MY TURN

"WHAT'S GOOD for the goose is good for the gander" was a platitude often used by my father as I was growing up. I took this to mean that I was not to expect any special favors, since everybody has to live by the same rules. Of course, back then, we did not have the special class of people known as "lawmakers" who live in Washington D.C. and who don't have to follow the same rules as the rest of us ordinary folks.

In the end, investigations into the President's "Whitewater" affair may turn up nothing which is illegal as far as man-made laws are concerned, but there are other laws (rules) which should have been followed. These are the unspoken rules of morals, ethics, honesty and fairness. Americans are showing an increased mistrust of politicians which seems to be growing by leaps and bounds, and with good reason.

We've learned that while our President was governor of just about the poorest state in the country (he likes to brag about being one of the lowest paid governors) he and his family were living high on the hog. Sooiel! There were plenty of under the table dealings, "selling short" and insider tradings going on. These "investments," plus the usual amenities granted a governor such as housing, staff, travel, food, expense accounts, etc. plus his wife's nice lawyer salary and retainer fees, brought that poorest-paid governor right up into the wealthy category. And this is the guy who campaigned for the presidency by heaping moral scorn upon the wealthy. . . and the same guy who took a tax-deduction for donating his and his wife's used underwear to some charity.

Now, when the going gets tough for the first couple, we suddenly are barraged with rhetoric about their old-fashioned family values and religious faith. Not so long ago these topics were met with great disdain when they were suggested by Dan Quayle et al.

I wouldn't trust him (Bill Clinton) as far as I could throw him. (My mother used to say that about some of the dates I would bring home.) Here we have this untrustworthy person of questionable character and ethics at the helm of our government, and he is proposing that we turn our health over to him and his henchmen (or henchwomen, as the case may be). Absolutely ludicrous!

What is more important to your very life than the health care you receive from cradle to grave and the doctors who provide it for you? The Clintons' agenda seeks to drive a wedge between patients and the trust they have traditionally placed in their doctors by labeling them as greedy and uncaring.

Physicians are required to have a lot more education than lawyers and politicians. A future doctor will spend about 15 years in school and residency training with costs amounting to nearly \$500,000. But you don't even have to pass a test to become the President!

The Whitewater mess has served as a smoke screen while the Clinton health plan is quietly sliding through the various committees and is heading toward Congress. This plan will effectively deprive us of the doctors whom we have chosen, will limit our access to specialists, to second opinions and advanced technology and will burden the people with a great new bureaucracy. Nothing in the Constitution authorizes the government to have this much power over our private lives.

Some people do complain about the \$20 to \$50 they pay to see a doctor, but then they'll pay more than that to go to a concert or ballgame. However, I think what most of us are worried about is the

Suspect In Shooting Returned To County

A 19-year-old youth was in Parmer County Jail as of Wednesday, after being extradited from Flagstaff, Arizona, back to Parmer County.

Sheriff Rex Williams personally drove to Flagstaff on Monday, and took custody of Todd Jenkins, who was arraigned Wednesday morning at the Court House in Farwell, before Judge Louise Hancock.

Jenkins had signed a waiver which allowed his return to Parmer County.

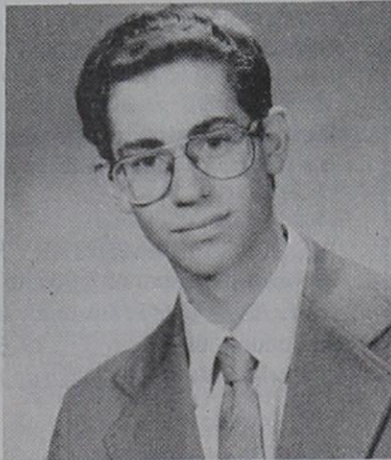
Jenkins is charged with assault with a deadly weapon and theft. His bond was set at \$50,000.

Olan Turner accompanied Williams to Arizona, and the officer recovered 10 guns which were allegedly stolen from Turner the morning that Jenkins left the Hub area residence, driving Turner's 1985 model Buick.

