FEDERALS EVACUATE OJINAGA TO AVOID MASSACRE-REBELS HOLD NORTHERN MEXICO.

BIGGEST VICTORY OF THE WAR

American Patrol Takes Charge of 2,800 Men, Six Generals, 200,000 Rounds of Ammunition and 1,500 Civilians Who Crossed Border to Escape From Rebels.

Presidio, Tex.-The Mexican federal army, with its nine generals, evac-Ojinaga, Mexico, Saturday The triumphant rebel forces under General Francisco Villa immediately occupied the village.

General Salvador Mercado, who was Huerta's chief military commander, crossed the river and surrendered to Major McNamee of the United States

The defeat of the federal army followed only a few hours' fighting in which the rebels, beginning at sundown, started to close in on the be sieged garrison with cannon and rifle

Texas. After the fighting had been in progress about five hours, seven wagons loaded with documents belonging to the Huerta government came over and were captured by the United States border patrol.

Major McNamee immediately ordered all cavalrymen to meet any emergency. Women, children and wounded soldiers had been crossing in numbers, but the apparent advance of the rebels gave reason to believe a greater rush across the border was immi-

For five hours the sharp flashes of the rebel fire had been seen drawing closer to the federal intrenchments. The whole scene was witnessed in the moonlight partly obscured by dust and years.

by the fire of a few machine guns, which may come to the knowledge of The rattling return fire of the rebels soon silenced the guns of the outpost. The scattered federals were thrown general against such officer or offiinto disorder and dashed for the Texas side. Twenty-eight hundred Mexican fed-

eral soldiers, six generals, 200,000 rounds of ammunition, two cannon, four large field pieces and 1,500 civilian refugees are now in the custody of the United States army border patrol as the result of the federal evacuation of Ojinaga, Mexico, and the occupation of the Mexican village by General Francisco Villa's rebel forces Saturday.



The automobile was a seven-passenger car and was completely demolished, being ground into small pieces. The dead: Frank A Blain and R. Allen Blain, Fort Worth: Eugene Corley and Edward E. McLemore, Dallas.

ORDER TO REDUCE ESTIMATES ISSUED TO CHAIRMEN OF COMMITTEES.

COST OF GOVERNING IS HIGH

Army and Navy Need Much Money-Waterway Improvement Advocates Expect Another Rivers and Harbors Bill.

By GEORGE CLINTON.

Washington.-Democratic leaders in both houses have passed the word to the chairmen of committees which deal with appropriations that they must cut the supply estimates as deeply as they can without running the danger of crippling the government service. The Democratic party, as is the custom with all parties, is pledged to economy in government, but the leaders have been a little frightened by the size of the estimates which have been transmitted by the secretaries of the different departments.

From a comparatively become the leading manufacturing enterprise of the state as measured by the value of products manufactured. In 1900 the nearest approach to a packing house in Texas was a sauplants at that time and their combined annual output had a value of \$42,000. The latest census reports l'exas whose yearly production is sisters. more than \$42,000,000 in value. This rigantic industry furnishes employment to 4,300 persons, who receive \$2,600,000 annually in salaries and wages and represents a capital in-

vestment of \$12,438,500. The packing houses of Texas slaughter 2,000,000 head of livestock annually, which is equivalent to the natural yearly increase and is 20 per cent of our meat animal supply. These animals cost the packers \$37,500,000, while a decade ago animals slaughtered were valued at

only \$3,170,000. In number the predominating class of meat animals slaughtered is hogs, the total number killed each year being 940,000, compared with 208,-270 ten years ago. The demand for pork has increased with marked rapidity in Texas during recent years, and last year we consumed \$240,000,-000 more of pork and pork products

than we produced. Beeves and calves rank next to swine in number slaughtered, but the cost of the cattle killed yearly is \$7,-000,000 more than that of the hogs. As Texas is the leading livestock State she also ranks first in number of cattle. We had 6,056,000 head on January 1, 1913. In 1912 the value of beef produced in Texas had n value of \$47,812,000, while the requirement for the year was only \$19,646,000, leaving a surplus of \$28,166,000. Our packing houses now slaughter a million head of cattle annually, while ten years ago the
