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

From the moment, shortly after noon, when it was officially announced that the first full meeting of the delegates on both sides was to be held later in the day, until after the mediators had gone to the American side of the river shortly before midnight, there was an atmosphere of suppressed excitement about every move made both by the mediators and by the representatives of the United States and Mexico.

Speculation and rumor of all sorts as to the exact purpose of this sudden calling together of the entire mediation body were virtually set at rest when it was admitted that the moving cause for the precipitate step was the condition in Mexico, the taking of Saltillo and the threatened constitutionalist advance on the capital. It was declared that while the situation there hardly could be called critical, it was grave. It was said to be the desire of the Methan delegates to see some form of provisional government established in the City of Mexico before events brought about a crisis in the capital. There was an evident disposition to waive all immaterial points at issue and come to gether squarely in an effort to reach a conclusion.

The meeting was held early in the afternoon. At its close a bulletin was issued announcing that the conference had been held at the request of the Mexican representatives for the purpose of informing the mediators and the American representatives of the ideas of their government concerning several interesting points for the best solution of the present difficulty. It was decided to maintain secrecy in regard to these points until a concrete solution shall have been reached, to which end the informal conversations will continue.

Fair-Market Throughout Has Been Good One for Farmers. San Benito, Tex .- Practically all of what may be termed winter truck,

cabbage and lettuce for the most part. has been gathered. Last week's shipment of cabbage was only ten cars, bringing the total season's movement of cabbage up to 993 carloads. These figures do not include drop shipments by express, which easily amount to forty or fifty carloads. This is double the shipment of any previous year and is about 40 per cent of the total yield of the whole lower Rio Grande Valley.

The total shipment of lettuce was slightly more than a hundred carloads of last year. . Returns on lettuce for bringing in a total sum far greater than for any previous year. The highest price received for a single car was. holds the record for receipt for any single car shipped from Texas this season. Practically all of the lettuce growers made money this year, one especial case is that of a four-acre patch owned by a dentist in San Benito and worked with hired labor, which yielded a net return of \$1,762.

This season has been very success ful from the truck grower's standpoint. The market for the whole Season through has been much better than that of last year, while the total return from all varieties of truck is far greater than that of any other year since the opening of the valley as a trucink district.

RESINOL WILL SURELY THE TEXAS FLOOD SITUATION

SITUATION IN ALL THREATENED SECTIONS IMPROVING.

Four Deaths Have Been Reported Colorado and San Antonio Rivers Have Caused Apprehension.

Flood conditions along larger Texas rivers and the creeks and smaller streams have assumed a more hopeful aspect in the last day or two. It is generally reported that the situation has become less threatening and in various sections the farmers are encouraged to believe that much of the cotton, corn and other crops which, two days ago, were believed to be a total loss, may now be saved by quick and effective attacks upon the weeds.

The Colorado river at Austin caused much alarm among the bottom farmers, while individual industries along the banks have suffered considerable loss.

The Trinity, Brazos and Guadalupe rivers have entailed a heavy loss upon the nearby fields, but 'further encroachments are not expected only in exceedingly low localities. The various creeks tributary to these and other rivers accumulated big damages immediately after the heavy rains of Saturday night and Sunday, but now practically all have resumed their usual courses.

Deaths have been reported in the Trinity and Brazos rivers. A mother and her baby were drowned at Onalaska in the Trinity and two young men were drowned below Marlin in the Brazos. These fatalities, seemingly, were due to mistaken judgment in boat capacity rather than in the usual dangers of floods.

Flood warnings have been issued by the weather bureau to all points on the Trinity, Brazos, Colorado and Guadalupe rivers as the result of heavy rains in all sections of the State, except the eastern section. Danger is possible along all the rivers, it is asserted.

The watershed of the Guadalupe river experienced heavy precipitation. At Austin 4.24 inches of rain fell during the twenty-four hours preceding o'clock Thursday morning, according to a report. Ballinger reported 2

inches and Marble Falls 2.75 inches. A rise of the Guadalupe below Gonzales is predicted, and a rise of the Colorado below Austin is expected.

The Colorado river rose 10 feet at Ballinger, 5 feet at Austin, 6 feet at Marble Falls and 8.1 feet at Colum-

On the Brazos river a rise of 2 feet was reported at Kopperl; 7.7 feet at Waco and 2.4 at Valley Junction, But .65 inch of rain fell at Kopperl, .24 at Waco and .6 at Valley Junction. Little rain fell along the course of the Trinity river. At Riverside the stream was 3 feet above flood stage

It was significant that while the views had been so divergent as to give rise to the distinct statement that there was a "hitch," the atmosphere was so cleared at the end of the conference that a spirit of optimism was displayed by all of the participants. But will even 1,500 pounds per acre of high grade complete fertilizer build up the fertility of soil? The answer is quite simple. Fifteen hundred pounds of fertilizer contain several times the phosphoric acid removed by a heavy crop of vegetables, and the unused portion will remain in soil for the benefit of succeeding crops. The supply of potash need not give concern, but the weakness of the fertilizer is the low content of the high priced element, nitrogen.

A comparison of the proportions of plant food elements present in fertilizers with those found in crops will make this point clear. Take corn, for example. In mature plants for every ten pounds of phosphoric acid are found 23 pounds of potash and 32 pounds of nitrogen, but in a common brand of trucker's fertilizer for every ten pounds of phosphoric acid are four pounds of potash and only three and one-third pounds of nitrogen. Thus 1,500 pounds of such fertilizer does not contain as much nitrogen as is required in the production of a 40bushel corn crop and less than onethird the amount removed by a heavy crop of cabbage. In fact, all of the ever, not all of them are bringing in nitrogen demanded by common farm and garden crops cannot be profitably supplied by commerical fertiliz-

ers. To build up soil in nitrogen, recourse must be had to the growing for manurial purposes of leguminous plants, such as peas, beans, vetches, especially clovers, all of which gather nitrogen from air. A complete fertillzer for the legumes need contain only phosphoric acid and potash, but the sweetening of soil by an occasional liming will be of benefit to them and to the garden crops. Clover should be sown freely in midsummer wherever possible. Finally, as a result of the application of manure, fertilizers, lime and the growing of legumes, fertility of soil is built up.






