



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LESSON FOR APRIL 4

SAUL REJECTED BY THE LORD.

LESSON TEXT-I Samuel 15:10-23 GOLDEN TENT-Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice.- I Samuel 15:22.

God was sorry that Saul had proved himself & worthy, A half-way obedience of God's command only heightened his guilt. iie, for a later age, in Saul's commission against Amalek, there were none | -Chicago Journal such for him" (Vaughn). Man's repentance involves a change of mind and purpose. In Saul's case God re pented, changed the instrument of his execution, because of the change of circumstances and relation. God is ever the same; it is man alone who changes. Saul had given Samuel cause for anger (v. 11 R. V.), but he did the wise thing in taking it to God in prayer. Arising early the next morning Samuel hastened to acquaint Saul with Jehovah's message. It is remarkable of how many of the great rose early, Abraham, Gideon, Joshua, Job, Jacob, Moses, etc., not to forget

our Lord Jesus. 11. Samuel's Rebuke, vv. 13-19. It must have been a striking scene when the aged Nazarite prophet faced the proud but recreant king. A guilty conscience is often covered by a great show of piety (v. 13), but such acts cannot stille the conviction of the heart nor deceive the righteous judge. Sin proclaims itself even as Samuel's sharp question brought conviction from the lips of Saul (v. 14; Prov. 28:13). Saul thought to deceive Sam uel by using a falsehood (v. 15). The only safe course is to confess our sins (Ps. 32:15; L John 1:0). There la an interesting suggestion in the way Saul uses the impersonal, "they and "we in verse 15, as if to lay the guilt of his acts upon others. It is easy for the sinner to blame other and seek to minimize his own guilt (Rom. 14:12). Verse 9 clearly indicates why Saul and the people had spared the best of the cattle. To use a part only for God and the rest for self in direct disobedience to God's rights or the rights of others is to incur his righteous wrath (vv. 22, 23) III. Saul's Self-Rejection, vv. 20-23.

God set Saul aside because he had rejected the right and chose the wrong. Face to face with his sin Saul could not dodge the issue. Samuel's "wherefore" (v. 19) must have aroused Saul's guilty conscience. It is a question which should reach every tempted soul. Samuel characterizes Saul's sin as being due to stubborn ness, rebellion, disobedience and a rejection of God (v 19) Again Sau. seeks to evade his responsibility (vv 20, 21). Then Samuel speaks plainly (v. 22) comparing his sin of disobedi ence with witchcraft, stubbornness iniquity and idolatry. Plainly he tells Saul, "Because thou hast relected the word of the Lord, he hath also rejected thee from being king". (v. 23).



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THE BREWERY SUITS

The Waco Morning News and Home and State are giving the people of Texas a look-in upon the methods by which the brewery and liquor interests have been for years attempting to control and to a great degree have controlled the politics of this State. The petition of Attorney General Looney in the suits recently instituted against the breweries in and out of Texas is given in full and the correspondence between Adolphus Busch, Otto Wahrmund, Otto Koehler, B. Adoue, I. Friedlander, et al. makes interesting reading. It shows conclusively that the old slogan of "local self government" as put forward by the liquor interests has had no sincerity in it. This evidence, as shown by actual correspondence between the Big brewing associations outside of Texas and their paid agents in Texas, is conclusive proof that the breweries do not even believe in the great "Home Rule" movement which they have recently organized to defeat National Prohibition. They tell us that the States ought to be let alone, to deal with the liquor traffic; they tell us the counties ought to be let alone to adopt or reject local prohibition, yet when a campaign is on either in State or County, or even precinct, the evidence shows the brewing interests in St. Louis and elsewhere outside of Texas have come with their corrupt millions to interfere with "local self government." Whenever we have a county election in this state the breweries put their cunning hand in it to defeat the will of the people. And even when it is to elect our state and county officials they put their filthy hands into these elections in order that they may elect men to office who will favor their

The eyes of the people are being opened as never before to the fact that the liquor traffic has no rgard for law or government except to further its own selfish and corrupt interests and that there is absolutely no sincerity in any of its pretexts or

cuses that it should be allowed to exist. The only honest excuse they can give for the existence of this awful traffic is for the purpose of making money, and all intelligent people know that this must be at the expense and detriment of every other legitimate business as well as good govern-

ment, education, religion, and good morals. The licensed saloon is the depot through which the liquor traffic distributes its death dealing product. It lies within the power of free horn citizens to put this useless and harmful traffic out of business. Why not do it?

The report of the special agent for the breweries in 1909 has the following: "Darkest Russia is not any more under the domination af the ezar than the Shelby (county) under the rule of the Baptists and Methodists churches." From which it would appear that Shelby county is not under the rule of the organized breweries, all of which is cause for congratulation to its citizens. Hurrah for old Shelby !- Comanche Vanguard.

The Germans report that a French steamer loaded with ammunition put into the Belgian port of Ostend, now in German hands, by mistake, thinking it to be the friendly port of Nieuport, and that she was a valuable prize. It is said the crew were drunk. No doubt this will cause the French to put a ban on drinking on board all vessels.

The Iowa Liquor Dealers' Association met some time ago (The State recently went dry by legislative enactment) at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and the mayor of the city welcomed them with an open ing address. The Woman's Christian Temperance Union, believing that the mayor did not represent the real sentiment of the city of Cedar Rapids, also presented the dealers in intoxicating drinks with an address which is unique and worthy or a wide reading. It was as follows:

Gentlemen: A welcome to a city should be representative, and since the welcome accorded your association by the mayor of Cedar Rapids represents the thought of but a portion of its citizenship, it seems fitting that the entire community should communicate to you its sentiments. Hence, in behalf of those not represented by the mayor, the Woman's Christain Temperance Union extends this greeting.

