

El Paso, Tex.-After the evacuation of Santa Rosalia Saturday the combined rebel forces of Pancho Villa, Tomas Urbina and Manuel Chao, numbering 4,000, scattered to the hills, according to a brief dispatch received and clogged bowels. Try by Colonel Juan N. Vasquez, federal commander, in Juarez Sunday.

Mexico City.-Government officials regard the federal successes the past week as a "death blow" to the organized revolution in the north. The defeat of the rebels at Santa Rosalia appears to be confirmed. Advices from General Samuel E. Mercado, military governor of the State of Chihuahua, to the department of the interior describes the result as a rout of the enemy

The town was recaptured, according to the governor, who added: "The victory is of great importance because the trains by which the enemy expected the return to the south have been captured, as have large amounts of war material."

Several thousand men were said to have been engaged at Santa Rosalia. This victory, together with the occupation by General Maas of Sabinas on his march to Piedras Negras has greatly encouraged war department

officials General Trucy Aubert, with 1,000 men marching to the relief of Torreon, has reached Madera, about 100 miles east of Torreon, but is making slow headway owing to the necessity of repairing the railroad. Conditions at Torreon have greatly improved and it is reported the rebels practically have abandoned that district.

General Felipe Alvarez is said to be preparing an expedition to march on Durango, which for months has been in the possession of the rebels.

Teziutlan, in the State of Puebla, still is besieged by Indians, but foreigners and noncombatants have been able to leave the town, reaching Puebla City under federal escort. Raiding, pillaging and burning of ranches continue in various parts of Puebla and Morelos. The efforts of the rebels in San Luis Potosi, Coahuila and Nuevo Leon are confined raiding of small towns.

KERRVILLE

Is the county seat of Kerr County, has a population of about 2500, is sit-Antonio, and is the terminus of the Kerrville branch of the S. A. & A. P. railroad. It has two daily trains to and from San Antonio, and daily mail routes, carrying passengers in hacks, to Ingram, Junction, Rock Springs Harper and other places north and west of Kerrville, and also a daily line Fredericksburg is 25 miles; to Bandera and Medina City, 25 miles; to Junction 60 miles; Rocksprings 80 miles, Harper 21 miles.

Kerrville has electric lights and a splendid system of water works. The sum of \$20,000 is being spent on the streets and \$40,000 has been voted for road improvements in this precinct.

The elevation at Kerrville is 1750 feet. The Guadalupe river, which heads 30 miles north of Kerrville, runs through the city. On the east side where the city is located, there are high cluff's on the river, and on the west side is a fertile and beautiful valley, and mountains surround the city on the east and west. The Guadalupe valley is occupied by thrifty farmers and ranchmen, and the mountain regions, among which there is consider able valley, creek and arable land there are large ranches of cattle, horses, sheep and goats, all of which do well in the Kerrville country. The land generally is well wooded, principally with live oak, Spanish oak and cedar, and the range is good, and water excellent.

Our farmers grow wheat, oats and all other small grain, cane and alfalfa, cotton and corn, and fruit and veg-etables do well. Kerrville is one of the largest wool markets in the state. and large quantities of wool, mohair, cotton, oats, cattle, etc., are shipped from this point.

The climate of the Kerrville country is unsurpassed. The winters are short and generally mild and invigorating owing to the dryness of the climate and the prevalence of sunshine. The summers are cool and delightful, and the mountain air is pure and bracing. Game abounds in the Kerrville country, and fishing in the Guadalupe, especially north of Kerrville, is good Kerry and the adjoining towns are popular resorts for health and recrea-



ROUP IN THE CHICKEN FLOCK

Disease Is Prevalent Where Fowls Are Kept In Filthy, Damp and Poorly Ventilated Quarters.

(By F. W. KAZMEIER.) Roup is prevalent in flocks kept in filthy, damp, poorly ventilated quarters. Vigorous stock in good surroundings proves quite resistent to the disease.

Common colds do not develop into roup if the specific germ is not present. The common belief is that roup is developed from a neglected cold. This is not the case, although it supplies the conditions so that the roup germs can easily get a foothold. For the benefit of those who have

been unlucky enough to get this terrible disease introduced into their flock I give the following successful way of combating roup: First, remove all conditions which tend to foster it, next, remove all affected birds a clean, dry room, of even temperature, that is free from draughts of air. If you desire to doctor them, treat as soon as the earliest symptoms are detected. Disinfect the poultry house and runs with a five per cent, solution of carbolic acid and repeat this disinfection at least once a week. Feed a well balanced ration containing some meat scraps. Burn all dead birds. A far developed roupy chicken is worth more dead than alive. One good remedy is to put a few drops of kerosene oil-on the affected fowl's head. This is also excellent for common colds. Peroxide of hydrogen and water half and half, or creolin or carbolic acid in two per cent, solution may be used in the same manner. RECESSION OF RIVERS AND SMALL STREAMS SHOW EVI-DENCE OF DAMAGE.

Mother and Three Children Drown in San Antonio River-Two Women and Two Children Perish in Williamson County.

Following a cessation of unprecedented rainfalls in South Texas, from the Rio Grande to the Sabine river, and in Louisiana, rivers and small streams this week are receding from record-breaking high water marks. and making patent the great damage that has resulted. The recession of the waters reveals fields swept bare by the onward rush of swirling torrents, the wrecks of houses that were in the path of the floods, and the bodies of animals that could not be driven from the lowlands before the waters overtook them. Reports of the subsidence of waters come from points at some distance from the Gulf of Mexico, where the tides have been able to go down with the slacks 'ng of the rainfall, but nearer the gulf the waters are not receding and in some places are still rising. Until all that country has again become dry land, no estimate of the damage that could be near correct can be made. Writer Bemoans the Passing of the Ancient Fondness That Made Winter Evenings a Joy.

The old butternut, a very rich and ragrant nut of the olden time, has alost disappeared. Very few people of the present generation have ever tasted a butternut. The black walnut is becoming fewer, and in a generation hence it will hardly be known. And yet it is a precious nut, full of goodness and rare taste. 


