Happenings the Wide World Over of Important Events Condensed to Good Reading. ,

WASHINGTON NEWS.

President Wilson is making an effort to fill diplomatic posts before the extra session of congress begins. Dr. Eliot and McCombs, respective-

ly, have declined ambassadorships to Great Britain and France.

President Wilson, will confer frequently with members of the house fires aggregating a loss, of \$230,000 and senate in the president's room at the capitol during the extra session of congress. This was announced at the White House Thursday.

A general fight to cut down federal expenditures and bring them within the estimated revenues of the government is to be made in the special session of congress as soon as the tariff bills have been disposed of by the house. President Wilson's letter to Senator Tillman, made public Tuesday, in which he declared himself in favor of a "carefully considered a. wisely planned budget." lent new strength to the plan, now well under way in congress, to bring the country's enormous expenditures under some central control.

In issuing his call for a special session of the Sixty-third congress, without specifying the legislation which he will ask the congress to enact, President Wilson Monday defeated the attempts of the conservatives under Floor Leader Underwood to have him hold the legislation to the tariff and the passage of the sundry civil and Indian appropriation bills, which fail ed last session.

STATE AND DOMESTIC NEWS.

The arrival Friday, consigned to the depot quartermaster at Galveston, of 157 additional mules and 28 new wagons for the Second division and the issuance of an order from division headquarters effecting a redistribution of all animals and wagons among the various regiments and other organizations, sums up the important happenings in the camps of the Second division of the United States army now mobilized at Galveston and Texas City.

Governor Cruce of Oklahoma says there will be no limitation upon legislature in submitting amendments to vote of the people in Oklahoma.

General Superintendent of the Cotton Belt Railroad E. A. Peck, who had been missing from his hotel in Hot Springs, Ark., since Wednesday, March 12, wandered a mile from that city into a clump of small pine trees and shot himself through the right temple. Governor Colquitt Monday received opies of documents in the archives of Mexico relating to the Alamo mission at San Antonio. The order to have these copies made and sent to last acts in the official career and life of Francisco I. Madero, late president of Mexico. Among the documents which President Madero forwarded was Santa Anna's report on the battle of the Alamo, heretofore unpublished. Mrs. A. F. Upsetting of Western Classification 51 Means Much.

Most Important Phases. "Of the many phases of the declsion the first in importance are the rules and regulations. The carriers proposed many changes. These are applicable to every city, town and hamlet west of the Missisippi river. The state commissions made objecchanges were made or ordered in

twelve of them. "A concrete illustration of these concerps the dunnage allowance. Prior to the issuance of No. 51, the carriers permitted the shippers to use lumber and boards to prop up machinery in a car, the railroads hauling 500 pounds of such lumber free of charge. No. 51 abolished the dunnage privilege, and the commission ordered it reinstated. When one considers the thousands of shipments that are made annually, the importance of such a

ruling can be appreciated. "Another change of importance to the western half of the United States concerns green hides. The carriers put in a rule permitting them to refuse to take green hides for shipment. We pointed out that they could be stored or handled in live stock cars. and not contaminate other commodities, and claimed that the carriers should be compelled to accept the same for transportation. Our position was sustained by the commission.

There must be many others in America besides myself who have been through this section of Central Africa and to whom Rogers was known personally. And to us the story brings regrets, for Rogers was a fine type of man, even though his latter days were spent in outlawry and defiance of lawfully constituted authority.

In order that the causes which led up to the tragedy may be better understood, it is necessary to touch lightly upon history and political facts. Many may recall that the British government leased the strip of the Congo territory. known as the Lado Enclave-a long strip stretching along the banks of the Nile from the southernmost extremity of Lake Albert to Kiro, on the edge of Sudan-to the late King Leopold of the Belgians, for the duration of his lifetime. On his death, it passed back into British hands and, incidentally, under the control of the Sudan officials.

Prior to this-that is to say, under Leopold's rule-the Lado Enclave was the happy huntingground of a band of British and foreign ivorypoachers. The Belgian administration of the Lado was a mere farce. Officials were few and far between and the natives did as they willed. without fear of let or hindrance. It must be remembered, however, that if any of the poachers were caught red-handed with the poached ivory, they were sent to the Belgian Congo capital, Leopoldsville, on the Congo river, to undergo ten years' hard labor in a chain-gang.

This little pleasantry of punishment was the

There are many points you and I would like to have cleared up, but either Fox's modesty or his sense of what is due to a dying man's last request prevent the elucidation of the blank spaces. For instance, we would like to know who is the doctor referred to by Rogers and Captain Fox. Maybe we shall never know! Rogers' lips are sealed by death and the lips of Captain Fox are sealed by a dying man's last charge. The "doctor" must go down to posterity as a figure of mystery, unless the Belgians disclose his name. We know that he was the boon companion of Rogers and we have the latter's statement that

Up the banks of the Nile went the little party of soldiers and their white leader and ever in advance of them was the fearless Rogers, laughing in his sleeve and content in the belief that be could outwit the most determined pursuit.
