OUR AREA RECEIVED some disturbing news last week with the selection of the Deaf Smith County site as one of the three finalists for the nation's first nuclear waste repository.

The other two site finalists are located in Washington state and Nevada.

The Department of Energy says it will spend \$850 million during the next six years studying the Deaf Smith County site.

It behooves all residents in this area to put pressure on the Department of Energy to prove beyond the shadow of a doubt that our underground water supply can be protected from nuclear waste stored beneath the aquifers.

It has been mind-boggling to many people from the very first mention of Deaf Smith County as a waste repository, that the DOE would consider a site which is right in the middle of one of the most productive agricultural areas in the world.

There have been some reservations about the possible salt contamination of the underground water which could be caused during the test drilling work that the DOE will do in the coming years.

But that his nothing compared to the fears of nuclear contamination of our water, plus the general hazards of having such a repository located in such a viable area—just 35 miles from a metropolitan city, Amarillo.

Do the possible economic benefits of a nuclear waste dump overshadow the disadvantages, particularly if you consider the potential loss of productive agricultural land and businesses?

These are questions which the DOE's study will tackle.

Personally, we already have our own conclusions as to the soundness of constructing such a waste repository in this area. It would take a lot of proof on the part of the DOE to change our thinking.

Unfortunately, you also get the idea that the DOE officials also have their minds made up on the subject, and that the time-table set up for testing, etc., is merely going through the motions prior to making the final site selection.

If the DOE's studies are not convincing enough, the residents of our area will have one last recourse. Should the Deaf Smith County site be selected, our state governor could still veto the selection.

The only way the veto could be overturned would be by a two-thirds approval by both houses of congress, something our legislators have said in the past would be a hard vote to muster.

SATURDAY is an important day to local residents, who will be casting their ballots in runoff elections.

For the first time that we can remember, there are two local races carried into a runoff in the Democratic party.

Bovina and Rhea voters will be making their choice for a county commissioner, as well as a local justice of the peace in Saturday's voting.

The campaigns for the two offices have been relatively low-key, but we urge a good turnout for these important choices.

Remember: if you voted in the May primary, you have to stick with that party's runoff election this time. If you did not vote at all, you can vote in the runoff of your choice. And you CAN vote without producing your voter's registration card, provided you are legally registered.

GOP Voters To Travel

Area Republican voters will go to Friona Saturday to vote in the Republican runoff election.

The voting will take place at Friona High School, southwest corner entrance. That will be the G.O.P. polling place for the entire county, as a light turnout of Republican voters is expected.

There are three statewide races on the Republican ballot.

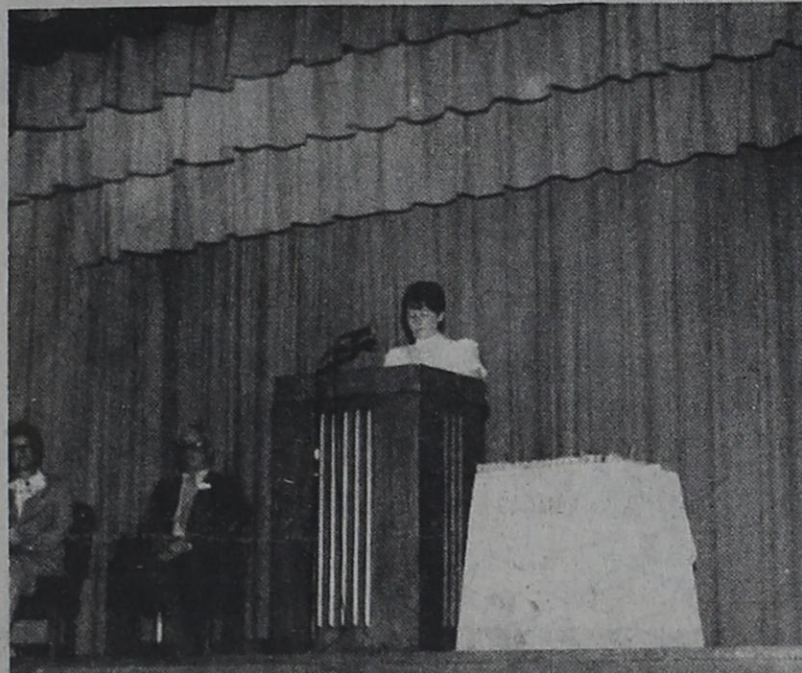
David Davidson and Aaron Bullock will meet for the lieutenant governor's nomination. Davidson led the voting here in the primary.

Commissioner, J.P. Races To Top Runoff

Two local races are expected to spark a good turnout in the Democratic party runoff election on Saturday.

The election will be held at the American Legion Hall in Bovina, and in the Church Parish Hall at Rhea.

The commissioner's race pits Tom Ware and Don Murphy in the runoff. Ware led the voting in May with 218 votes, to 183 for Murphy. Lawrence Widner, the third candidate received 60 votes, enough to force the runoff.

Wayne Spears and Bonnie Clayton will meet for the Justice of the Peace nomination. In the primary, Spears received 132 votes to 124 for Mrs. Clayton. However A.T. (Buster) Morgan received 95 votes and Norbert Schueler 73.

It appears that the winner on Saturday will be the candidate who is able to pick up the most votes from the supporters of the two candidates who were eliminated in May.

Spears, the incumbent, has been much in the news this year. He was one of the defendants in a civil rights trial held in federal court in Amarillo in March.

The jury in the civil rights trial found Spears and three other defendants liable for damages amounting to \$127,500 to Carrie Melear and Willie Stewart.

The lawsuit grew out of incidents the night of May 10, 1984 when Spears accompanied local law enforcement personnel who "made false arrests, broke into rooms of an apartment complex and detained two innocent people while searching for a suspect supposedly in the area."

