## New Supt. Kerrville Schools

From a post card picture swiped from the professor, we had the above cut made, and here present the people of Kerrville with a fairly good likeness of their new superintendent of schools, Prof. J. G. Chapman, recently elected by the board. Prof. Chapman is a native Georgian and graduated with a P. S. degree from Reinhardt College of that state. He is graduate of Peabody at Nashville and of the University of Nashville and Peabody College with A. B. degree. Among the numerous Summer Schools he has attended was Summer School of the South at Knoxville, Tenn. He is also a graduate student of Columbia University, New York. He has served as superintendent for the past ten years in Alabama and Louisiana and last year was superintendent at Marietta, Okla. He comes recommended as a first class school man and a gentleman of the highest character.

## A Great Encampment

The 1915 Westminster Encampment is opening with the best attendance and greatest enthusiasm in its history. The summer home feature of the camp is making a strong appeal. New cottages are being built each season, and this year there were two hundred campers a week before the program began. The manager reports that a week before the opening reservations were made for almost the full capacity of the equipment; the arrangements, however, are sufficiently elastic to provide for all who come.

For some weeks the early campers have been attending the churches in town. On last Sunday Dr. R. E. Vinson of Austin preached to a large congregation at the Camp in the morning. At the evening service the Camp invited the congregation of the Presbyterian church to worship with them and asked Rev. W. P. Dickey, the pastor, to preach. Camp musicians rendered a splendid musical program, and a large audience of town and Camp people enjoyed an inspiring service. During the service Dr. Dickey baptized the little son of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Delaney.

The program begins Thursday evening of this week at 8:15. The opening sermon will be preached by Rev. James L. Vance of Nashville, Tenn. Dr. Vance is pastor of one of the largest churches in the Presbyterian church, the First Church of Nashville, and is also Chairman of the foreign Mission Committee of the Southern Presbyterian church. Dr. Vance and a team of experts and missionaries representing the Foreign Mission work will present that work through lectures and moving pictures of the actual work, taken last year, from Thursday evening to Sunday evening. Every one interested in Foreign Missions should attend these sessions.

Monday and Tuesday the Women's work will be presented by Mrs. W. L. Hickman and her assistants, and

this program includes all the practical problems of Women's work in the church. It will be of interest to the women of all churches, and it is open to all who wish to attend.

The next four days will be given to a School for Young People. The young men from 15 to 22 will be in camp with Dr. W. B. Gray and Mr. Garland Lang. The young women will be under the guidance of Mrs. W. L. Hickman and Mrs. W. B. Gray. The mornings will be given to a study of the work and methods of young people in the church. The afternoons will be filled with well planned amusement. Each evening a lecture suited to them will be delivered by interesting speakers.

August 3rd will be devoted to the educational work of Texas under the direction of Dr. R. E. Vinson. August 4th to 8th will be given to the most vital interest of the Synod of Texas: the Home Mission work. The interest of this will be clear when you learn that some of the speakers are Dr. T. A. Wharton, Dr. W. M. Anderson, Dr. W. R. Minter of Austin and Dr. Arthur G. Jones of San Antonio.

On the 9th a conference of the Synod on Stewardship will begin. Another invaluable feature is the Bible Class conducted by Dr. Vinson. This will begin the first Friday morning and will meet every morning except Sunday at 9 o'clock during the Camp. The study this year will be in Isaiah.

This is not a revival meeting in the ordinary sense, but it is a meeting for the purpose of a most earnest and continuous study of all things we ought to know and do as Christian people. The inspiration of the thoughts and devotion of great hearted men and women and the association with a large body of zealous, wide-awake Christian people produces a revival of the best kind.

The people of Kerrville and surrounding country are cordially invited to come and take part in these meetings.

## District Court.

As we went to press last week the Jack Satterwhite murder case was on trial. The case went to the jury at 4:45 Friday afternoon and at 9:20 Saturday morning a verdict of guilty was brought in, assessing the penalty at 45 years in the penitentiary. This case was hotly contested as in the previous trial and a large number of people expressed a deep interest by being present. In the argument of the case District Attorney Brucks led for the State, followed by Judge Wallace for the defense. Gilbert C. Storms then spoke for the State, followed by Judge Geddie for the defense, who made an address of one hour and forty minutes. The closing speech for the State was by Judge John R. Storms. All the arguments were thorough and interesting. The Defense made a motion for a new trial which was refused, and an appeal will be made to the Court of Criminal Appeals.