The guns taken were all shotguns or rifles, Williams said, including one considered an antique. A couple of the shotguns were valued at around \$600 apiece. The vehicle appeared to be in good order, and Turner drove it back to Parmer County.

Jenkins is charged with the shooting of another 19-year-old, John O. Turner, at his grandparents' residence on Tuesday, March 27. Turner was able to dial 911 and report the shooting. He also walked out to the road. He was brought to Friona by ambulance, where he later was transferred by air to St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo.

Turner was released from the hospital this week, according to sources.

The sheriff described Jenkins as "a drifter" who wandered into Friona about six weeks ago from Casper, Wyoming.

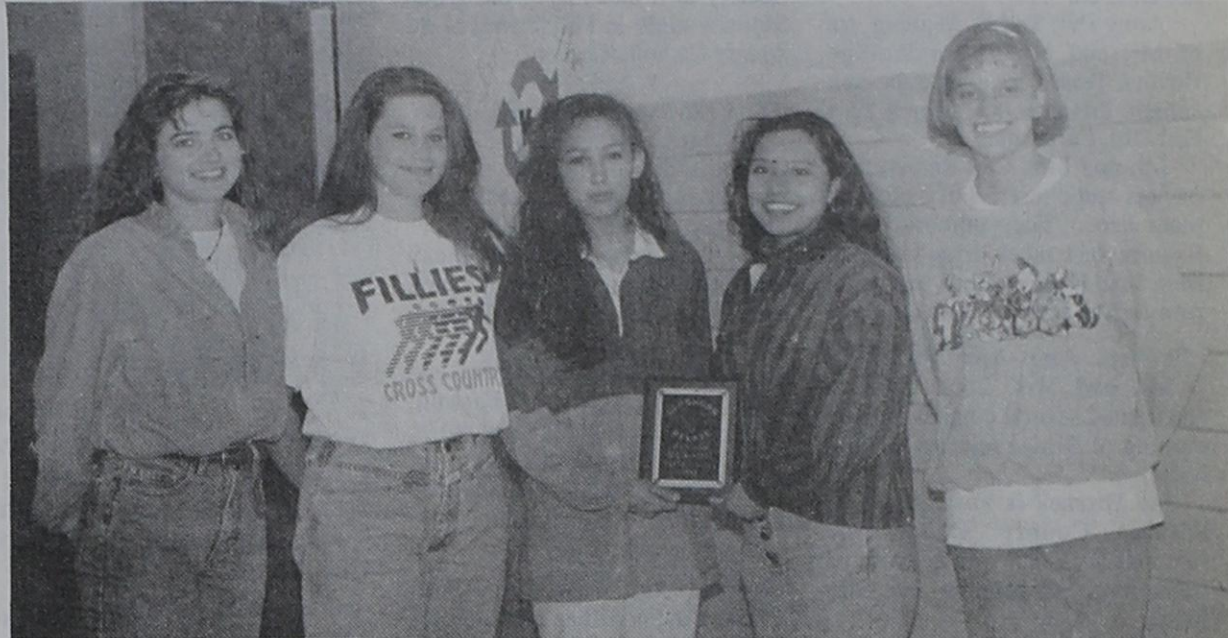
Williams said Turner befriended Jenkins, who stayed with Turner on Monday night at Turner's grandparents' home.

Turner's grandparents were out of town, Williams said.

John Clark, a friend of Turner's, said Turner tried to help Jenkins find relatives that Jenkins said lived in Friona. They were unable to find any local relatives, Clark said. But Jenkins "got to be friends with people in Friona and never did leave."

Clark said he introduced Turner and Jenkins. He said Jenkins briefly lived with Turner and some other roommates before Turner moved in with his grandparents.

Clark said Turner recently became a Christian, and was trying

A.C.L.S. Classes Held At Parmer Co. Hospital

Advanced Cardiac Life Support classes were sponsored by Parmer County Community Hospital on March 4, 11 and 12.

Those eligible to take the course are Registered Nurses, Licensed Vocational Nurses, paramedics, physicians and physician assistants. They must possess a current card in Basic Life Saving (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) as a pre-requisite to A.C.L.S.