It is quite usual in greeting a body to enumerate its accomplishments and tell of its worth and standing. Courtesy to the individual somewhat embarasses us here. Shall we greet you as those who wreck homes, debauch manhood, prostitude womanhood, disgrace and impoverish childhood? Shall we greet you as those who place upon the taxpayer the heaviest burden in carrying for the results of your traffie?

Your position in community is quite pecular We fail to find a city that enumerates among its advantages its saloons. The commercial club of our city advertises our manufacturing plants, our churches, our schools and colleges, but never once have the thirty-two soloons of the city been advertised as a reason for industries to locate here.

It is said by some that you help a town. Do you make better fathers, husbands, sons, and so raise the standard of citizenship? Do you bring comfort and happiness to mothers, wives and children? Do you add to the efficiency of the laborer or business man and so add to the material prosperity of the place?

Any business is judged by its results. Sometime since Cedar Rapids had a manufacturers' week. Every business in the city except yours exhibited its wares. Yet your ambition is to be classed as a line of legitimate business. The packing house and food mills showed their splendid products ready to feed the world. The pump manufacturers and wood finishing concerns exhibited their contributions to comfort and esthetic pleasure. The clothing manufacturers gave evidence of prosperity? Did the saloons of Cedar Rapids use their windows or those of other places lent to exhibit their finished product? No, you find these in the penitentiary, where 85 per cent of the inmates are your graduates. Seventy per cent of the insane are others. Ninty per cent of pauperism is another class. The great burden of private charity is due to the saloon. The taxpayer must pay the enormous cost of your colossal failure to care for your product. But only the Father of us all knows the blight of manhood, the shame of womanhood, the wreck of home, the heartbreak of the innocent. Ah, no, gentlemen, you are not welcomed to Cedar Rapids by its homes and social

Yours is not a legitimate business, so declared by the United States Supreme Court. Our stores open at their pleasure, closed only on a day of rest. But on self defense a community limits you to time and seasons. If your places of business are so demoralizing that they must be closed on election days and holidays, and so dangerous that they are closed in times of fire, riot, or others occasions of excitement how can a city welcome you at any

In the name of humanity, in the name of our God, the seven thousand members of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Iowa lead in this protest against your welcome to any city of the state. Exchange.



Washington.-At the suggestion of the American forces on the Texas fleet: border, Acting Secretary Breckenridge of the war department has ordered three batteries of the Third Field Artillery to Brownsville, Texas, as a demonstration to the Mexican forces contending for possession of Matamoros that American lives and property must not be endangered by firing across the line. U. S. ARTILLERY WILL LOST SUBMARINE LOCATED AUSTRIANS RETREAT AT MOUTH HONOLULU HARBOR

IN THE MOUNTAINS

AUSTRIANS AND RUSSIANS FURI-OUSLY BATTLE IN SNOWCLAD CARPATHIAN MOUNTAINS

TWO BRITISH SHIPS SUNK

In the Dardanelles the Allied Fleet Has Slowed Up Hostilities to Clear Channel of Mines-Snow Hinders Operations.

Latest War News From Front.

Fast and powerful submarines of the German navy have torpedoed two more British steamers in the waters adjacent to the British Isles. Both steamers, the Falaba and Aguila, took. to flight at the sight of the submarines, but were speedily overhauled. with the result that both vessels were sent to the bottom, with a loss of life estimated at between 140 and 150.

Only a few minutes were allowed the passengers and crew to put off in the boats, and, according to the survivors, the Germans turned their guns on the captured ships, and thereby added to the loss of life by shell fire.

Since the French merchantman Admiral Ganteaume, with 2,600 refugees from Belgian and French coast towns aboard, was torpedoed-Oct. 26-the Falaba, which was in the West African service, is the only steamer carrying any great number of passengers that has been sunk by a German submarine. The Falaba had aboard, according to the latest official list published by the Elder-Dempster Steamship Company, 151 passengers, of whom 86 were saved. Four passengers are reported to have been killed and sixty-one are missing. Forty-three of the crew also are missing and four were killed.

Of the Aguila, the three lone passengers and twenty-three of the crew were lost.

A measure of vast importance is forecast by the conference which British ship owners have had with David Lloyd-George, chancellor of the exchequer. The shipbuilding employers unanimously urged the total prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors during the period of the war.

In the land operations of the war eastern zone still occupies the center of interest, for in the Carpathians the Russians continue their drive toward the plains of Hungary, with the Austrians apparently being

In the Dardanelles the allied battleships have been throwing a few shells at the forts and the mine sweepers have been steadily at work.

A Constantinople dispatch says that General Liman von Sanders, a German officer, has been placed in command of the Turkish forces of the Dardanelles.

There has been little activity in France, but the Germans have bombarded the towns of Nieuport and Nieuport Bains in Belgium.

The battles for the Carpathian passes continue with extreme violence, this being the only region where for the moment fighting on a large scale is taking place.

The Russians, who recently regained possession of Dukla Pass, are pushing their way toward Bartfeld on the one side and Svidnik on the other, where, if they achieved their object, they would have in their possession the heads of the railroads running southward into Hungary.

The Russians also are carrying on offensive operations against Uzsok Pass to the east, but at Tukholka Pass still further to the east they apparently are satisfied to withstand the Austro-German attacks against their ties. very strong positions at Koziouwka, which the Germans have tried often to capture.

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

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
