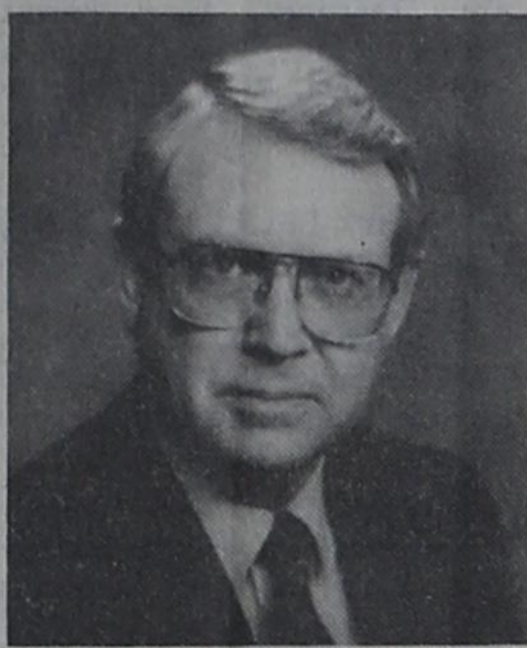

Injuries Hurt BHS Gridders

Injuries played a big part in the Bovina Mustangs' game at Silverton last Friday, as the Mustangs dropped their second game of the season, 29-12 to the Silverton Owls.

Silverton's Neal Edwards ran eight yards and Wayne Henderson's kick gave the home team an 8-0 lead in the first quarter.

The Mustangs came right back with a 60-yard run from senior Bud Venable on their first offensive play. Bovina's kick failed, leaving the score at 8-6, Silverton.

The Owls scored again as Jamie Frizzell took a 31-yard pass from Kendall Minyard. Henderson's kick made the score 16-6.

On the very last play of the half, Bud Venable hooked up with Denver Riddle on a pass play that covered 60 yards and a touchdown. The PAT was no good, as the teams went to halftime with Silverton on top, 16-12.

In the second half, the Mustangs made some key defensive mistakes which cost them the game. The Owls were able to put the ball in the end zone twice more on pass plays to make the final score 29-12. Silverton lost two of their players to injuries during the game.

The Mustangs also were strapped, as Scott Scaff, senior offensive guard and defensive tackle, out for knee surgery, and Woot Sudderth, senior quarterback and defensive cornerback, both had to watch the game from the sidelines.

Riddle played the game with a bruised kidney.

"Our defensive effort was good. We were just a little lax on offense. I thought we played a better game in our first outing," said Mustang Coach Terry Bean.

Bean said he was proud of freshman Cory Kirkpatrick, who stepped in as starting quarterback with Sudderth sidelined, and did a good job both at quarterback and at defensive cornerback.

Bean singled out Manuel Porras for his good defensive play and Bud Venable on offense.

Hereford Bi-Products Wins Civil Settlement

(From the Hereford Brand) Hereford Bi-Products Inc. and Southwest Hide Co. recently won an in-court settlement of \$5 million from Amarillo By-Products Inc., defendant in a civil trial in U.S. District Court in Amarillo.

Garth Merrick, president of Hereford Bi-Products, issued a statement on the suit Friday because of his "concern that the

general public is not aware of the outcome of the suit nor the fact that his company is not related to the Amarillo firm."

Merrick added that an article in The Amarillo Globe-News this week brought his attention to the fact that area citizens—including some of his customers—were not aware of the reasons for the court case.

The Amarillo article reported that the Amarillo City Commission had ordered Amarillo By-Products to adopt an acceptable plan for treatment of its industrial waste and implement that plan by Dec. 1. The story also added that Amarillo By-Products had been a defendant in a Racketeer Influenced Corrupt Organization case, and that U.S. District Judge Mary Lou Robinson had announced settlement terms of a \$5 million payment to plaintiffs Hereford Bi-Products and Southwest Hide Co., with the payment to be hiked to \$15 million if the \$5 million was not paid by a certain date.

Merrick said the in-court settlement was announced on the fourth day of the trial on July 27. The suit filed by Hereford Bi-Products alleged, in part, that Amarillo By-Products "conspired to commit fraud and theft" of money and property against the plaintiffs and others. Some of the others allegedly damaged included Caviness Packing, Palo Duro Packing, Great Western Meat Co. and 66 Pack. Southwest Hide, co-plaintiff, is based in Boise, Idaho.

Merrick explains that he did not seek publicity about the civil suit, "the news media did not pick up on the case and little publicity was seen or heard by the public." He added there seemed to be enough confusion on the name identity of the companies involved that he should make a statement.

Hereford Bi-Products has other plants in Plainview, Friona, Muleshoe, Stratford, Spearman, Clovis, N.M., Guymon, OK., and Amarillo Canning Co. in Amarillo.

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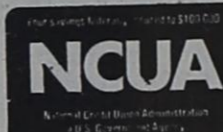
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Parmer County will use the following rules and procedures to comply with its responsibility under the Indigent Health Care and Treatment Act for residents residing in Parmer County.

Application can be requested from the Panhandle Health Care Coalition office at the Pavilion of Northwest Texas Hospital, 7201 Evans Drive, P.O. Box 2168, Amarillo, TX, 79105. Assistance in completing the application will be provided if needed. Contact the Panhandle Health Care Coalition (806) 378-4692 or its Coordinator (806) 238-1366 at the Bovina Center for assistance.

Parmer County will use rules and procedures found in the County Indigent Health Care Program Handbook published by the Texas Department of Human Services. In summary, these are the rules:

1. Application forms must be completely filled out.
2. Verification of income, termination of income, residence, household composition, and resources is required, if questionable.
3. Following rule-approved gross income adjustments, net income cannot exceed:

4. Liquid resources assets cannot exceed \$1,000. The equity value of a car greater than \$1500 is counted against the \$1000 limit. Personal property and homestead are exempt assets.
5. Higher Liquid resources assets and income may be accepted in special circumstances.
6. Eligible persons must be residents of the area of Randall County not included within a hospital district.
7. Applicants must provide all requested information and documentation requested or applications will be denied.
8. Applicants have the right to appeal adverse decisions.

On September 2, Andres Ortiz, 21, Bovina, was arrested by the Sheriff's Office on a charge of violation of probation. Case is pending in District Court.

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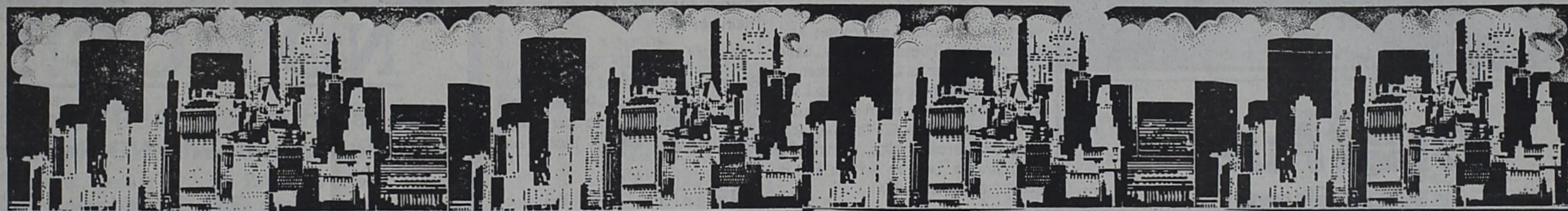
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Parmer Co. Fair Set September 17