A.C.L.S. training consists of a rigorous course in life threatening emergencies, interpretation of cardiac dysrhythmias, airway management including the insertion of endotracheal tubes, administration of emergency medications and treatments deemed appropriate in the emergency situation.

Students must pass a five part exam at the end of the course. They must score a minimum of 84% on the two written exams on general course curriculum and cardiac dysrhythmias. In addition,

they must pass skill stations on airway management, megacode and treatment modalities.

A.C.L.S. training benefits everyone needing emergency cardiac care. Bill Neely, hospital administrator, emphasized the importance of A.C.L.S. training classes in terms of the knowledge and skill level gained by those employees completing the course. This level of employee training further enhances patient care and the hospital is extremely pleased with the overall program results.

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Center Pivot System Evaluations Available

Since we are in the irrigation season and many new sprinkler systems are being installed, now is a good time to consider having your new or old system checked.

Running a pressure test before purchasing a center pivot system in order to properly design and match the system to the well, would be wise. Sometimes this test will indicate that it isn't feasible to install a center pivot or that bowl work may be required due to low well output under pressure. It is better to find this out before a

system is in the field. The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District has the equipment for running this test.

It is also good to check old center pivot systems from time to time. Nozzles will wear after time, sometimes sand going through the system is the culprit causing nozzles to wear out. The sand widens the nozzle allowing too much water to be put out.

Anytime any major changes are made, like bowl work or replacement, systems should be checked for efficiency.

Producers will want to keep systems as accurate as possible for maximum production. For assistance, contact the SCS office in Friona, or call 247-2220.

Happy Homemaker

This week recipes of Bovina residents, which originally appeared in the Cook's Corner of the *Bovina Blade* are being featured.

Mrs. Rouel (Thelma) Barron contributed the first four. Of the first one, she said, "This salad will keep ten days in the refrigerator and make a good company dish."

RUSSIAN SALAD

1 small head cabbage, shredded
1 small onion, chopped fine
1 small green pepper, chopped
1/2 to 1 teaspoon celery seed
Mix vegetables and celery seed in a bowl that can be covered.

For the dressing, boil:

1 tablespoon salt
1 tablespoon honey
1/2 cup white sugar
1 cup vinegar
2/3 cup salad oil

Pour while very hot over vegetables, cover and let stand in refrigerator several hours before serving. This salad will keep for ten days.

HAMBURGER DELUXE

(Serves 12 to 15)

1 to 1-1/2 pound hamburger
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 can spaghetti with cheese sauce

1 can Spanish rice
Brown hamburger in 2 tablespoons oil. Mix all ingredients together and put in baking dish. Grate cheese and cover top. Bake at 350 degrees until cheese is melted.

PECAN PIE

1/2 cup oleo
1 cup sugar
1 cup white corn syrup
3 eggs
3/4 cup pecans
2 tablespoons coconut (optional)
1 teaspoon vanilla

Melt oleo, add sugar and corn syrup. Beat eggs lightly (do not beat until foamy) and add to first mixture. Add pecans, coconut and vanilla. Pour into unbaked pie shell and bake about 45 minutes at 350 degrees. This makes one large pie. Double recipe and you have enough for three small pies.

RAW PEANUT BRITTLE

2 cups sugar
1/2 cup water
2 cups raw peanuts
3/4 cup corn syrup
Pinch of salt
4 teaspoons soda

Put sugar, syrup and water in

pan. Add salt. Cook until sugar melts. Add peanuts. Do not stir, but cook until reaches hard crack stage. Take off heat, add soda and stir quickly. Pour on greased surface. When cool, break in pieces with knife handle. Do not store air tight. It will become sticky. Makes about two pounds.

TITIANA'S FRUIT CAKE

1 can sweetened condensed milk
1 cup coconut
1 cup chopped dates
2 cups pecans, broken

Mix and bake at 325 degrees for 45 minutes or until done. Do not cool too fast. Wrap and refrigerate. Will keep at least four months.