On Monday morning the case of the State vs. Fred Kountz, charged with the murder of Hunter Smith, was called to trial. This case came here on change of venue from Kimble county where the killing of Smith took place at a barbecue about a year ago. The case was tried in Junction last February resulting in a hung jury. A jury was selected Monday afternoon composed of the following Kerr County citizens: Arthur Mosel, J. P. McFarland, Garrett Martin, R. J. Irving, Ed. Kaiser, A. L. Colbath, Geo. Williams, Roy Littlefield, W. K. Parks, T. A. Duderstadt, R. H. Renschel, T. J. Parks. In this case there are about 121 witnesses from Junction and Kimble county. There are four lawyers on each side of the case as follows: For the State, District Attorney L. J. Brucks, District Attorney Dayton Moses, Judge John R. Storms, Gilbert C. Storms; for the defense, M. E. Blackburn, H. E. Wilson, Clarence Martin, Lee Wallace. Dayton Moses is leading the prosecution and H. E. Wilson and Clarence Martin alternating in

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**Confederate Pensions Reduced**

It will be remembered that while a candidate for office Governor Ferguson, like most candidates for governor have done for the past twenty years, made many glaring promises in his appeal for the support of the battle scarred Confederate Veterans of Texas. They were promised a permanent advancement in their pensions, and the increase was given them for a few months, but this spring they were cut down to the former pittance of a little more than three dollars a month. It is to the shame of our State government that these dear old men, and women who have worn out their lives in service in this glorious Southland that they love so well are to be so neglected—so forsaken—when thousands of dollars of State funds are squandered for inaugural balls, punch and salad receptions, and many other unnecessary fool things. Let every paper—every good citizen in Texas—call the attention of our state officials and legislative body to the fact that they must account for this disgraceful treatment of the Old Soldiers of the South in summing up their official records, and let the warning ring out in clarion tones that the promises made and laws enacted to take care of these old people must be carried out or else expenses will be cut somewhere else to provide the needed funds.

**Election Next Saturday**

Saturday, 24th inst., there will be a special State election to vote on five constitutional amendments.

These three seem to us should be adopted:

First in importance is the amendment requiring citizenship to be a qualification for a voter and authorizing voting by mail by absent voters. As the law now is every foreign born person can vote if he is 21 and has lived in the State 12 months by simply declaring his intention to become a citizen, when in most cases the party never does become a citizen. There are thousands of voters in Texas of foreign birth and various nationalities who never have become citizens and never intended to, yet they may determine the issue of great questions and the election of officers. And there is no good reason why railroad men and traveling men who are necessarily absent should be disfranchised. This amendment should be carried.

Second, the amendment increasing the number of judges of the Supreme Court from three to five. The congested condition of our courts and delay in passing upon cases demands this change.

Third, the amendment separating the A. & M. College from the State University should be adopted. These institutions reflect great honor to Texas, but they are at different places and neither is dependent upon related to the other.

**Law Enforcement**

Dr. Geo. W. Truett of Dallas, speaking to the Law Enforcement League of that city last Saturday, said: "There can be but one view taken by any man who desires the highest and the best for all the peoples and conditions in our social order, and that is, that lawlessness, wherever found and whatever its form, is as the pestilence that walketh in darkness and the destruction that wasteth at noonday. Nor is it possible to preserve the dignity of law and maintain its supremacy, unless all the laws are faithfully enforced. Both the man who violates law and he who is willing for it to be violated are alike offenders against the majesty of the law, and are together contributors to a spirit that would destroy civilization itself. The noble words of Thomas Hooker are as true today as when he spoke them: 'Of law, there can be no less acknowledged than that her seat is the bosom of God, her voice is the harmony of the world. All things in heaven and earth do her homage, the very least as feeling her care, and the greatest as not exempted from her power.'"

In regard to Sunday laws Dr. Truett said: "In the interest of the State and of the individual and of the home, and of the toiling men, women and children, and of all society and civilization, the State should see to it that its laws touching the Sabbath are humane and righteous, and then see to it that such laws are enforced. To this task everyone desirous of the highest and abiding welfare of all the people should constantly give his best support. It would indeed be a black Friday for America if the Sabbath should lose its hold upon her people."

**High Tax Rate**

It is lamentable and almost a calamity that Texas is to have the highest tax rate this year in the history of the State. Speaking of the addition to the burdens of the people, Farm and Ranch of Dallas said recently:

"It is rather discouraging to note that although the country has just passed through times of financial distress because of the European war, taxes, both National and State, have been or are to be increased; transportation companies are pleading for increase in rates; in some instances commodities the consumer must have will be advanced in price; more offices have been created and larger salaries given to officials with no thought of the producer. It does not seem fair to penalize the producer and the consumer for the inefficiency and incompetency of those who serve the public."

High taxes in order to build good roads, schools, etc., in which the people can see they are getting the worth of their money, are not felt as a burden, but it is evident that there are sadly too many calls for taxes for the service the people get from it.

The Westminster Encampment in the edge of our city opens its annual meeting today with a very interesting program and a large attendance from all sections of the State. We wonder if our people fully realize and appreciate what this encampment means to our city and the great and splendid things it brings to us year after year for our mental, moral and spiritual uplift, to say nothing of what it may mean to the town from a financial standpoint? Let's attend the meetings and be convinced.

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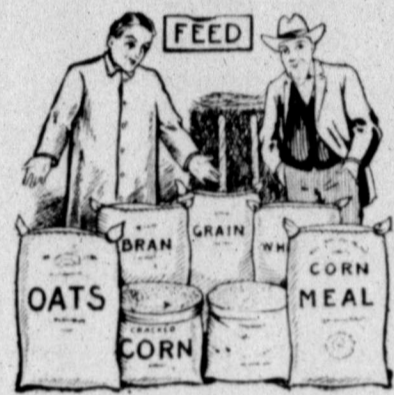