Although the local races are the highlight, there are five statewide races on the Democratic runoff ballot.

John Sharp and P.S. Ervin meet for the Railroad Commissioner race. Shirley Butts and Oscar Mauzy are opponents for Supreme Court Justice, Place 1.

Jim Brady and Robert M. Campbell meet for Supreme Court Justice, Place 2. Raul Gonzalez and Jay Gibson meet for the Supreme Court, Place 4. George Martinez and Rusty Duncan are opponents for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1.

School Corner

In every issue there are at least two sides. Such is the case with the permanent school fund controlled by the commissioners court. I believe that this is the American way. We are all entitled to our opinion in a Democracy. I do believe, however, that everyone involved should tell the whole story. This issue has advantages and disadvantages, and I believe that we should all share both.

At the present time each school in the county is sharing the interest

on the permanent school fund based on each school's average daily attendance (ADA) for the year. As previously stated this will amount to about one per cent of the total budget for Bovina ISD. This income, even though it is small, is an advantage to leaving the fund intact. This amount of interest that we receive can be used in the overall operation of the school.

The principal of the permanent school fund can only be used for permanent improvement or reducing bonded indebtedness. This is the major disadvantage because now is when the respective school districts are having to make permanent improvements. These improvements are presently having to be made with local dollars. In Bovina's case we are badly in need of a new roof which will cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000. Using values that are presently placed on Bovina's property each one cent will raise approximately \$5000. \$100,000 in revenue would require twenty cents in taxes.

Each individual has to decide for themselves, but I personally believe that the Bovina ISD would be better off financially in the years to come if the permanent school fund were divided now to allow us to use the money to replace the badly needed roof. Our plans, certainly are not to raise taxes by twenty cents to do it, but however it is done it is going to have to be done with tax dollars.

The school boards and administrators of Parmer County have made our feelings known. Resolving the issue is now up to the people of the county and the commissioners court.

Sesquicentennial Notes

The history of the Bovina United Methodist Church was secured from the church office and written by Pauline Caldwell.

Bovina, the oldest town in Parmer County, at one time had the distinction of being the largest shipping point of cattle in the world. It got its name from the Latin "bos," meaning ox or cow. Parmer County, named for a Texas hero, Martin Parmer, was created in 1876 but was not organized until 1907. The county, in the southwest central Panhandle, was one of the ten counties which made up the Capitol Syndicate Land grant which built the present state capital building and was part of the 3,050,000 acre XIT Ranch.

In 1898 the Pecos Valley Railway, later absorbed by the Santa Fe Railroad, was built from Roswell, New Mexico, to Amarillo, Texas. Soon thereafter the county acquired the necessary quota of votes for organization. One of the first towns was Bovina, situated in the heart of the XIT Ranch and on the railroad. It began with about a dozen people, a general store, livery barn, barber shop and section house.

About 1906, when settlers with the idea of farming began coming into this ranching country, the desire for churches was evident. Available records show that the first Methodist Church and the second of any denomination organized in Parmer County, was in late 1905 at Bovina with nine charter members. The Rev. V.H. Trammell, pastor of the Hereford Mission, helped organize and served the new church, preaching one Sunday of each month in Bovina and traveling to other congregations on following Sundays. The place of worship was in a one-room school building which later became the Catholic Church. This structure is still standing and is a private home located at 603 Second Street. Charter members of the church were Mr. and Mrs. Bill Townsend, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Merrill, Miss Ruth Coons, Miss Rowene Coons, Mr. and Mrs. D.O. Stallings, and Mrs. G.D. McLean.

Although the church held services only once each month, the pastor lived in Bovina for four years, according to Mr. and Mrs. C.F. Hastings who have had their membership in the church longer

than anyone else. Mr. Hastings came to Bovina in 1902. Mrs. Hastings came with her family in 1909, and the two were married in 1915. Most of this early history was supplied by these faithful members. Mr. Hastings died in 1978 and Mrs. Hastings resides in Prairie Acres Nursing Home in Friona.

Mrs. Mary Trammell, wife of the first pastor, died in 1908 at the age of 28, and is buried in the Bovina Cemetery. As part of the observance of Heritage Sunday, May 18, 1980, the congregation placed an appropriate memorial plaque on her gravestone.

The first church building was erected in 1910 during the ministry of the Rev. J.A. Sweeney (1908-10). It was located across the street from the present church at the corner of Fourth Street and Avenue C, seating about 75 people and costing approximately \$2,000. The labor was done by members. Money for the structure was raised through contributions of members and non-members. Mrs. Bill Townsend (Aunt Millie), ran the hotel and knew most of the cowboys on the area ranches. She wrote to these men asking for donations and response to these letters is given credit for raising much of the funds. The congregation worshipped in this church with only a small addition for 37 years. An old house on Fourth Street across from the church was the parsonage.

A Methodist Church was organized in 1914 at Friona and was on a circuit with Bovina. In 1926 the Oklahoma Lane Church, seven miles south of Bovina, was founded and added to this circuit. In 1928 Friona became a station, but it was not until 1947 that Bovina and Oklahoma Lane became separate charges. Pastors served these churches on alternate Sundays.

During 1923-24 a Senior Epworth League was active with several from other Bovina churches attending because there was no other organization of this type. Officers were: Mrs. W.E. Williams, president; Mulkey Ezell, vice president; Mrs. Frank Hastings, secretary; W.E. Williams, treasurer; Mrs. Frank Hastings, corresponding secretary; Gladys Stagner, L.D. Parker, Lillian Ezell and Mrs. Eugene Parker, department superintendents; and I.E. Walker, pastor. (To be continued in next week's Bovina Blade.)

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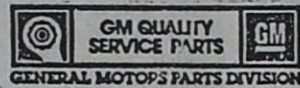
