Indian Depredation Claims.

A few days ago the government sent \$3,000,000 to Cuba to pour into the greedy hands of a gang of barbarous cutthroats called the Cuban army. Every cent of this vast sum came from the pockets of the people of this country, among whom must be numbered the few surviving pioneers who freely shed their blood for the freedom of this fair land from the blood-thirsty Comanche. Vaccination.

In view of the spread of smallpox in other parts of the state, it would be wise on the part of parents in our city to give their children the benefit of vaccination. Better Than Riches.

The Kerrville Water Works Company is digging trenches preparatory to laying its mains from its works up the river to the reservoir in the northern suburb of town, a distance of two and eight tenths miles. The reservoir has a capacity of 500,000 gallons. The water will be forced through a three inch main by a pump having a capacity of 125 gallons a minute, or 180,000 gallons a day.

When the water works yields its entire city supply of filtered water, it will be a better thing for our people than the discovery of a rich gold mine in our midst; for while the latter would bring us wealth, a bountiful supply of pure water will afford us health, a greater boon than riches.