WALDORF ASTORIA CAKE

1/2 cup oleo
1-1/2 cup sugar
2 cups flour
1 cup buttermilk
2 eggs, beaten
2 bottles red food coloring (2 ounces)

1 tablespoon cocoa
1 teaspoon salt
Cream oleo and sugar together. Add remaining ingredients and beat well. Then mix 1 tablespoon vinegar and 1 teaspoon soda and mix well. Bake in a 350 degree oven in two layers.

ICING

1 cup milk
1/2 cup flour
Mix and cook until thick, cool. Cream together well:
1 cup sugar
2/3 cup shortening
2 teaspoons vanilla
1/8 teaspoon salt

When this mixture is creamed well, add to above mixture and beat well. If the icing isn't thick enough, add powdered sugar until desired consistency.

ITALIAN SPAGHETTI

Mix together:
3 cans whole tomatoes
2 cans tomato sauce
2 cans tomato paste
3 bay leaves, crumbled

Fry two onions and 2 garlic pods, diced, in oil (olive oil optional). Then add tomato mixture and cook at low heat while making meat balls.

2 slices white bread, soaked in water
2 eggs
1 onion, chopped
1 pod garlic, diced
Salt
Pepper

Squeeze all the water out of the bread slices. Mix all ingredients together and shape into meat balls. Fry in olive oil. Add meat balls to sauce and cook slowly for at least two hours. Boil Italian spaghetti in salt water according to directions on package. Place spaghetti on plate and spoon meat balls and sauce over the spaghetti. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Serve with French bread and tossed salad.

1 hen, boiled, boned and cut in small pieces
1 large package corn chips
1 can mushroom soup
2 cans enchilada sauce
1 cup broth
Salt and pepper to taste
1/2 pound grated cheese
Put a layer of chicken, corn chips, enchilada sauce, mushroom soup and cheese in casserole. Repeat. Pour broth over mixture. Be sure to end with cheese on top. Heat at 250-300 degrees until heated through.

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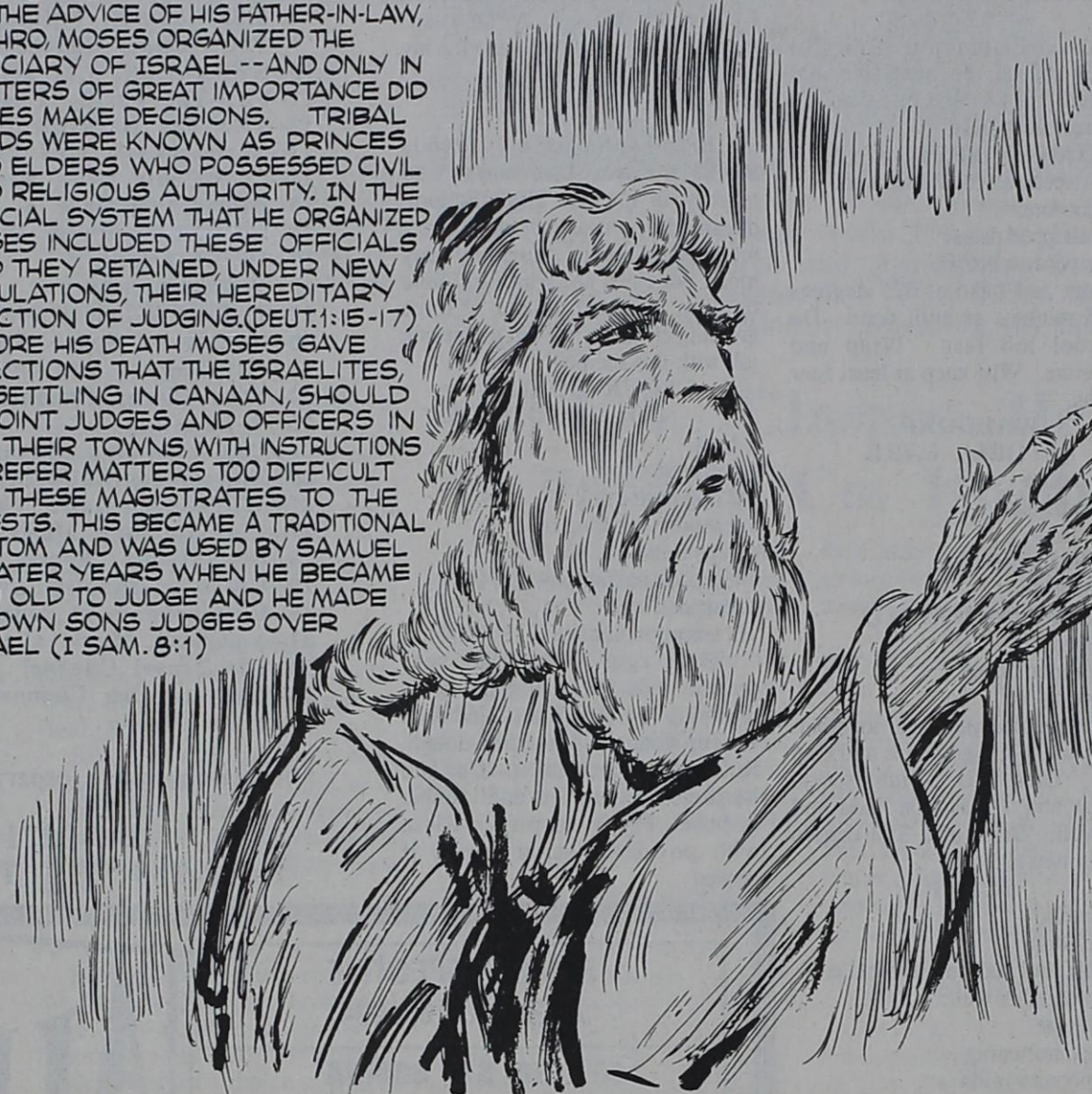

