Writer in Indiana Newspaper Has Some Pertinent Remarks to Make on the Subject.

The United States department of agriculture has issued a bulletin "to determine the best way of pasteurizing milk so as to kill the disease germs and yet not give the milk a cooked flavor or lesson its nutritive value." Where are Sukey and dear old Bossy of yesterday? Gone, without ever having entertained the slightest suspician that their lacteal product was not above reproach. Then science comes in to cast doubt upon all their daughter. "A healthy child." says the Homeopathic Envoy, "growing up where germs swarm becomes a strong man, while another fed on pasteurized milk and guarded by 'sterilization' may grow up a weakling. Why? Give it up! Perhaps there are fundamental causes not recognized by the theorists. If milk will cause disease, will heating make it wholesome? ' If milk is pure, will not heating cause it to lose its best nutritive qualities? If the germs come from the cow, why use her milk? If they come from without, why not keep them out instead of killing them after they get in the milk?"-Indianapolis News.

Formally Advises Will Not Interfer Dealings in i.

London -In reply to Pre on's communication annou determination to eliminate Gen Huerta and his adherents from poin Mexico, Great Britain Saturday swered formally that her policy was strictly one of noninterference.

It was understood the other European powers had sent similar replies to that of Great Britain after exchang ng views, which it was understood Washington desired.

President Wilson's note to the pow rs, while it stated clearly his intention to get rid of Huerta, did not, it is understood, include any outline as to how he expected to accomplish that object in case Huerta should remain deaf to persuasion.

As an official pointed, out, however, intervention must follow.

It is expected President Wilson will communicate to the powers successive steps of the proceedings as he has been doing. So far as Great Britain is concerned it is pointed out he may rely on her reply being the same in each case-namely, noninterference.

A Number of Resolutions on Subject Adopted at Meeting of Texas Congress of Mothers.

Fort Worth, Tex.-The conference of the Texas Congress of Mothers and Parent Teachers' Association end ed Friday after adopting a number of resolutions which bore directly upon the subject of child welfare and re jecting one which the conference by a close vote decided was foreign to the general purposes of the association. The resolution, read by Mrs. Hortense Ward, would have placed the association on record as favoring the ballot for women in Texas, but by a vote of 19 to 17 this was lost.

The following subjects were covered in resolutions adopted:

Statewide safe and sane celebration of national holidays; censorship of motion picture shows and theaters; more concise birth records; the establishment of a pension system for teachers who have given twenty y ars to school work; a child welfare exhibit at the Texas State fair, the Texas Cotton Palace and county displays, and a building at the Texas State fair for the exhibit; means for arousing greater interest in the mothers' com pensation and minimum wage act and a correction of the defects of the fiftyfour-hour law; child labor and compulsory education laws; legislation for institutions for the incurably insane and a broadening of the work of the

When the resolution indorsing woman suffrage was introduced some keen discussion promised to follow. It was the opinion of some of the champion of the cause to vote as individuals and not as a congress on the measure To this Mrs. Ward replied that she could not see why a person favoring woman's suffrage would hesitate to firmly stand by her belief. Mrs. Ward told the conference that the best way for the mothers to secure the legislation in favor of the child was by direct methods, and that the ballot would be the weapon, the woman could use with much effect. The first vote; taken by acclamation, could not be decided. The president called for a rising vote and the count showed

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
