"BULLETIN NO. 6.

"The postoffice officials at Washington, D. C., have just ruled that a subscription to any publication, entered as secondclass matter, must be discontinued when the time for which it is paid in advance has expired.

"This is such a radical ruling and directly opposite to all law and previous rulings that it means a complete change and revolution in the publishing business. This ruling will greatly reduce the circulation of nearly all papers, and cause the withdrawal of many advertisements until a lower rate is put into effect. This vitally affects you, for it prohibits extending credit to your subscribers, and reduces your circulation and value to advertisers. Any violation to this will deprive the publisher of hispound rate."