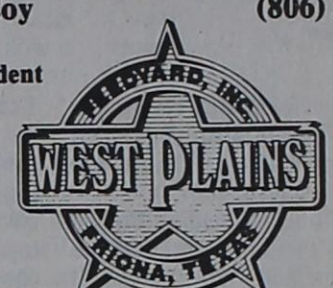

staggering expenses of a prolonged catastrophic illness and the possibility of resulting bankruptcy. A recent poll by the U. of Cincinnati shows that 84 percent of the people are happy with the quality of medical treatment they get and 80 percent are satisfied with its availability.

With this in mind, it appears that we have an insurance problem rather than a "health care crisis" as Clinton is fond of calling it. According to the Joint Economic Committee, there may be 5.8 million uninsured folks out of the 250 million who live in this country. This is a relatively small percentage. It would seem this problem could be faced without destroying the entire health system.

Under the Clinton health plan, employer mandates will close down small businesses and will leave between three to six million people jobless and uninsured. The economy will be burdened with over 151 billion dollars in new taxes and growing deficits, according to Dan Mitchell of the Seniors Coalition.

Water Dist. Measurements Indicate Decrease In Levels

Parmer County ground water levels declined an average of 2.66 feet in 1993 in 97 privately owned wells in the observation well network maintained by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in its 546,400 acre service area within the county. This represents a decrease of 218,013 acre-feet of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in the portion of Parmer County within the Water District service area.

"Below average precipitation during 1993 across most of the Water District service area caused irrigators to apply heavier and more frequent irrigations than usual to replenish soil moisture for the 1993 growing season. This significantly contributed to the decline in ground water levels," said Don McReynolds, High Plains Water District technical division director.

Ground water levels within the Water District's Parmer County service area decreased 1.39 feet during the ten year period from 1984 to 1994. An average annual increase of 1.98 feet was recorded during the five year period from 1989 to 1994.

Ground water levels in the Ogallala Aquifer within the 6.7 million acre Water District service area had an average decline of 1.46 feet from January 1993 to January 1994. This is a net decrease of about 1,467,300 acre feet of ground water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the Water District service area.

A zero average annual change in ground water levels was recorded for the first time in the Water District's history in 1985. Depth-to-water measurements revealed an average ground water level rise of

0.50 of a foot in 1986; an average rise of 0.90 of a foot in 1987; an average decline of 0.51 of a foot in 1988; an average decline of one foot in 1989; an average decline of 1.06 feet in 1990; an average decline of 0.73 of a foot in 1991; and an average rise of 0.14 of a foot in 1992.

A network of 1,174 privately owned observation wells is used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the High Plains Water District. The depth-to-water measurements are taken in January and February of each year in order to allow water levels to stabilize from the pumping during the previous growing season.

By comparing the current depth-to-water measurements with those taken the previous year, McReynolds says technical division staff members can determine what changes have occurred in the ground water levels.

Of the 15 counties or portions of counties making up the High Plains Water District, only Cochran County recorded an average rise in depth-to-water levels in 1993. The counties with average declines in depth-to-water levels in 1993 were Armstrong, Bailey, Castro, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hale, Hookley,

Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Parmer, Potter and Randall counties.

Maps showing the location and well number of observation wells in each county or portion of a county served by the Water District will be published in the April issue of *The Cross Section*.

Tables listing observation wells in each county within the District and the depth-to-water levels at one, five and ten year intervals are also printed.

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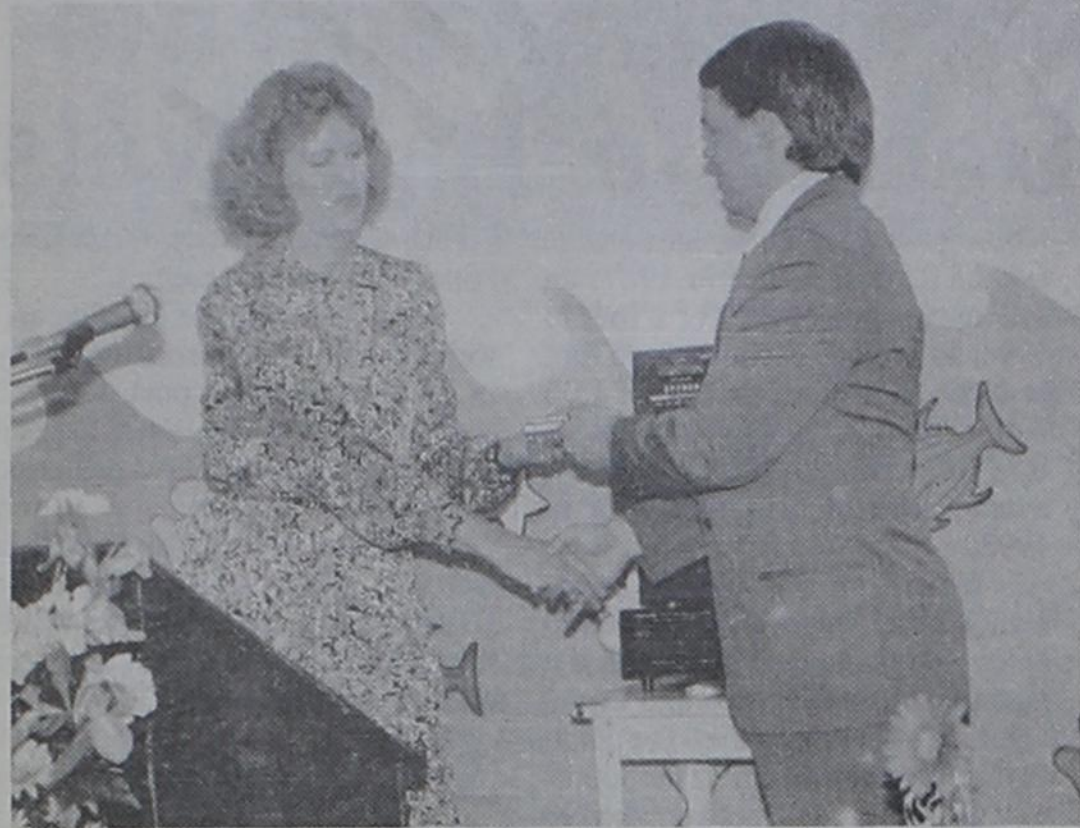
